

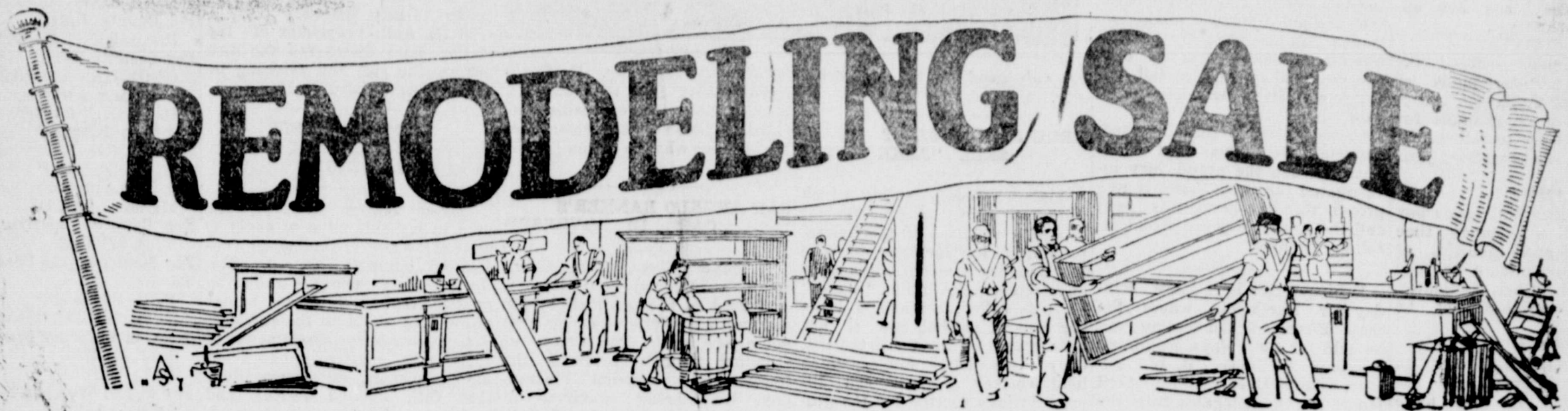

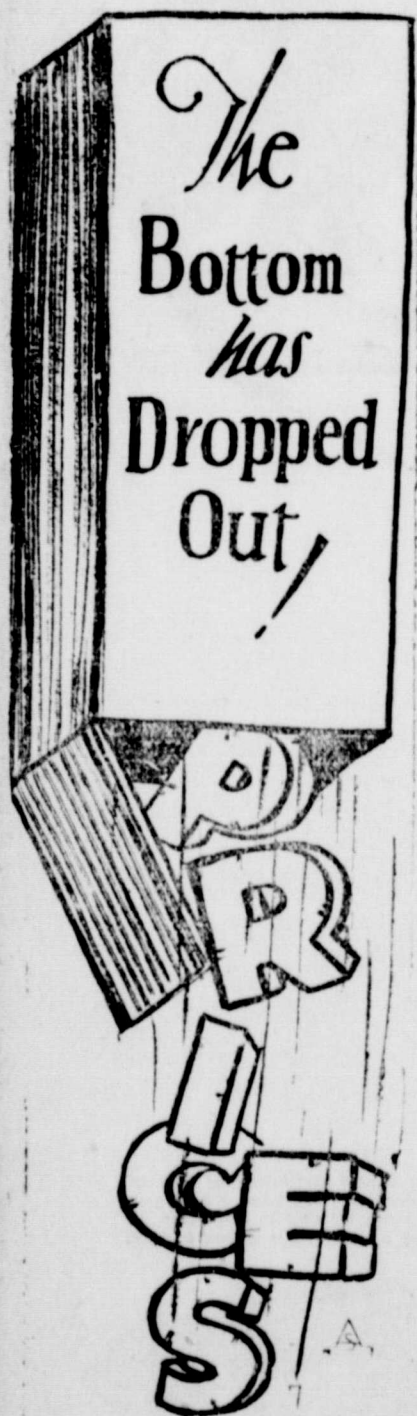

**SENT TO JAIL IN
BATH TUB CASE**

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, June 3.—Earl
Carroll, the Broadway producer,
convicted of perjury in con-
nection with a grand jury investi-
gation of a party given by Carroll
in his theatre at which a nude
chorus girl, Joyce Hawley, served
drinks from a bathtub in which
she was seated, was sentenced to-
day by Judge Goddard before
whom Carroll was tried and con-
victed.

