HEAT CONTINUES GRIP THE EAST

(By Associated Press)
UNDATED, July 22.—All the relief the people residing in the heat belt of the East could get today was in reading about the rain and increasing coolness in the West. The weather bureau predicted showers for the hot belt tonight, but as the same prediction was made yesterday and failed to materialize, small comfort was derived from the forecast. However, thunderstorms were reported in a large number of places in Texas.

Throughout almost all of the Eastern states the heat continued to hold forth today and the temperature started on an upward rush which bid fair to pass yesterday's record.

Filipinos Using Wheat as Food in Lieu of Rice

(By Associated Press)
MANILA, P. I., July 21.—Consumption of wheat flour in the Philippines has increased in the last few years. Figures of the bureau of commerce and industry show that although rice is the chief staple the Filipinos are using bread as a supplementary food generally and in some cases as their principal article of diet.

Wheat importations last year were 76,000 tons as compared with 45,000 tons in 1921. Four-fifths came from the United States.

MORE BILLED IN ELECTION FRAUD

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, July 22.—Fifty-four election judges and clerks who served in holding the Cook county primary election last April were indicted by a special grand jury today on charges of conspiracy to make false counts in connection with the irregularities at the polls. The indictments returned today bring the total up to 109 indictments, all against election judges and clerks in this county.

A complete recount of votes cast for the United States senatorial nomination in both the republican and democratic parties was ordered today by Judge Jareck at the request of Senator James A. Reed, of Missouri, chairman of the Senate campaign expenditures committee.

SUES TO RECOVER PART OF ESTATE

ST. LOUIS, July 22.—Mrs. Sophie Mier, age fifty-one, of St. Louis, who claims to be the daughter of the late William Edenborn, capitalist and owner of the Louisiana Railway & Navigation Company, today announced that she will sue to establish her claim to a daughter's share of the \$75,000,000 estate left by Edenborn. The suit will be directed against Mrs. Sarah Edenborn, widow of the multi-millionaire. Mrs. Mier claims to be the daughter of Edenborn by a previous marriage.

UTILITIES LINEMAN INJURES A FOOT

L. A. Walton, a lineman for the West Texas Utilities Co., was brought to the city Thursday afternoon about 1:30 o'clock and treated in a local physician's office for an injured foot which he received when a lineman's "spur" penetrated his left foot about one and one-quarter inches. The injury was very painful but was not serious.

MASONS HERE FOR SESSIONS

Judge James W. McClendon, of Austin, chairman of the Masonic Service and Education committee; Wilbur Keith, Dallas, executive secretary; John W. Howarth, and Judge Hiram F. Lively, both of Dallas; were scheduled to arrive in Ballinger this afternoon after 3:00 o'clock for the purpose of holding two sessions here for the Masons of this district.

A number of Ballinger Masons left about 3:00 o'clock for Rowena, where they were to meet the committee who are being brought to that city by prominent San Angelo Masons.

The committee held a couple of sessions in San Angelo Wednesday evening. The first was an open meeting with motion pictures and a lecture by Wilbur Keith. The second was a closed meeting for Masons only, held in the lodge rooms with Judge McClendon and Judge E. R. Bryan, of Midland, Grand Master of the Lodge of Texas, the principal speakers.

The first meeting was to be held at 5:00 o'clock this afternoon in the lodge rooms when Judge McClendon and one or two others of the committee were to make addresses. Judge Bryan could not continue the trip with the committee and returned to his home in Midland this morning. Judge B. F. Brown, of Sterling City, another speaker who attended the San Angelo meeting, was not able to come to Ballinger, he also returning to his home today.

Tonight at 8:00 o'clock at the Maeroy Theatre, Mr. Keith will deliver an illustrated lecture, with John Hooks, a graduate of the Masonic orphan's home of Fort Worth, in charge of the motion picture machine. Scenes of the Masonic home in Fort Worth, where 356 students are now enrolled; the Home for Aged Masons and their Widows at Arlington; the Eastern Star Home at Arlington; and the Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children at Dallas, will be shown.

The committee will go to Junction Friday, where after holding a couple of sessions, they will close the July tour.

PROBE CONTINUES IN NORRIS CASE

(By Associated Press)
FT. WORTH, July 22.—Efforts of the Tarrant county grand jury which is investigating the death of D. E. Chipps, killed by Dr. J. Frank Norris in the office of the First Baptist Church last Saturday afternoon, were directed to the sifting of testimony of all persons in or near the office at the time of the shooting, at today's session of the investigation.

L. H. Nutt, a deacon of the church and an eye witness to the slaying; Ralph Ridgeway, fourteen-year-old boy who was in a nearby room of the church when the fatal shots were fired, were recalled before the investigating body today.

