LEGION PLANS TO BUILD MODERN AUDITORIUM

One of the most enthusiastic meetings ever held in Ballinger by the American Legion was reported from Monday night when more than 100 Legionnaires and Auxiliary members met in their regular monthly meeting in the Legion hall. At the close of the session the ladies served delicious ice cream and home-made cake to all present and a delightful social hour was spent.

The big question before the meeting Monday night was the plan submitted by a special committee regarding the equipping of a modern auditorium. For some time this matter has been under consideration by the post and a committee was named by Commander E. W. McLaurin several weeks ago to get the figures and formulate a plan whereby the auditorium could be made a reality.

The committee report was as follows: That the stage part of the present auditorium be completely wrecked, floor extended five feet wider, modern lighting equipment installed including mirrored troughs overhead, three sets of scenery installed, front curtain, mirrored footlights, and the stage equipped to care for any attraction coming this way. The auditorium would be wired with new modern lighting fittings, including exit lights; an inclined floor installed, seated with standard 18-inch opera chairs, the front entrance remodeled and when completed is to be one of the finest small auditoriums in West Texas with a seating capacity of 426 and room provided for overflow crowds.

The plan of raising funds for this cause will be in the form of offering for sale 300 ten dollar bonds. These bonds will bear no interest and practically will be only a receipt for \$10. The sale of the bonds will net \$3,000, and the committee's estimate of the total cost with new chairs was \$3,380. In case that a deficit exists when the auditorium is completed the post plans to get in the clear with the annual Legion show which has always netted more than the expected deficit.

Speakers for the new proposition pointed out that Ballinger was at present without an auditorium and that sooner or later it would be necessary to erect a municipal building to serve this purpose at a cost of from \$30,000 to \$40,000. The present scheme it was said, would give Ballinger a place for all meetings and at a cost that would be nil compared to a new structure.

The Legionnaires discussed the policy of the post for the auditorium in case it is built, and came to the decision that all gatherings where no admission was charged could have free use of the hall with lights and janitor service furnished. Where a local organization presented a paid attraction a fee which would will

(By Associated Press) BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 18.—Robert Scott, 86 years of age, Confederate veteran from Nacogdoches, Texas, died last night in the Birmingham Baptist Hospital.

Scott, a native of Alabama, was stricken as the special train from Texas approached Montgomery, early Monday morning.

He is survived by three daughters, six sons, and thirty grandchildren.

The body will be sent to Nacogdoches today for burial.

BIRMINGHAM, May 18.—The arrival today of General W. B. Freeman, of Richmond, Va., commander-in-chief of the United Confederate Veterans, was the signal for a wave of enthusiasm which swept through the crowds gathered here for the thirty-sixth annual reunion of the veterans.

Special trains bringing wearers of the gray uniform were arriving here today from all quarters of the South.

BIG BUILDING BILL PASSES CONGRESS

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 18.—Congress today completed its approval of the \$165,000,000 public buildings bill under which new federal buildings are to be erected in many cities.

The conference report has already been approved by the Senate and was accepted by the House. The bill has been sent to President Coolidge, who is generally expected to sign it.

BISHOP EN ROUTE TO WASHINGTON

(By Associated Press) LAREDO, May 18.—Archbishop George Caruna, papal nuncio, who was expelled from Mexico for alleged illegal entry into that country, arrived here today on his way to Washington.

He said he would prepare a statement for publication, on his experiences in that republic.

The archbishop stated that he had obtained positive proof of the falsity of the charges made against him.

"Ample proof of this has been secured and is now in the possession of the American consul at Nuevo Laredo, who is to report it to our government at Washington," the nuncio said.

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, May 18.—Seventeen passengers of the Clyde Line steamer, Seneca, who were among those taken from the vessel when it went aground near Miami, Florida last Sunday, upon their arrival here this morning signed statements charging that some of the crew were under the influence of liquor.

The statement also charged that members of the crew donned life preservers ahead of the passengers, thereby causing much concern to the women on board.

Although the statements criticized members of the Seneca's crew, Captain B. W. Leek, in command of the steamer, was highly praised.

Chaplain Says Murderers Highest Type of Criminals

(By Associated Press) HUNTSVILLE, Tex., May 18.—Murderers are the highest type of criminals, and the most important thing society can do is to provide means to care for the released prisoners from penitentiaries, A. R. Watson, chaplain at "The Walls" central unit of the Texas penitentiary system here, told the Associated Press.