Judge Goddard sentenced Car-
roll to one year and one day in
jail in each of the two cases and
assessed a fine of \$100 each in
the two cases. The court ordered
that the jail sentences on the two
counts run concurrently so that
Carroll will have to serve only
one year and one day in jail, but
the fine of \$2,000 will have to be
paid.

Carroll testified that no such
party as alleged was held in his
theatre when the grand jury in-
vestigated the case. Later it was
proven that the party was held
and the grand jury indicted Car-
roll for perjury.

**DRUG STORES CAN'T
SELL "JAKE" NOW**

Under a federal ruling which
went into effect on June 1st, it
is now a violation of the federal
prohibition law for drug stores to
sell Jamaica ginger without a
physician's prescription. "Jake,"
as it is called, contains a large
per cent of alcohol, and it has
been placed on the restricted list.
Only those drug stores which
hold whiskey permits can fill
prescriptions written for the gin-
ger mixture.

DALLAS, June 3.—James Duncan, age 44, former special deputy sheriff of this city, shot and killed Mrs. Octavia Peacock, age 34, and then fatally wounded himself with the pistol with which he shot the woman. The shooting took place at the home of Mrs. Peacock.

Mrs. Peacock was the mother of four children and the children witnessed the tragedy. Her husband was away at work at the time of the shooting, and police are unable to find any explanation for the double tragedy.

PROPOSES BETTER MARRIAGE LAWS

HOUSTON, June 3.—Nearly 300 county and district court clerks are here today for the thirty-fourth annual convention of the Texas County and District Clerks Association. The convention will last through Saturday.

Two legislative bills designed to give Texas better marriage laws were submitted to the clerks convention here today. The bills are said to embody better features of marriage laws which have been enacted by other states, and if adopted would require the publication in advance of the intention to marry and also require health certificates for both parties to the marriage contract.

FARMER HAS HARD LUCK IN MAKING CROP

A farmer living North of Winters under the watersheds of the mountains, played in hard luck recently, according to meagre details brought to Ballinger by parties from that section of the county.

According to the report the farmer living over the mountains in the district where hail recently fell, lost all his crop in the storm. Tuesday of this week he cranked up his flivver and started out in search of seed to replant his cotton. He found the seed and was returning home with the seed in his touring car, when he drove into high water, lost his seed and experienced a

narrow escape with his life when the car was washed downstream.

The rain Tuesday afternoon was a regular cloudburst over a small area on Bluff Creek North of Winters, and the farmer was crossing Bluff Creek when the high water swept him off the bridge and downstream. The auto turned bottom upwards with only about six inches of the casing visible and spinning in the water. The car was rescued Wednesday.

The rise on Bluff Creek brought down about a three or four foot rise in Elm Creek at Ballinger, and caused fishermen to wonder from whence the fresh water was coming.

In reporting the story two or three different names were given The Ledger, and the reporter was unable to verify the name of the unlucky farmer.

