DOCTOR AND NURSE HELD FOR MURDER

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, March 4.—Dr. C. A. Wallace, a Houston physician, and Mrs. Hattie Harvey, said to be a nurse, were charged with murder today in connection with the death of Mrs. Fannie Isenberg, age twenty-eight.
Mrs. Isenberg was the wife of Paul Isenberg. She died early today in a local hospital, and the warrant charging Dr. Wallace and Mrs. Harvey with murder was filed shortly afterwards.

CALVIN REVIEWS YEAR'S WORK

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 4.—President Coolidge today rounded out his first year as occupant of the White House in his own right earned by his election to the office of chief executive. In 1919 Mr. Coolidge has served more than two and a half years as chief executive of the greatest country in the world.
His elevation to the office of president upon the death of Warren G. Harding preceded by nineteen months his inauguration last March 4th as president elected by the people.
Reviewing the past year's activities, President Coolidge had the satisfaction of realizing that two of his major recommendations to congress, adherence to the world court and tax reduction, had been acted upon.

FOUR PRISONERS ESCAPE FROM JAIL

SAN ANTONIO, March 4.—Four military prisoners, two of them facing a ten-year sentence at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, escaped from the Fort Sam Houston guard house today.
The men made their get-away by sawing out of a window early this morning.

FARMERS ASKED TO FRAME BILL

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Representatives of the farmers in Middle Western states were instructed today by the House agricultural committee to draft a farm relief bill.
The bill will be presented and worked out before congress as soon as the committee can perfect it.

SAN ANGELO SETS NEW POSTAL RECORD

SAN ANGELO, March 4.—Postal receipts at the San Angelo postoffice for the month of February set a new high record. The receipts were \$209 more than for any other month in the history of the city.

ATTEMPT TO KILL MEXICAN GOV.

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO, D. F., March 4.—General Garrido, governor of the state of Tabasco, and a friend, were wounded when an assassin last night tried to kill the governor, who is on a visit here. The governor and friend are not believed to be seriously wounded.
Four men, said to be political enemies of Garrido, have been arrested.

RAIN LIGHT OVER THE ENTIRE STATE

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, March 4.—Light rains, beginning last night and continuing today in practically every section of Texas, with cloudy and warmer weather and prediction of probably more rain tonight, will assist the agricultural sections. Reports indicated that the rains were not heavy in any part of the state, being confined to drizzling and misty falling weather.

Following a light sprinkle Wednesday, and early Thursday morning, the Ballinger trade territory continued to be dampened by a drizzle throughout a major portion of Thursday. The rain had not been sufficient to cause water to run in the road up to a late hour Thursday, but water puddles were formed in places, and farmers declare that the moisture will be of some benefit to small gain. Reports received here indicate that the rain covered a wide range.

NO ALARM OVER MARKET BREAK

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, March 4.—Drastic declines in stock prices have been brought to a halt, and buying orders for hundreds of thousands of shares were distributed on today's market by strong financial interests.
Hundreds of bargain hunters, or small traders, who only come into the market after big breaks, sent buying orders in, with the result that prices on scores of issues rallied from one to fifteen points before noon.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The break in the stock market is not regarded with alarm by Secretary Mellon, who believes it is only a natural reaction of excessive speculation.
The secretary's views were outlined today at the treasury building when he stated that he believes the reaction will have a wholesome effect and that fundamental conditions of prosperity will not be disturbed.

The secretary regards the slump as inevitable evidence of the process of a feeling that where prices run to one extreme set-backs are in order.

Brownwood is host this week to several hundred school teachers, the occasion being the annual meeting of the Mid-Texas Teachers Association. It adds to the environment of any community to bring together in it a bunch of teachers or preachers occasionally.

SCHOOL POLITICS

Patrons of the Ballinger schools should not precipitate a political scrap in selecting four trustees to make up the new board. There are one hundred or more good men in Ballinger to select from and they should be chosen with an eye single to the best interests of our schools, and not to satisfy the personal ambition of some individual, or to satisfy the whims of some political faction.

The board should be composed of men who can work in harmony, and where there would be no such thing as a minority. The patrons should get together, single out the best men for the place, and draft them into service. Do this and they will serve. No man wants to enter a contest and make a fight for the privilege of performing a service which calls for sacrifices of his time remunerated only by criticism and knocks.

No issues should be injected into a campaign for the election of school trustees, and the names of candidates for superintendent of the school should not be written between the lines of the names on the printed ballot. The interests of the one thousand school children and the tax payers who put up the forty thou-

and dollars annually to keep the schools going, is of far greater importance than the interests of one individual or faction.

These remarks are prompted by the persistent rumor that a ticket has been slated and that a political fight is brewing which will leave its mark of disfiguration on our schools.

PRO LAW GOOD LAW—PLEASES EVERYBODY

Why all this hulla-baloo about the dry law not being enforced? The wets, those who opposed the dry law in the beginning, tell us that booze is plentiful, and that they can buy all they want.

