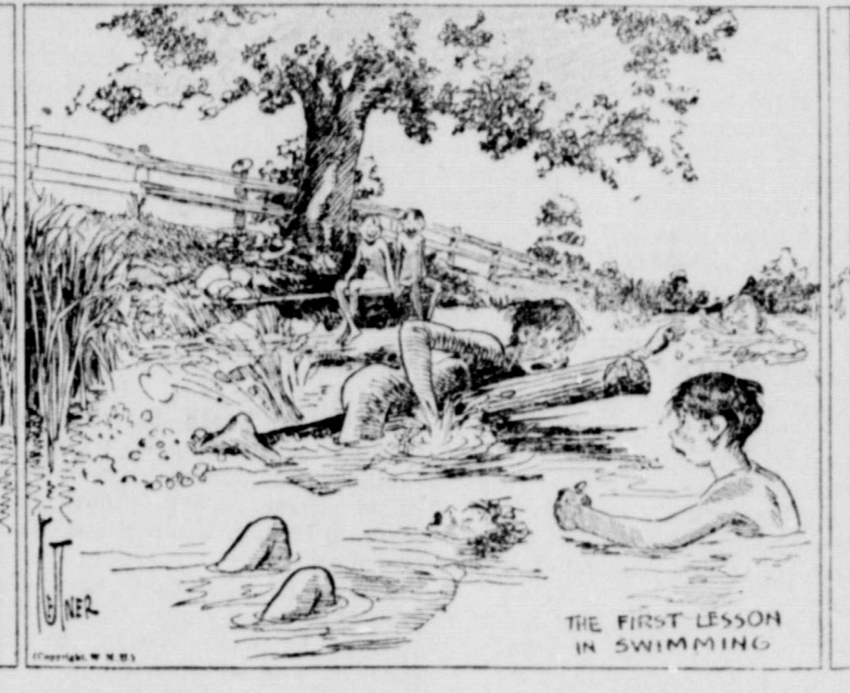

NEW EVIDENCE IN MURDER CASE

(By Associated Press)
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 16.—An entirely new aspect has been given to the Theresa Mors murder case which is being investigated by the authorities. The new development in the case is caused by the testimony of a woman who says she heard and saw two men fleeing from the apartment occupied by Mrs. Mors and Kid McCoy, the former pugilist, a few minutes after the shot was fired which ended the life of Mrs. Mors.

The new witness in the case, the police say, lived in the apartment directly under that in which the shooting took place. McCoy is being held in connection with the shooting.

ALLIES TO LEAVE RUHR BY SEPTEMBER 30TH

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Aug. 16.—Speedy preparations are being made for the plenary session of the international conference tonight, when the complete membership will be summoned and when the delegates will initiate their agreement as to how the Dawes plan is to be executed.

Until the German reichstag and the French chamber of deputies endorse the action of the London conference it will not be possible to have the final signatures attached to the document.

LONDON, Aug. 16.—August 15, 1925, is the date finally agreed upon for the evacuation of the Ruhr. The French and Belgians have also agreed to evacuate all other towns and points outside the Ruhr which are not in the district they are occupying under the treaty of Versailles.

As an example of good will the French and Belgians are prepared to withdraw French troops from Dortmund and surrounding territory on August 30th, which is one day after, it is expected, the French parliament will ratify the agreement just entered into by the international conference of inter-allied nations.

PRESENTS LETTER WRITTEN BY GENERAL SAM HOUSTON

CANYON, Aug. 16.—A letter written in July 1824 by Gen. Sam Houston has been presented to the Panhandle Plains Historical Society by W. H. Bush of Chicago. Mr. Bush also presented the society a photographic copy of another letter written Feb. 17, 1844 by General Houston and addressed to General Jackson at The Hermitage, Nashville, Tenn.

Both these letters will be added to the growing collection of documents possessed by the historical society.

W. H. Bush is a member of the Chicago Historical Society but is an extensive land owner in the Panhandle. He is deeply interested in the history and development of this section.

PREACHER POUNDED AT NAZARENE REVIVAL

The congregation of the Nazarene church went to church Friday night with armsfull of bundles, packages, boxes, buckets, paper bags, etc., all loaded with something to eat, and the pastor, Rev. E. D. Messer, was given a good pounding. The offering included chickens, flour, bacon, canned goods, and almost everything necessary to keep the pantry replenished. Practically every church in town had a hand in the pounding, sending contributions either to the tent where the revival is being held or to the pastor's home. Rev. Messer was loud in his expressions of appreciation. He stated that the good things came in at the right time, as he had just lost his job, and was now depending on his pastorate entirely for support. Rev. Messer has been acting as assistant county superintendent, as well as serving as pastor of the Nazarene church, but he completed his work with the county superintendent Friday. He is an expert stenographer and bookkeeper, and from time to time has been supplementing his salary from his church by doing such work.

