## MAY DAY 1926 REPORTED QUIET

(By Associated Press)  
 WASHINGTON, May 1.—May Day found employment stable, wages high and industrial peace general throughout the United States with radicalism showing little strength and trade unions quietly expanding their efforts to improve the economic and cultural conditions of their members.  
 Protests, which are a traditional mark of May Day in Europe, faded in the United States before the bright prospects observed by government employment service and the Department of Justice found no reason to take special precautions against unlawful demonstrations.

## FORMER PIONEER BALLINGER CITIZEN DIES

News was received from San Antonio Friday of the death of J. H. Miller, one of the early settlers in Ballinger and a former business man of this city. Mrs. Sam Baker, of this city, is a daughter of Mr. Miller and she and Mr. Baker left several days ago for San Antonio in response to a message that Mr. Miller was seriously ill. A letter from Mr. Baker to E. D. Walker Friday stated that Mr. Miller died at San Antonio on April 28.

Mr. Miller settled in Ballinger in the early days of the city, and for many years was engaged in the general merchandise business in the building now occupied by Afflerbach's variety store. He owned that building and other business property in Ballinger for several years after leaving Ballinger. The family lived for many years in the home now occupied by Mrs. W. L. McAuley on Tenth Street.

Mrs. Miller died some time ago, and Mr. Miller lived to be quite an old man. He is survived by four daughters and two sons, Mrs. Sam Baker, of this city; and Mrs. J. A. Guy, of Talpa, two of the daughters being well known here. Horace and Hayward Miller are the two sons, and the two younger daughters were not married when the family moved from Ballinger.

## CONVICT WOUNDS TWO DEPUTIES

 WINFIELD, La., May 1.—R. E. Boyette, deputy sheriff, was fatally wounded and a man believed to have been Ray Rayburn, a paroled convict from the United States penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, was instantly killed in a pistol duel here this afternoon. Deputy Sheriff Bryant Sholars was also seriously wounded.

The shooting occurred at a house where a man identified as Rayburn by his parole in his room, was living. The deputies had sought to question him about a furniture robbery.

Rayburn's sixteen-year-old wife is being held in jail. She declared that she and Rayburn were married at Wharton, Texas, about three years ago.

## GREAT BRITAIN FACES GENERAL LABOR STRIKE

(By Associated Press)  
 LONDON, May 1.—Great Britain faces a general labor strike as a result of the coal miners' strike against a reduction in wages and increase in hours. Representatives of 203 trades unions, comprising 5,000,000 workers, with enormous financial resources, met today and decided to back up the miners in their grievances by ceasing work in all the vital services next Tuesday. Unless settlement of the miners' dispute is reached before next Tuesday millions of workers in many lines of industry will walk out.

The British government is greatly aroused by the strike of the miners, who laid down their tools at midnight last night when the governmental subsidy expired, and issued a proclamation that a state of emergency exists.

The proclamation issued by the government under the law gives the government almost unlimited powers to be exercised for the protection of the general public from suffering through the curtailment of vital necessities.

Some hope remains that negotiations between the mine owners and miners may be reopened, but that hope is very faint.

## JARDINE FAVORS TWO FARM BILLS

 POMONA, Fla., May 1.—The Tincher credits bill and the pending co-operative marketing bill were endorsed by Secretary William Jardine in an address today before the annual conference of the Farmers Union.  
 The secretary of agriculture also favored recognition through higher prices for quality production of cotton.

## 600 BOND ISSUES ARE AFFECTED

(By Associated Press)  
 AUSTIN, May 1.—A joint committee seeking the validation of Texas road district bonds which were affected by the Archer county bond decision, went into a special session here today. J. A. Kemp, of Wichita Falls, chairman of the citizens committee, said he had discussed the extraordinary session of the legislature with many members of the Senate and House, and all thus far are willing to meet in a special session, validate the bonds and return home.

About 600 road district bond issues are to be validated if the special session is called, Kemp said, representing approximately \$80,000,000.