All this being true, the law is a good law for the wets, and why should they kick? On the other hand, the dries, those who worked for years to make the nation dry, say they are satisfied, and under no condition are they willing to undo what has been done.

If the pros who were pros at the beginning are still pros, and they are, and if the wets can still get all the liquor they want, as they say they can, then why not let well enough alone.

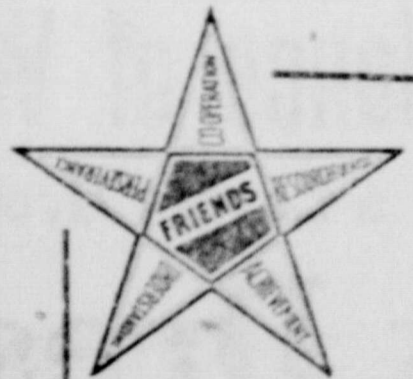

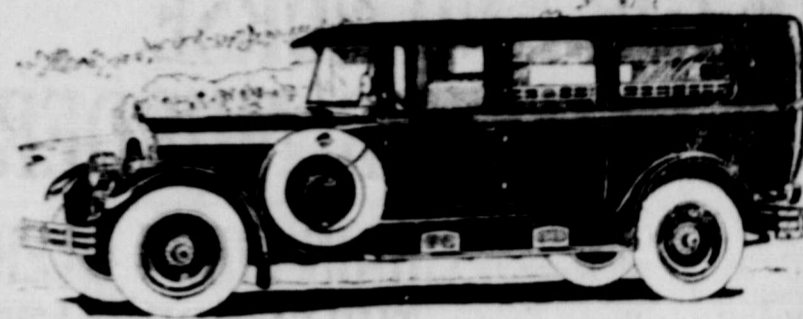

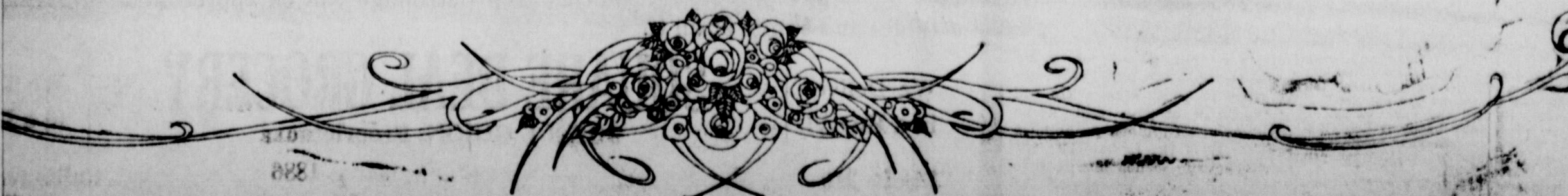

UNCOVER NEVADA MINES BURIED FOR 2,000 YEARS

(By Associated Press)

LOS ANGELES, March 3.—Several new discoveries throwing additional light on an ancient race have been made at Pueblo Grande de Nevada, the buried city of Nevada.

The archaeological finds were described here by Governor Scroggins, who has followed with interest the excavating work in his state. They include the remains of the works where these ancient people obtained their salt, ledges where they mined for ornaments, and remnants of clothing indicating familiarity with the use of cotton.

"The salt was gotten from a series of caverns a short distance from the buried city," Governor Scroggins said. "Some of the walls and floors of these caves are formed in part of pure rock salt and here the ancients conducted their salt mining. The workings, showing where large blocks of salt were removed, are in the same condition of about 2,000 years ago."

"One of the relics was a pair of sandals of a type never before found in this country. They are in a good state of preservation and were made of deer hide and equipped with cotton cords for fastening."

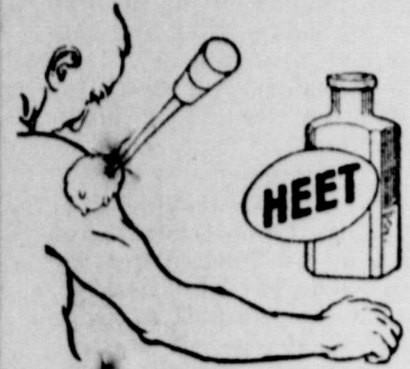

BEGIN CULTURE OF OLIVES IN THE LAREDO DISTRICT

(By Associated Press)
LAREDO, March 4.—The "fruit" that made Italy famous is gaining a foothold in the Rio Grande valley. Olives gradually are coming to be one of the products of the "magic valley" and it is expected that within a few years olive orchards may be established in many parts of South Central Texas.

At Pearsall, Texas there are a great many olive trees planted around homes and they appear to be thoroughly acclimated and bearing well. C. H. Henderson of Pearsall has a tree more than 20 years old.