The services at the Nazarene church were cut short Friday night on account of the threatening rain. The services will continue through next week, and Sunday promises to be a big day. Monday night, Mrs. Catherine Seals, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Jeanes, who is here visiting from California, will preach.

MANY FILING ABSENT VOTES

The ballots for the second primary election have been printed and are now being used by voters who are leaving home and do not expect to be here on August 23rd.

Any person who will be absent from home on election day may cast an absentee vote until including next Wednesday, Aug. 20th. No absentee ballot can be filed after that date. If you are leaving home and want to leave your ballot behind, call on the county clerk with your poll tax receipt and he will direct you how to file your ballot.

More than 50 absentee ballots were cast in the first primary, and quite a number have already been filed for the second primary. The official ballot is a short one, and it is now a choice between two candidates for office where no candidate received a majority of all the votes polled in the first primary.

PREDICTS U. S. WILL NEED FOREIGN MEATS IN 15 YEARS

(By Associated Press)
EDINBURGH, Aug. 16.—At the concluding session here of the Scottish cattle breeding conference, when a review of the cattle situation in the chief countries of the world was under discussion, Major E. N. Wentworth, of Armour's Bureau, Chicago, said that the United States had already passed in consumption the rate of production in sheep and mutton, and was at the balancing point in beef. He believed as the industrial population increased and while wage levels remained high, it would be very possible within the next 15 years for the British colonies to export produce to the United States.

Major Wentworth said also, he did not think the United States would ever become a market for imported pork and bacon, but that America was certain to become a definite market for beef, sheep and lamb, and dairy products.

ICE AGAIN STOPS WORLD FLYERS SEEKS CONTROL BRANCH LINES

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, August 16.—Boats from the American world flyers' supply ships off the coast of Greenland failed to get through the ice to a new landing place which had been selected for the aviators today. The boats could only get within fifteen miles distant of the new landing yesterday.

1 DEAD; 1 HURT; TRAINS COLLIDE

DALLAS, August 16.—Harry Childress, age 42, of Jacksonville, Texas, engineer for the Texas & New Orleans Railroad, was killed and John Lewis, fireman, also of Jacksonville, was injured when a freight train crashed into a gravel train on a siding three miles West of Grand Prairie this morning.

Childress was trapped in the engine cab and was fatally scalded by escaping steam. He died two hours later in a local hospital. Lewis suffered bruises when he jumped to safety just before his engine crashed into the gravel train.

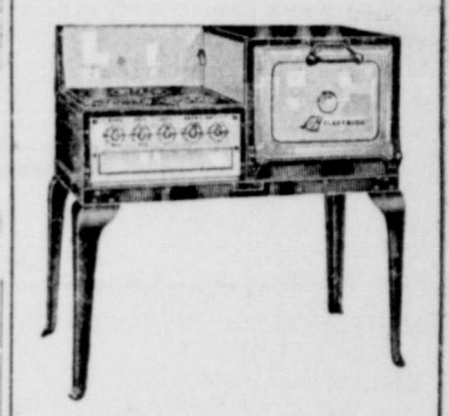

**DEATH CLAIMS
 C. C. GANNOWAY**

After lingering at death's door for several days, C. C. Gannoway passed away at his home on Fifth Street at 7:15 o'clock Friday evening. He had been in poor health for several years, but able to be up and among his friends until a short time ago.

Mr. Gannoway was a pioneer of this county. He came to the county from Hill county thirty-three years ago, and located in the Wingate country, where he lived until he moved to Ballinger about ten years ago. He was numbered among the best men and the best citizens of this county, the faithful husband of a devoted wife and the kind father of a large family of children, and a friend to all who knew him.

Mr. Gannoway was born in Arkansas on August 31, 1854. He would have been 70 years of age if he had lived until the 31st day of this month. In 1875 Mr. Gannoway was married to Miss Belle Arnot, and he is survived by the faithful wife who has shared with him for forty-nine years her joys and who has borne with him his sorrows.