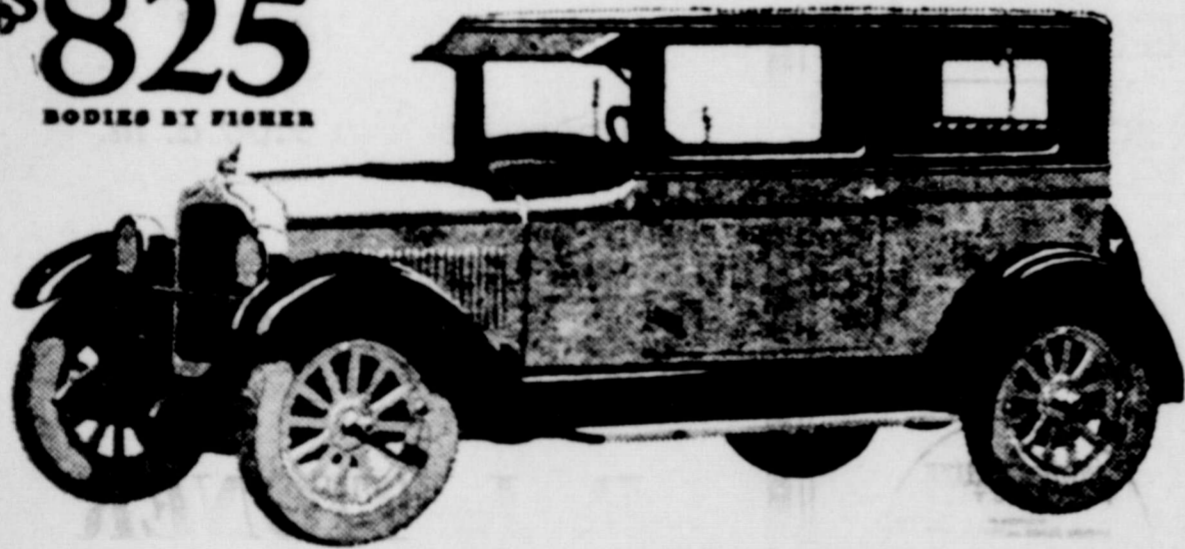

### ACCEPTS WORK IN CHILDREN'S WELFARE HOME

Miss Josephine Burris, of this city, has accepted a place as field worker with the West Texas Children's Aid and Welfare Association, and will begin her duties Monday. Rev. W. A. Nicholas, superintendent of the association, was here Saturday and made arrangements with Miss Burris to take this work. Miss Burris and sister, Miss Bonnie Burris, have been teaching school at Post. They closed their school recently and returned home.

It will be the duty of Miss Burris to travel over quite a

large territory of West Texas, visiting children who have already been placed in homes, seeing that they are properly cared for, pick up other children who need homes and find homes for those who need them, and also solicit funds to help support the activity. She will make headquarters in Ballinger.

The headquarters of the children's welfare association is in Abilene, and is one of the best known institutions of the kind in the state. It does not maintain an orphan home, but acts as a clearing house for dependent children, gathering up the children and placing them in good homes. Children turned over to the association are cared for by the Red Cross until they can be placed in homes. The association pays a dollar a day board for them until they can be adopted.

Rev. Nicholas reported that seventy-five children were placed in homes last year, forty-one of which were babies, twenty-two girls and nineteen boys, between the ages of one day and twelve months. Twenty-one children have already been placed in homes this year. Ballinger furnished seven children several years ago, but so far no children have been placed here. Rev. Nicholas stated that at present the association had four children on hand, a baby boy four months old; two boys 8 and 11 years of age; and one girl 12 years of age.

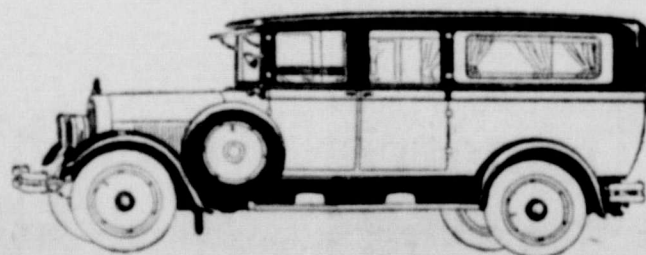
