CROP REPORT SENDS COTTON PRICE DOWN

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—A probable cotton production of about 15,395,000 equivalent to 500-pound bales, if average influences prevail during the remainder of the season was indicated by the Department of Agriculture announcement today in its report of November 1st. A probable yield of 166.4 pounds of lint cotton per acre is indicated. Last year's crop totalled 13,267,936 bales.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—Cotton ginned from the 1925 crop prior to November 1st, totalled 11,198,660 running bales counting round bales as half-bales, the Census Bureau announced today. The ginnings were 9,715,643 bales on the same date last year. Ginnings in Texas for the same period were 2,850,972 bales.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 9.—The New Orleans cotton market broke 120 points, or \$6 a bale, after the government report was issued today.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Cotton broke \$5.00 a bale on the publication of the semi-monthly government report.

COL. MITCHELL STANDING PAT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—A number of more accusations were turned loose today by Col. William S. Mitchell against those in charge of the military and naval air services.

Through his counsel, Representative Frank Reid, the colonel informed the court martial trying him that because of his previous utterances on the air controversy he was fully prepared to prove his charges of criminal and almost treasonable negligence against government aviation.

HOSPITAL INTERNES STRIKE; APOLOGIZE

VERA CRUZ, Nov. 9.—A singularly polite strike has been recorded in this city, where strikes of one kind or another, frequently anything but amiable, are almost incessant.

Hospital employes and attendants walked out when their salaries had not been paid for several months. Formal and elaborate expressions of regret were transmitted to the patients.

"We deplore the unfortunate condition in which we must leave you," the strikers said to the patients, "but our own cases are more lamentable. Our salaries in most instances are \$30 or less per month. And when even that salary is not paid, we must, with renewed expressions of infinite regret, proclaim that we cease work!"

SCHOOL BOARD EQUIPS STAGE

The board of trustees of the Ballinger Independent District placed an order Friday for stage scenery, curtains and lights, which will put the stage in the high school auditorium in perfect shape. The scenery ordered includes an exterior woodland set and an interior parlor set with additional doors for the back drops that will give an option of two complete scenes for interior purposes. The velvet front curtain is in brilliant colors and is a beautiful piece of art.

This equipment will be installed by December 1st and by that date it is expected that the entire auditorium will be ready for use with all seats and lighting fixtures installed.

This auditorium with stage fully equipped will be the first auditorium the city has ever had where an entertainment could be presented with everything that is needed for the offering of an up-to-date attraction. Any high class show or local company will be able to give a performance of nearly any nature in the new school building, with plenty of room both on stage and for seating a large audience.

Good progress is being made on the new building and the interior finishing work will soon be completed and the building turned over to the board.

88 ARE KILLED IN CAR WRECKS

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Automobile accidents and deaths in ten Middle Western states dropped to 88 last week as compared to more than 100 for the previous week.

Twenty-three of these deaths occurred in Illinois, most of which were reported from Chicago, and 21 in Ohio.

Only four deaths from automobile wrecks occurred in Texas.

Poland Shuts Off U. S. Flour

WARSAW, Nov. 9.—Poland also has had an unusually good harvest this year, and there is no longer any necessity to import foreign flour, of which last year America sent over \$20,000,000 worth. To make further importation impossible the government has placed an import tax of \$1.50 per hundred kilos on flour.

ANNUAL MEET OF RADIO MEN

More than 400 delegates representing national and international interests of the radio world were on hand to hear the secretary present to the conference, which is meeting at his call, his views on vital problems.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Fourteen large ships in the "Rum Row" fleet appeared off the coast of New York today laden with holiday drinks.

New tactics have been evolved to meet any repetition of the Coast Guard blockade of last summer that drove away some of the vessels anchored outside the 12-mile limit. The new flotilla does not anchor, and when the coast guard vessels make their appearance the liquor armada takes to its heels until the Coast Guard vessels give out of fuel and have to go in to port and replenish storage tanks. Business between the liquor vessels and shore bootleggers then goes on during the Coast Guard vessels' absence.

Four other new rum vessels are reported to have been sighted off the coast of Boston, and a few others South of New York.

AN OKLAHOMA CITY THAT IS TAX-FREE

PONCA CITY, Okla., Nov. 9.—This city of 15,000 population, is free from taxes. Revenues derived from the municipally-owned light and power plant and waterworks are sufficient to pay all taxes. Rates charged for water, light and power are lower than in most other places where plants are operated by public service corporations.

The supreme court at Wash-
ington has held the Arizona state
minimum wage law for women
unconstitutional. Only one judge
dissented, Judge Brandeis. The
case was appealed by the owner
of two stores in Nogales who was
paying his saleswomen less than
\$16 per week, who defended him-
self in the state court upon the
ground that if he paid the legal
minimum of \$16 his business
would be ruined. The state court
upheld the validity of the law,
but the federal district court held
it invalid, and this decision was
sustained by the court of the last
resort.—Comanche Chief.

**CAR SMASHES ORDER OF
DAY FOR WEEK-END**

There were not less than a
dozen car wrecks and smash-ups
in Ballinger and vicinity, Satur-
day and Sunday. Several crashes
occurred at the intersection of
Eighth Street and Hutchings
Avenue while traffic was the
heaviest Saturday afternoon, but
fortunately no one was hurt.
Three cars were badly damaged,
both front wheels caved in, and
fenders and radiators burst, and
repair bills will require a consid-
erable amount of money.