Around Laredo are several small olive groves all producing a profit. It is claimed that olive trees will produce abundant crops on rocky, broken land where other fruit trees are rarely successful. The trees usually begin to fruit when from eight to ten years old and their longevity is greater than that of any other orchard tree. Well matured trees at the age of 10 to 12 years produce from 15 to 20 pounds of oil. Production increases with the age and development of the tree.

ED'S DUCK CAME FROM CANADA

A mallard duck banded with an aluminum tag No. 232002 at Davidson, Saskatchewan, Canada, on May 9, 1924, was recently killed by E. C. Schuehard on the Colorado River near Ballinger.

The Ledger carried a story of the killing of the duck at the time the hunter came in with his bag, and stated that Mr. Schuehard, a clerk in the local postoffice, had forwarded the band to the Bureau of Biological Survey at Washington, as was requested of him by the band found on the duck's leg.

Mr. Schuehard received a card this week from Washington acknowledging receipt of the tag and informing him that the bird was banded at Davidson on the above date by R. Lloyd. The card said, "By means of these aluminum bands an important investigation relative to the migration and life histories of our native birds is being advanced," and it thanks Mr. Schuehard for notifying the department of the capture of the duck.

It is about thirteen hundred miles on an air line from Davidson, Sask., to Ballinger, and the duck was killed a year and eight months after it had been marked and released.

NEW YORKERS LARGEST U. S. ONION CONSUMERS

(By Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, March 3.—If the onion boycott recently adopted by several fashionable Chicago hotels were to spread to any considerable extent, Bermuda onion growers in Texas might have cause to worry. But at present there is no apprehension in the minds of Winter Garden farmers as they prepare to harvest their crops this month.

"If the boycott should extend to New York, there might be cause for anxiety," said J. Austen Hunter of the state department of agriculture. "For New York is the nation's largest consumer of onions."

Residents of the country's metropolis eat approximately

5,000 carloads of onions every year, far more than any other city. In Chicago, where South Side hostilities have catered to the fastidious by banning the vegetables, the consumption is only 1,500 carloads.

Texas provides something like 15 per cent of New York's onions. The rest of the supply comes chiefly from New York state, Egypt and California.

Incidentally, Texas onions find a market in California, despite the large onion crops raised in the Golden State. The shipments there from this state average 35 to 40 carloads annually, Hunter said.

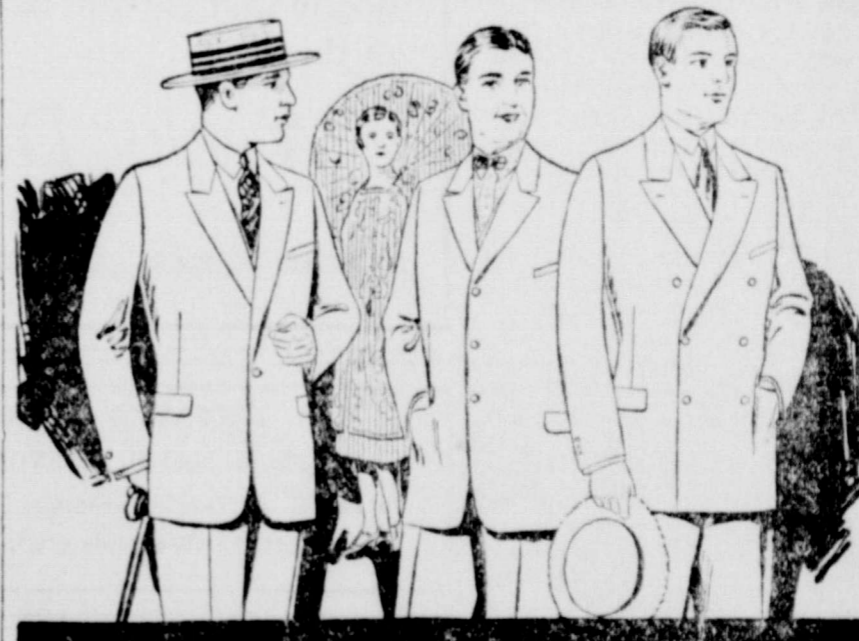

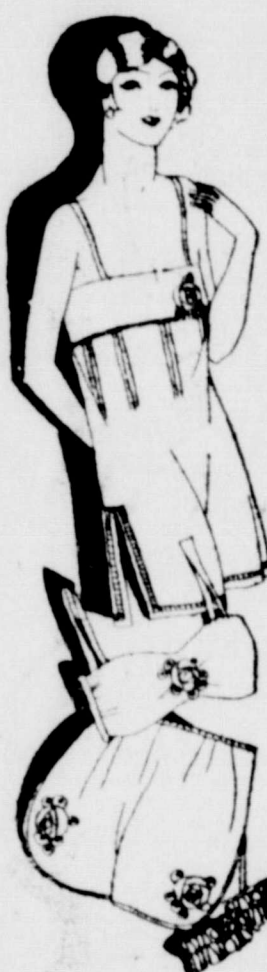