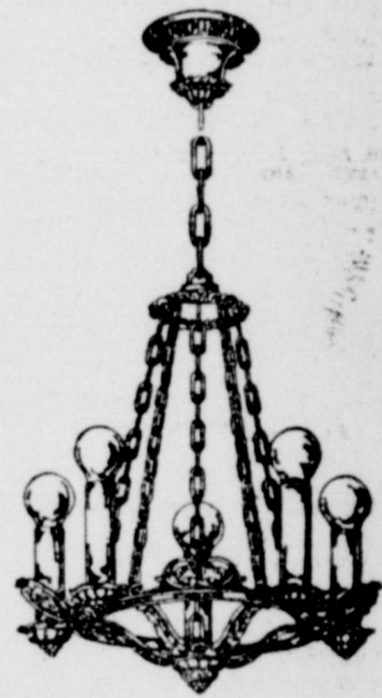
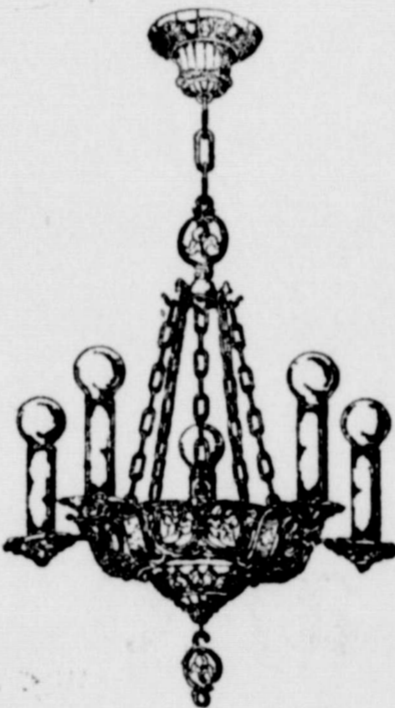

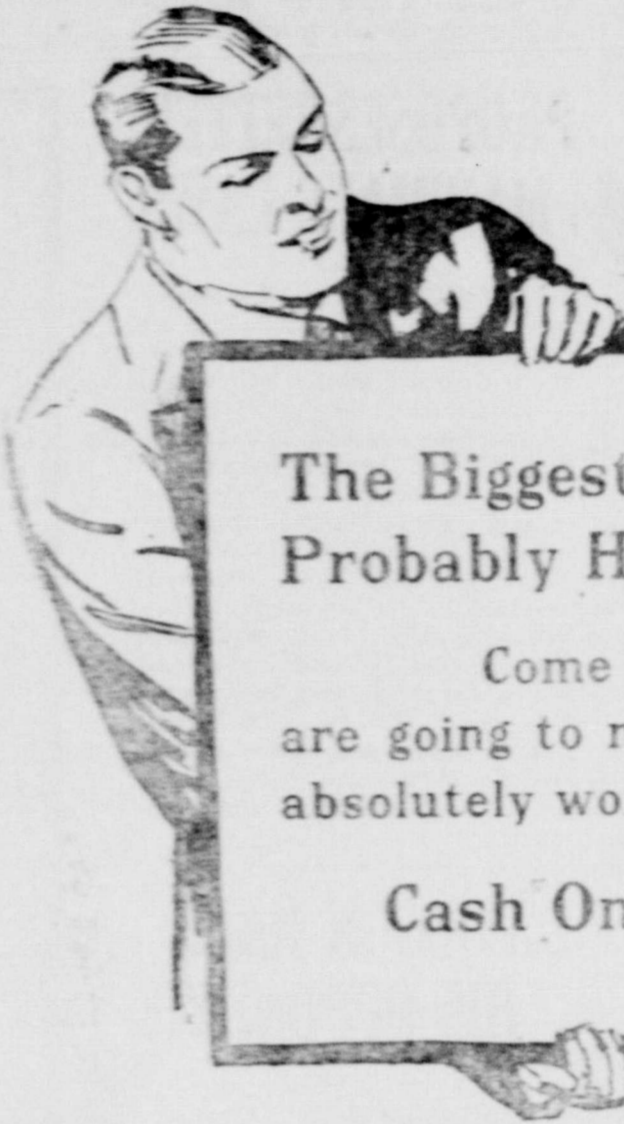

ARIZONA SHEEPMEN TAKE PROFITS IN RAINS

(By Associated Press)
TUESCOTT, Ariz., June 3.—Arizona stockmen, owning more than a million head of sheep, will save on both ends of their annual spring "drive" from the deserts of Southern Arizona to the high mountain plateaus of the North because of the unprecedented spring rains this year.

Leaving the lowlands two weeks beyond the usual date, May 15, the herdsmen will use up the

abundant feed there and will also give the mountain pastures a fortnight's more growing season which forest service officials say will greatly increase the quantity of grass.

