Democratic Convention Demands Resignation of Mrs. Bloodworth

AUSTIN, Sept. 3.—The State Democratic Convention adjourned sine die at 10:30 o'clock this morning, after having adopted the Ferguson platform as submitted by the platform committee with only a few slight changes, by a rising vote. The vote was unanimous.

The platform contains twelve planks. The plank on the Ku Klux Klan condemns and denounces "what is known as an 'invisible empire' of the Ku Klux Klan as un-Democratic, un-Christian and an un-American organization."

This plank calls upon those who "have joined this dangerous order through mistake as to its real purposes to withdraw from same and lend their aid and influence to free the country from the strife and trouble which this insidious clique has aroused among our people."

One plank in the platform endorses the administration of Governor Pat M. Neff, and also gives endorsement to Lieut. Gov. T. Whit Davidson for his work "in suppressing violence and in arousing the public conscience to the menace of masked bands."

The plank on prohibition would demand the publication of druggists' reports showing the amount of prescription liquor sold.

The platform demands that the "legislature give due and proper respect to the election of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson on a platform of business and economy."

The convention demanded the resignation of Mrs. J. T. Bloodworth as national committee-woman. Mrs. Bloodworth is the last party official reputed to be affiliated with the Klan. The demand for her resignation was referred to the executive committee for its action.

NAMED TO CARRY CHINESE CIVIL OUT DAWES PLAN BATTLE RAGING

PARIS, Sept. 3.—Seymour Parker Jr., former under-secretary of the United States treasury department, has accepted the post as agent general for the reparations payments to be carried out under the Dawes plan. The post is being temporarily filled by Owen Young, of New York, who aided General Dawes and other financial experts in drawing the plans for putting into effect Mr. Dawes' reparations program.

RUSSELL WELL READY TO DRILL

Drilling will be resumed in the Russell oil well within the next few days, probably by the end of the present week. The rig is hooked up and everything ready for operation with the exception of a few extras which are due to arrive immediately.

This well is expected to prove the best in the Russell field, and the promoters are very optimistic for bringing in the field, opening up what has been watched as one of the most important oil districts in West Texas. The gas and oil supply in the first well drilled in this field has made further development possible and created interest among the scouts through out the state.

The well will be completed within sixty or ninety days.

SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 3.—With fighting at Wangtu, near here, in progress today between the contending armies of two rival provincial governors, reports have been received indicating that the battle lines were extending toward the coast in the direction of Woosung. Although a large number of troops are engaged in the conflict, reports received here say that no material advantage has been gained by either side.

DRAGGING RIVER FOR MISSING MAN

AUSTIN, Sept. 3.—The Colorado River here is being dragged today in an effort to locate the body of Judge J. F. Carl, an attorney from San Antonio, who disappeared yesterday.

Judge Carl came here to attend the State Democratic Convention as a delegate from Bexar county. The finding of the clothes of the attorney yesterday near the Austin dam caused the police to believe that the man had suffered bodily injury.

FLIES DEAL DEATH TO MONTANA HOPPERS

HELENA, Montana, Sept. 3.—Sarcophagid or flesh-fly armies, now invading Montana grain fields, are killing grasshoppers with such rapidity that within a short time the insect pests will be virtually exterminated, according to entomologists of the State Agricultural College at Bozeman. The flesh-fly invasion, coming at the height of the state-wide grasshopper poisoning campaign, has accounted for millions of "hoppers," the college experts report.

Swarming over the fields the flesh-flies strike the grasshoppers either in flight or on the stems of the grain, killing the hopper by depositing living maggots in one of the vulnerable places on the hopper's shield. The maggot immediately trenches in the fatty tissues eating into the vital organs and causing a slow death. The Sarcophagid fly multiplies rapidly having from three to five life cycles a year while the grasshopper produces but one new generation each year.

BACK TO SCHOOL

The most significant event of the year takes place in September when millions of children go back to school.

When the final history of this age of democracy is written the common school will set down as its greatest glory.

Here they come—children of all classes, religions and races, trooping into the schoolrooms where they sit side by side to study and to learn. This is not only an institution for the informing of the mind, it is the training school of democracy and its importance as the representative institution of the commonwealth cannot be overestimated.

Class consciousness, snobbishness, intolerance, superciliousness, cannot exist in the atmosphere of the public school. Here the barriers that separate classes and creeds, races and communities are broken down. A sense of mutual sympathy and understanding is developed, the solidarity of the nation is exemplified, and the one loyalty to the flag as against all other obediences and authorities and allegiances is emphasized.

Seventy years ago Theodore Parker declared: "The common school is the cradle of America's greatness." Twenty-five centuries ago Diogenes said: "Education is the basis of the Greek state." We may well say: the public school is the foundation of the American state.

The greatness and glory of this United States waxed and waned with the development or decline of the public school. If by reason of the growth of some other system of schools, or by a failure on the part of the citizenship to appreciate the unique civic significance of the public school, it should fall into decay a body blow would be struck at the republic.