At noon the grand jury adjourned until next Tuesday to give time for the officers to develop additional testimony if possible. The police and other officials are working on the case from every angle, but very little additional testimony than that which was first developed has been brought to light.

KING AND QUEEN GIVE BIG PARTY

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, July 22.—King George and Queen Mary today gave a royal party in the gardens of Buckingham Palace to which 13,000 guests had been invited. There were a hundred and one Americans among the thousands who sipped tea with the British sovereigns.

As virtually all the guests invited accepted the invitation and came to the party, the six-acre gardens of the palace were the scene of the most brilliant function in the history of British royalty.

ONE KILLED IN BOLD HOLDUP

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 22.—Aaron Rodack, proprietor of a jewelry store, was shot and killed and his clerk seriously wounded during a daylight hold-up today on Broadway.

Five robbers participated in the hold-up and all made their escape after fighting their way through a crowd that collected at the sound of the shots. The robbers failed to get any loot on account of the crowd which gathered when it became known that a hold-up was being staged.

FOUR BOXES TO HOLD REPUBLICAN PRIMARY

Republican County Chairman A. F. Brock announced Thursday that primary elections would be held in only four of the twenty-seven precincts of the county. In Ballinger voting boxes will be located at the City Hall and in the office of the Cameron Lumber Company. All republican voters residing in Precinct No. 1 can vote at the City Hall and those residing in Precinct No. 24 can vote at the lumber yard.

The other two boxes holding elections will be at Winters and Wingate.

Republican candidates were not assessed, and the election will be in charge of men who have volunteered to do the work.

First Cafeteria in London is a Success

LONDON, July 21.—London's first cafeteria has been a success. It has a seating capacity of 500. While Londoners at first shied at the idea, within two weeks of the opening the cafeteria had all the noon business it could handle, and most of the arm chairs also were filled at tea time.

The cafeteria is in the shopping district, and has proved exceedingly popular with women who are eager for a quick lunch.

HOUSTON, July 22.—A guard, named Raider, was shot and killed when six convicts escaped today from the Ferguson State Farm, according to word received here by the Houston police department. Officers of surrounding territory have been notified to be on the lookout for the felons who escaped in two large automobiles.

The convicts are: George Dixon, of San Antonio; Charles Pryor, Red River county; Richard Naylor, Fannin county; C. R. Holland, Guadalupe county; Rebot Bernard, Navarro county; and Alvis Ireland, Archer county.

Most of the men were serving terms for robbery.

According to the report received here the automobiles drove up to the farm soon after midnight. The men in the cars opened fire on Raider, killing him instantly. The convicts then fled with the men in the cars.

Later it was learned that three men occupied the automobiles which drove up to the farm. After shooting the guard the men in the car liberated six convicts and sped away with them after first locking the doors on the remainder of the prisoners.

A posse was aiding officers today in searching the country for the prisoners.

**Vincent Astor Gives
Monument to Oregon**

(By Associated Press)
ASTORIA, Ore., July 22.—On
Coxcomb Hill, above the mouth
of the Columbia River here, will
be dedicated tomorrow a monu-
ment to the discoverer and the
pioneer traders of the Columbia.
The monument, which was pres-
ented by Ralph Budd, president
of the Great Northern Railroad,
was donated by Vincent Astor,
grandson of the founder of
Astoria.

The shaft, 125 feet high, bears
a frieze depicting the achieve-
ments of John Jacob Astor; Cap-
tain Robert Gray, who discovered
the river in 1792; Lewis and
Clark, and others.

**ENCAMPMENT AT
GAP A SUCCESS**

The Buffalo Gap encampment
came to a close Wednesday at
noon. It was conceded by all
who were present, to be by far
the most successful in the history
of the organization. Since the
purchase of the ground by the
Abilene Presbytery there is a
greater incentive for the board
of directors and all others who
are interested to make perman-
ent improvements.

The attendance and the re-
sponse of the great throng of
people that was present Sunday,
surpassed the most eager expec-
tations of the promoters of the
encampment. All the incidental
bills will be cared for and more
than \$3,000 was raised for the
present and future improvement
of the grounds.

More than a thousand lives
came under the influence of the
eight days conference.

As this conference was put on a
standard basis this year more
than thirty received credit. This
credit will be an incentive for
more and better preparation and
thus it is hoped to develop a more
efficient leadership in the var-
ious fields of religious activity.
There were seven or eight who
received credit from the Eighth
Street Presbyterian Church, to-
ward work on diplomas. At the
consecration meeting Tuesday
evening there were seven who
offered themselves for full time
Christian service.

