\$5,000 CAR TAKEN BY ROBBERS

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, April 24.—Rains which began falling in sections of the Panhandle and West Texas Wednesday were continuing in a number of places today, according to reports received here. Rain amounting to nine-tenths of an inch fell in the vicinity of Wichita Falls this morning.

LAST SHOWERS REPORTED TO BE MORE EXTENSIVE

Up to noon Friday the rainfall for the day and for Thursday amounted to almost one inch at Ballinger with heavier precipitation reported from other points in the county.

The Friday showers came in hard dashes, and continued for a good portion of the forenoon hours. Telephone reports indicated that the Northwestern part of the county received the heaviest rain again, Wingate reporting an inch and a half, which brought the total for that point during the two days up to two and a half inches.

Norton, Maverick and other points to the North reported from one-half to one inch of rain again Friday morning. The Friday rain was reported to be more general than the showers of the day before, and in some localities it was said that sufficient rain to guarantee safe planting had fallen, or was falling late up in the day Friday.

Clouds which formed to the North and Northwest of Ballinger following stiff, moisture-laden winds from the South which blew for three days, brought rain as far South as Concho and Millersville. The rain was said to be light East and West of Ballinger, but threatening clouds promised to bring rain to all sections of this county and surrounding counties.

According to press reports the Panhandle and lower plains region received good rains Thursday and Thursday night. The rain began falling in the Amarillo section Wednesday night and extended South. East and South Texas had reported no rain up to noon Friday.

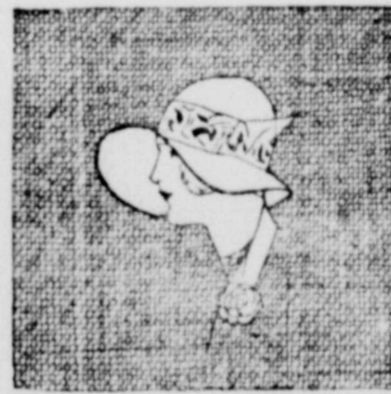

AIRSHIP MAKES SAFE RETURN

LAKEHURST, N. J., April 24.—The naval dirigible Los Angeles arrived here this morning on its return trip from the Bermuda Islands. The round trip to Hamilton, Bermuda was made in less than twenty-one hours. On the return trip the airship brought back three sacks of mail.

SEVENTEEN TRAPPED IN COAL MINE

(By Associated Press)

WALLACE, Idaho, April 24.—Seventeen miners were trapped in the Hecla Mine at the 2,000 foot level last night, and all hope of rescuing them has been given up.

Rescue crews from adjoining mines brought up three men alive from the 1,000-foot level, but said the seventeen men trapped at the 2,000-foot level could not be rescued alive.

The mine at the 2,000-foot level is filled with poisonous gas and is practically impenetrable. Fire which caused the explosion trapping the men is burning from the 1,600 foot level down to the lowest level of the mine, and rescue workers cannot go below the 1,000 foot level.

The fire started in a pump station at the 2,000-foot level in the mine. About 100 men escaped from the mine.

Three rescue crews of twelve men each are working in shifts in an effort to reach the men who are still in the mine. A revised list shows that only fourteen men are still trapped in the mine.

BALKAN STATES NOW SCENE OF REIGN TERROR

(By Associated Press)

UNDATED—Dispatches from Sofia continue to minimize the seriousness of the Bulgarian situation, but indirect reports from other Balkan centers picture the condition as most grave.

The Balkan states are said to be taking military precautions against the spread of terrorism in Bulgaria. Roumania is reported to be moving troops toward both her Russian and Bulgarian frontiers, and Jugo-Slavia is guarding her border. Indirect reports say that Greece is mobilizing a part of her army, but will not intervene unless Greek frontiers are threatened.

SOFIA, April 24.—Ivan Manoff, member of the secret committee of the Bulgarian Communist Party, was shot and killed by the police today when he refused to surrender.

Another store of arms has been discovered by the police in the search of homes suspected of harboring conspirators.

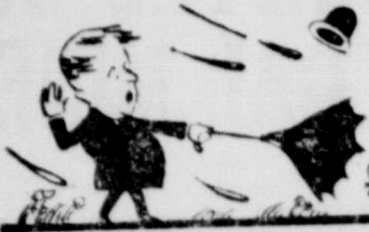

Bus lines which were established in San Angelo some time ago to take the place of street cars, or at least to serve in the place of street cars, have been discontinued for a lack of patronage. Too many people own autos and prefer to drive them to make such bus lines profitable.

