GOVERNOR SENT TO JAIL

(By Associated Press)

OXFORD, Miss., April 16.—Theodore Bilbo, former governor of Mississippi, went to the Lafayette county jail today, where he will serve a sentence of thirty days for contempt of federal court.

MYERS INVESTIGATES LABOR SITUATION

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, April 16.—A state-wide investigation of labor conditions in Texas has been instituted by State Labor Commissioner Joseph S. Myers. Partial returns from the inquiries which have been sent to all labor agencies in the state have been received. The investigation is in regard particularly to the large shipments of Texas laborers to other states and orders for such laborers.

The inquiry will include reports of labor conditions between February 18 and April 14, according to Commissioner Myers. Each labor agency has been given a blank asking for detailed information. The principal question asked is for the number of orders received from outside concerns and the number of laborers shipped to other states.

The labor agencies also have been asked to furnish information regarding the supply of unskilled laborers, whether shortage or surplus.

The investigation is being conducted according to Myers, in an effort to find methods for preventing large numbers of Texas laborers being taken to other states. Such action will result in a shortage of labor during harvest, the commissioner declares, if it continues.

Labor agencies are to be directed to supply local needs first before shipping laborers to outside points, according to department officials.

AWARDS MADE IN DISTRICT MEET

SAN ANGELO, April 16.—San Angelo High School swept clean the class A athletics and class A literary events in competition with entries from a dozen counties here Saturday in the university interscholastic league meet for district 11.

Eola won the class B athletics, Eden the class B literary contests, and Eola the rural literary events. The weather was cool and the field heavy for track work but a big crowd attended, including probably 200 out-of-town people.

Ed Eason, editor of the Winters Enterprise, was knocked unconscious but not seriously injured when accidentally struck by a discus thrown by E. Humphries of Eden.

In class A athletics San Angelo scored 78 points to Winters 38.

Class B athletic totals were: Eola 24, Eden 22, Junior High (San Angelo) 21, Miles 18, Sterling City 16, Mertzon 15, Rankin 3, Robert 3, Lakeview 3, Knickerbocker 2.

Class A literary results were: San Angelo 47, Ballinger 10, Winters 9.

Eden scored 49 in class B literary events, winning from Bronte the cup awarded for the first time last year by the San Angelo Board of City Development.

In rural literary contests, Eola scored 46 points and won from Wall a similar trophy.

San Angelo High retained the cups it won for the first time last year in class A literary and athletic events.

MURDER CASE ON AT CANADIAN

CANADIAN, Tex., April 16.—A special venire of one hundred men were summoned to appear here today from which a jury will be selected for the trial of William Moler on indictment charging murder in March of Noah Samples, prominent Plains country cattleman. The body of Samples was found near Canadian in an abandoned cellar after a several days' search. Moler was arrested and confessed to slaying the man, stating that he committed the crime for the purpose of robbing Samples.

BREWSTER COUNTY HAS \$300,000 ROAD PROGRAM

ALPINE, Tex., April 16.—Brewster county will soon launch upon a \$300,000 highway building program, according to county officials. Bonds to this amount which were voted at a special election of the Brewster county tax payers in September, 1922, were sold recently by the county commissioners' court.

The highway construction program planned under this issue of bonds will give Brewster county one of the most complete road systems in this section of Texas, according to the officials of this county.

CLARA PHILLIPS WHO ESCAPED FROM JAIL IN CALIF. LOCATED

LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 16.—Clara Phillips, the noted "hammer" murderess, who escaped jail here last December, has been traced to San Salvador, according to a copyrighted story carried in the Los Angeles Examiner today. Apprehension of the woman is expected momentarily, according to the newspaper.

Mrs. Phillips was under a ten year sentence for the death of Mrs. Alberta Meadows when she escaped in a sensational way. It is alleged in the trial of the case that the woman beat Mrs. Meadows to death with a hammer.

FLOGGING CASES FAMILY ILL ARE CONTINUED AFTER DRINK WELL WATER

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The grain futures trading act was today declared valid and constitutional by the Supreme Court.

MORE RAIN, WITH PLENTY ON HAND

Nine inches of rain is the total precipitation for Ballinger since the first of January, and it is still raining. 2.40 inches fell in January; 3.40 in February; 1.75 in March; and 1.45 up to date in April. Most anybody would smile with a little sunshine to drive the clouds away.

ATTORNEYS BUSY FOR IRRIGATION

At a meeting of the directors of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association here last Saturday, Judge A. K. Doss of this city, and Judge John W. Gaines, of San Antonio, were employed as counsel for the association, and details for creating the irrigation district and financing the construction work will be worked out at once.

