DAYLIGHT RAID ON TEXAS HOTEL

(By Associated Press)
FT. WORTH, Feb. 27.—Two robberies apparently committed by the same two men, were reported to the police department from the Texas Hotel just before noon today, following the daylight encounter on the twelfth floor of the hotel with F. L. Clampitt, of Kansas City.

The hotel clerk and a policeman, Edgar Mason, an actor and his wife, were the victims of the second episode, and the men were believed to be still hiding in the hotel when a call was sent to the police station for help.

Clampitt was the first man held up, and in the encounter with the robbers he exchanged shots with them, who fled to another floor of the hotel and attempted to rob the other parties before the alarm could be given.

FARMER LOSES 18 BALES COTTON

Joe Knoff and W. A. Koch, who live ten miles South of Ballinger on the Ballinger-Paint Rock road, were in the city Saturday conferring with the compress manager and cotton men concerning the salvaging of the remnants of eighteen bales of cotton which Mr. Knoff lost in a fire at his home Thursday afternoon.

The cotton represented Mr. Knoff's entire crop of thirty bales. Twelve bales were rolled away and out of reach of the fire, but eighteen bales were destroyed before the fire could be put under control.

The cotton was piled out in the corner of the field near the Knoff home, and it is believed that a little four-year-old boy set it afire while playing around the cotton. The cotton was not insured and the loss figures more than \$100 per bale, on present market basis.

A call was sent to Ballinger for a fire truck and the chemical car was sent out, but lost the way and returned to Ballinger after failing to locate the scene of the fire. Mr. Knoff's neighbors gathered in and helped to fight the fire, the women helping to form a bucket brigade in carrying water from cisterns and tanks. It was Friday morning before the fire was finally extinguished. Mr. Knoff hopes to be able to salvage a few hundred pounds of lint from some of the bales.

FIRST CHICKS HATCHED AT COLEMAN PLANT

The first chickens are hatching today at the Chamber of Commerce incubator at the West Texas Utilities Company's garage. Apparently the percentage will exceed the fondest expectations. Tuesday 4,000 more eggs were placed in position and yesterday many were turned away. The incubator is not large enough to supply the demand. This morning club boys were here from Bangs trying to buy Rhode Island Red chicks. Other orders are coming by mail. Obviously the success of the venture is assured, and it is a great aid to the poultry industry in this and adjoining counties—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

PLANTER KILLED IN FIGHT WITH NEGRO LABORER

MARLIN, Feb. 27.—The trouble between Louis Britt, Brazos valley planter, and Jesse Hawkins, negro, in which Britt lost his life at the hands of the negro, grew out of a controversy over a debt which the negro is said to have owed Britt.

MARLIN, Feb. 27.—A pistol duel five miles Southwest of here last night resulted in the death of Louis Britt, a prominent Brazos valley farmer, and the wounding of Jesse Hawkins, negro.

Hawkins is in the Falls county jail here charged with murder. The cause of the fight has not been made public.

DAVENPART GETS 99 YEARS IN PEN

After deliberating one hour and twenty minutes the jury in the Gratton Davenport case at San Angelo returned a verdict of guilty and fixed the penalty at 99 years in the penitentiary.

It was the second trial Davenport had faced for murder in connection with the death of Sam Rogers, son of W. H. Rogers, of Winters. The first trial resulted in a hung jury, the jury standing 9 to 3 for conviction.

Davenport is alleged to have shot Rogers down as the latter was driving down the street at Mertzon in his wagon on Feb. 3, 1925. Rogers was killed without a moment's warning. Davenport declined to make a statement and it was some time before it became known what Davenport's defense would be. In the trial he plead insanity and the unwritten law was also injected into the case.

Rogers was foreman of the Sugg ranch, and Davenport lived on an adjoining ranch in Irion county. The case was transferred from Sherwood to San Angelo for trial.

\$100,000 GOES UP IN SMOKE

DALLAS, Feb. 27.—Fire in a United Cigar Company store in the heart of the business district of Dallas this morning caused damage estimated at between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

Five firemen were injured during the fire which the firemen fought for nearly four hours before bringing under control. The cause of the blaze has not been determined.



LEGION WOMEN GETS LIFE TERM TO TOUR TEXAS FOR MURDER

GROVETON, Tex., Feb. 27.—The jury in the case of George Maddox, charged with killing Chris Wright, twelve miles West of here last December, returned a verdict of guilty today and assessed Maddox's punishment at life imprisonment.

