### The Recipes

**Friday Dinner Dishes** Boil one-half cup rice until tender; drain, add one-third cup milk and one beaten egg, and season to taste with salt and pepper. Pour into greased mold, and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Turn out and set platter. Add one-half

Heat to boiling and pour over the rice mold. **Steamed Fruit Dumplings.** Roll out bakingpowder biscuit dough, made with one cup flour, and cut in four 4-inch squares. Pare and core one apple and cut in wedges. Divide the apple and one-fourth cup canned cranberry sauce between the four squares of dough, placing them in the middle. Bring the corners of the dough together and pinch well. Place dumplings on a plate, put in a steamer and steam forty-five minutes. Serve with butter and brown sugar.

### College Degree Worth \$100,000, Experts Find

Statisticians and research investigators have at last run down the elusive and much discussed dollar and cents value of a college education and have fixed it at \$100,000. Their survey reveals that the average untrained boy goes to work at the age of 14, earns less than \$2,000 a year, and his income from 14 to 60 totals \$54,000. The high school graduate, they find, starts work at 18, reaches his maximum income of \$2,500 at 50 and by 60 has earned a total of \$85,000. The college graduate, they learned, starts his career at about 22, has caught up with the high school graduate by 30 and at 60 is earning from \$3,000 to \$5,000 a year with a total earning of 90 of between \$190,000 and \$200,000. Figures from the same survey produced by the statistical department of Union Central Life Insurance Company show that out of 1,000 children entering grade school only 23 graduate from college. Lack of funds is revealed as the main reason for leaving school and educational insurance is now advocated as a means of giving a higher percentage the "break" which a college degree assures.

### English Books in Lead in German Translation

Berlin—Book sales in the English language hold first place among works by foreign authors translated into German. Next to German books, the average German reader prefers those translated from the English, American and British authors, statistics reveal, enjoy the greatest popularity in Germany. Russia is second. Nevertheless, the publication of foreign books shows a decrease within the past half year of over 20 per cent, compared with the same period. France was the chief loser.

For we do not suppose that the electrical rain-makers will so far defy established natural laws as to bring downstorms from aboard of dirigibles. The rains should be quite orderly and never freakish. Ruskin said: "As men do not walk on their heads, there are natural laws that cannot be set aside." "We have always thought of rain men, one of these days, determine when rain should fall and when it shouldn't, and electrical control may be the secret. But we have profound doubts of his being able to do a thing when a Gulf of Mexico hurricane came ashore.—F. H. Collier in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

### When Water Freezes

There is no difference between the freezing point of water that has been heated and that which has not been heated if the water is pure. In the case of tap water, which is nearly pure, the natural laws that govern the water may drive out some of the air. This has no considerable effect on the freezing point, but may affect a difference of a difference of freezing point of the water, but is probably because the water in cold-water pipes contains dissolved air, which separates on freezing and forms sticky ice; while when water in a hot-water pipe freezes, it is more apt to become under-cooled and then freezes rather suddenly, forming compact ice free from bubbles, which is more apt to break a pipe.

Early Motion Pictures  
The modern motion picture dates from about the year 1895, when Edison produced his kineoscope, the first machine of the kind using film. Edward Muybridge, often called the "father of moving pictures," had preceded him by about 20 years, but was handicapped by the fact that he had to use glass plates. Other pioneers before Edison were Sellers, Lincoln, Marey, etc. In 1894 C. Francis Jenkins was the first to produce moving pictures by modern methods. The first public showing of moving pictures was made in June, 1901.

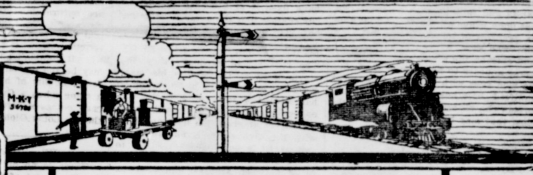

# THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS MUST DECIDE THE FATE OF TEXAS RAILROADS

● THE WELFARE of Texas and Texans has gone and will always go hand in hand with the welfare of Texas railroads. Their dependency upon each other is absolute.

In 1929 Texas railroads gave employment to 82,956 employes, to whom they paid annually \$126,674,543 in salaries and wages. In 1930 this number decreased to 70,739 while the payroll declined to \$109,892,226. In 1931 the number of employes fell to 67,998 and the payroll to \$89,505,918.

This represents a decrease of more than \$37,000,000 in purchasing power in Texas communities. There has been a corresponding decrease in purchase of materials and supplies by Texas railroads. The ability to have maintained railroad payrolls and purchases would have been a very important factor in overcoming the present trying economic condition.

The decline in railroad payrolls and purchases is due only in part to economic conditions. The revenues of the railroads have been affected not only by business conditions but to a very large extent by loss of traffic to trucks and buses using the public highways in competition with the railroads.

● The time has come when the people of Texas must decide whether the traffic of this state can best be carried by the railroads, using facilities which they built and maintain at their own expense, or by trucks and buses using the highways built and maintained at the taxpayers' expense.
