## OXIEN HAS A NOVEL PLAN

The citizens of the Oxien community have carried out a novel plan of community co-operation this year that has proved one of the best movements which have been reported in this county. Citizens of that section wanted to build a church and of course money had to be raised to do the work. One citizen, as a part of the money raising program, donated twenty acres of land to be used by the committee named for the building. The ground was accepted and all the workers of the community met one day and planted it in cotton and at different times during the year they have taken their teams and plows and worked the crop which was raised on the 20 acres.

A few days ago all the community gathered and in one day picked three bales of cotton from the field and it was brought to Ballinger and ginned. One of the citizens stated that he thought it was likely that another bale would be gotten at a later date.

This cotton will be sold and the money put into the building fund for the new church. The reporter could not ascertain whether the cotton was being sold as it was ginned and what price it brought, but nevertheless it will be a good start on the new church fund.

The Towler gin ginned the cotton and did not make any charge, the gin donating the work to the cause.

This is a good example for other communities to follow. It shows a good spirit of co-operation and when communities come together to work for a common cause they are bound to succeed.

## CORKS AFFECT LONDON'S CHAMPAGNE MARKET

LONDON, Nov. 6.—Used champagne bottle corks are collected by waiters in large restaurants here as eagerly as are tips. The corks are worth money and figure strongly in the quotations on the champagne market.

Wine merchants established a cork clearing house that is known to all city cafe waiters. It is designed to boom the particular brands of champagne which the wholesalers or retailers want to "unload."

Waiters in all the large restaurants where champagne is served receive daily quotations on the clearing house rates, the cork prices varying from two pence to six pence each. The price of corks fluctuate weekly according to the brand of wine and its popularity.

At times when sales of any brand shows signs of falling off the price of its corks rises, as an incentive to waiters to aid in stimulating the sale of this particular kind. Waiters everywhere here now collect champagne bottle corks as eagerly as they do tips.

## RAIN SOAKING ALL OF TEXAS

(By Associated Press)  
DALLAS, Nov. 6.—Reports received here indicate that all parts of the State have been drenched by heavy rains. As a result of the heavy rains in South Texas yesterday a considerable amount of damage was done and four rivers in that section are expected to overflow their banks. These four rivers are the Trinity, Neches, Sabine and Little River, all of which are tributaries of the Brazos. A heavy rise is also expected in the Brazos.

Lower temperatures accompanied the rain in the Panhandle and North Texas.

## LYNCHINGS SHOW BIG DECREASE

(By Associated Press)  
DALLAS, Nov. 6.—A wave of lynchings and mob violence throughout Texas was probably prevented by the firm stand which was taken by the Dallas authorities and newspapers during the "black terror" excitement last summer. Mrs. Jesse Ames, of Georgetown, told the Commission of Inter-Racial Cooperation here today.

Mrs. Ames is director of the Texas division of the commission, which is a Southwide movement to obtain justice for negroes and ameliorate racial differences.

Mrs. Ames' report for the year commented on the fact that there had been no lynchings in Texas thus far this year and that there was only one last year. Lynchings throughout the country have decreased 75 per cent in three years, she said.

## ABILENE COMMISSION OUTLAWS FLIRTING

ABILENE, Nov. 5.—Flirting and "goo-goo" eyes have been outlawed by the city fathers of Abilene. An ordinance just passed declares that offenders shall be fined not more than \$200. Whistling to attract the attention of a woman also is placed under the ban.

A "flirt" or "masher" is defined by the ordinance to "include any person who by word, sign, gesture, wink, facial expression or look shall seek to attract the attention of any person of the opposite sex other than a friend or acquaintance for the purpose of making a mash or flirting."

## 6,000,000 GAL. ALCOHOL LEAK

(By Associated Press)  
CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—The report of the congressional investigation committee on enforcement of the Volstead Act was given in an address prepared for delivery before the Anti-Saloon League Convention here today by Representative Hudson, of Michigan, chairman of the committee.

The information gained was from questionnaires which had been sent to federal and state officers, social welfare organizations, and leaders in industrial and commercial life.

In his address Congressman Hudson estimated that there is a leakage of about 6,000,000 gallons of denatured alcohol each year into bootleg channels for re-distillation.

Weakness for the enforcement of the law was placed by the report in the lack of adequate penalties.

## FAMILY OF SIX BURN TO DEATH

(By Associated Press)  
BALLETON SPA, New York, Nov. 6.—Six members of one family were burned to death by fire which destroyed a bungalow here today. The dead are: Geo. Kemp, age 40; Mrs. Geo. Kemp, Viola Allen, age 14; Myrtle Allen, age 9; Carroll Allen, age 10; and Marcina Kemp, age 11.

The Allens were children of Mrs. Kemp's by a previous marriage, and the Kemp child was born to Kemp by a previous marriage. Beatrice Kemp, age 9, is the sole survivor, and she escaped with her clothing in flames. She summoned neighbors, but the firemen found the bungalow a regular furnace and the nearest hydrant was a quarter of a mile away.

When the flames died down the bodies were all found huddled together in one room of the one story house.