A little timely help to a man who has been in servitude for his offense against society would put him on a constructive path of life and would reduce the number of "repeaters" this 71-year-old minister who has charge of the educational, recreational and religious activities of the penitentiary, said.

There are three primary classes of prisoners to be dealt with behind these walls, erected in the sixties as a result of an appropriation bill signed by President Abraham Lincoln. And coincident as it may seem, these walls were built in the home town of Texas' greatest hero, General Sam Houston, and where his body lies today on a rain washed sandhill of Southeast Texas.

All condemned men welcome the chaplain and gladly listen to religious instruction, Chaplain Watson said.

Explaining his statement further that murderers are the highest type of criminals, Chaplain Watson said that they, except the professional gunmen, act through emotion and anger and act to uphold their honor and defend their homes and loved ones. "Repeaters" are few from that class, he said. However, he excepted those criminals who shoot in pursuance to their other crimes.

Of the three classes of prisoners, Chaplain Watson's first includes those men who are practically driven into crime and who are heartily penitent, and anxious to get back into the work of rebuilding themselves. He said they go forth and if given the slightest chance, live irreproachable lives.

His middle class of prisoners comprise those who are not especially bad, who have good impulses and like to do right, but who are so weak in character and will power, that when they get out of prison, they will fall into criminal life again unless their environment is favorable.

The third class of criminals is composed of men, Chaplain Watson said, who are as corrupt as men can get, vicious in character, vile in thought, ugly in conduct and who have no thought of being any different from what they are.

Chaplain Watson is unusually well equipped for his work in the penitentiary. Born in Hot Springs, Ark., in 1855, he attended rural schools in Arkansas, and came to Mills county, Texas, in 1873, where he farmed and ranched until he, with his wife, moved to Brownwood where he studied for the ministry in the old Coggin Academy, now known as Daniel Baker College. West from Ballinger to San Angelo and then further West, on to Sonora, Del Rio, or to Sterling City, Big Spring, Fort Stockton

and El Paso, or Christoval, El Dorado and other points the good roads are shared with San Angelo and Ballinger.

To Abilene, Anson, Stamford and on North, the roads are in very good condition.

South to San Antonio, the route is over some of the best and most travelled roads in the state. To the Alamo City via Paint Rock, Brady, Mason, and Fredericksburg, the roads are as smooth as desired and much travel is seen on this highway daily.

After leaving San Antonio the route to Corpus Christi and other towns in Southwest Texas is one to be proud of in any state in the union.

Tourist travel is being made much more convenient and comfortable by the construction of paved and macadamized highways, by tourist camps en route, and by use of detailed highway maps showing distances between larger cities and accommodations to be found. Conditions of the roads are also broadcast every day from various radio stations in Texas and the Southwest and the modern tourist with a receiving set in his car can learn the latest news of the road in front of him.

Dained minister in the Baptist Church, he preached in the rural communities in Brown county and helped to build and open Howard Payne College at Brownwood in 1890. He was there three terms. He taught and preached in that part of Texas for many years, served two terms in the state legislature and in 1925 was elected chaplain by the Texas Prison Commission. He understands men from all walks of life.

As chaplain he directs the educational activities and holds school six nights a week in the cell building. Beaches and tables are set out as in a regular school house, and the men who belong to the different classes are let out of their cells. About one-third of the prison population in the "Walls" attend the school, which has classes from the first grade to the Senior high school studies. A part of the school is the prison orchestra of about 20 pieces.

In the recreational department, a motion picture is shown in the auditorium every Sunday morning. A baseball park is being put in and occasionally various kinds of athletic events are staged. A large well equipped library is at the disposal of the convicts and many become well read men. The library is in charge of a trusty, the only attorney at law in prison. He was convicted of murder.

Every first and third Sunday mornings, Chaplain Watson holds religious exercises in the chapel at the "Walls." On the second Sundays he preaches to the tubercular convicts at the Wynne farm, and on the fourth Sundays he conducts services at the Gorce farm for women convicts. Prisoners voluntarily attend the services.

He visits the boys in the death cells; is with them when they are executed, and buries them in the lonely prison cemetery when the relatives do not come for the bodies. The electrocutions are always shortly after midnight and the funeral services are held the following noon in the chapel. Many of the prisoners attend the services, but it is not compulsory.