Surplus herds on the Northern forest grazing areas during the last few years have resulted in some damage to the grass. Stockmen have been pressed by the forest service to reduce their herds and thus give the range a chance to recuperate. This season presents the opportunity.

Cattle-sheep wars of a past generation have been settled for all time by the creation by law of "drive-ways." These long lanes, running North-and-South, provide four passageways across recognized cattle ranges for the sheep on their twice-a-year journeys from the mountains to the plains and back.

The dates on which the drive-ways are used are regulated to meet the requirements of feed, lambing and shearing. The forest service has in charge the regulation of the movements of sheep, and the driveways are so located as to size and direction as to provide feed for "carrying" the great bands of sheep as they make their month-long trips.

LEPROSY, TREATED EARLY, CURABLE, SAYS PHYSICIAN

(By Associated Press)
MANILA, P. I., June 2.—Leprosy, when treated early is curable in fifty to seventy-five per cent of the cases, declares Maor A. P. Hitchens, health advisor on Governor General Leonard Wood's staff.

The Philippine Health Service is encouraged to believe that within a quarter of a century complete control of the disease in the Islands, is possible. Major Hitchens said the Philippines have now reached the peak of the malady and that unless present machinery for its control and treatment breaks down, the disease will recede rapidly.

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 2.—Numerous genera of leper curing flora exist in Brazil, including one species which is thought to be more efficacious than the famous chaulmoogra tree of Hawaii, announced the National Agricultural Society.

The Brazilian tree which is thought to contain a superior grade of the magic ethyl ester is popularly known in Portuguese as "sapucainha." In various parts

of Brazil the seed is called "leper fruit" and "leper bread," indicating that the natives believe that it cures the disease. The tree grows wild in several states.