## INSPECTION FOR NATIONAL GUARD

DALLAS, Nov. 6.—An attempt to shoot Jim Kimbro, a negro, at his trial here on a charge of slaying J. P. Robinson, was made yesterday by a woman spectator, it was learned today. ## NO TAXES PAID IN THIS CITY OF 11,000

(By Associated Press)  
SOUTH RIVER, N. J., Nov. 6.—The record in this municipality of 11,000 of "no local taxes" is endangered only by the intrusion of politics.

Revenue from the city owned power plant and from license and franchise fees kept the tax wolf away during the last year. Mayor Allgain now stipulates that if politics is held in abeyance the city can continue the no-tax program and at the same time reduce power rates.

When borough officials last fall took up consideration of the 1925 levy, they found surplus revenues of \$45,000 on deposit. Rates for lighting current were reduced to those charged by competitors and local taxes abolished.

**R. J. WHEELER  
TO MOVE AWAY**



Rufus J. Wheeler will leave  
Ballinger some time between this  
date and January 1st to make  
his home in San Antonio. At a  
recent general conference of offi-  
cials of the American Central  
Life Insurance Co. it was decided  
to divide the state of Texas into  
three divisions and to place a  
superintendent in charge of each,  
and Mr. Wheeler was named by  
the company as superintendent of  
the Southwestern Division, with  
headquarters at San Antonio.

Texas has heretofore been  
under one superintendent, but  
owing to the great size of the  
state and the enormous amount  
of business being done by this  
company it became necessary to  
divide it into the three sections.  
It is the only state that is not  
under one superintendency and  
each of the three divisions will  
be separate as are the other states,  
and each superintendent will  
have the same staffs as do state

Texas division will be under su-

will have headquarters at Ama-

under him. His district is con-  
sidered one of the best in the

which Runnels county is grouped.

as he does, Mr. Wheeler is ex-

visit old friends.

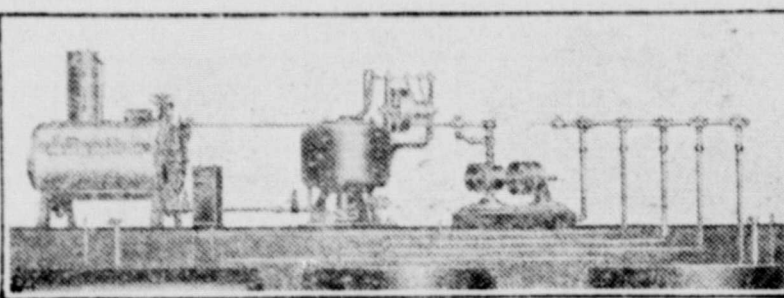


Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Moore are

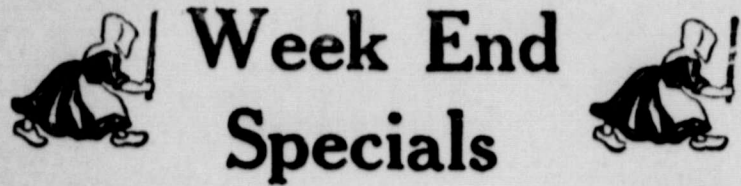

Bill Would Abolish Death Penalty (By Associated Press)

SYDNEY, New South Wales, Nov. 6.—A bill to abolish the death penalty will be presented to the next session of the legislature by the state cabinet.

The measure would substitute imprisonment for hanging in cases of convicted murderers, the sentence varying in severity in accordance with the circumstances of the crime.

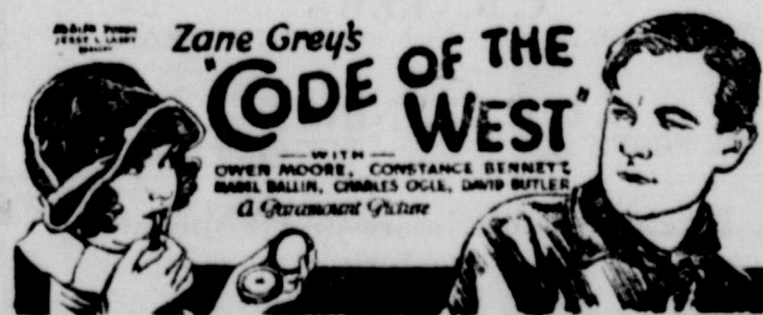

## LYCEUM NUMBER HERE TUESDAY

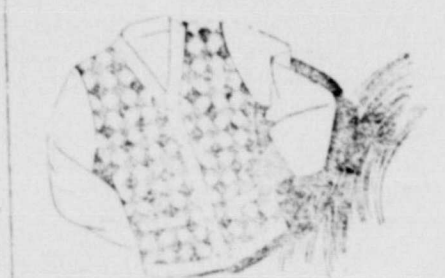

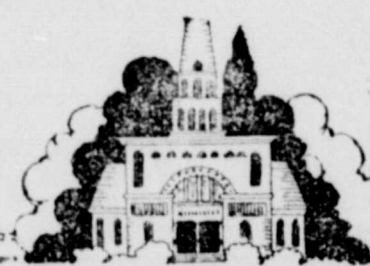