Only one man, of 27, was not reconciled to his fate before going to the electric chair, and he attempted to commit suicide, Chaplain Watson said. Most of the condemned men never flinch as they make the death march.

"Electrocutions are not good for the prison system," Chaplain Watson said. "Prisoners resent them and feel nervous when the death nights come. Eighty per cent of them do not believe in

capital punishment and they oppose the idea of making a slaughter house out of the penitentiary. There is only one argument in having electrocutions in the penitentiary and that is economy."

The convicts are not permitted to witness the executions, but all of them know when the switches are pulled, because every light in the Walls flickers. Condemned men are treated very kindly and are given everything they desire, except freedom. Few of them have visitors when they are in the death cells.

Chaplain Watson said his work is not so productive of results, but that it is a good service and is appreciated by most of the men. He explained that few criminals ever really become Christians, and reiterated that murderers are the highest type of men in prison. They are usually fairly well educated men, actuated by emotion and anger, and seldom is there a repeater, he said.

"There is still some hope for the second term," Chaplain Watson said, "but when he comes back the third time, all chances are against him. Most of our convicts are liquor law violators, with those convicted of burglary, forgery, robbery with firearms, murder, criminal assault, ranking in number as named. All crimes are represented here by these men. Some of the men are bad and know it and revel in their wickedness. They never have any intentions of changing when they get out of prison, but we have a large number of men who do not expect to have anything more to happen in their lives like that."

Asked to explain that "mysterious look" in the prisoner's

eye, Chaplain Watson said, "I have wondered if other people have noticed it, and I have spent many days studying and analyzing it. My conclusions are that the 'mysterious look' in the prisoner's eye is a combination of an element of self-consciousness of guilt, self condemnation, and an attempt to deceive the visitor into belief of his innocence, a dare devil spirit assumed and a bluff of defiance."

"I have concluded that one of the best things that society of the state can do is to provide some systematic, efficient way of taking care of released prisoners until they can get a good start in life on the outside," he said. "After-care of released prisoners is our most important problem. We ought to have a sympathetic organization to help them and I don't know a better field of service than this of helping a man from the prison gates to fit himself properly in society."

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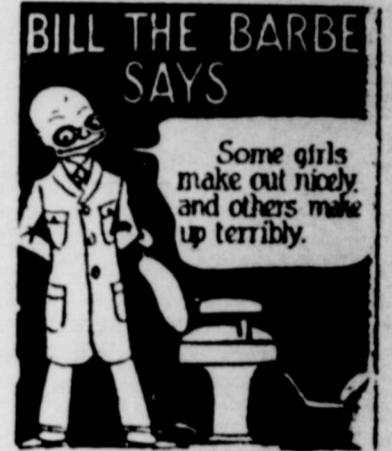

Founder of New Orleans Finally to be Honored

(By Associated Press) NEW ORLEANS, May 17.—After 200 years New Orleans is proposing to honor Bienville, its founder, by naming a park for him.

For two centuries Bienville has had to worry along with only a street named in his honor, and that street not one of the leading thoroughfares. The Louisiana Historical Society is gaining support in its campaign to have City Park rechristened Bienville Park.

Bienville and his party of explorers founded New Orleans in 1718, Bienville holding out for locating the city on its present site.

WORMS WORKING ON YOUNG CROP

According to reports coming in to the office of C. W. Lehmburg, county agricultural agent, cut worms and web worms are damaging the cotton in several sections.

Mr. Lehmburg has co-operated with the farmers in protecting their crops and on the strength of these reports he has prepared several formulas which might be used in destroying the worms.

Following is a statement and the formulas by Mr. Lehmburg: "Reports coming in from different sections of the county indicate that there may be another horde of web worms preying on our cotton crop this year. It was also stated by several farmers that the cut worms are doing considerable damage to the young cotton."

"Believing that, in this case, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, I am herewith giving several formulas that, if properly used, will greatly aid in saving the cotton crop."

"The following three arsenicals are used extensively as dust sprays: calcium arsenate, lead arsenate, and Paris Green."

"No. 1. We suggest that calcium arsenate be applied as a dust, preferably while the dew is on the plants, using about five pounds per acre."

"No. 2. If calcium arsenate is not available use lead arsenate, in the powdered form, at the rate of about three to four pounds to the acre without a dilutant."

"No. 3. Paris Green can be used but is more expensive. It should be used with air slacked lime, using an equal quantity of lime, or more, according as the method of dusting makes a heavy application."