Nine children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Gannoway, and of this number seven are living. All were with him a few days before his death, but two were called home on account of illness in their own immediate family. The living children are Mrs. Anna Moroe, of Abilene; Mrs. Clyde Gentry, of Norton; Mrs. Hallie Turner, of Lamesa; Mrs. Pearl

Black, of Breckenridge; Mrs. Ursula Turner, of Raymondville; Guy Gannoway, of Wingate; Mrs. Olga Gardner, of Newcastle. Twenty-nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild also survive.

The remains of the pioneer citizen were laid to rest in the cemetery at Wingate, where the deceased lived for almost a quarter of a century. The funeral services were held at the residence of the deceased in Ballinger at 1:30 Saturday afternoon, the services being concluded at the cemetery at 4:00 o'clock. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Ben S. Sullivan, a pioneer West Texas Baptist minister; Rev. T. C. Jester, formerly pastor of the Baptist church in Ballinger, now of Taylor, and who is holding a revival at Wingate; and Rev. Alvin Swindell, the present pastor of the Ballinger Baptist church.

**Experts Seek Light on Ways
 of Women 2,000 Years Ago**
 (By Associated Press)

CHRISTIANIA, August 16.—What is believed by experts to have been a kind of vanity box used by the women of 2,000 years ago, and a neck-ring of solid gold, were unearthed recently on a farm by a peasant who gave the articles to his children for playthings.

Collectors eventually heard of the discovery and induced the children to part with their ancient toys. The articles, in the judgment of the experts, date back to about 120 B. C. The ring, of artistic though barbaric design, has been placed in the museum of Christiania University, while the vanity box has been going the rounds among experts

who are eager to determine if it contained a powder puff among its appurtenances, or, if not, what might have been in use to take its place in those days.

**WOODWARD FIRST TO
 SERVE NEW DISTRICT**

The recent election resulted in the election of Hon. Walter Woodward of Coleman to the state senate from this district, which, under the new apportionment, is changed from the twenty-sixth district to the twenty-fifth district.

The old twenty-sixth senatorial district was composed of the counties of Erath, Comanche, Mills, San Saba, McCulloch, Runnels, Concho, Coleman, Brown, Llano.

The present senatorial district is composed of the counties of Coleman, Comanche, McCulloch, Brown, Runnels, Concho, Menard, Mason, Irion, Schleicher, Tom Green, Mills, Coke, Sterling, Kimble, and Gillespie.

It will thus be seen that in the matter of the new district the counties of Erath, San Saba and Llano were dropped, and the counties of Menard, Schleicher, Tom Green, Mason, Coke, Sterling, Gillespie, Kimble and Irion were added.

Judge Frank Sweet says that the state had not been redistricted in twenty years, at the time it was redistricted in 1921. The population of the counties which made the old twenty-sixth district, in 1920, was 112,395. The population of the new twenty-fifth district by the census of 1920 was 155,058.

Under the new re-districting law every senator will have to draw for terms when the legislature meets next January. Fifteen will draw for two year terms and sixteen will draw for four year terms. This so arranges the law that one-half of the senate has to be elected every two years and one-half are holdovers.

Under the redistricting law twenty years ago, or in 1902, "Uncle Bill" Adams was elected first senator for the twenty-sixth district. Hon. Walter Woodward has the honor of being the first senator for the twenty-fifth district. Other senators who have served this district, or rather the old twenty-sixth district are as follows: Hon. Arch Grinnan, Hon. R. P. Connor, Hon. Scott Woodward, Hon. J. Harvey Baugh.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