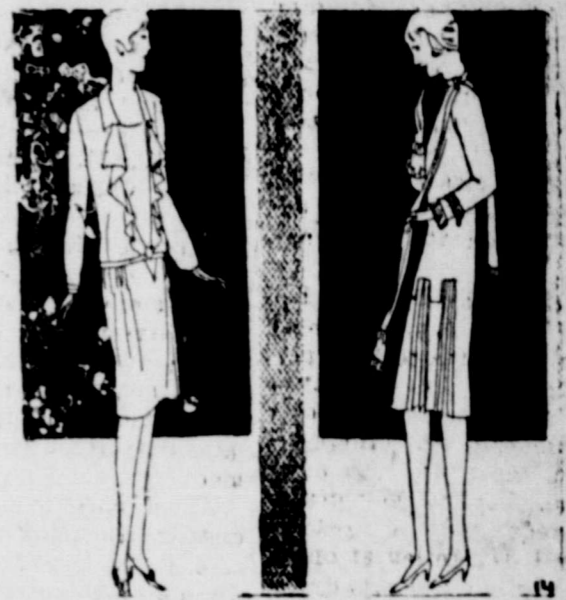

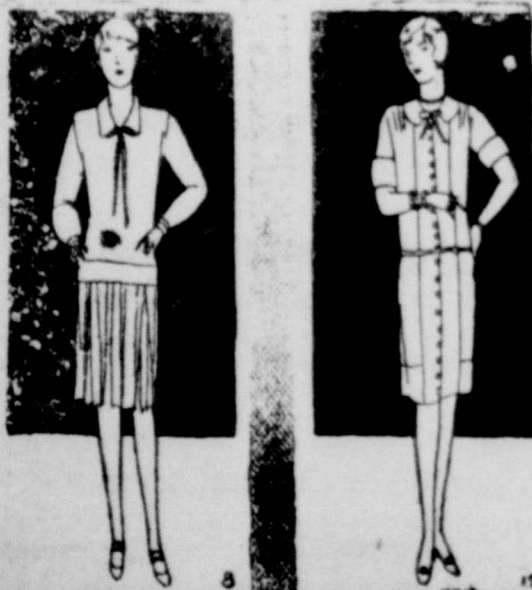

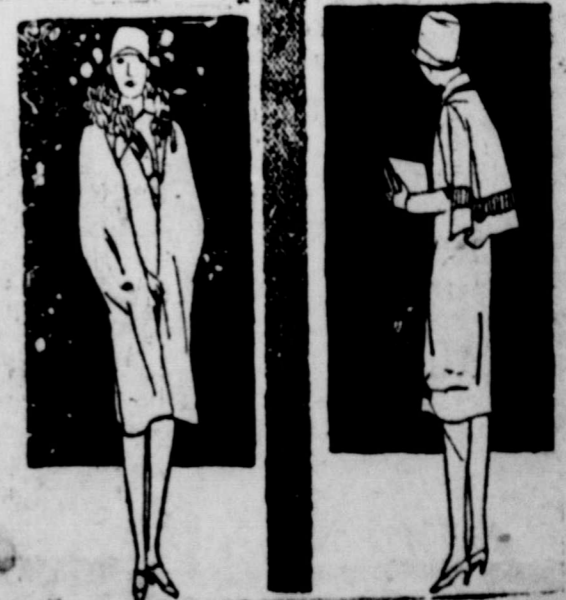

Six Dead in Oklahoma Storm; Damage Great

(By Associated Press)

PAWHUSKA, Okla., June 3.—Six persons are known to be dead today as the result of a storm that swept over Northern Oklahoma last night, according to reports reaching here this afternoon.

Five of the victims were drowned and the other one was struck by lightning.

The dead are Henry Blackert, age 40; his wife, Mrs. Henry Blackert, and two of their daughters; Mary, age three; and Mrs. Ruth Bailey, age 29; and her son, Robert, age seven months; all of Hominy, Oklahoma. Albert Adams, age 25, of Drumright, was the last reported death.

The members of the Blackert family were drowned when an automobile in which they were riding plunged into Rock Creek after the bridge had been washed away. Two members of the family were washed ashore. Adams was an employee of a power company. He was struck by lightning. He leaves a wife and one child.

About fifty houses along the creek near Hominy were flooded to a depth of four feet from a rain which amounted six inches.

KITCHEN CONTEST CLASS B LETTER

The Ledger has been furnished with a paper read by Mrs. C. T. Urbantke, of the Sweet Home Womens Club, before the recent County Council of Women's and Girls' Clubs held in Ballinger. Mrs. Urbantke won first prize in Class B in the kitchen improvement contest. She tells as follows how she improved her kitchen:

"The first thing I did to improve my kitchen was to figure out what it would cost. I first got the linoleum, which was the most expensive. Next I built a cabinet, and then came the sink, which my daughter, Effie, gave me. My dish tray was built on rollers, which is very handy. It is used to carry the dishes to the dining table and to the sink. My kitchen table was raised to the right height; my wood box is built on legs, using two boxes, one over the other. This is placed by the stove.

"The bread and flour boxes were raised from the floor just at the cabinet. The cabinet is a large one, where all my cooking vessels and groceries are kept, and the flour right near makes it handy, and I do not have to go a step while preparing a meal.

"The kitchen table, sink and dish tray are arranged so that dish washing is so handy that I enjoy doing the work, and I have a lot of it to do, as I have a large family.

"Next came the solving of the water problem. The water is

brought in thru a hose thru the wall at the sink. This did not cost me a cent, as we had the hose on hand, and it was not in use for any other purpose.

"For light I use a hanging lamp, which is located in the center of the kitchen. This gives sufficient light to work at any place in the kitchen. The clock is located on the cabinet where it can be seen from any place in the kitchen.

"Grocery bills, cook book, and other articles are kept handy in a cloth pocket on the wall. The broom and mop are kept on a rack behind the door. A rack for dish towels is located behind the stove. A high stool, wood box, dish tray, bread and flour boxes, and shelving were made of scrap lumber. Everything was painted in blue and gray to match the linoleum on the floor, which is all me. My kitchen is bright and light even in winter when the doors are closed.