"Methods of applying the dust spray—"

"If dusting machines are not available the bag and pole system may be used, which is as follows:—"

"Take a pole sufficiently long to reach across two or four rows, tie a bag, filled with poison over each row and about 18 inches above the plants. Saddle a horse and place the pole in the saddle in front of the rider and trot the horse up and down the cotton rows. The shaking effected by the trotting of the horse will dust

out the poison and makes an easy and cheap method of applying the dust. Cultivators or wagons with wire or rope wrapped about the wheels at certain points are used by some farmers in place of the horse."

"Liquid Spray—If spray machinery is available, the poison can be mixed with water. In making up a spray, one pound of Paris Green, or one and one half pounds of either calcium arsenate or lead arsenate, in fifty gallons of water should be used. If Paris Green is used, it will be best to slack one pound of quick lime, and add this to the water, after

straining, so as to finally make the fifty gallons of spray. In applying this spray use a nozzle that produces a fog or fine vapor."

"For the control of the cut worms use the poison bran mash, made up as follows: Coarse wheat bran, 25 pounds; white arsenic or Paris Green, 1 pound; cane or sorghum molasses (avoid corn syrup), 2 quarts; lemons, six fruits; water enough to make a wet mash that can be readily sown."

"Mix the poison thoroughly with the bran. Squeeze the lemons and grind the rinds in a fine meat chopper, and add both to two gallons of water, add both to this also the molasses. Now mix the liquid thoroughly with the bran-poison mixture so every particle is wet. The mash should be thoroughly moist, yet so that when sown it falls readily apart."

"How Do I Know What to Believe?"

"How do I know what to believe?"—with this striking question, Father Cartwright began his lecture at St. Mary's Catholic church last evening.

On this, the speaker said, the churches of the world are divided into two great groups. The first says that the Bible is the teacher of mankind. The second says that the Bible and tradition are the means to this end, but as interpreted by an infallible teaching church, not by the individual.

If the Bible and it alone were the means left us by Christ, Rev.

Cartwright went on, it must fulfill these conditions: It must be available to all, for Christ died for all. Second, it must contain the fullness of revelation. Third, it must be so clear in its meaning as to admit of but one interpretation. Fourth, it itself must assure us that it is the inspired word of God. And finally, it of itself must assure us that we have today a substantially true copy of the original revelation. Point by point the missionary discussed these requisites.

The lecture of tonight, "How Are We to Know What to Believe? Is It from the Church?" is a complement of the above lecture and should prove an interesting one. The "question box"

was well patronized last night. The missionary says, "Use the question box and keep me busy."

LEGION PLANS TO BUILD MODERN AUDITORIUM

One of the most enthusiastic meetings ever held in Ballinger by the American Legion was reported from Monday night when more than 100 Legionnaires and Auxiliary members met in their regular monthly meeting in the Legion hall. At the close of the session the ladies served delicious ice cream and home-made cake to all present and a delightful social hour was spent.

The big question before the meeting Monday night was the plan submitted by a special committee regarding the equipping of a modern auditorium. For some time this matter has been under consideration by the post and a committee was named by Commander E. W. McLaurin several weeks ago to get the figures and formulate a plan whereby the auditorium could be made a reality.

The committee report was as follows: That the stage part of the present auditorium be completely wrecked, floor extended five feet wider, modern lighting equipment installed including mirrored troughs overhead, three sets of scenery installed, front curtain, mirrored footlights, and the stage equipped to care for any attraction coming this way. The auditorium would be wired with new modern lighting fittings, including exit lights; an inclined floor installed, seated with standard 18-inch opera chairs, the front entrance remodeled and when completed is to be one of the finest small auditoriums in West Texas with a seating capacity of 426 and room provided for overflow crowds.

The plan of raising funds for this cause will be in the form of offering for sale 300 ten dollar bonds. These bonds will bear no interest and practically will be only a receipt for \$10. The sale of the bonds will net \$3,000, and the committee's estimate of the total cost with new chairs was \$3,380. In case that a deficit exists when the auditorium is completed the post plans to get in the clear with the annual Legion show which has always netted more than the expected deficit.

Speakers for the new proposition pointed out that Ballinger was at present without an auditorium and that sooner or later it would be necessary to erect a municipal building to serve this purpose at a cost of from \$30,000 to \$40,000. The present scheme it was said, would give Ballinger a place for all meetings and at a cost that would be nil compared to a new structure.