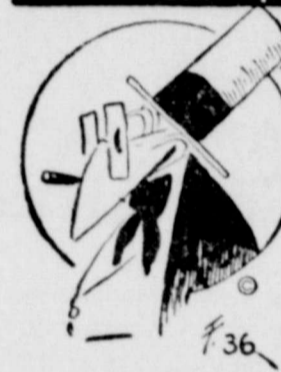

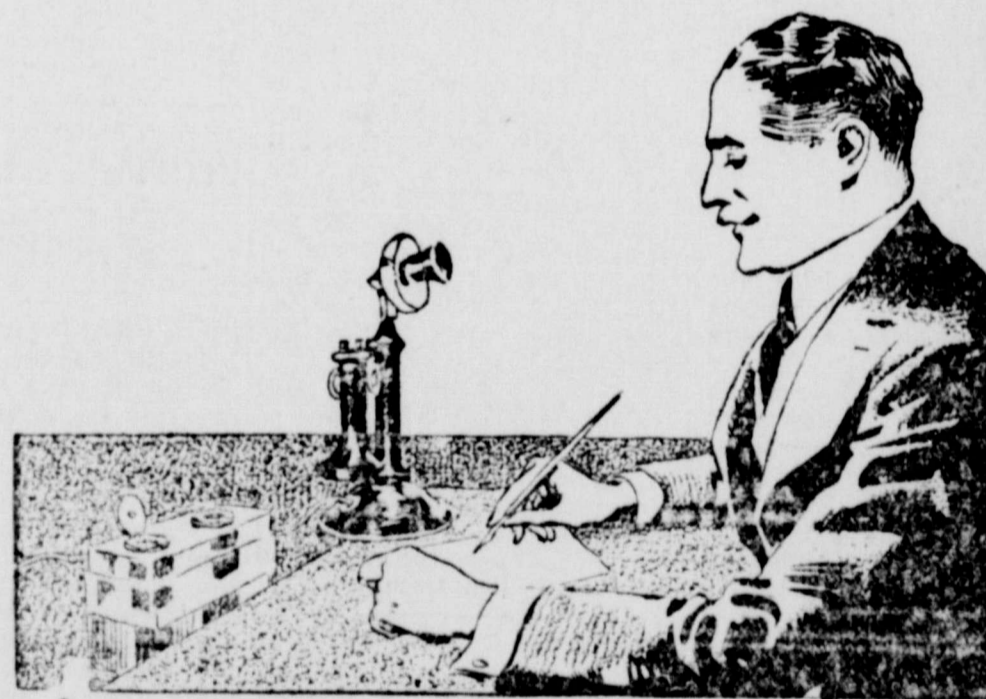
John B. Moon and P. B. Garrett, now Texas business men, but both former varsity students, have the management of the Circus and Coronation in charge. During their college days they produced many college

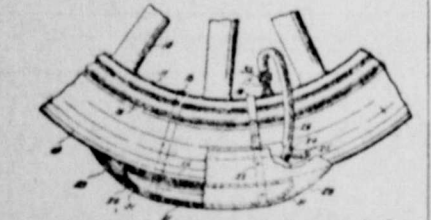

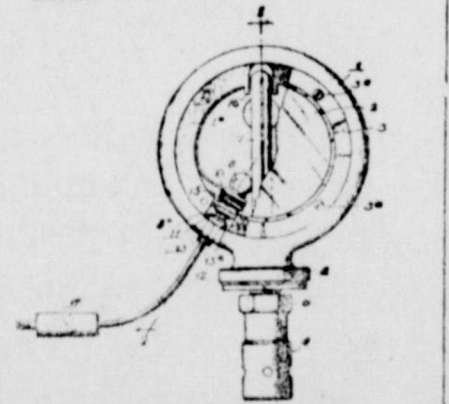

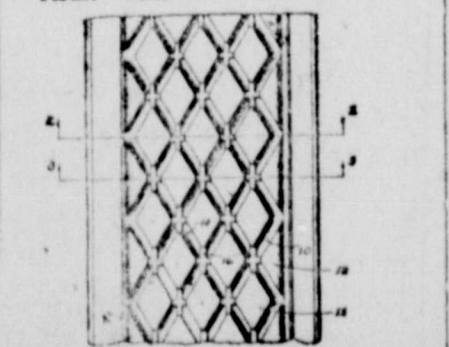
The ornamental design for a radiator cap as shown.

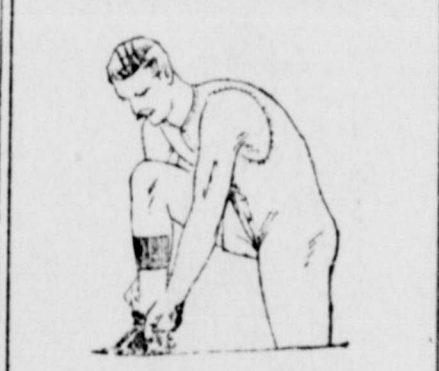