Judge Gaines spent a couple of days here and he expressed himself as being very optimistic over the outlook for early development of the big proposition. He pointed out several features of the big project which no other irrigation district can claim. One is that it is the only two county project in the Southwest. That is, the district will be carved out of two counties—Runnels and Coke.

As the work progresses on plans for creating the district, and as a study of the survey is made, it appears more and more feasible every day, and capitalists are ready to back the project to the limit when all laws governing the creation of the district are complied with and when the organization is ready to begin the actual construction.

Irrigation, oil and a college, and of all three irrigation would no doubt be the one item of development which would bring the greatest number of people, and the benefit would be permanent, as the big irrigation system would insure bumper crops on thousands of acres of fertile land for generations to come.

BRITISH CLAIM TRADE BETTER

(By Associated Press)

LONDON, April 16.—Stanley Baldwin, chancellor of exchequer, in making a statement before the House of Commons today, said that the past year's surplus of one hundred million pounds had gone for the reduction of the government debt.

The statement shows that the financial year just closed became steadily better as trade proceeded at home and commerce abroad improved, and the unemployment situation shows a marked improvement.

"TECH" COMMITTEE MEETING TONIGHT

SIGNS FINLAND DEBT FUNDING AGREEMENT

WASHINGTON, April 16.—The American debt funding commission today authorized Secretary Mellon to sign the war debt funding agreement with Finland.

PRIEST SENT TO PEN FOR LIFE

KALAMAZOO, Mich., April 16. Rev. Charles Dillion, the confessed slayer of Rev. Henry O'Neill, both Catholic priests, in Saint Augustine Catholic church, last Thursday, has been sentenced to life imprisonment and hard labor by Judge Weimer of the circuit court. Judge Weimer passed sentence on the priest today.

NEFF HANDS IN 8 TAX BILLS

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, April 16.—Senator Charles Murphy, of Houston, was elected president pro tem of the Senate today and the Senate suspended rules and passed finally the per diem contingent expense bills totalling \$11,000.

Eight bills were introduced in the House. They include the so-called quo warranto bill, which is sponsored by the governor and seeks to remove county officials from office who fail to perform duties prescribed by their oath. The bill failed to pass the regular session and was re-submitted in the governor's message today.

AUSTIN, April 16.—Both houses of the Texas legislature established quorums this morning and the second special session of the legislature got under way.

Twenty-three members answered roll call in the Senate and one hundred and three in the House.

The legislature is called upon to enact eight revenue raising measures by the governor in his first message submitted soon after both houses convened. The measures proposed by the governor include bills for increasing gross oil production tax, franchise tax, inheritance tax, delinquent tax, income tax.

Governor Neff also called upon the legislature to give the revenue measures the first consideration. The state is facing a deficiency in its general revenue fund amounting to \$780,406, the governor's message declared.

Considering the appropriations already made presentary, the state will have a deficiency of approximately three million four hundred thousand dollars by the close of the year, the governor said.

RABBIT DRIVERS TO MEET TOMORROW

W. E. Rollins, who lives two miles West of the city, was in the city Monday arranging for a rabbit drive for the country West and adjacent to Ballinger tomorrow (Tuesday). Those who will take part in the drive are requested to meet at the upper dam on Elm Creek at ten o'clock in the morning, and the drive will be made West and up the creek.

Mr. Rollins stated that the rabbits were thick in that community and were playing havoc with the small grain crop. He stated that four acres of oats near his home were kept grazed down by the rabbits as though a bunch of sheep were grazing them.

HELD "PEACE PIPE" SACRED

American Indians Attached Immense Importance to the Ceremony That Accompanied Its Smoking.

The smoking of the "Pipe of Peace" among the American Indians was a ceremony attended with great solemnity. The peace pipe, called by the French the calumet, was treated with great reverence and was brought out only upon the most important occasions, such as the making of peace treaties, the reception of a distinguished stranger with whom the tribe wished to be upon good terms. If the occasion did not bring forth the pipe of peace, it was a sign of hostility. To refuse to smoke it when offered was a cause of offense. The calumet was between two and three inches long, and the stem rather than the bowl was the object of the Indian's reverence. The stem was of reed, artistically decorated with women's hair or eagle's quills. Among the western tribes the pipe bowl was of red catlinite, a fine-grained stone of deep red color found in Coteau des Prairies, west of Big Stone lake, in South Dakota. The Indians of the White and East made the bowl of white stone pierced with several holes so that several stems could be used at the same time. The calumet quarries were regarded as neutral ground among the warring tribes and there were many sacred traditions connected with these spots.

