## MORE OIL SHOWS IN CONCHO WELL

After penetrating one foot of the lime at the Kemper Kimberlin-Shultz No. 1 at about 1,200 feet in the Northeast corner of section No. 129, block 72, of the T. & N. O. Railway Co. survey, 10 miles Southeast of Paint Rock, the driller shut down operations until the arrival of Mr. Kimberlin from San Antonio, where he was attending the Oil Scouts Convention.

Oil was showing in the slush pit of this well Tuesday afternoon and the bailer was worked for a short time bringing some little oil out of the hole. It is said that the showing of oil is about .40 gravity.

A 6 5/8ths inch casing is set to 1,140 feet in this well.

The bailer was lost for a short time after the bit went into the lime but was soon found and brought out of the hole. Operations were then suspended.

This well is in the vicinity of several other tests put down on the Shultz Ranch and is 1 3/4 miles Southwest of the Amery & Dutton Shultz No. 1, which was drilled past 1,400 feet.

A good showing of gas was found at 960 feet in this well but with the present showing of oil no gas was found.

W. O. Shultz, of Paint Rock, who owns the land where the well is being drilled passed thru Ballinger this morning about 11:30 o'clock en route to Fort Worth to look after business.

Mr. Shultz said that a good showing of oil was found at 1,200 feet in the well.

It is generally believed that pay, if any, will be struck at about 1,400 feet.

There is a probability of a shallow field in Concho county on the Shultz Ranch, operators believe. Several wells have been drilled in that section during the past few years and a good showing has been found in almost every hole.

## LAWN GRAIN IS HURT BY HAIL

Hail and rain did considerable damage to the grain in the Lawn community of Taylor county, according to a report received at the Ledger office from the telephone operator at Lawn.

The hail, the report stated, practically destroyed all of the grain in that section of the country; telephone wires were put out of order in that section, and hail damage extended as far as Goldsboro in Coleman county.

This is the first hail or damage of any consequence to the grain crop in this section of the country.

A light hail storm was reported at Ovalo, also in Taylor county. Rain, estimated at one inch or more, accompanied the hail in the Lawn section.

Heavy rain was reported from Abilene Tuesday night.

The hail did not last very long but when it fell it whipped the grain in the fields to pieces and practically every field in the Lawn community was ruined.

## I. C. C. INVESTIGATING NATION'S RAIL RATES

(By Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, May 19.—The Interstate Commerce Commission's general inquiry into the nation's freight rate structure as directed by congress, reached another milestone today in the form of oral arguments in that phase of rates in the West.

The arguments probably will continue ten days.

At the invitation of the Commission of National Association of Railway Utilities, the commission appointed a committee of nine state corporation railroad commissioners to co-operate with the federal commission in its general inquiry. This committee includes Clarence E. Gilmore, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission and the entire state commission of Texas, who will sit with the federal body during the livestock arguments.

### WINTERS RODEO BEGINS FRIDAY

"Hackberry Slim" (H. A.) Johnson, one of Texas' best rodeo managers, has started out his series of summer shows the past two weeks, the first in Brownwood, then in San Angelo, and this week is presenting his Western attractions in Winters.

Monday night, Mr. Johnson, assisted by George Newton, trick roper, and a group of Comanche Indians from an Oklahoma reservation, staged a Wild West performance here at the Maeroy Theatre. The crowd attending this offering was large and the applause and encores were plentiful throughout the evening's entertainment.

The Indians, about thirty of them, travelling in cars, came to Texas especially for the Brownwood and San Angelo celebrations. In both places they attracted considerable attention and drew large crowds. At the Maeroy Monday night they gave

their tribal dances, war songs and regular pow-wow.

Mr. Newton is considered one of the best trick ropers in the Southwest and he has attracted favorable attention in parades, on rodeo lots, and before the footlights.

The Indians returned to their teepees in Oklahoma Tuesday morning but will return to Texas before Friday night for the rodeo to be staged in Winters.

Mr. Johnson expects to exhibit in a large number of West Texas cities before the close of summer.

### DALLAS FIRM GETS CONTRACT

F. A. Mote, of Dallas, was awarded the contract for the construction of the Winters high school, it was announced here this morning. The contract totals \$101,620.

The general contract calls for an expenditure of \$88,500. The heating and plumbing contract was awarded to C. E. Wallas, of Stamford, calling for an expenditure of \$10,500. The Moody Electric Company of Abilene, was awarded the contract for the installation of the electrical equipment for the sum of \$2,620.

The Winters school will be one of the most modern in this part of the state. David S. Castle, of Abilene, is the architect.

The building will be 130 by 58 feet. A wing is to extend back of the main section, 65x49 feet, which will house the main auditorium with a balcony.

The contract calls for completion of the project by January 1, 1927.

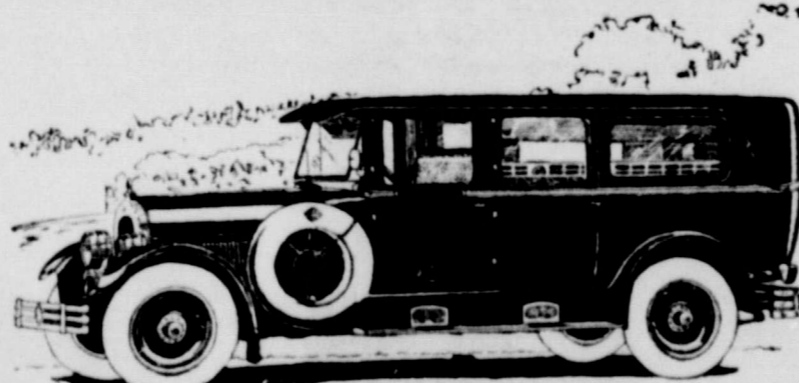

**PAULIST FATHER GIVES LECTURE ON CHURCH**

Tonight the subject of the lecture will be: "The Forgiveness of Sin, or the Catholic Practice of Confession." The missionary urges everybody to attend this lecture and get the real inside history and explanation of everything that takes place in the confession of sin as practiced in the Catholic Church.