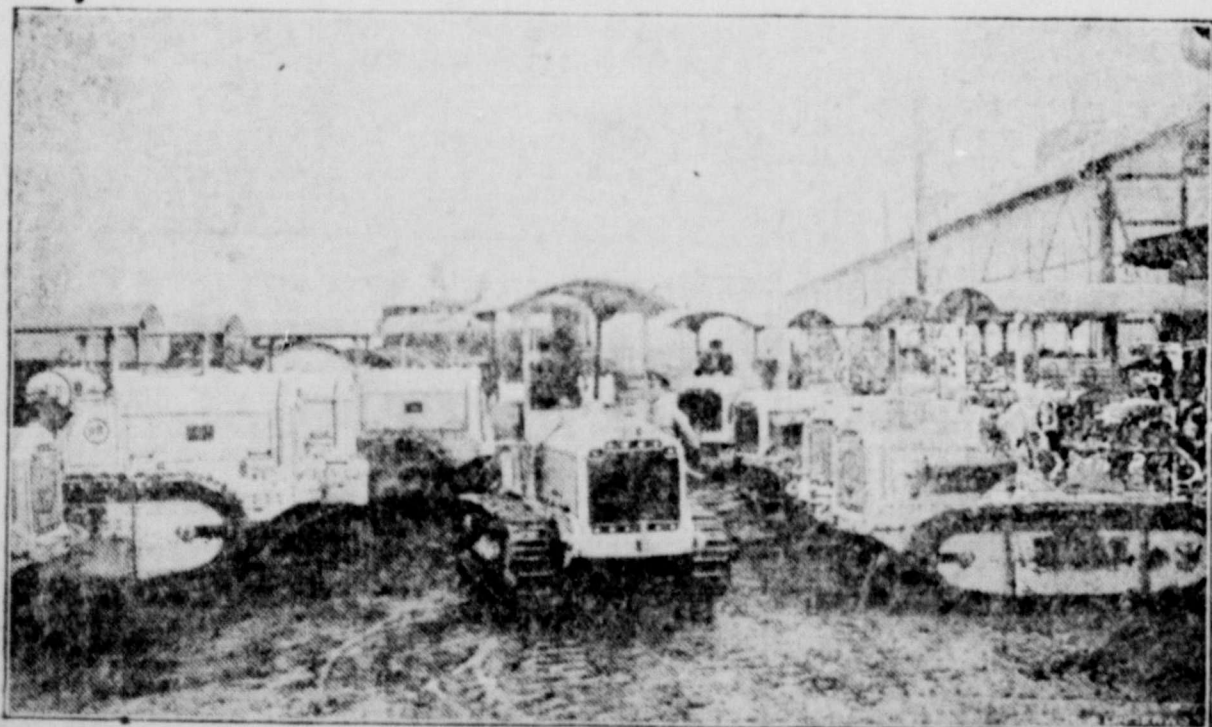

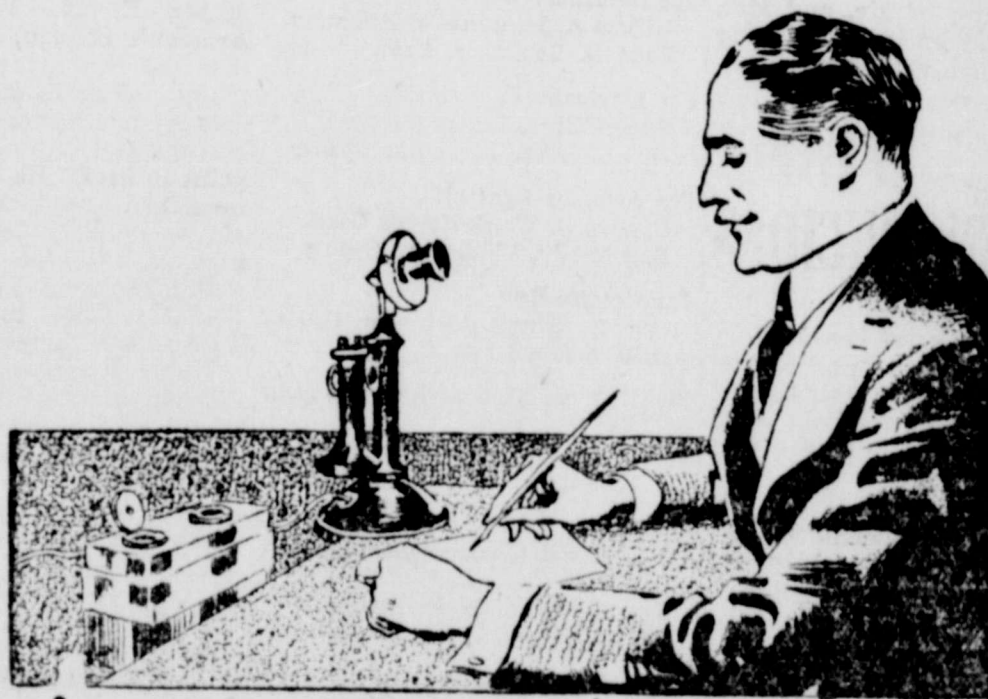

TRACTOR SHOW DRAWS CROWD

More than three hundred men, and many women, witnesses the tractor demonstration put on in South Ballinger by Van Pelt, Kirk & Mack Friday afternoon. At one time there were more than one hundred autos parked in the vicinity of where the demonstration was held, and many were going and coming during the two hours or more time that the tractor was being put through a test.

