

"Realizing the seriousness of the situation, the State of Arizona attempted to meet the emergency by various regulatory measures within the state, even going to the point of proclaiming a non-cotton zone in the infested territory.

Lawsuits which followed developed that the state did not have the necessary legislation to give the authority to carry out such a program, so the state is now looking to the federal government for assistance and sup-

port. In concluding, Mr. Marlatt pointed out that recent experiments "show that this pest can pass the winter very successfully n the cultivated cotton plant, and this fact establishes the necessary final evidence to show that it is a serious menace which should be dealt with by the most prompt and effective means av-
