FOURTH DEATH SENTENCE FOR WACO NEGRO

(By Associated Press)
WACO, Mar. 29.—"They seem to be running me through pretty fast," was the only comment made by Roy Mitchell, negro, after the jury returned a verdict of guilty and fixed the death penalty for killing W. P. Diskell, a local cotton man almost a year ago. The jury returned a verdict late yesterday.
The negro is now under death sentence in four cases, and he will be arraigned for trial in the fifth murder case tomorrow when the charge against him for killing Harrel Bolton early last year is heard. The four death penalties have been assessed against the negro within two weeks.

MILES PLANS FOR SCHOOL CONTEST

SUES OFFICER FOR \$10,000 DAMAGE

A ten thousand dollar damage suit was filed in District Court at Ballinger this week growing out of the arrest of J. W. Tabor, a young farm hand, by J. R. Harris, a prominent farmer of the Hatchel country, and deputy sheriff of that community. The suit is of unusual nature.

Tabor is seeking damages in the sum of \$5,025 actual, and \$5,000 exemplary. The young man alleges among other things that his home is in Cooke county Texas. That in 1922 he made a crop on the Ferguson farm in the Hatchel country, and that after completing his work, and while arranging to return to his home for a visit, the defendant detained him at Winters and searched his suit case for good alleged to have been stolen, making the search without warrant, etc. The plaintiff further alleges that on January 16th of this year, he was arrested by the defendant and brought to Ballinger and placed in jail with negro prisoners, where he was held overnight and most of the following day, without any complaint being filed against him, and that he was arrested without warrant, etc.

At the time of the arrest of Tabor by Mr. Harris, the said Harris was acting as a deputy sheriff, and it is reported that he arrested the young man for threats to run the negroes out of the Hatchel community, but no complaint was ever filed against Tabor charging him with making such threats. It is also reported that Tabor was seeking work in the Hatchel country, and it is alleged that he failed to find employment he charged it to the fact that the farmers were employing negro hands, and it is alleged that he made a statement that the negroes would have to be run out of the country in order that a white man might get a job. And this statement resulted in the deputy officer arresting him and bringing him to Ballinger and placing him in jail, it was said.

Judge A. K. Doss was employed by the young man to file suit.

TWO DIE AS RESULT BURNS

MILLION WATCH FUNERAL MARCH

PARIS, March 29.—All Paris paused today to pay final tribute to Madame Sarah Bernhardt. Crowds gathered at the Church of St. Francois de Sales for the funeral service over the remains which rested in a rosewood casket which the famous actress ordered made thirty years ago.

The ceremony at the church was simple and in accordance with her wishes there will be no eulogies after the ceremony at the church. The coffin was placed in a hearse covered with flowers and carried to the tomb provided for the body.

The hearse was followed by five floats bearing flowers from ten to twelve feet high. The police estimated that at least one million people gathered along the route of the funeral procession and stood with bowed heads as the hearse passed.

Recent Freeze Took Heavy Toll of Fruit and Truck

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, March 29.—A final summary of results of the freezing weather of March 18th on Texas truck crops is contained in the weekly bulletin of the state marketing department, issued today. The summary is based on late reports from representatives of the department in the various truck districts.

Early reports of destruction of between 75 and 80 per cent of the peach crop in East Texas are substantiated with few exceptions in late reports, the bulletin declares.

"The weather caught many of the orchards in full bloom," the report says of the peach situation, "and others with buds bursting, conditions following the inclement February weather having favored the advancement of the crop."

"Tomato plants in the East Texas section were damaged as much as 60 to 75 per cent," the report continues, "and while replanting is general, the three weeks set-back in starting the tomato crop to market, will probably result in decreased plantings to this crop in favor of some of the less perishable ones. Edding sweet potatoes, representing three-fourths of the plantings in East Texas also are reported killed."

"Eight hundred to 1,000 acres of cucumbers at Corpus Christi, and considerable plantings to this crop in the Wharton-Bay City section, were a total loss as a result of the freezing weather, and as the outlook for Texas cucumbers was highly promising this year, the destruction represents a severe financial loss. Some replanting will be done in both sections."

"The cantaloupe movement from Mercedes probably will be reduced by half as a result of the weather and it is now expected that nothing of importance will

California Japs Now Going to Mexico?



LOS ANGELES, CAL.—Japanese farmers in California are planning to quit the state and establish themselves either in Sinaloa or Nayarit, Mexico, according to a story in the Los Angeles Times which states it is "able to announce that negotiations for the removal of 'the entire Japanese agricultural colony in California' already 'has been taken up with the Mexican government.'"

"The anti-alien land law of California . . . throws thousands of Japanese farmers out of their land with the first of the year," the paper continues. "What these farmers would do has been a question until now unanswered." N. Jobayashi, who has lived in Mexico many years and who is married to a Mexican, a native of Guadalajara,

roll to market before the middle of May, a delay of nearly two weeks from earlier estimates. Beans and tomatoes in this section took about a 25 per cent loss, cloudy skies and winds averting a heavier loss. Spinach at Laredo was uninjured but the deal there is rapidly drawing to a close. Onions in this section escaped injury Sunday night but ice which formed in the fields Monday may further retard movement.