A McCormick-Deering tractor was demonstrated, pulling a triple disc plow, and several acres of land by the modern way. Most of the crowd lingered throughout the entire time and watched the tractor as it plowed round after round, throwing up a perfectly pulverized lay of land without stopping a minute for any cause.

Perhaps one of the drawing features of the demonstration was a guessing contest staged in connection with the plowing. Van Pelt, Kirk & Mack, local dealers for the McCormick-Deering line, gave away \$32.50 in cash prizes, the prizes being awarded on a basis of the nearest guess as to the time required in plowing an acre of ground with the tractor, and quantity of coal oil required for fuel. The guessing game was

interesting, many of those guessing figuring it out on a scientific basis. The tractor traveled at a rate of three miles per hour and cut three nine-inch furrows, or a total of twenty-seven inches.

The timekeeper and judges were appointed and the contest was an interesting one, many of those present keeping their eyes on the watch and counting the minutes as the tractor cut down an acre of land.

The acre of land was plowed in sixty-eight minutes and thirteen seconds, and two and a half gallons and twelve ounces of oil were used.

E. C. Tinsley won first money on time, his guess being 68 minutes and 10 seconds. John Keel won second prize, time 68 minutes and 30 seconds; Joe Spoonst third, 67 minutes and 30 seconds.

J. F. Borders won first prize in guessing on the quantity of oil used in plowing one acre. He guessed two and a half gallons and twenty ounces. M. B. Helweg, Bryan Clayton and Paul Mueller tied for second guess on oil, all three guessing two and a half gallons.

The tractor dealers served ice cold lemonade during the demonstration, and the factory sent several men here to assist in putting on the demonstration. It was one of the most successful demonstrations ever staged here.

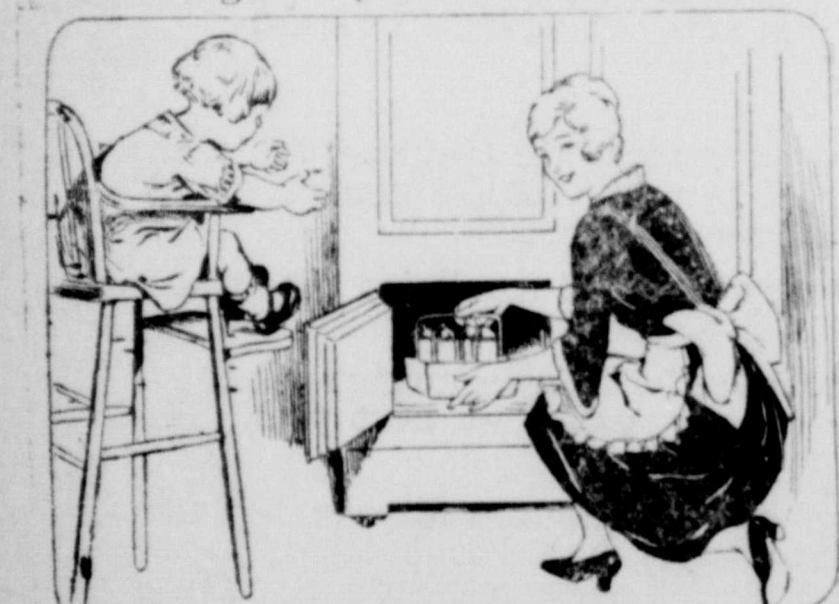

Infant Mortality Rates Are Falling Through Proper Care of Baby's Milk



Babies are healthier. Infant mortality rates are falling steadily. A happy picture of the future is painted by medical experts and social workers at "Baby Week" conferences. The entire race will attain greater longevity, these experts said at the recent Chicago meeting, if progress of the last few years continues.

Mothers of today far out-shine mothers and grandmas of the nineteenth century in care of babies. Many are skilled in calories, bacteria and hygiene. Still others, however, and in far greater number, ignore vital rules in preparation and care of food. They are in large measure responsible for the mortality rate being up to its present point. To protect the health of the household, and particularly the health of the child, the experts say food should be kept in a good refrigerator with a well-filled ice chamber. Utmost care should be taken with babies' milk. It should never be placed upon a window sill, or in any other improvised cooling place, even in cool weather. Bacteria multiply quickly in milk kept in warm temperatures. A low-temperature refrigerator is required. Milk even slightly tainted endangers the baby's health.

Modern mothers are learning much about proper diet for baby and for the rest of the household. Moreover, they are learning that ice, the cheapest article in household expenses, is the real safeguard of health. This summer, hundreds of health experts are preaching the gospel of the proper care of food as the means of lowering infant mortality and building a stronger race.
