The young lady told the officers that she quarrelled with her father and that he sent her away from home several weeks ago, and that she was without funds. According to the girl's story she walked to California.

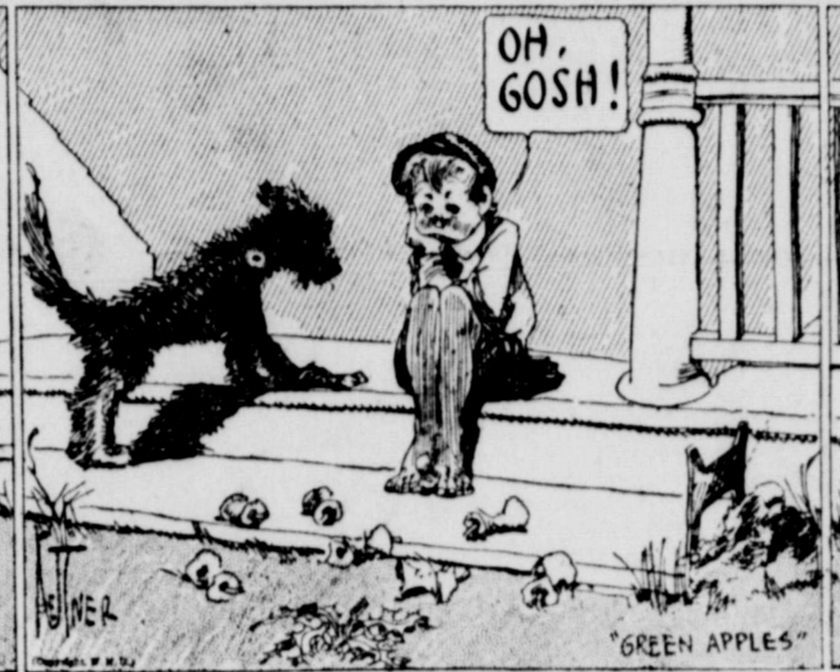

## FOUR KILLED IN SHIP CRASH

(By Associated Press)  
NEWPORT, Rhode Island, July 22.—Two men and two women are known to have been killed when the oil tanker, Swift Arrow, crashed into a liner of the Eastern Steamship Line, Boston, off Point Judith last night during a heavy fog. The bodies were found in the wreckage of two staterooms when the Boston was towed into Newport harbor, where the vessel reached today.  
Several passengers are known to have been injured. The crew and passengers were taken off in life boats and transferred to rescuing steamers. Radio calls were sent out for help, and the details of the collision picked up in fragmentary form.

FALL RIVER, Mass., July 22.—Mrs. Oscar Green, of Brooklyn, New York, was killed in her berth on the steamer Boston in collision with an oil freighter last night. This was learned when passengers arrived here last night on a rescue steamer.

## 3000 PEOPLE KILLED IN BRAZILIAN REVOLT

## BOY'S FATHER FIRST WITNESS IN MURDER CASE

(By Associated Press)  
CHICAGO, July 22.—Jacob Franks, father of the 13-year-old victim of Nathan Leopold Jr. and Richard Loeb, the millionaire youths who have confessed to the slaying of the Franks boy, will be the first witness for the state when the presentation of evidence begins tomorrow before Chief Justice John Caverly.

The two youths were arraigned for trial yesterday and entered pleas of guilty through their attorney, Clarence Darrow, and it was made known that the defense would be insanity. States Attorney Robert Crowe will make a brief opening statement when the case is taken up tomorrow. He will make a brief statement setting forth the aims of the prosecution, and suggesting that the penalty be fixed at punishment by death. The state will demand the death penalty, while the defense will plead insanity.

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Three thousand civilians are reported to have been killed and injured in fighting at Sao Paulo between the Brazilian army and the revolutionary forces. The reports were received today by the state department, and said that no Americans were killed. The heaviest fighting, the messages said, took place during the night of July 20th, but the result of the fighting did not materially change the situation.

