

RAINS OVER THE STATE MAY CAUSE SMALL VOTE

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, July 23.—The final day of the Texas primary campaign was overcast with lowering clouds and shot through with politics. Each of the three leading candidates for the democratic nomination for governor predicted victory.
Lynch Davidson is the only candidate who does not claim nomination in the first primary, both Dan Moody and Gov. Ferguson asserting they will receive a majority tomorrow, and will be nominated on the first ballot. Davidson stated that he would safely be in the run-off.
The Texas Election Bureau, through A. F. Henning, manager, announced that everything is all set for collecting and tabulating the returns, and early reports on the vote are promised.
Henning predicted that the vote will be around 650,000. He said that poor roads in some sections of the state due to recent rains, would keep some of the farmers away from the polls, and that if it continues to rain tomorrow the total vote will be smaller.

SELLING LIQUOR ON U. S. SHIPS

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Charges have been made that intoxicating liquor is being sold aboard United States Shipping Board vessels, and have been referred to the authorities here. The charges included the sale of liquor on the Leviathan, the largest passenger ship flying the American flag.
Federal authorities have been ordered to begin an investigation of the charges at New York.

BOARD BEAUTIFYING SCHOOL PROPERTY

The school board recently launched a campaign to beautify the campus of the high school. Workmen were put on the job to clear the grounds of rocks, rubbish, etc., and a contract for building cement walks was awarded and the work is well underway. A cement walk is being run on the terrace around the building from the South entrance to the North entrance, and walks will also be laid to the street from the entrances to the building. This improvement will add greatly to the civic attractiveness of the school campus.

LARGE ABSENTEE VOTE CAST IN RUNNELS CO.

One of the largest absentee votes ever cast in Runnels county in an election was reported Friday by County Clerk W. A. Forgey.
The total number of absentee ballots filed with the clerk before the closing date for absentee voting is 143. The ballots have been sent to the election judges of the various precincts.

THOMAS SPEAKS FOR DAN MOODY

H. Bascom Thomas, of Dallas, one of the most prominent speakers of Texas, answered charges made by Lynch Davidson and James E. Ferguson against Dan Moody, the young attorney general of Texas, who tonight is closing his campaign for governor, here Thursday evening at the court house lawn.
Mr. Thomas left early Friday morning for Albany, where he was to speak in the afternoon. Tonight he will speak at a rally to be held in Abilene by the Dan Moody for Governor Club there.
Judge O. L. Parish, local attorney, formerly county judge, and representative from this district, presided at the meeting held here at 8:00 o'clock Thursday evening when some 500 or 600 people gathered to hear what Thomas had to say in regard to the governor's race, for Moody, and against Fergusonism and Davidsonism.
Judge Parish introduced Troy P. Simpson, local newspaper man, veteran of the World War, a member of the Pat Williams Post No. 8 of the American Legion, formerly post commander of that body, and an unwavering supporter of Dan Moody for governor, who attacked James E. Ferguson for making untrue and false statements about Moody's war record. After a few remarks in regard to Mr. Moody's war record, in which Mr. Simpson highly praised this record, he presented Mr. Thomas, who was the principal speaker for the occasion.
Mr. Simpson in his few short remarks told of his service in the uniform of the United States during the World War, and also Mr. Moody's service at Camp Pike in Arkansas, where Mr. Simpson said Dan Moody learned to fight and today that Dan Moody was fighting Fergusonism for himself and for the people of Texas.
Mr. Thomas in his opening remarks asked all the people seated in the cars surrounding the court house lawn to come nearer the stand as his voice must be heard for the two other addresses he has scheduled before the campaign closes. Mr. Thomas announced that he would give a civil and respectful answer to all questions asked him by members of the audience.
"I'll not sling back ugly remarks at you like Jim Ferguson does," Mr. Thomas said, "Jim Ferguson is the only man speaking for a candidate for governor who does those things."
Two or three questions were asked Mr. Thomas during the course of his address. One was why did he support Jim Ferguson for the Senate four years ago and support Mrs. Ferguson for governor two years ago and was now changed over to the Moody forces. Mr. Thomas stated that he had seen his mistake in supporting Ferguson, but he was against the Ku Klux Klan and he would just as soon vote for a wax doll in a show window of a Ballinger business house as the Ferguson during those two elections. Mr. Thomas stumped a greater part of Texas during those two campaigns and in each instance he was a staunch supporter of the Fergusons.
Mr. Thomas spent a part of the evening discussing Mr. Davidson, who, according to Mr. Thomas, thinks that he is running for governor.
"He is like a negro going thru a cemetery, just whistling to keep up courage," Mr. Thomas said. "He knows he has not a chance. Davidson has made some awful ugly statements about Mr. Moody in saying that the liquor interests and Standard oil interests are

POINCARÉ HAS NEW CABINET

All the others have been cabinet members with the exception of the minister of labor. He is the son of the late president, Fallières.
All parties are represented in the cabinet.