The case went to trial yesterday, and quick time was made in getting it before the jury. Maddox is a farmer, about fifty years of age, is married and the father of eight children.

FOUR KILLED ON GRADE CROSSING

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Feb. 27.—Four persons in an automobile were killed today when a car was struck by the Twentieth Century Express of the New York Central Railroad at a crossing just outside of the city.

The dead are Glenn Smith, his wife Augusta, Roy Beteridge and Dewey Veaney, all of this city.

OIL FIELD ASKS FOR RAILROAD

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Permission for the construction of a line of railroad from a point near Panhandle, Texas, to Section Land, in Hutchinson county, thirty miles distant, was requested in a petition filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission today by the Panhandle-Santa Fe Railway.

The application declares that the road is necessary to furnish transportation for the oil field in Carson and Hutchinson counties.

Death was attributed to heart disease.

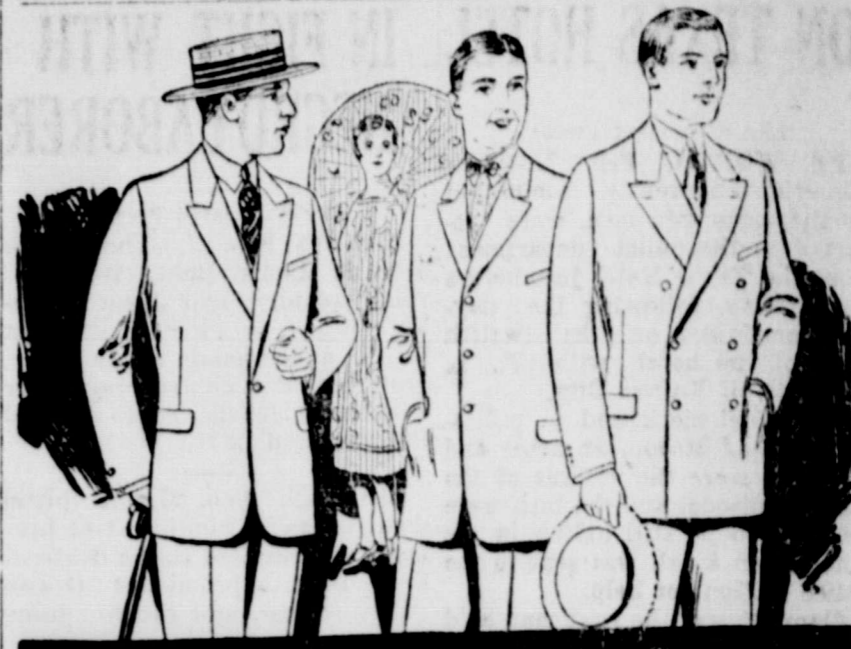

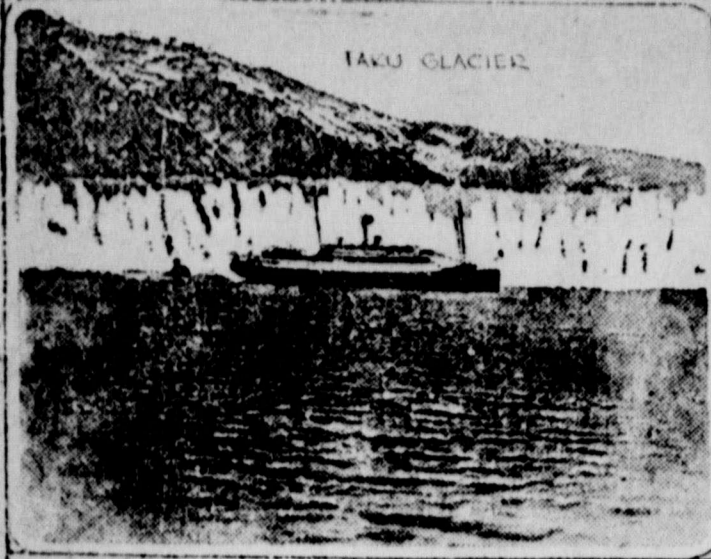

Alert Bay brings immediately to mind the grotesquely carved and painted totem poles, only exceeded in fantasticality by the ornaments decorating the graves in the Indian cemetery not far from the wharf. Wrangell is interesting because of its international importance and its comparatively recent headlining in the news. Taku Glacier, Juneau, and then the surpassingly lovely Lynn Canal to Skagway! Inland from there is a spectacular rail journey over the White Pass into the Yukon Territory and Canada. Then a visit to the Klondike is a fitting climax to the Alaskan trip.

