Outlines Program for Interscholastic Meet

Friday and Saturday of next week will be gala days in Ballinger for the schools of the county, especially the schools which take part in the Interscholastic League events.

Prof. W. A. Cain, superintendent of the Ballinger schools, and director general of the county meet, has issued a letter to the various schools and the plans for the county meet are better told in his letter, which is as follows: "To members of the University League:

"I have written the members of the executive committee and submitted a tentative program for their approval. All have answered except one or two, so I am announcing the program finally in this letter to you.

"I hope that you will send in your entries just as early as possible, however, I believe that the rules say that these entries must be in ten days before the county meet. Our county meet will be held on the third and fourth of April in Ballinger. We have tried to arrange a program that will suit the convenience of all.

"The tennis will be held Friday afternoon and we can furnish three courts if necessary. We shall play the doubles first, beginning at 2:00 o'clock. The singles will be played immediately after the doubles are finished. We hope to finish the tennis Friday but can not tell until the entries are all in, therefore we ask that you get your entries in as soon as you can.

"The preliminaries in debate will be held Friday night the finals will be staged Saturday night.

(Program—Saturday)

9:30 a. m.—Essay contest, high school declamations

10:00 a. m.—Spelling contests, all divisions

10:00 a. m.—Music memory contest

10:30 a. m.—Rural declamations, all divisions

11:00 a. m.—Arithmetic contest

11:30 a. m.—Extemporaneous speaking

2:30 p. m.—Track and field events.

"Any questions that arise in your mind, I shall be glad to attempt to answer if you will write me.

"We have secured the services of four judges, two out of Abilene, Mr. Holden associated with McMurry College and Mr. Brewer who is connected with the A. C. C. In addition we have asked that the superintendents of schools at Santa Anna and Coleman, Messrs. Withers and Hufford, be with us. I shall try to secure at least one more judge for literary contests and if it meets the approval of the athletic director, I will be glad to get a man to help him handle the athletics.

"Ballinger expects to pay the expenses of these judges by the sale of tags to our own people. In addition to this Ballinger Chamber of Commerce and the American Legion has agreed to give to

the County League Organization two loving cups the first to go to the Class A. championship and the latter to go to the Rural School championship. Winters is donating two cups, one to each of the debates, boys and girls. Miles is giving a cup to be awarded to the Class B. championship winner of the county.

"Rural as well as independent schools are cordially invited to enter into all activities of the meet. I hope that the rural schools will enter the track and field events for even if you have only one athlete he may possibly be the high point winner. I have seen the time when one or two men won the state meet for a school. I know that often because a teacher does not have a number of men they fail to enter any at all. Do not let this be the case with our schools.

"We also extend an invitation to all the people who are interested in this work to visit Ballinger on the days of the meet. We shall try to give you a hearty welcome and try to make you feel that you are really wanted.

"Hoping that we may have a very pleasant and profitable meet."

FRENCH WRECK KILLS FIVE

(By Associated Press) PARIS, March 25.—Five persons are known to have been killed and fifty others were injured when the Bordeaux-Paris express was wrecked near here today. The dead include Dr. Adolphe Pedebidon, senator from the upper Pyrenees arrondissement.

Seven coaches jumped the track, and three of them tumbled into the river.

The P. & O. system, of which the Paris-Marseilles and Paris-Bordeaux express trains were formerly reputed to be the fastest trains in the world, connect Bordeaux, Marseilles and Orleans with the French capital.

COLLIER CASE GOES TO JURY

(By Associated Press) WICHITA FALLS, March 25.—After five and a half hours of presentation by the attorneys' argument remained unfinished when court reconvened this morning in the trial of Frank Collier, former mayor of this city and whose fate is soon to rest in the hands of the jury for the murder of Elzie ("Buster") Robertson. The case is expected to reach the jury soon this afternoon.

The attorneys yet to be heard in the case are Charles Francis and B. Y. Cummins, for the defense; and Bernard Martin and District Attorney James Allred, for the state. Cummins will close for the defense and Allred will close for the state.

SLAYER OF OFFICERS IS STILL AT LARGE

(By Associated Press) ABILENE, March 25.—An all-night search participated in by from 700 to 800 men, including officers from several counties in this section, revealed no trace of the Mexican who shot and killed Sheriff W. W. Satterwhite of Howard county, and Deputy Sheriff Geroge Reeves of Merkel, yesterday.

The men were killed when they attempted to arrest a Mexican for killing a man earlier in the day at Big Spring.

Reports from Sweetwater said the man hunt had swung into Nolan county at Dora, 20 miles South of Sweetwater. An unconfirmed report stated that another member of the posse was killed this morning.

The fugitive has at least three, and possibly more killings to his record.