RELIGIOUS WAR ON IN MEXICO

NOGALES, Ariz., July 23.—Semi-official dispatches to the Nogales Herald today from Mexico City said the secretary of war had ordered all federal troops to be under arms ready for instant action on August 1st, at which time, reports previously have stated, Catholic churches throughout the nation will be closed under orders from high ecclesiastical officials.

The injured persons included pea pickers, who sought shelter in a barn when the storm broke. The barn was demolished.

PLANS MERGER SOUTHERN RYS.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 23.—Plans for a great rail merger in the Southwest, combining the Kansas City Southern, the Missouri, Kansas & Texas, and the St. Louis-Southwestern systems, were completed at a meeting of the Kansas City Southern board of directors today.
Early application will be made to the Interstate Commerce Commission to approve the consolidation.
Directors of the other roads previously had taken action on the matter.
The merger, which has been in process of formation for more than a year, will unite the railroads with total assets at approximately \$600,000,000 and combined trackage of more than 6,000 miles.

KILLS RATTLESNAKE IN HER BEDROOM

COTTON CROP ESTIMATE IS LOWER THAN IN 1925

EARLY RETURNS FROM ELECTION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 23.—A cotton crop of 15,368,000 bales, each bale equivalent to 500 pounds, was indicated by the condition of the crop reported on July 16th, the Department of Agriculture announced today.
The condition of the crop was placed at 70.70 per cent normal. For the same date last year the government's report fixed the estimate of the 1925 crop at 15,635,000 bales and the condition of the crop at that time was given at 75.40 per cent normal, and the yield turned out 16,103,679 bales.
Indications are that the acre-production this year will amount to 155.80 pounds.
The condition of the Texas crop on July 16th of this year is placed at 73 per cent normal.
The bulletin board will be arranged for displaying returns from the county boxes, and from time to time bulletins from the state will be announced. Arrangements have been perfected for special wire service. Additional telephone service will be furnished, and with long distance line connected directly with the Ledger office, returns from outlying districts will be received promptly.
For the convenience of the public the city authorities have agreed to clear the street in front of The Ledger office. A rope will be stretched across Hutchings Avenue at the intersection with Eighth Street and also from the alley at the side of the Ideal Bakery, and no parking will be allowed on the block in front of the newspaper office, porting the returns.

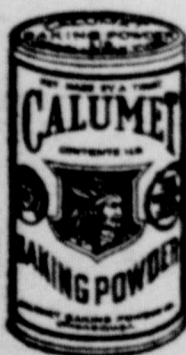

THIS CITY IS HOME OF BLUE RIBBON CHILDREN

(By Associated Press)
MANSFIELD, O., July 22.—Mansfield has been an attraction for child health workers of the world for the last six years and although it no longer is in the general limelight the work which directed attention here is being carried on just the same.

On April 20, 1920, the city was selected by the American Red Cross and the National Child Health Association as a center to develop "blue ribbon children," in a six-year experiment.

The procedure consisted simply of teaching elementary school children principles of right living—regular bathing, regular teeth brushing, regular eating and sleeping and the like.

When they reached a certain stage of perfection, as attested by physicians and dentists, they were given a blue ribbon. Four thousand children have been so tagged.

In the six years, there was almost a constant procession of health workers from the United States and foreign countries to see how the project worked out. The national organizations considered results so excellent that five other demonstrations immediately were opened in various sections of the country.

The experiment permeated Mansfield's civic life and when the crops of health workers left, the county and city health boards decided to carry on.

RAIN HALTS DRILLING OF KIMBERLIN'S NO. 1 SHULTZ

Rain halted drilling operations on Kemper Kimberlin's No. 1 Shultz well in Concho county, for a short time Wednesday night during a heavy downpour but drilling was resumed Thursday morning.

