## AUSTIN LAWYER IS INDICTED

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, March 24.—After being indicted by the Travis county grand jury Tuesday and after making bond for \$500, Harris Bell, an Austin attorney, today issued a statement in which he demanded an immediate trial on the charge. He promises a startling revelation at the trial.  
Grand jury action was expected after bribery charges were filed against one of the members of the grand jury. The grand jury was reconvened and instructed to investigate charges and counter charges made by Bell and a member of the grand jury alleging an attempt to bribe.  
The grand jury indictment against Bell is said to have been in connection with a land deal in which Jesus Ramirez charges Bell with obtaining a deed to 121 acres of land in Bastrop county through fraud and misrepresentation.  
Bell was employed to represent Ramirez in court and thought he was signing a deed of trust to the land to secure Bell in payment of attorney's fees, it is alleged, and the mortgage turned out to be a deed to the land.

## GERMANS DEFEND LEAGUE STAND

BERLIN, March 24.—Replying to Sir Austen Chamberlain's statement in the House of Commons yesterday, the German government today made public its correspondence with Brazil regarding the League of Nations.  
The German government argues that it is clear from this correspondence that Germany had a right to expect admission of its representative to a seat in the league council.

## JOY RIDERS CAUGHT IN HIGH TIDE

Two couples of young folks out joy riding in the wee sma' hours of Saturday night, or Sunday morning, were caught by the high tide in Elm Creek at the upper dam crossing, and had a narrow escape.  
The young people were riding in a borrowed Ford touring car, and the chauffeur drove into the edge of the water just as the creek began to rise. Fortunately he stopped before reaching deep water, but a wave rolling down the stream from the heavy rain which had just fallen submerged the machine within a few minutes after the joy riders had escaped from the car by wading out, and the auto was washed down the stream a short distance.  
The automobile was recovered Monday afternoon, and aside from water damage and a broken top, the damage was light.

## BANKERS HOLD MONTHLY MEET

The Miles National Bank was host to the bankers of Runnels county Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the Runnels County Co-operative Bankers, and every bank except one was represented with one or more representatives at the meeting.  
The business session was held in the directors' room of the Miles bank, after which a committee of ladies served a banquet to the bankers. The banquet was held in the bank building also.  
All the directors of the Miles bank were present at the meeting, and some of them took part in the general discussion. In addition to a fixed program, there was a general discussion, or round-table talk on matters of vital interest to both the bankers and the public from a standpoint of co-operative methods.  
E. D. Walker, of Ballinger; Bert Low, of Winters; Carl Word, of Rowena; and R. G. Erwin, of Ballinger, were among those assigned special subjects which opened the way for general discussion. Mr. Walker spoke on the subject, "Object of Bankers' Co-operative Organizations." Mr. Walker pointed out the fact that not only must the bankers cooperate with each other to be of the greatest service to the public, but that the bankers and farmers must co-operate to succeed. Mr. Walker submitted a plan of obtaining valuable information from the farmers by mailing out questionnaires, and some of the banks will join in this movement.

Bert Low, of Winters, talked on the dairying industry. He told of what had been gained by stocking the farms with dairy cattle, and said that there was still a great demand for good dairy stock. The bankers expressed a willingness to assist the farmers in acquiring dairy cattle.  
Carl Word, of the Rowena bank, spoke on "Bank Service," and R. G. Erwin's subject was "Rib Ticklers." Mr. Erwin related many little human interest stories, the amusing side of the banking business—things which come up every day to give the boys something to laugh about.  
Among those taking part in the program, but who were not assigned any particular subject, were: Mr. Deffelbaugh, of the First National Bank of Winters; John Semieck, director of the Miles bank. Mr. Semieck pointed to the fact that the farmers were better business men today than they were in years in the past, and that a wide gap between the bankers and the farmers had been bridged and that there was a better understanding between them. Mr. Deffelbaugh discussed the service side of the banker's work.

Others took part in the general discussions, and the meeting was declared to be a successful and very enthusiastic one.  
The five-year balanced farm program came up for discussion and the bankers have agreed to mail out with the monthly statements copies of the program which the farmers have adopted and which has been printed for their convenience.  
The next meeting will be held at Winters on April 20th, which is one week ahead of the regular date. The date for the meeting was moved up one week in order not to conflict with a revival at Winters in which Dr. George W. Truett, of Dallas, will be the evangelist.  
Among those attending the Miles meeting from Ballinger were: R. G. Erwin, W. R. Bogle, E. D. Walker, Ross Murehison, J. L. Chastain, Fred Kiechle, C. W. Lehnberg and J. D. Motley.

TAYLOR, Tex., March 24.—Charles Otto, age thirty-eight, and Julius Otto, age thirty-four, brothers, were found dead in their home near here today.  
Officers are making an investigation, and the coroner has not returned a verdict.

### OMAHA SNIPER SENT TO CHAIR

WASHINGTON, Neb., March 24.—Frank Carter, the Omaha "sniper," was today sentenced to be electrocuted at the Nebraska state penitentiary on June 9th for the murder of A. D. Searles, Omaha specialist.  
It is alleged that Carter killed a number of other people, shooting them with a .22 calibre pistol before he was finally apprehended. He was caught following a reign of terror in Omaha in which several people were mysteriously murdered.