The Legionnaires discussed the policy of the post for the auditorium in case it is built, and came to the decision that all gatherings where no admission was charged could have free use of the hall with lights and janitor service furnished. Where a local organization presented a paid attraction a fee which would will

Chaplain Says Murderers Highest Type of Criminals

(By Associated Press)
HUNTSVILLE, Tex., May 18.—Murderers are the highest type of criminals, and the most important thing society can do is to provide means to care for the released prisoners from penitentiaries, A. R. Watson, chaplain at "The Walls" central unit of the Texas penitentiary system here, told the Associated Press.

A little timely help to a man who has been in servitude for his offense against society would put him on a constructive path of life and would reduce the number of "repeaters" this 71-year-old minister who has charge of the educational, recreational and religious activities of the penitentiary, said.

There are three primary classes of prisoners to be dealt with behind these walls, erected in the sixties as a result of an appropriation bill signed by President Abraham Lincoln. And coincident as it may seem, these walls were built in the home town of Texas' greatest hero, General Sam Houston, and where his body lies today on a rain washed sandhill of Southeast Texas.

All condemned men welcome the chaplain and gladly listen to religious instruction, Chaplain Watson said.

Explaining his statement further that murderers are the highest type of criminals, Chaplain Watson said that they, except the professional gunmen, act through emotion and anger and act to uphold their honor and defend their homes and loved ones. "Repeaters" are few from that class, he said. However, he excepted those criminals who shoot in pursuance to their other crimes.

Roads in Fine Condition For the Summer Tourists

Now that pretty weather—hot weather—is coming on, after several weeks of semi-winter weather, tourists are starting West, South, East and North for their annual vacations.

Tourist travel through Ballinger has been slight during April and the first half of this month but during the last few days many cars of tourists have passed through the city, most of whom are going West.

The roads, according to visitors, are in very good condition. An excellent road is now to be had between Ballinger and Fort Worth via Coleman, Cisco, Ranger, Eastland and Mineral Wells, an thru Dallas and Shreveport, Louisiana, giving the Louisianians an outlet to the western portion of Texas over one of the best roads in the Southwest.

West from Ballinger to San Angelo and then further West, on to Sonora, Del Rio, or to Sterling City, Big Spring, Fort Stockton

and El Paso, or Christoval, El dorado and other points the good roads are shared with San Angelo and Ballinger.

To Abilene, Anson, Stamford and on North, the roads are in very good condition. South to San Antonio, the route is over some of the best and most travelled roads in the state. To the Alamo City via Paint Rock, Brady, Mason, and Fredericksburg, the roads are as smooth as desired and much travel is seen on this highway daily.

After leaving San Antonio the route to Corpus Christi and other towns in Southwest Texas is one to be proud of in any state in the union. Tourist travel is being made much more convenient and comfortable by the construction of paved and macadamized highways, by tourist camps en route, and by use of detailed highway maps showing distances between larger cities and accommodations to be found. Conditions of the roads are also broadcast every day from various radio stations in Texas and the Southwest and the modern tourist with a receiving set in his car can learn the latest news of the road in front of him.

The third class of criminals is composed of men, Chaplain Watson said, who are as corrupt as men can get, vicious in character, vile in thought, ugly in conduct and who have no thought of being any different from what they are.

Chaplain Watson is unusually well equipped for his work in the penitentiary. Born in Hot Springs, Ark., in 1855, he attended rural schools in Arkansas, and came to Mills county, Texas, in 1875, where he farmed and ranched until he, with his wife, moved to Brownwood where he studied for the ministry in the old Coggin Academy, now known as Daniel Baker College. Chaplain Says Murderers Highest Type of Criminals

ained minister in the Baptist Church, he preached in the rural communities in Brown county and helped to build and open Howard Payne College at Brownwood in 1890. He was there three terms. He taught and preached in that part of Texas for many years, served two terms in the state legislature and in 1925 was elected chaplain by the Texas Prison Commission. He understands men from all walks of life.

As chaplain he directs the educational activities and holds school six nights a week in the cell building. Benches and tables are set out as in a regular school house, and the men who belong to the different classes are let out of their cells. About one-third of the prison population in the "Walls" attend the school, which has classes from the first grade to the Senior high school studies. A part of the school is the prison orchestra of about 20 pieces.