EASTERN LADS WANT WORK ON TEXAS RANCH

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 26.— Though the frontier days and customs of the Southwest now belong to the ages, Texas still is a lure for the adventurous youth of the North and the East. The hope of being a Lone Star cowboy still thrills many a boy as he lives a commonplace life in the cities of New York, Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin and Minnesota or on the small farms of those states. Evidence that these youths long for Texas' well-known open spaces is found in the dozens of letters received by Col. Ike T. Pryor, veteran cattleman and trail driver who owns a ranch of 100,000 acres in Zavalla county. Nearly daily he gets a plea of a young man in the North or East for a job on this ranch.

Such applications have been common in Col. Pryor's office here for some time, but they increased considerably when a popular magazine published in January an article about the cattle king and his trail driving experiences. His wastebasket became full to overflowing with offers to help take care of the big herds which are the colonel's pride. A few days ago two young men arrived in San Antonio from Minnesota, having travelled all the way in a "flivver." They left their farms and homes upon reading the magazine article, determined to find work on the Zavalla county ranch, and were disappointed when informed at Col. Pryor's office that they could not be accommodated.

Col. Pryor, a few weeks ago, received an appeal from an Ohio woman to find her young son who had left home with only \$10, headed toward the Pryor ranch. The last the mother had heard from him was that he had reached Louisville, Ky., and had spent all his funds. So far the lad has not turned up at the ranch.

None of the applications for work that reach Col. Pryor come from the West—for the simple enough reason. The Western boy is more or less accustomed to "magnificent distances," and Texas holds no particular lure for him when near at home. He can find plenty of territory in which to stretch. Too, he knows that the Wild West era has passed, something apparently not realized by young men in the

HARLINGEN EXPECTS TO BECOME A PORT

(By Associated Press)

HARLINGEN, Feb. 26.—Harlingen, an inland town approximately 75 miles from the Gulf of Mexico, may yet see ships of a certain draft steam up to its nearby but as yet non-existent wharves, unload steel in unbroken bulk from Pittsburgh and other products from points in between.

John N. Garner, congressman from this district, will assist upon the Harlingen project with a view of making it a link in the Intra-coastal Canal, which is a project now in the making from New Orleans to the Rio Grande.

A survey of the Arroyo Colorado, now a dry bed and one of the outlets for the Rio Grande flood waters, is the immediate prospective preliminary. Ulti-

mately a five foot channel in the Arroyo is contemplated. It is pointed out it will not only greatly increase the tonnage available to the canal when it is completed to the mouth of the Rio Grande, but will greatly aid the port of Point Isabel, which is another ambitious Gulf Coast project 25 miles from Brownsville.