### EAST TEXAS IN C. OF C. MEETING

## MAN AGAIN HELD ON DRY VIOLATION

Charlie Winnans, a young man, was arrested Tuesday and placed in jail on a charge of transporting intoxicating liquor. Bond in the sum of \$1,000 was fixed for the young man, and it is understood that he experienced no trouble in making bond.  
Winnans was recently indicted by the grand jury on a liquor charge and he was out on \$750 bond when arrested the second time. The complaint filed against him in Judge C. H. Wingham's justice court Tuesday was alleged to have taken place earlier in the day.  
It is alleged that Winnans was caught burying a half gallon of whiskey in the sand at the corner of the cemetery on the Ballinger-San Angelo road, presumably the liquor "funeral" being a plan adopted for making a delivery. Persons who witnessed the burial from a short distance reported the matter to the officers. The whiskey was resurrected and Winnans placed under arrest a short time afterwards.

## MARSHALL GETS 10 TO 20 YEARS

PHILADELPHIA, March 24.—David Marshall was today convicted of murder in the second degree for killing Anna May Dietrich. The verdict carries with it a penalty of from ten to twenty years in the state penitentiary.  
Miss Dietrich was thirty-five years of age, and was employed as a milliner in Philadelphia. Marshall operated as a chiropractor and he declared that the women killed herself in his office, and he tried to conceal the tragedy by hiding the body.  
Parts of the woman's body were found in the wooded section of Delaware county, fifteen miles from Philadelphia on January 21 of this year. Marshall was known to have been a friend to the woman and he was arrested and charged with the slaying soon after the body had been identified.

## WOMAN DEAD; HUSBAND HELD

## SOUTH BALLINGER HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB

The Home Demonstration Club met March 16th with Mrs. T. P. Brown. An interesting cheese demonstration was given. The simple process followed was: 2 1/2 gallons of whole sweet milk, heated to 86 degrees. Remove from fire and add one-quarter tablet cheese coloring and then add one-quarter tablet Rennet tablet to cause coagulation. Let set eight or ten minutes, or until a firm curd forms. Cut into one-quarter inch squares. Heat again to 100 degrees. Remove from fire and strain. Put

into press under 40 pounds weight. The cheese must ripen ten days before ready for use.

After the cheese demonstration the house was called to order by the president and a business session held. Year books with the program for the year's work were distributed. Three new members were added to the club. They were Mrs. Jeanes, Mrs. Tyree and Mrs. Douglass.

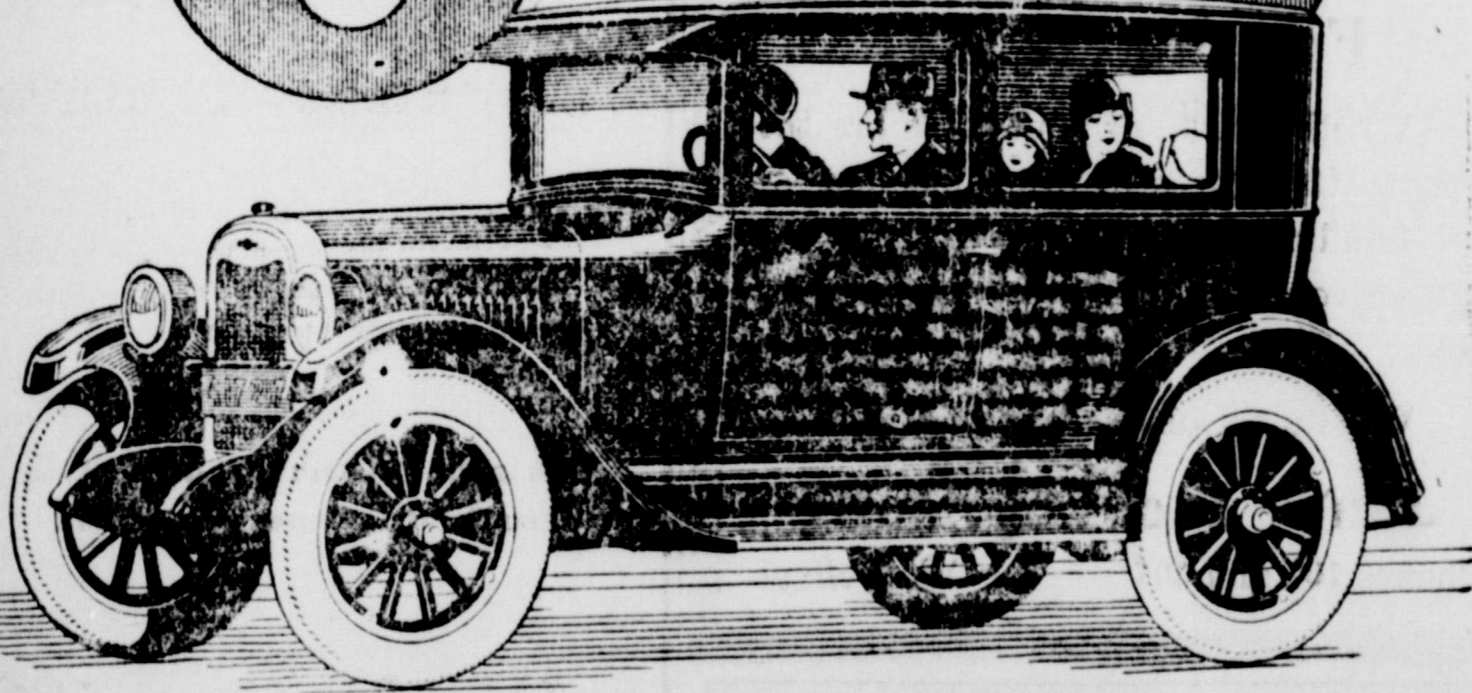