Federal records are said to show where a prohibition enforcement officer saved \$40,000 per year on a \$3,000 salary. Yet there are some folks who insist that the prohibition law is not a success. This reminds us of a certain candidate for governor, who while campaigning, said he was going to make the prison system pay.

Doy Arnold, seventeen-year-old Mineral Wells boy, who is in jail waiting to go to the electric chair and be put to death for criminal assault, is writing the history of his life as a warning to other boys to go straight. The state should have the boy's warning printed and a copy placed in the hands of every boy. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, so we have always been told.

There has never been a time when the newspapers have played a more important part in the upbuilding of community life and business conditions than they have in the past two years, and today their power for good is being felt in a way that will mean much in community development. In other words, we have reached the time now when all elements are pulling together, when not only petty jealousies that have hampered the growth of small communities have been set aside but when animosity and bickering between cities have been wiped out almost entirely, and one town today is only too glad to help another. — Southern California Business, Los Angeles.

BALLINGER ELECTION
The citizens of this city have been called on quite a number of times to vote on bond issues and taxes to take care of the bonds and interest, but the election on the 28th of this month will be the first opportunity they have ever had in the history of the city to vote off a bond issue and tax. A vote for the sale of the city light plant equals a vote to cancel \$65,000 worth of bonds which are bearing six per cent interest, and which would become a tax bur-



den should the city's light plant fail to meet the obligation—Ballinger Ledger.

How the Ballinger voters can fail to vote favorably for the sale of the light plant, it is difficult to see. In fact, it is to be presumed that the vote already is a favorable one for every resident of Ballinger will realize at once that to defeat the election would be equal to giving that city a set-back of several years in its progress. The election is something of a novel election but that fact should not deter the Ballingerites from carrying the election.—Abilene Reporter.

COST OF LIVING
A report just issued by the United States Department of Labor and of the bureau of labor statistics shows that the cost of living is still going up. The cost of the various articles of food combined shows an increase of 2.8 per cent on February 15, 1925, as compared with February 15, 1924. Looking further back the big increase in the cost of living is reflected with the combined cost of various articles of food in February, 1913, and February, 1925. The report shows an increase of 56.3 per cent since 1913, or an average increase of eight per cent per year. This comparison is on food alone. A greater increase in some other necessities of life is shown. One dollar nine years ago would pay less than fifty cents on a grocery bill today.

HIGHEST COURT BACKS DRY LAW
As time rolls on, as we get further away from the days of liquor rule, and people realize more the evils of the traffic, the law enforcement machinery seems to run smoother, and those upon whose shoulders rests the responsibility of enforcing the law are becoming more "hard boiled" so to speak.

A recent decision of the United States supreme court, the highest court in the land, struck a "hard blow" at the bigger bootleggers of the country. The court upheld the lower courts in such decisions that gives the authorities a greater latitude than ever before in carrying on law enforcement. The highest court reaffirmed its decision that automobiles may be searched and liquor confiscated without the presence of a search warrant. In some states this had been a big obstacle in the way of running down bootleggers. The court upheld decisions in lower courts which sent some of the "higher ups" in Northern cities to the pen. Mayor R. O. Johnson, of Gary, Indiana, met defeat in his appeal to the higher court and must take his medicine for violating the prohibition law. Along with Johnson a number of other higher-ups were told they would have to pay the penalty fixed by the lower courts for violating the liquor laws.

FARMERS SHOULD WATCH THE HOPPERS
With the coming of the rains it is feared that the grasshopper crop will get an even start with cotton and feed crops, and to avoid the ravages of the pests the farmers should keep an eye on the development of the hoppers and be prepared to strike in time to check them. It is claimed that where small areas have been irrigated that the grasshoppers have already shown up in alarming numbers, and some predict that they will hatch out by the millions since the rains commenced, and unless a concerted effort is made to destroy them there is danger of great loss to the crops.

