

Two aspirants, with about equal followings, the Grand Duke Cyril and the Grand Duke Dimitri, both dream of occupying the throne so tragically abandoned by Nicholas II. Cyril, the eldest son of the Grand Duke Vladimir, brother of Alexander II, is the first in line in the succession, in case Russia should be disposed to return to czardom. But many legitimatists oppose his candidacy on the pretext that his mother was a Protestant and that in marrying her the Grand Duke Vladimir had, in accordance with dynastic exigencies, renounced his right to the

"Cyril denies the existence of such a written renunciation, which, for that matter, nobody can claim ever to have seen. His adversaries reproach him with having compromised himself with the Socialists by making a visit to the revolutionaries at the Tauride palace the day after the abdication of Nicholas II. For these two reasons monarchists prefer the son of the Grand Duke Paul, the Grand Duke Dimitri, who, as is well known, took part in the assassination of Rasputin.

Need for a Strong Man. "But not all the monarchists believe Russia will have need of a strong man, capable of maintaining order in the country until elections can be held. These monarchists are persuaded that the Grand Duke Nicholas, whose liberal sentiments are unconcealed, would be able to take the reins during this critical period. It is asserted that the former generalissimo is receptive to such suggestions.

"Finally, General Wrangel, who remains in the Balkans, is not altogether inactive. The officers who served under him in the south of Russia have not deserted him, and it is said that they are ready to answer a second call from him.

"The Democrats and Socialists form a number of groups more or less isolated. The revolutionary Socialists stand altogether apart. The moderate Socialists, whose leader is M. Aksentiev, are inclined to make political concessions. They would have little trouble in reaching an agreement with the moderate Republican groups. The revolutionary Socialists of the Left, led by M. Tchernov, remain faithful to their extremist principles, and if they were permitted later to exercise any power in Russia they would pursue again the policy which they followed in 1917 and thereby prepared the way for Bolshevism. Between these two tendencies Kerensky still hesitates, as if he were waiting for events to dictate his line of conduct.

Irrigation Tax Rate will be Low; Water Revenues will Help Pay Off Bonds

The advertisements appearing in The Ledger of August 8th, and 10th purporting to give the tax rates that would prevail in the irrigation district demonstrate that the writer is not only unfamiliar with the best form of bend issues, but is also unacquainted with the advantages to be derived from an inexhaustible supply of water for farms and towns

The present tax valuations as given may be correct, but after the irrigation system is constructed taxes will be leved on the basis of entirely new wealth resulting from the irrigation of farm lands; increased city water supply; increased production; increased population, new industries, etc. The writer of the ad was actually pessimistic enough to contemplate that the taxable valuations of this section would remain the same during the next 40 years even without irrigation.

The district in its final form will include about 150,000 acres of irrigable land, worth on an average \$250.00 per acre. Before the first tax levy is made, Ballinger, with a population of several thousand people would have taxable valuations of at least \$5,000,000.00. Bronte and Miles would have valuations of at least \$1,000,000.00 each. The combined valuations of Maverick and Tennyson would be about \$500,000.00. Comparison with other irrigation districts show that the total valuations should reach at least \$22,500,000.00.

Valuations would not have to be raised on the property now owned in Ballinger, Bronte and Miles. The added values would come from new buildings, homes, enterprises, etc. Much of the added values on the land would come from the new improvements which would necessarily be erected.

For arguments sake we will discard two and a half million of these valuations, leaving a total of \$20,000,000.00, instead of \$28,000,000.00 as the opposition says will be necessary. We will take the irrigable land at less than \$85.00 per acre, or one third of its actual value, instead of \$175.00 per acre, as they say would have to be done. And against this valuation we will issue \$5,000,000.00 worth of 6 per cent bonds. But not straight 40 year bonds, as they would have you do. It would be the height of waste and extravagance to retire the bonds in the manner contemplated by them. That plan did not even take into consideration the interest that would accrue on the \$125,000.00 annually retired to the sinking fund. Would you have your business administered that way? The wasteful manner in which they would retire the bonds would cost the district nearly \$5,000,000.00 more over the 40 year period than the following plan:

An ideal plan would be to issue serial bonds, payable annually, the carlier maturing bonds being in small denominations, increasing the size of the bonds annually as the interest payments decreased. Then, instead of paying \$425,000.00 every year, as they would have you do, the annual payments could be so fixed as to range from \$362,000.00 down to \$185,000.00 with the annual tax rate decreasing from a maximum of \$1.80 to a min-

The following diagram outlines a bond issue on which \$50,000.00 is paid annually during the first five years; \$75,000.00 annually during the next five years, etc. Note carefully how the total payments for each year are balanced as the payments on the principal are increased, and the pay-

The annual payment under this plan would average about \$300,000.00 instead of \$425,000.00, as the opposition would have it. If landowners paid only \$1.00 per acre per year water service charge, the revenue would be \$150,000.00. Deduct this from the \$300,000.00 annual payment and you could cut your taxes in half. But landowners can afford to pay more than \$1.00 an acre per year for water. This district can be made self supporting without a tax levy, just as is done with Ballinger's Municipal Light

Average tax rate over 40 years \$1.53

It should be kept in mind that the total tax will not be borne soley by those who now live within the district. The 150,000 acres now owned by our citizens will be subdivided and sold at fancy prices. At a high average of 50 acres to the family, the district would support 3000 families, or 15,000 people. The three towns and two communities would have a combined population of about 15,000 people. The average annual production of the distrct would be between twelve and thirteen million dollars, using figures from twenty Western irrigation projects as a guide.

The cost of the project would be small compared to the cost of doing without it. Drouths have cost this section millions of dollars. We can stop this annual loss by empounding the storm waters and putting them to

work every summer when they are needed.

The outstanding problen which confronts this country would be solved. With an ample supply of water every year for the farms and cities, both farmers and business men could pursue their labors without fear of drouth, secure in the knowledge that bountiful crops would be raised, regardless of conditions elsewhere. Agriculture and commerce would be for the first

time in our history placed on a firm, sound basis.