# "Get On the Line for God"

—Winsett

The above is the slogan announced Monday night by Evangelist John G. Winsett for the revival meeting which is now on at the Baptist church.

The evangelist and his singer, T. D. Carroll, reached Ballinger Monday afternoon from Merkel, where they closed a great meeting Sunday. More than sixty members were received into the Merkel church on the last day in addition to those who had already joined during the meeting.

It was a splendid congregation that greeted the visitors for their first service here. Mr. Carroll demonstrated at once his fine ability as a song leader. He also sang a solo, entitled, "He Loves Even Me." His voice is under fine control, exhibiting its ability for gentler tones where necessary for interpretation, as well as a richness and volume that can well fill the largest auditorium.

Mr. Winsett, as a public speaker, is the soul of energy from the moment he jumps to his feet until he says the amen. There is not a dull moment at any time. He won't permit it. Somehow you are gripped by all he says. He is a man of striking personality, strong in body, broad shoulders, full chest, massive head, active as a boxer and the audience feels that he is well able physically to back up all he says. And he is a sin fighter. On that point he left no doubts in the minds of his hearers the first service.

The speaker's text was in II Chronicles 7:14: "If my people who are called by my name shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from Heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land." The emphasis was given to the word "my," the preacher declaring that if the people who are professed Christians themselves become revived as they should, there need be no worry about a revival for the town, for that would be bound to follow.

Two services a day are being held—10:00 a. m. and 8:15 p. m. The evangelist says every service will begin on the minute and close when the Lord wants it to. The morning service lasts but one hour, but is followed by a prayer meeting for those who can remain.

The evangelistic team comes to Ballinger from Merkel, and the pastor of the Merkel church, Rev. W. H. Albertson, gave the following report of the meeting at that place:

"Sunday night, July the twentieth, marked the close of one of the most significant and far reaching meetings ever held with the First Baptist Church of

Merkel, Texas. Rev. John G. Winsett and Mr. T. D. Carroll composed the evangelistic party. The Lord was greatly magnified and gloriously blessed his people throughout the entire campaign. There were many outstanding victories and high hours.

"Bro. Winsett preaches the gospel in its purity without fear or favor. He is absolutely uncompromising on the fact that Christian people should be different from the world. He doesn't mince words in saying that if we are Christians we should live like a Christian. All of our churches today need a revival within that the cold and backslidden Christians may "Get on the Line for God," and that the unsaved in the churches may be reached for Christ. Bro. Winsett goes on the basis that if the church really gets right with God and will take a stand for Him the lost will be saved even after the evangelist is gone.

"There were eleven week-day services, the stores closing for the last week. All of these week-day morning services were given to the study of the Holy Spirit from the facts as they are revealed in the word of the Lord. I don't think I have ever had anything to happen in my pastoral experience that did the church as much real good as these discussions. Most of us believe the Bible doctrine of the Holy Spirit but we do not appropriate Him in our lives.

"The last Sunday morning service was the greatest of all. It began at 10:30 and closed at 2:00. No one wanted to leave. Most men trembled and wept under the power of God. Women shouted His praises when they saw loved ones coming into the Kingdom. People were dazed and overwhelmed by the presence of God.

"The last Sunday afternoon of the meeting the evangelist delivered a lecture on 'The Menace of the Nations.' The tabernacle was packed to overflowing. He showed how divorce and immorality are digging the foundation from under our great Christian nation. He called a spade a spade

and put divorce and immorality both where they belong—in hell. The devil is the author of divorce and divorce is the mother of immorality. I could wish that Winsett might go into every community and preach this sermon.

"Bro. T. D. Carroll is an excellent choir director and stands at the front as a soloist. He sings under the leadership of the Lord.

"Merkel will long remember this campaign. Some are mad, yes. Jesus never went into a community that he didn't leave the Devil howling. The First Baptist Church endorses these men without any sort of reservation. If you want your community stirred out to its limits for God get these two brethren. There were eighty-seven definite decisions for the Lord, and 17 subscriptions to the Standard."