Jackie Coogan Receives Accolade As Knight in Order of Maccabees



DETROIT—Jackie Coogan is now "Sir Jackie Coogan" and the youngest knight in the world. The boy film star received the accolade of knighthood here as the climax of the city's reception to him at a meeting held in Jackie's honor at the Detroit Board of Trade. Jackie looked very small among the city officials and business men who gathered him to the speakers' stand but he walked with the self-possession of a person used to the public. A city directory and a dictionary were placed in his hands to bring him to a level with the others. An automobile motorcade wished to lift him up to it but Jackie declined and scrambled up to his seat without assistance. When he was in his chair with his feet dangling he did not look so much like the dignified center of attraction but like a very little boy with a chubby, happy face. Being received into the order of Maccabees was a ceremony Jackie liked. He knelt with the aplomb of the trained actor as Supreme Commander A. W. Frye of the international fraternal order of Maccabees touched Jackie's shoulder with the sword of honor and said: "Arise, Sir Jackie Coogan." Jackie was interested in the sword. He drew it from its sheath, felt of its edge and point with his thumb, and made passes at the scabbard. He was delighted when he found that the sword was to be his own. By the initiation Sir Jackie became a custodian and protector of many children older than himself among the orphans and half-orphans of members of the Maccabees who are being reared and educated by the order, either with their mothers or in the Maccabees international home at Chatham.

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FIGHTING THE RAIN FAKERS

A California rain faker has been negotiating with the citizens of South Texas to deliver to them one inch of rain for \$4,000 or two inches for \$8,000. If it rains more than two inches he will give them the excess fee.

It is indeed a very liberal offer, but surely South Texas people will not be duped into such a game, regardless of how bad they need a little moisture. Reports say that the situation is serious in South and Southwest Texas, down around San Antonio, and further to the South. The rain "maker" submitted his proposition to the people of Yoakum, where it is said no rain has fallen in several months, and where the people are getting pretty nervous.

The government weather observer at San Antonio gives some figures which are calculated to interfere with the rain "maker's"

proposition. The rain producer asks for six weeks in which to deliver the rain, which would require all the month of May. The weather record for forty years shows that with the exception of two years the San Antonio country received more than one inch of rain. This within itself would make a good bet for the fake rain maker.

It is pouring down rain in Ballinger as this is being written, but out optimism would be normal or above if there was not a cloud in sight, for the Ballinger weather record speaks for itself.

A thirty-year weather record here shows that more than one inch of rain fell every May with the exception of May in 1896, and out of the thirty years more than two inches of rain fell every month with the exception of four years. Of the thirty years more than three inches of rain fell in May for sixteen years. The average rainfall at Ballinger for May is 3.45 inches.

Christian Methods Help Big Business to Succeed



EDWARD WENTWORTH BEATTY

"Here's a cheering bit of news this bright autumn day," declares Joe Toy in the Boston Traveler recently. "Christian practices applied to big business bring the biggest success." Edward Wentworth Beatty says so. He should know. He is the head of one of the biggest businesses in the world; president and chairman of the board of directors of an industry that employs more than 100,000 men and owns more than 120,000 miles of telegraph lines, 13 first-class hotels, a \$17,000,000 irrigation enterprise, a fleet of nearly 100 big steamships, a 19,800 mile railroad and hundreds of thousands of acres of farm and mineral lands—the Canadian Pacific Railway and its associate companies.

"Mr. Beatty is in Boston and I interviewed him at his hotel. It is his 47th birthday anniversary. For six years he has headed what is almost a small empire. He was only 41 when he became president of the great railway company. And it is a great company; it can carry you almost anywhere in the world, house you, feed you, even supply a camel or donkey for you 600 miles up the Nile, in Egypt. I know. It was altogether encourag-

ing to talk with this relatively young man. "Modesty is a trite word, but it fits him; he isn't shy, he is direct and sincere, and has a horror of being quoted in the first person. A big Bostonian once said that in Boston one is not old enough for a big job until he is 45, and then he is too old. What did Mr. Beatty think of that? Would he explain how he, at the age of 41, became head of the Canadian Pacific Railway?

"And he explained. Opportunity, he said, did it. If the opportunity came when one was young, so much the better, one arrived at the pinnacle of success while still young. He had entered the employ of the railway when he was 23, as an attorney. Time went on, and he became chief counsel. 'Because there was a vacancy.' Then he became vice president and

really president. Simple!

"That is the unvarnished story," he announced calmly. Quite unvarnished! Nothing of his own ability to fill the jobs offered him. None of that.

"Will you explain how it is done, so that other young men may know?" he was asked. There was no explanation other than the presence of opportunity and making the most of it. It wasn't strange that a young man should have an important position. In England things were different. There it is believed that old age brings wisdom. The United States and Canada were young men's countries. Then he started to tell how a young man holds down a big job, but he declined to use himself as an example.

"Can a man conduct a big business and at the same time adhere to Christian practices?" I asked him. That seemed to me to have a very important bearing on the happiness of a people. He thought so, too.