Drilling is around 1,440 feet, it is reported. The bit ran into a broken shale, streaked with lime and with some showing of oil, but not enough shale to delay further progress of the test.

Drilling is progressing very slowly on this well.

Statue Shows Marquette Viewing Historical Spot

CHICAGO, July 22.—The first white man and likewise the first Christian missionary to view the site of Chicago, was honored recently by a bronze statue depicting Father Marquette holding high a cross. Louis Joliet, fellow explorer, and an Algonquin Indian, are at his side.

The last months of the explorer's life were spent in a little cabin on the Chicago River, not far from the site where his statue was unveiled. The cabin was five miles upstream from the spot where Marquette reared the first place of Christian worship within the present limits of Chicago, then an Indian hunting ground.

Herman A. MacNeill, of New York, the sculptor, also is especially noted for his Indian pieces, "The Moqui's Prayer for Rain," and "The Sun Vow."

A feature of the dedication was that although Marquette prophesied commercial greatness for the place of his last labors, the goal at which he aimed was a spiritual one recently fulfilled by the International Eucharistic Congress.

Crack Austrian Football Team Broken by U. S. Tour

VIENNA, July 22.—The American tour of the Austrian Hakoah football team, the best players in the country, has had a sequel in the disintegration of the team.

"Seven players, which can not be replaced, have refused to renew their contracts because they have got engagements in America," the club manager announced sadly. "That is the price we have to pay for their fine sporting feats."

Honor System Fails with Philippine Convicts
 (By Associated Press)

MANILA, July 23.—A policy of confining the worst Moro criminals from Mindanao and Sulu in Bilibid prison in Manila instead of at the San Ramon Penal Colony at Zamboanga, has been inaugurated. A dozen of the most desperate convicts have been brought here.

At the San Ramon colony the prisoners are placed on their honor to a large extent, with the result that many of them have escaped and formed outlaw bands which have terrorized the Moro country.

Berlin Exhibition Contains 19 American Paintings

BERLIN, July 21.—Nineteen paintings by American artists are exhibited at the International Modern Art Exhibition at Dresden, the first of its kind since 1912. The exhibition, for which a special building has been constructed, contains 993 paintings, portraits, drawings and sculptures of artists in twenty countries.

The American exhibits, furnished by various private collectors and dealers in the United States includes oils by Jules Pascin, Rockwell Kent, Alfred Maurer, Leon Sloan, Maurice Becker and John Kroll.

**Roast Pig With Lots of
Dressing is Cuba's Dish**
(By Associated Press)

HAVANA, July 23.—Cuba's national dish is roast pig.

The pig, twenty to forty pounds on the hoof, is stuffed with a dressing made with a bread base, to which is added spices to suit the individual taste. It takes the place of honor on 'Noche Buena' (Christmas eve) instead of the familiar American turkey on Christmas day.

The most popular dish is chicken and rice. The chicken is stewed and the rice steamed separately. They are combined with a few strips of a mild red pepper grown in Cuba and placed in an earthenware dish and baked. Sometimes eggs or saffron are added to the rice.

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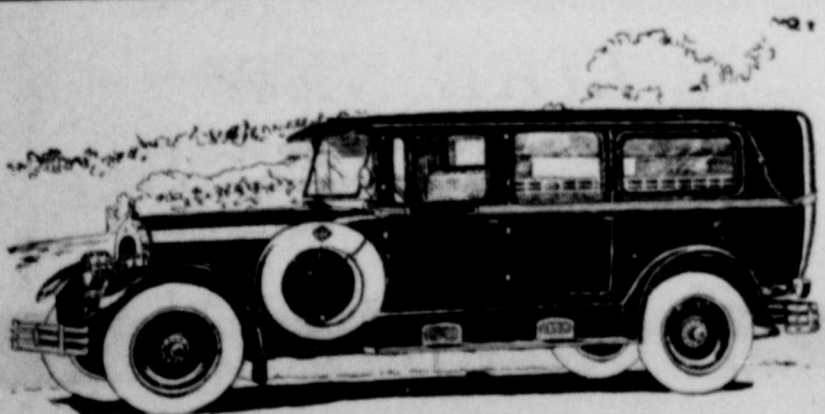