In the recreational department, a motion picture is shown in the auditorium every Sunday morning. A baseball park is being put in and occasionally various kinds of athletic events are staged. A large well equipped library is at the disposal of the convicts and many become well read men. The library is in charge of a trusty, the only attorney at law in prison. He was convicted of murder.

Every first and third Sunday mornings, Chaplain Watson holds religious exercises in the chapel at the "Walls." On the second Sundays he preaches to the tubercular convicts at the Wynne farm, and on the fourth Sundays he conducts services at the Goree farm for women convicts. Prisoners voluntarily attend the services.

He visits the boys in the death cells; is with them when they are executed, and buries them in the lonely prison cemetery when the relatives do not come for the bodies. The electrocutions are always shortly after midnight and the funeral services are held the following noon in the chapel. Many of the prisoners attend the services, but it is not compulsory.

Only one man, of 27, was not reconciled to his fate before going to the electric chair, and he attempted to commit suicide, Chaplain Watson said. Most of the condemned men never flinch as they make the death march.

"Electrocutions are not good for the prison system," Chaplain Watson said. "Prisoners resent them and feel nervous when the death nights come. Eighty per cent of them do not believe in

capital punishment and they oppose the idea of making a slaughter house out of the penitentiary. There is only one argument in having electrocutions in the penitentiary and that is economy."

The convicts are not permitted to witness the executions, but all of them know when the switches are pulled, because every light in the Walls flickers. Condemned men are treated very kindly and are given everything they desire, except freedom. Few of them have visitors when they are in the death cells.

Chaplain Watson said his work is not so productive of results, but that it is a good service and is appreciated by most of the men. He explained that few criminals ever really become Christians, and reiterated that murderers are the highest type of men in prison. They are usually fairly well educated men, actuated by emotion and anger, and seldom is there a repeater, he said.

"There is still some hope for the second term," Chaplain Watson said, "but when he comes back the third time, all chances are against him. Most of our convicts are liquor law violators, with those convicted of burglary, forgery, robbery with firearms, murder, criminal assault, ranking in number as named. All crimes are represented here by these men. Some of the men are bad and know it and revel in their wickedness. They never have any intentions of changing when they get out of prison, but we have a large number of men who do not expect to have anything more to happen in their lives like that."

Asked to explain that "mysterious look" in the prisoner's

eye, Chaplain Watson said, "I have wondered if other people have noticed it, and I have spent many days studying and analyzing it. My conclusions are that the 'mysterious look' in the prisoner's eye is a combination of an element of self-consciousness of guilt, self condemnation, and an attempt to deceive the visitor into belief of his innocence, a dare devil spirit assumed and a bluff of defiance."

"I have concluded that one of the best things that society of the state can do is to provide some systematic, efficient way of taking care of released prisoners until they can get a good start in life on the outside," he said. "After-care of released prisoners is our most important problem. We ought to have a sympathetic organization to help them and I don't know a better field of service than this of helping a man from the prison gates to fit himself properly in society."

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

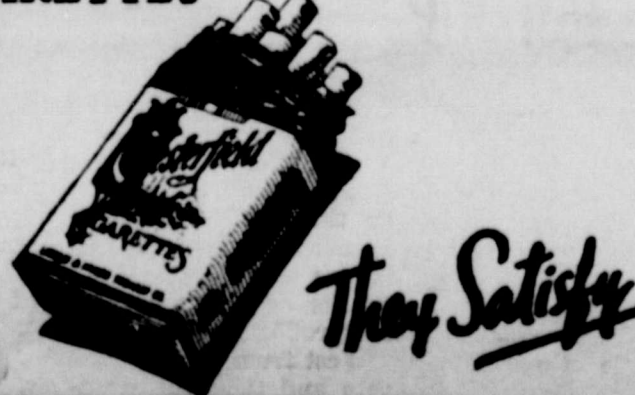

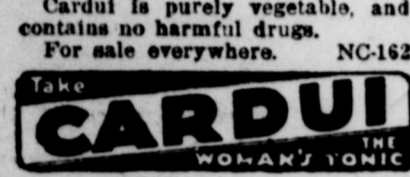

WORMS WORKING ON YOUNG CROP

According to reports coming in to the office of C. W. Lehmburg, county agricultural agent, cut worms and web worms are damaging the cotton in several sections.

Mr. Lehmburg has co-operated with the farmers in protecting their crops and on the strength of these reports he has prepared several formulas which might be used in destroying the worms.