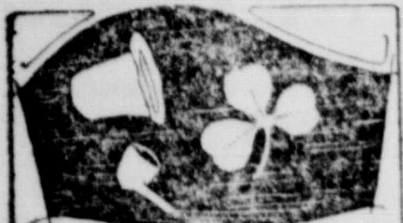

GASOLINE AND TOBACCO CHEAPER IN TEXARKANA

(By Associated Press)
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., March 25.—While the other people of Arkansas pay four cents tax on every package of cigarettes they smoke, four cents a gallon on every gallon of gasoline and ten cents a gallon on motor oil burned in their automobiles, the city of Texarkana is "sitting pretty." Texarkana, over the Southwestern border of Arkansas, with part of the city in Texas and part in Arkansas, does not have to pay the cigarette and tobacco tax, and pays only one cent a gallon on gasoline. Even the remainder of Miller county, in which the Arkansas city is located, must pay the taxes. The state of Texas does not

levy a tobacco tax and levies only one cent a gallon on gasoline. As a result, when the tobacco and gas tax laws were passed Texarkana was exempted from their provisions. It was provided, however, that whenever the state of Texas adopted such tax laws they also should apply to Texarkana. Thus, Texarkana, in Arkansas, stands in the unique position of having its tax laws, insofar as gasoline and tobacco are concerned, regulated entirely by the laws of Texas.

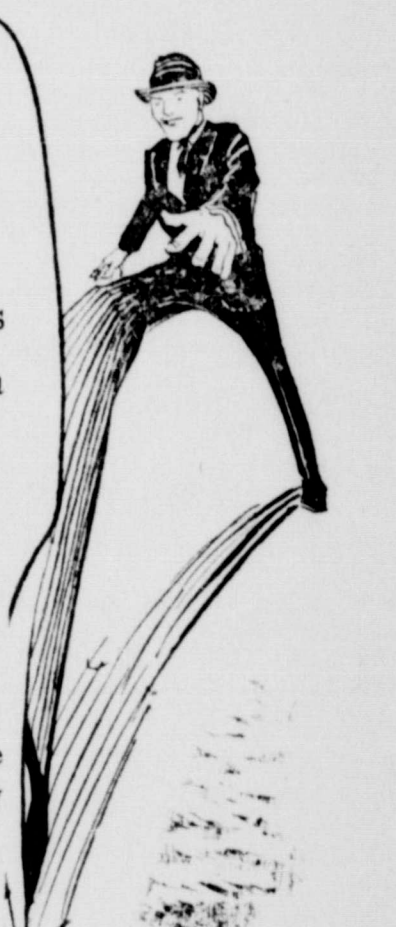

FARM PRODUCTS OF THE INDIANS SHOW MATERIAL INCREASE

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 25.—The little lad who has a weakness for war paint, feathers and Indian tales may take heart at the Indian bureau's announcement that there are still 345,000 of these primeval Americans in the land.

The attention of the Sixty-ninth Congress will be called to the fact that, unless the nation's lawmakers make other provisions, the period of government wardship in the five civilized tribes will expire in 1931. There are about 17,000 Indians under federal supervision in the five civilized tribes and over the country the Bureau of Indian Affairs has 200,000 "restricted" Indians, who are supervised.

The Indians themselves, Indian Bureau officials say, are anxious to have the restriction extended, as they desire government guardianship to conserve their lands.

Under the June 1924 law, all native-born Indians are now citizens of the United States, many of whom are under wardship. There are 190 tribes of Indians

now in the country, many of them being small groups.

The number of Indian children in schools, the health appropriations by congress, Indian hospitals and the value of farm products raised by those citizens have materially increased in the past decade. Farming and stock raising have developed appreciably among the Indians, and large sums of money are being spent by the government on irrigation projects on their lands, the Indians being the country's first irrigationists. The Navajo Indians in particular are great sheep raisers, their women being noted weavers of blankets.

McDANIEL MURDER TRIAL IS NEARING CLOSE

The trial of J. S. McDaniel, which has been holding the attention of district court at Paint Rock all the week, was drawing to a close Wednesday, the case having gone to the jury. McDaniel is being tried for the murder of Elmer Wright at Eola on December 29th, 1923.

The defendant took the stand in his own behalf and pleaded the unwritten law and also claimed a threat had been made on his life. He testified that threats made by Wright to take his life had been communicated to him, and he also testified that Wright went to the creek fishing with Mrs. McDaniel, but on cross examination admitted that there were others in the fishing party. The defendant told the jury that Mrs. McDaniel invited Wright to eat dinner with her and did not invite him, and this aroused his feeling. McDaniel and his wife were not living together at the time.

Judge A. K. Doss, of Ballinger, and Judge Walter Woodward, of Coleman, are defending McDaniel.

ROWENA OFFERS \$400 REWARD FOR ROBBERS

Fred Kiechle was in the city Wednesday morning from Rowena, and reported that so far no clue had been found which would justify an arrest in the attempt to murder of C. J. Weisner and to burn his store Monday night. Officers who were working on the case were called to join in the chase after the Mexican outlaw who murdered two officers at Merkel Tuesday. Mr. Kiechle stated that Rowena citizens had posted a reward of \$400 for the arrest and conviction of the persons who attempted to murder Mr. Weisner.

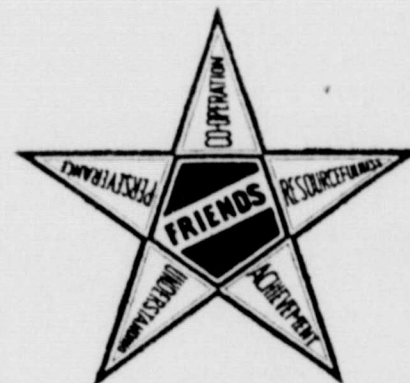
