## JUDGE McLEAN DIES TODAY—AGED 89

(By Associated Press)  
FT. WORTH, March 13.—Judge W. P. McLean, age 89, one of the pioneer lawyers of Texas and a member of the convention which drafted the present state constitution, died here today. Death came after a brief illness.

In addition to being one of the drafters of the Texas constitution, Mr. McLean was a judge, congressman and a member of the first railroad commission of Texas, being appointed railroad commissioner by Governor Hoag in 1891.

Judge McLean was born on a plantation in Copiah county, Mississippi. Two years later his father died and in 1839 his mother with her two young sons, emigrated to Texas and settled in Harris county.

## RAINS KNOCK WHEAT PRICE

CHICAGO, March 13.—More than ten cents per bushel collapse in wheat prices took place today soon after business began in the market.

May deliveries underwent almost a vertical fall to one dollar and seventy-one cents against a dollar eighty-two and a half yesterday.

This sharp drop was largely the result of widespread rains and a like increase in the new crop yield throughout the wheat growing belt of the United States.

## SENATE COMMITTEE REFUSES CONFIRM WARREN

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, March 13.—An adverse report on the nomination of Charles Warren to be attorney general was ordered today by the Senate judiciary committee. The vote was nine to seven. Twice previously the nomination had commanded a majority vote in the same committee.

All the democrats on the committee and Senators Borah, of Idaho, and Norris, of Nebraska, republicans, voted today against a favorable report.

## PROBING CAUSE OF INDIANS' DEATHS

PAWBUSSKA, Okla., March 13.—The state investigation into a series of deaths among the Osage Indians in 1922 has not been ended, and is proceeding with good results it was indicated in official quarters here today.

Berry King, assistant state attorney general, who is heading the court of inquiry, dropped from sight yesterday without making any statement, and it is believed that he has gone into the country and is taking testimony perhaps at a ranch house, which will prove beneficial to the investigation.

W. S. Moss, formerly proprietor of the Central Hotel, was here Friday. He is now living at Lubbock, and reports it getting very dry on the plains.

## ASKS SENATE TO RE-TRY FERGUSON

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, March 13.—A resolution asking the Senate to resolve itself into an impeachment court on March 16th for the purpose of removing the impeachment against James E. Ferguson, former governor, was introduced in the Senate today by Senator Moore, of Cooke county, and Senator Fairchild.

The resolution immediately plunged the Senate into a debate. By a viva voce vote a resolution offered by Senator Wirtz to send the resolution to the civil jurisprudence committee prevailed. Only two votes against referring the resolution to the committee were heard.

Senator Woodward, author of the amnesty bill which passed in the House yesterday, also asked that the resolution be referred to a committee, and stated that he believed the amnesty bill was constitutional and that no further action on the question was necessary.

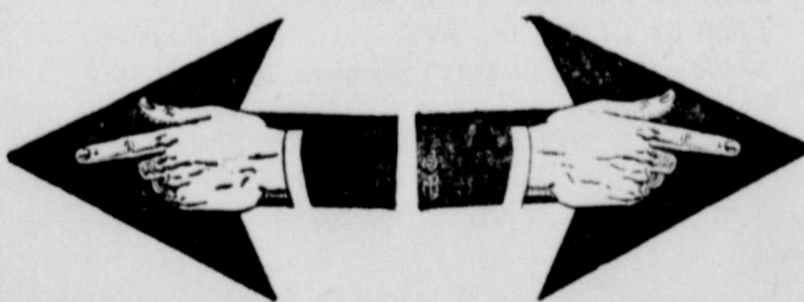

## JOINT MEETING ON PLANT SALE

Mayor S. B. Raby has called a meeting of the City Commission and advisory committee for tonight. The committee of seven men which was recently created to assist the commission in handling the light plant sale will meet at the city hall in joint session to discuss the details of the deal and work out the best plan for handling the city's property.

The mayor stated Friday morning that the question of calling an election, and fixing a date for same, would also be taken up tonight and the election ordered. A petition containing about 175 names asking the commission to order such an election was recently filed with the mayor.

As soon as the details of the proposed sale can be put in concrete form the commission and advisory committee will issue a statement, giving the public the information necessary to guide them in casting an intelligent vote on the proposition.

An investigation has been made to determine how the bonds amounting to \$65,000 held against the city, and bearing six per cent interest, can be handled. It is the opinion of the best authorities that the city cannot be relieved of this obligation, or at least cannot be released from the debt, unless the holders of the bonds will accept the cash and surrender the bonds. One bond broker stated that he could get in most of the bonds by paying a small premium on them.

While the city cannot be released from the bonded indebtedness, the commission and committee will adopt one of two plans. The city can either accept the West Texas Utilities Company's \$85,000 in cash, and the city pay off the bonds as they fall due, or the city can close the deal by accepting \$20,000 in cash and binding the utilities company to assume the \$65,000 in bonded indebtedness under proper security to take up the bonds as they fall due and pay the interest on the bond issue, thereby relieving the city of the payment of the debt. The latter plan seems to be the most popular with those who have expressed themselves on the question.

The proposition in all its phases will be discussed at the joint meeting tonight, and some scheme worked out for handling the deal to the best interests of the city, and the whole matter will be submitted to the voters for their approval, after the commission and advisory committee have a k'd the plan. The advisory committee is composed of R. G. Erwin, N. K. Freeman, E. D. Walker, Scott H. Mack, John F. Currie, J. McGregor and Paul Trimmer, and with these men the matter is in the hands of the city commission composed of Mayor Raby and Commissioners R. E. George and Elmer Talbott.

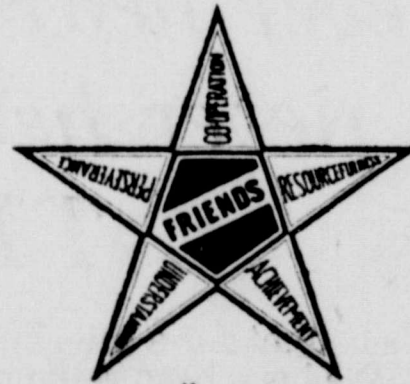

## LINCOLN'S DREAMS FORETOLD FUTURE

"It is a remarkable production. I wish every citizen of the United States could see it at once."—Oscar E. Bland, (Judge U. S. Court of Customs Appeals).

The opening of the re-showing of "Abraham Lincoln" at the Queen Theatre today recalls that the martyr president was a believer in dreams and it is of record that he was the subject of two dreams equally remarkable.

After he went to the White House, Mr. Lincoln dreamed one night that he was on a big ship sailing away in strange waters, he knew not whence or whither. The next morning good news came from the army. Many times thereafter President Lincoln had the same dream, and it was always followed by good news.

Toward the close of the war the weary president had a terrible dream that upset both Mrs. Lincoln and himself for several days. One night he seemed to be aroused from his sleep by the voices of many people in mourning and lamentation. The voices came from all sides as a choir invisible of woe, and he went out to inquire the cause. He descended the stairs to the East room and there, in the middle of it, stood a black catafalque upon which rested a corpse in grave clothes. The President asked of an attendant: "Who is dead in the White House?" "The President," replied the man. This is the last recorded dream of President Lincoln, and there is evidence that he accepted it as a premonition of the future.