With a greater interest and en-
thusiasm evident on every hand
the board of directors are plan-
ning greater things for the 1927
annual encampment. A more
convenient water supply and a
better sanitation will be installed.
A tabernacle and a cafeteria are
being planned. A committee com-
posed of W. C. Lansley, Mrs. J. L.
Kinkade and W. F. Tipp, was ap-
pointed at a meeting of the board
of directors to raise a fund to

build a Sallie Young memorial.
This monument is to be in the
form of a building in which to
house and care for the members
of the faculty of the encamp-
ment. Miss Sallie Young spent
her last day in the house on the
encampment grounds. She was
one of the pioneer educators of
this section of the country, teach-
ing in her own home. One of her
pupils whom she taught, be-
ginning with the alphabet, not
only aspired to, but was elected
governor of Texas, in the person
of Hon. Tom Campbell.

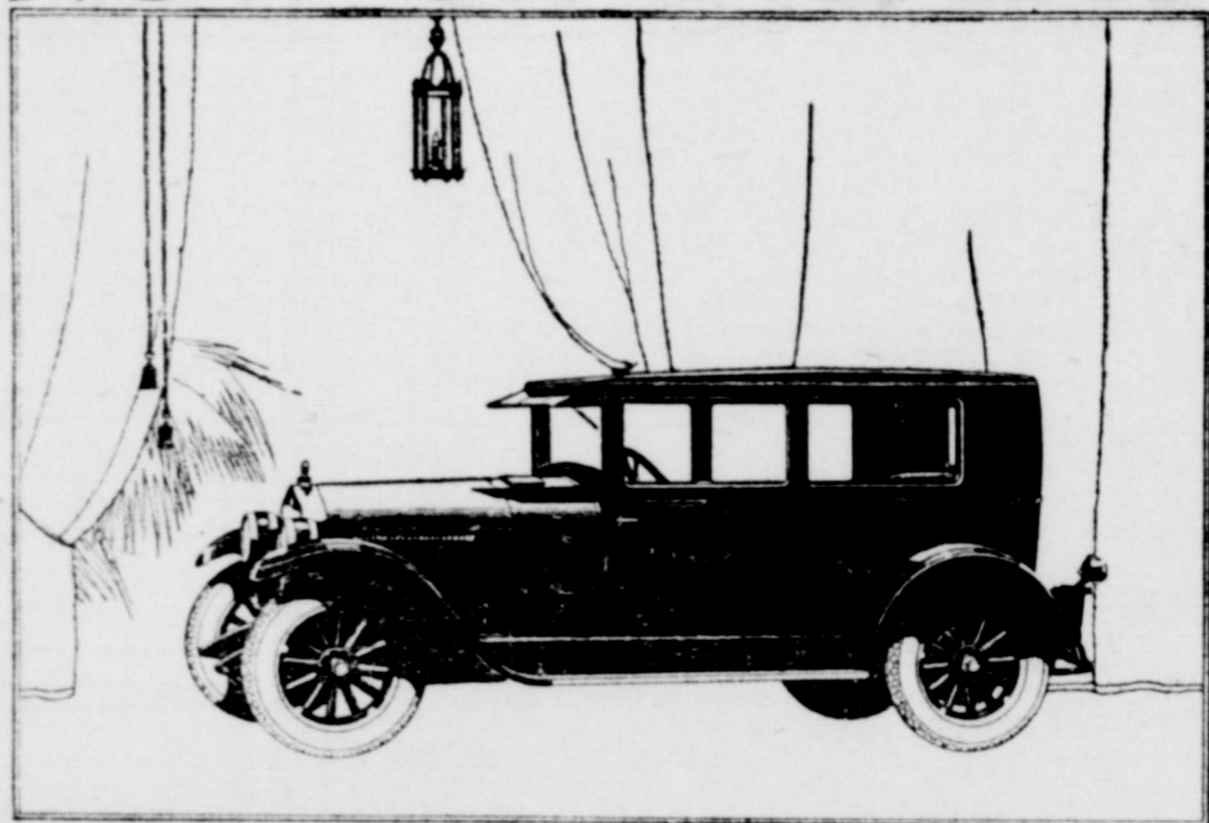

Mrs. Conlan, herself of Choctaw and Chickasaw origin, points out that the five civilized tribes of Oklahoma—the Chickasaws, Seminoles, Choctaws, Cherokees, and Creeks—have been an educated people for more than a century and that many outstanding artists have sprung from their ranks.

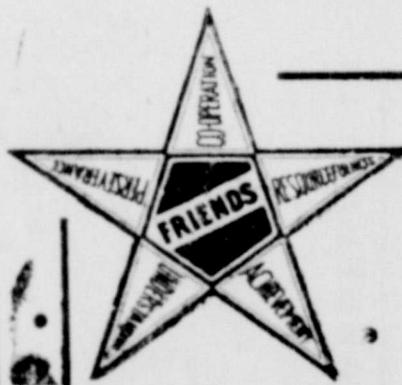