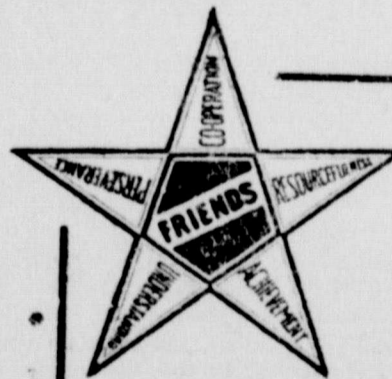

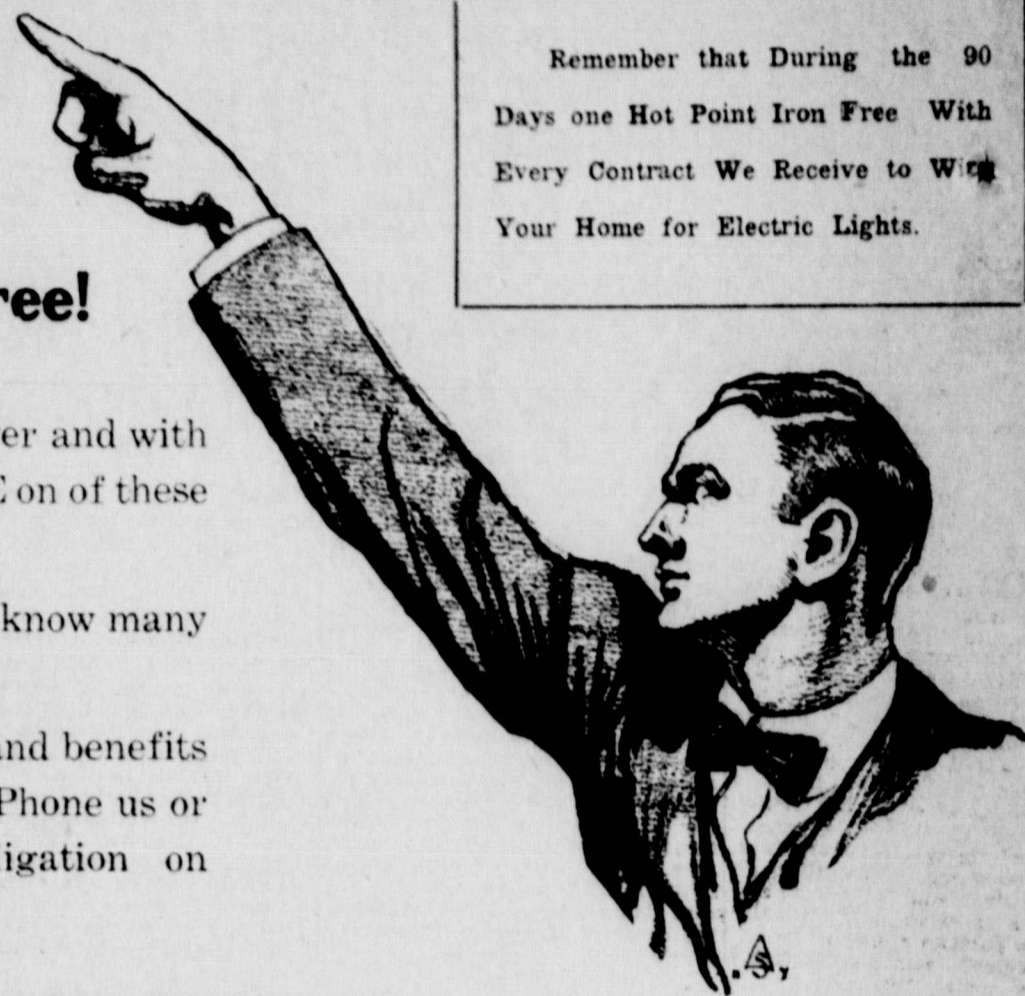

BERLIN, Feb. 27.—Thirty department store owners and managers from various parts of Germany will sail shortly for the United States to study store management, especially what the Germans call "jazz band advertising."