FURTHER HINTS ABOUT MEN

Famous Chinese Tombs.
 The famous Ming tombs are located near Nanking, China. On the road that leads to them from Nanking are colossal figures of carved stone. These are statues of Chinese kings. The Mongols under Genghis Khan's successor swept across Asia and Russia and overran Hungary. He defeated the Germans and Poles in 1241. But the mongols were beaten by Egypt in 1260. After that their power waned, and China was able to throw off the Mongol yoke in 1369, when she established a rule of native kings—the great Ming dynasty. Under the Mings, China flourished until 1644. Then the Manchus, another Mongol people, reconquered China, and remained masters until 1912.
 There is a fence built around these statues, because the Chinese believe that the statues would be very mad if a common Chinaman were to touch them.

Blind Spots.
 The world has its "blind spots" for thunder and lightning, says a bulletin of the National Geographic society. The brilliant flash of lightning and the crackle and rumble of thunder would be as impossible of conception by many Eskimos as would "solid water" by equatorial savages.
 In general the frequency of thunderstorms decreases as one goes north, until within the Arctic and Antarctic Circles they seldom occur.
 When Katmai volcano, on the Alaskan peninsula, erupted in 1912, some of the adult natives of the vicinity were more terrified at the lightning and thunder that accompanied the dust clouds than at the possibility of being buried by ash, because they had nothing in their lifelong experience by which to judge the blinding and deafening noise from the skies.

Luminous Paints.
 The luminous ingredient in paints is usually either calcium sulphide, barium or strontium carbonate or sulphate, or mixtures of these chemicals may be used. An example of a luminous paint, giving a violet, is as follows: 100 parts of strontium carbonate, 100 parts of sulphur, 0.5 parts each of potassium chloride and sodium chloride, 0.4 parts manganese chloride. These are heated an hour to 75 minutes to about 2,372 degrees F. The paint is prepared by mixing this with pure kerosene oil.

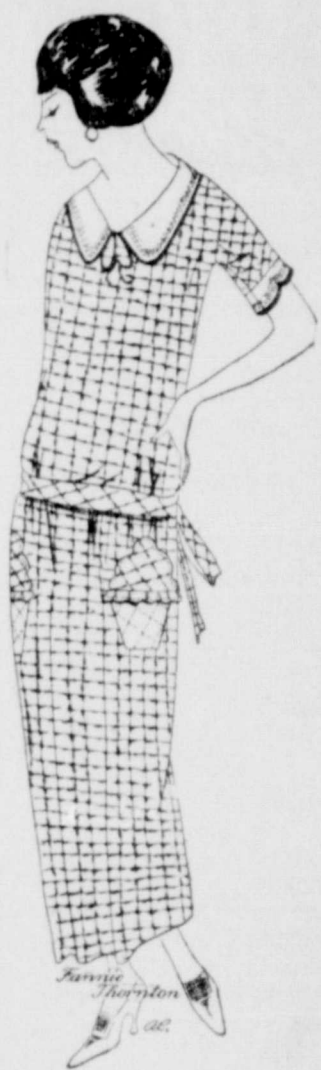
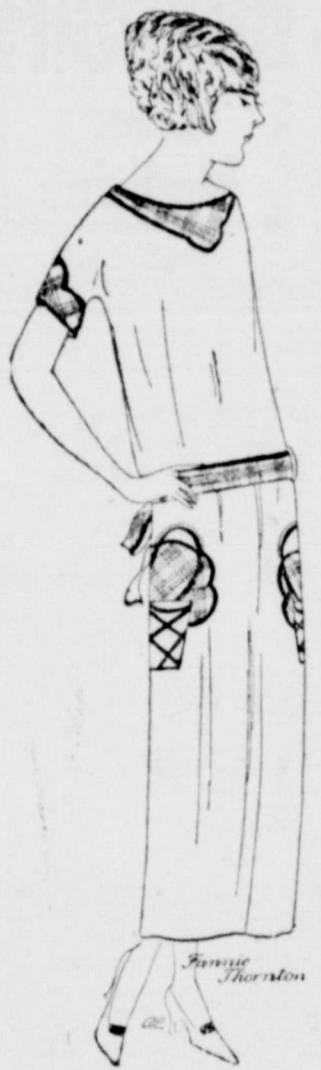