"Certainly," he agreed, with enthusiasm and absolutely without hesitation. "Looking at the subject solely from a practical standpoint, it is best to play fair with everybody, with your employees and competitors and the public. In England this year at the advertising convention at Wembley, American advertising men told how honest in advertising pays best. The same is true of other business. The square deal is the best policy after all. Big business is not coming to realize it. Big business has realized it all alone, but as time goes on more and more, big enterprises are finding it is best to play fair."

"If big business is honest and conducts its affairs along Christian lines, will that business make more money?" Mr. Beatty was asked.

"Unquestionably," he stated.

"Aside from all that, Mr. Beatty's father was born in Ireland and his mother was a New Englander. He is a bachelor and doesn't play golf. He wears his hat at the same angle that Admiral Beatty wears his. He looks younger than he is, and I should judge he would be a good man in a fight."

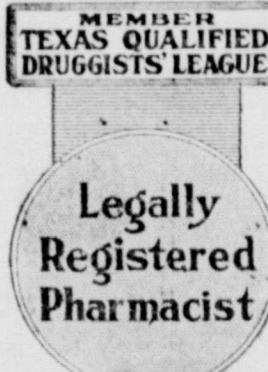

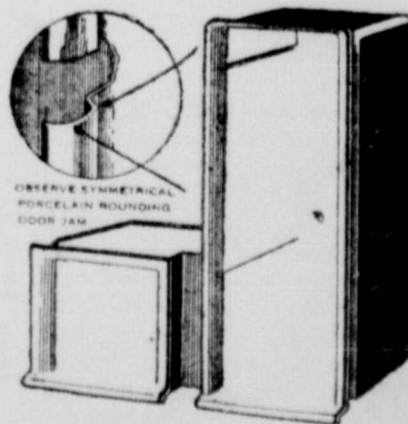

SAYS HEAD OFF 106TH BIRTHDAY BIG BOND ISSUE OF ODD FELLOWS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, April 24.—A \$75,000,000 state bond issue soon is to be proposed for Texas unless it is "nipped in the bud." Representative John T. Smith of Austin warns.

Sounding a "note of warning" in the current issue of his Texas Tax Journal, Rep. Smith who investigated an investigation of the highway department in the recent legislature, declares that bond buyers and road contractors "are beginning to evolve in their minds the matter of springing a \$75,000,000 bond issue on the people within the next few years." The expense for the bond issue, he believes, will be that the counties will have reached their limit in bonding.

"It is a well recognized fact," he said, "that the tieck eradication law of the last few years, and the voting of county and district bonds have practically exhausted the credit of a great number of counties. In fact, these expenditures have gone to such an extent that the question of selling bonds has been one that has kept the issuance of new bonds down, except in counties whose credit still is good."

"There are portions of Texas in which fairly good roads have been built, but they are in a disconnected form and scattered here and there. Now then, the bond buyer, the road contractor and the material men are beginning to evolve in their minds the matter of springing about a \$75,000,000 bond issue on the people of Texas within the next few years."

"They know many counties can not issue new bonds for several years, hence they are coming with the proposition of bonding the state to an enormous amount, and then when that is used up, if no roads are built, the tax payers can comfort themselves in the knowledge that they have made a lot of people rich, even if they never have the roads for their own use."

"The bond proposition is just in the formative stage at present, and if the people do not begin to frown on it, it is going to be a live issue. As long as we can raise about \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 a year to put on roads, we had better think about the economical expenditure of this amount rather than attempt to get more money."

Texas at present is one of the few states having no bonded indebtedness.

DECISION IN BORDER OIL CASES TO BE GIVEN OUT ABOUT JUNE 1

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 24.—A decision affecting leases valued at millions of dollars in the South half of the Red River oil field, on the Oklahoma-Texas border, is being prepared by Secretary Work and his assistant, John H. Edwards, and will be made public about June 1. Many oil companies with thousands of stockholders in all parts of the country are interested.

There are 178 applications for permits and leases involved, only 16 of which are not conflicting. A hearing of claimants occupied nearly two months and was the longest in the department's history.

When the field was taken over as a result of a Supreme Court decision declaring it public land, many of the claimants already had begun drilling wells. The department's findings will hinge largely on whether the applicants are equitably entitled to permits and leases by virtue of possession and expenditures on the land prior to February 25, 1920, when the government assumed control. Nearly \$3,000,000 realized from production in the disputed area since the government took hold is being held up pending the outcome of the case.

LONDON, April 24.—European representatives of American automobile companies are watching with interest preliminaries for this year's international motor trials to be held in August under auspices of the Soviet government.