"Now, my kitchen consists mostly of new things, all but one safe and one table, which were also painted light gray, and I feel proud of my new kitchen. Most of all I am thankful to my agent, Miss Eula Key, for telling me about the contest and helping me to improve the kitchen."

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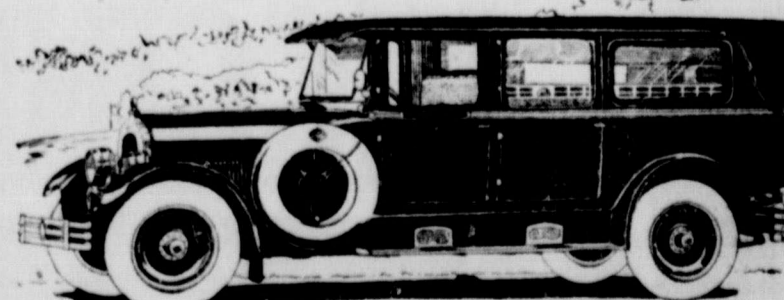

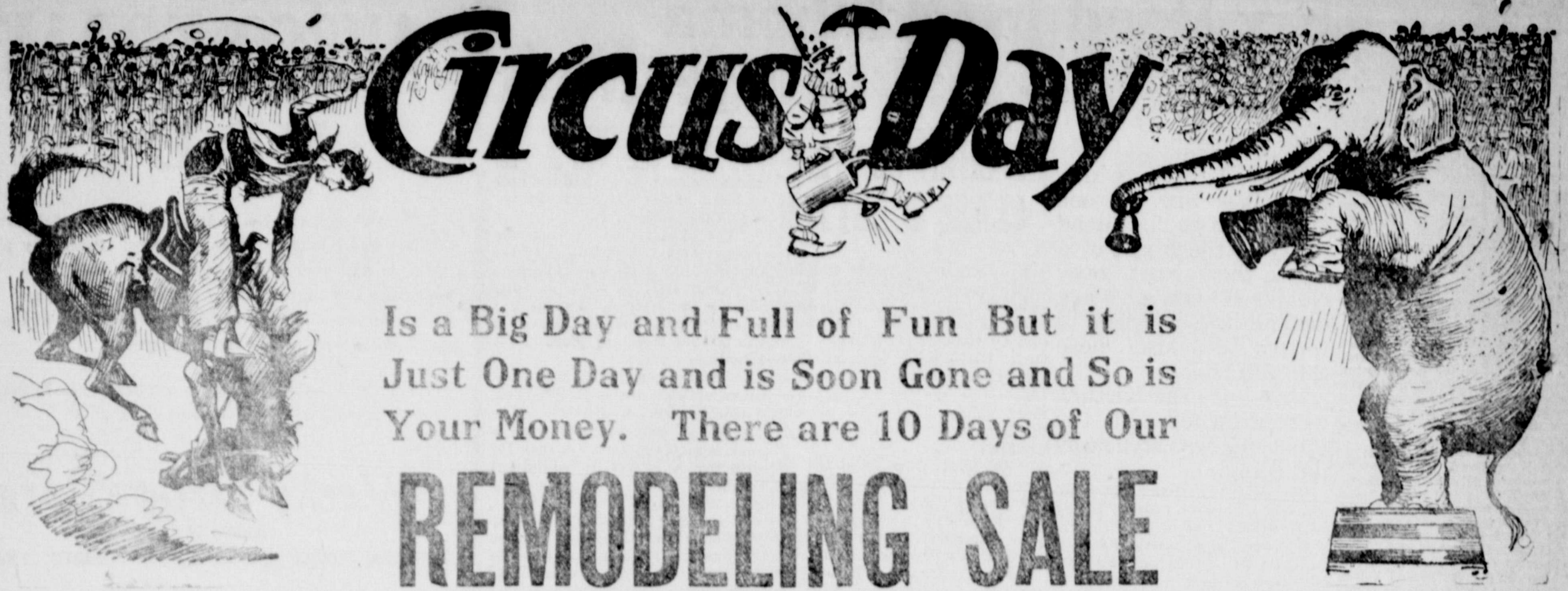