Another accident occurred Sun-

road just west of the Colorado
River bridge where the Paint
Rock highway intersects. Two
cars collided at the spot and both
were pretty badly smashed up,
but luckily none of the motorists

Cable News from Europe

PARIS, Nov. 7.—The Goncourt prize, announcement of which is one of the chief events of the French literary year, is already being awarded right and left by the critics, although the Goncourt Academy does not make its decision before December.

"If the prize is given not to a single work, but to the whole work of one author," comments *Cri de Paris*, "only two names can be mentioned—Andre Maurois and Paul Morand."

Both these writers are well known in the United States. M. Maurois by his "Life of Shelley," and M. Morand by his "Open All Night," and "Lewis and Irene."

PARIS, Nov. 7.—Official announcement this week that two million dozen oysters—or about eight of the succulent bivalves for every man, woman and child of Paris—are reaching the city daily was received with good natured banter and expressions of doubt by the general public.

The ministry of labor confirmed the figures, but explained that this enormous supply was not all consumed in the capital. Many of the shipments are forwarded to various points in the interior of France, with Strasbourg, Metz, Lille and Nancy as the best customers.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—Short skirts worn by women lawyers in the Paris courts recently have so shocked the elderly pontiffs of the Bar Association that they met and deliberated thereupon.

"The Council of the Order of Advocates," the bar's directing body is known, came to the conclusion that while a woman lawyer might wear knee length skirts outside the Palais de Justice, inside it she must keep her "toga," or formal black gown, at regulation length, meaning down to the ankles and even below.

Fearing to wound feminine susceptibilities, however, the council decided not to issue a formal circular on the subject, but charged each of its members to drop gentle hints here and there about the law courts, calculated to reach the ears of the fairer members of the profession.

PARIS, Nov. 7.—Charlie Chaplin is building a house at the little village of St. Jean de Luz, alongside one owned by Feodor Chaliapin, the famous basso. It is believed the profits of the French edition of his new film, "The Gold Rush," are being used in this venture. Real estate has already gone up in the neighborhood, the French apparently calculating that these two notables will make the neighborhood more popular. "Charlot's" new picture, Gallieized as "Lo Ruec Vers L'Or," is very popular in Paris.

LONDON, NOV. 7.—Women with short hair are not so "cantankerous" as those with unshorn locks, in the opinion of a London hairdresser catering to the public in the region of Ludgate Circus.

"I used to be against short hair for women," this worthy said, "but I've changed my mind. At one time I would not serve women who wanted their hair cut. Many customers have told me, however, that they found that their wives were better natured after they had had their long hair removed.

"When I was learning the hair dresser's trade 20 years ago women used to complain about their long, heavy hair, saying that this strain on the scalp gave them nervous headache. When a man's hair gets longer than usual it annoys him and makes him nervous, so I suppose that there is truth in the claim of modern women that a light head is much better for the health."

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The British government has decided to remove a long standing grievance of the British investigating public in the near future.

In the interest of upholding the value of the pound and thereby the gold standard, the issue of foreign loans in Great Britain has been under a government ban for a long time in order to prevent gold leaving the country. It is now learned that as a result of representations from bankers, financiers, and investors—the government believes

the time has arrived when this embargo may be safely lifted, to the benefit not only of investors but also of British trade, since the money so invested would be used to purchase British goods.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—German dancing masters are predicting that the old fashioned waltz, such as was danced before the war, will have a great vogue this winter. They believe that among the newer dances the Charleston and the Florida give the best promise of future success in Germany.

Dance music here seems to be reverting from the saxophones and loud brasses to music in which the strings furnish the backbone. There is also a marked desire for more graceful dances, such as the tango.

So great has the dancing craze become in Berlin that the police, who up to this time permitted restaurants, hotels and clubs to give only three or four dances a week, removed all restrictions at the beginning of this month.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—Tennis has taken such a strong hold in Germany that Munich will attempt to supply indoor tennis courts during this winter. A gigantic hall which was devoted to aeronautics during the recent Munich Communications and Transportation Fair, is being equipped with courts, which will be opened to the public about the middle of this month.

Other cities are watching this experiment with interest, to determine whether all winter tennis courts are practicable.

ent concert season Myra Mortimer, a contralto, whose home is in Denver, Colorado. At her recent debut in Beethoven Hall she astounded the critics by her handling of the German language in her rendition of songs by Schubert and Wolff. Her interpretation of old English songs, such as "Drink to Me Only with Thine Eyes," and German folk songs, won especial admiration.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—Sir Josiah Stamp, who was a British member of the Dawes commission, in an article in the *Deutsche Bergwerks-Zeitung*, proposes the question: "Is German on the verge of becoming an American province?" He was inspired to make this query by reports of enormous credits to be extended various German interests by American finance.

If in the next 30 years only half the sums mentioned are invested by Americans in Germany, Sir Josiah says, the total will be something over four billion pounds sterling (about \$20,000,000,000), or more than 20 per cent of the entire national wealth of Germany. Such an enormous sum, he thinks, cannot be considered merely a loan. On the contrary, he says, the principal of these advances must be considered as a permanent investment or at least a very long time credit. About two-thirds of this investment will take the form of new establishments in Germany.