Following is a statement and the formulas by Mr. Lehmburg: "Reports coming in from different sections of the county indicate that there may be another horde of web worms preying on our cotton crop this year. It was also stated by several farmers that the cut worms are doing considerable damage to the young cotton.

"Believing that, in this case, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, I am herewith giving several formulas that, if properly used, will greatly aid in saving the cotton crop.

"The following three arsenicals are used extensively as dust sprays: calcium arsenate, lead arsenate, and Paris Green.

"No. 1. We suggest that calcium arsenate be applied as a dust, preferably while the dew is on the plants, using about five pounds per acre.

"No. 2. If calcium arsenate is not available use lead of arsenate, in the powdered form, at the rate of about three to four pounds to the acre without a dilutant.

"No. 3. Paris Green can be used but is more expensive. It should be used with air slacked lime, using an equal quantity of lime, or more, according as the method of dusting makes a heavy application.

"Methods of applying the dust spray—

"If dusting machines are not available the bag and pole system may be used, which is as follows:

"Take a pole sufficiently long to reach across two or four rows, tie a bag, filled with poison over each row and about 18 inches above the plants. Saddle a horse and place the pole in the saddle in front of the rider and trot the horse up and down the cotton rows. The shaking effected by the trotting of the horse will dis-

out the poison and makes an easy and cheap method of applying the dust. Cultivators or wagons with wire or rope wrapped about the wheels at certain points are used by some farmers in place of horse.

"Liquid Spray — If spray machinery is available, the poison can be mixed with water. In making up a spray, one pound of Paris Green, or one and one half pounds of either calcium arsenate or lead arsenate, in fifty gallons of water should be used. If Paris Green is used, it will be best to slack one pound of quick lime, and add this to the water, after

straining, so as to finally make the fifty gallons of spray. In applying this spray use a nozzle that produces a fog or fine vapor.

"For the control of the cut worms use the poison bran mash, made up as follows: Cease wheat bran, 25 pounds; white arsenic or Paris Green, 1 pound; cane or sorghum molasses (avoid corn syrup), 2 quarts; lemons, six fruits; water enough to make a wet mash that can be readily sown.

"Mix the poison thoroughly with the bran. Squeeze the lemons and grind the rinds in a fine meat chopper, and add both to this also the molasses. Now mix the liquid thoroughly with the bran-poison mixture so every particle is wet. The mash should be thoroughly moist, yet so that when sown it falls readily apart."

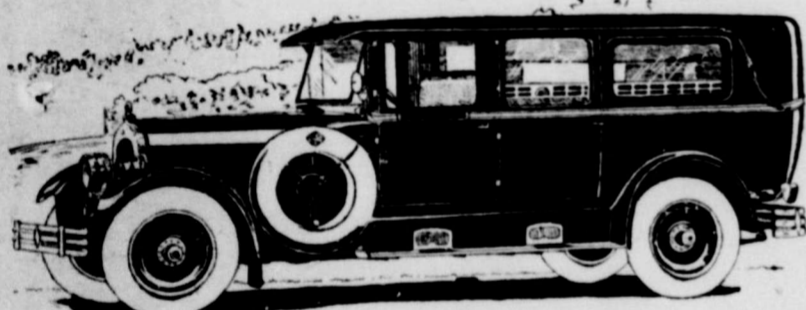

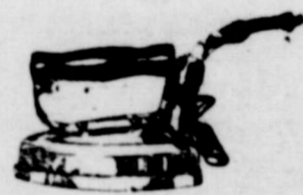

**"How Do I Know
What to Believe?"**


"How do I know what to believe?"—with this striking question, Father Cartwright began his lecture at St. Mary's Catholic church last evening.

On this, the speaker said, the churches of the world are divided into two great groups. The first says that the Bible is the teacher of mankind. The second says that the Bible and tradition are the means to this end, but as interpreted by an infallible teaching church, not by the individual.

If the Bible and it alone were the means left us by Christ, Rev.

Cartwright went on, it must fulfill these conditions: It must be available to all, for Christ died for all. Second, it must contain the fullness of revelation. Third, it must be so clear in its meaning as to admit of but one interpretation. Fourth, it itself must assure us that it is the inspired word of God. And finally, it of itself must assure us that we have today a substantially true copy of the original revelation. Point by point the missionary discussed these requisites.

The lecture of tonight, "How Are We to Know What to Believe? Is It from the Church?" is a complement of the above lecture and should prove an interesting one. The "question box"