"Below Houston, in the Pasadena-Seepwater section, a severe loss was sustained to the strawberry crop. Possibly 50 per cent of the crop was killed, taking the plantings as a whole. Notwithstanding the two freezes this year the strawberry crop of this section has been a profitable one. Next year's plans call for three times the present acreage."

"Estimates on damage to potatoes in the Wharton-Eagle Lake district are still at wide variance. Reliable local sources figure not more than 10 to 12 per cent of the plantings will be injuriously affected. Other estimates run as high as 30 to 40 per cent of the crop."

"Austin spinach was injured to a slight extent though not materially. It is hoped the local onion crop which has been seriously infested with thrip, will be considerably benefited by the possible destruction of this pest. The plants were not injured."

BRINGS SUIT FOR DEFAMING HIS SISTER

INDIANAPOLIS, March 29.—Louis Karnes, brother of Mrs. Agnes Karnes Randle, whose husband, Captain Edwin Randle, is stationed at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas, filed suit today for \$100,000 against Col. Arthur L. Conger, of the 20th United States Infantry, alleging defamation of Mrs. Randle's character.

Karnes will leave for Washington tonight, where he said that he would confer with the army authorities and demand an investigation of Col. Conger's action.

SAN ANTONIO C. C. BACKS UP

The San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, which passed a resolution endorsing San Angelo as the "logical" location for the Tech college, evidently realizes that somebody has made a blunder, and it backs up, renigs, and take it all back.

As a matter of fact the endorsement was not worth one whoop to San Angelo, and would have been of no value if passed in behalf of some other city applying for the college, but other towns in the territory resented the efforts on the part of San Antonio to "tamper with the jury."

The San Antonio Express, in reporting the action of the chamber of commerce in retracting or rescinding their former action, says:

"Taking note of the candidacy of 17 other towns which have entered the race for the West Texas Technological College since its qualified endorsement of San Angelo, the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce met Friday afternoon and rescinded its action with the explanation that, at the time San Angelo was endorsed it was without any knowledge of the fact that there were other cities aspiring for the school within San Antonio's trade territory."

"C. B. Yandell, general manager of the chamber, made the following statement regarding the action of the board of directors:

"At the board meeting the directors made it plain that the action which they took March 6, as favoring San Angelo was by way of emphasizing the chamber's preference for that city as against rival candidates located in the Panhandle of Texas, and without any knowledge that other cities, such as Coleman, Brady, Brownwood, Ballinger and a number of others which it is known will contest for the school, would become candidates therefor. The board took the position that it could not in fairness to the numerous aspirants undertake to pass upon their respective claims and, under the circumstances, concluded that in justice to all it would not seek to designate one city which had as much claim upon San Antonio as another, emphasizing that its original action was without any knowledge or anticipation of the condition and rivalry which has developed within the past three days."

MARCH CLOSING WITH MORE RAIN

Following on the heels of an inch rain Tuesday, a slow rain fell throughout the forenoon and up into the afternoon Thursday. The precipitation at Ballinger amounted to half an inch, bringing the total for the two days and for the month of March up to an inch and a half, all soaking in. The thirty year average March rainfall at Ballinger figures .87 of an inch, with only six years reporting as much as an inch and a half rain in March.

The forecast for the next 24 hours say: Tonight partly cloudy to cloudy. Friday warmer and unsettled.

HAMLIN MAN SHOT TO DEATH FROM AMBUSH

FT. WORTH, March 29.—Joe C. Randell, age 42, former district attorney, of Hamlin, died this morning, according to newspaper dispatches.

Randell was shot from ambush late yesterday while passing thru a cedar brake north of Hamlin en route to his home from Aspermont, where he had been attending court.

At the time he was shot by unknown parties from ambush he was traveling with Virgil Clark, C. T. Clark, and S. P. Rudder. Poses have been formed and are assisting the officers in searching for the person who fired the shots.

Randell was the innocent victim of what officers believe to be a bootlegger's bullet, which was intended for a state's witness in a liquor suit. He died in a hospital without regaining consciousness.

Two of the companions of Randell at the time he was shot were state's witnesses in liquor cases, and it is believed that the assassin intended the bullets for these witnesses.

The fatal shooting occurred in the Brazos bottoms, which are known to be infested with bootleggers, and the scene of many whiskey raids.

Randell is survived by a widow and two children. The man died in a hospital at Stamford.

TARIFF CAUSING COST SWEETNESS

WASHINGTON, March 29.—While the tariff commission is preparing to determine whether the present import duties are even partially responsible for the high sugar prices, Cordell Hull, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, declared that it had become the duty of the commission to report immediately to the president that it "was partially responsible."

It is asserted on the buyers' market that a fifty per cent reduction in the sugar tariff, which the president would be authorized to make under the tariff act, would reduce the retail price of sugar between two and three cents per pound.

MORE BILLS GET GOVERNOR'S OK

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, March 29.—Gov. Neff signed the bill authorizing the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad to purchase and operate five other Texas lines, including the International & Great Northern.

The consolidation is effective immediately, and is said to be one of the largest railroad consolidations ever effected in Texas, embracing several cross-state lines under the Frisco. The deal includes over fourteen hundred miles of railroads.

The bill increasing the terms of the state highway commissioners to six years and increasing their salaries to \$2500 annually, was also signed by the governor today. Mr. Neff also signed the bill prohibiting the exercise of eminent domain over certain riparian water rights adjacent to the streams of the state.