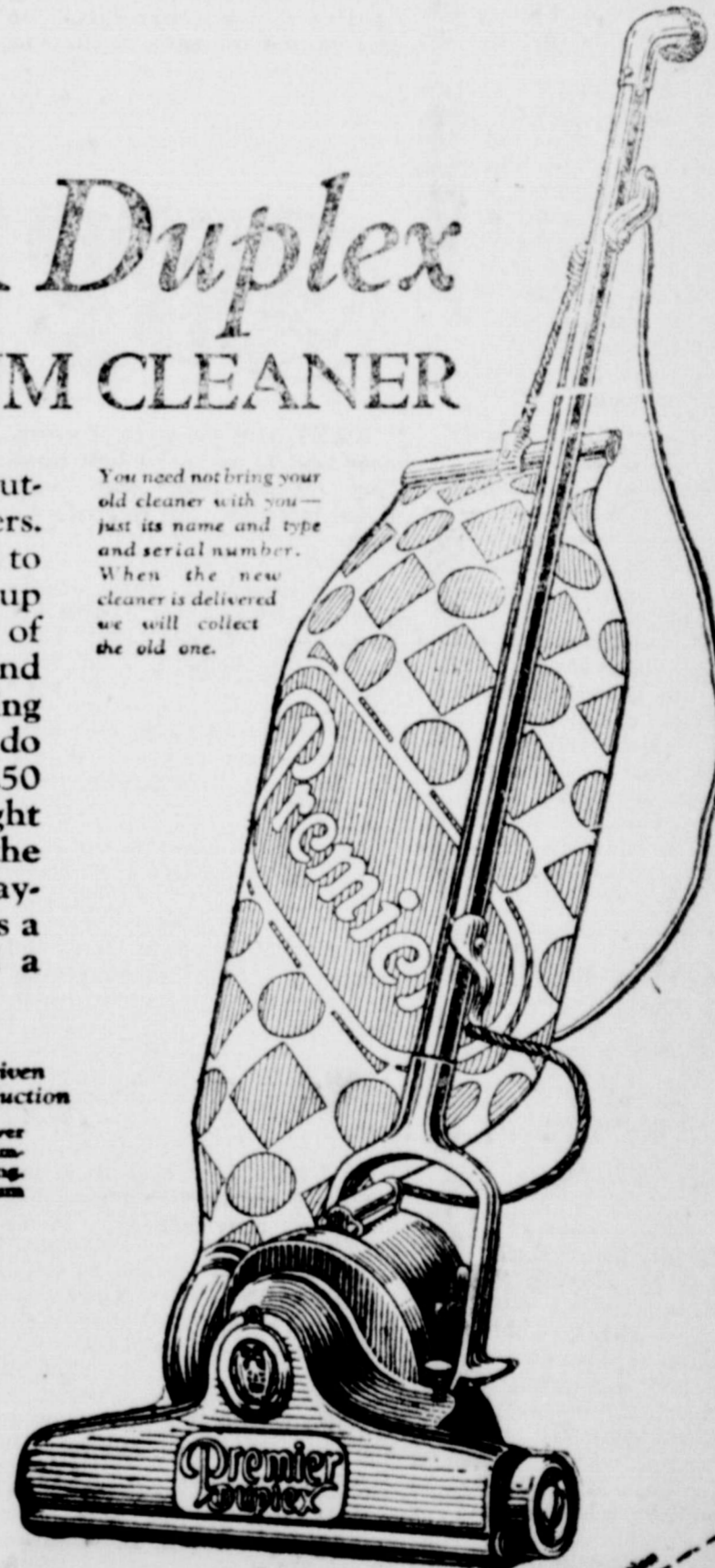

INCOME \$3,500 ON HOG CROP

(By Associated Press)

DILLEY, Tex., Feb. 27.—Joe Nagy, regarded as the peer of hog raisers in this section of Frio county, makes an annual income of \$3,500 out of his pig crop, which other farmers hereabout regard as quite an agricultural spree.

Those who have heard the story from sources close to Mr. Nagy point out that he has 4,300 acres of land, most of which is devoted to livestock raising. But feeding and shipping hogs, he regards as one of his most profitable enterprises.

He has 30 Poland China sows which farrow twice a year. An average of six pigs to a litter produces 360 pigs a year. In feeding for market he selects those which weigh about 100 pounds and brings them to full feed as rapidly as possible. When they add 75 pounds to their weight they are shipped either to San Antonio or to Fort Worth. Usually he has seven car loads of hogs to ship each year, and his average profits are figured at \$500 a car or \$3,500 a year.

How he feeds them is a short story in porcine prose. In addition to their grain allowance, they get a mixture of one-third steamed cotton seed and two-thirds of rice bran, and are fed all they will eat twice a day.

Unsatisfactory conditions in the cattle industry have caused Mr. Nagy to temporarily abandon that field for hog raising. Usually, however, he feeds several car loads of cattle for market each year. Hogs just now attract him as a profitable field. But this is not the full measure of his activities. He has 60 head of sheep and several milch cows. About 1,000 acres of his land is in cultivation; the remainder is range land and pasture. His principal crops are winter oats, for grazing, red top cane, kaffir and milo. Some corn also is grown, but he does not regard it as a dependable crop.

He has nine pit silos, each of

them with a capacity of 75 tons. When he is feeding cattle he regards them as nearly the keystone of the arch of cattle feeding business.

These feats are cited by Mr. Nagy's neighbors as evidence that he is a successful farmer who is not without versatility.

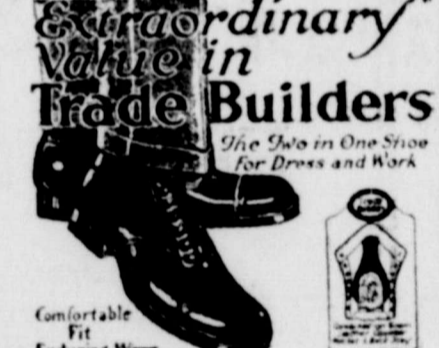
