



A federal highway coming thru Ballinger from Sweetwater to it is only a designation-but if an actual road is built and paved from Regina, Canada to San Antonio it will be one of the biggest things that ever happened to this eity. We have many designated highways in West Texas now that you can't get over with a wagon and mules, let alone an automobile. It is time to quit asking for these designations and really build on what we already have. Of course it will be nice when we are ready to build to get federal and state aid but the county has to make the first effort.

Ballinger's need for a municipal auditorium is just about as great as it could be in any city. There is not a picture show with a sufficient stage and the high school auditorium charging \$25 a night makes that place out of the question for the majority of enter-






