RELIGIOUS SITUATION BECOMES MORE TENSE

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO, D. F., August 10.—The situation revolving about the government religious regulations and their rejection by the Catholics today became more tense and complete.
President Elias Calles issued his bitterest broadside against the Catholic clergy in a statement to the American "good will mission." He charged the clergy was seeking wealth and political power, causing revolutions and bloodshed and using the pulpits for seditious speeches while keeping the masses of the people ignorant.
"The Catholic episcopate," Calles continued, "is unyielding in its refusal to accept the government's regulations."
No move has been made to return the priests to the churches and the deadlock is apparently holding with no prospects of a reconciliation.

AUXILIARY MEET WAS A SUCCESS

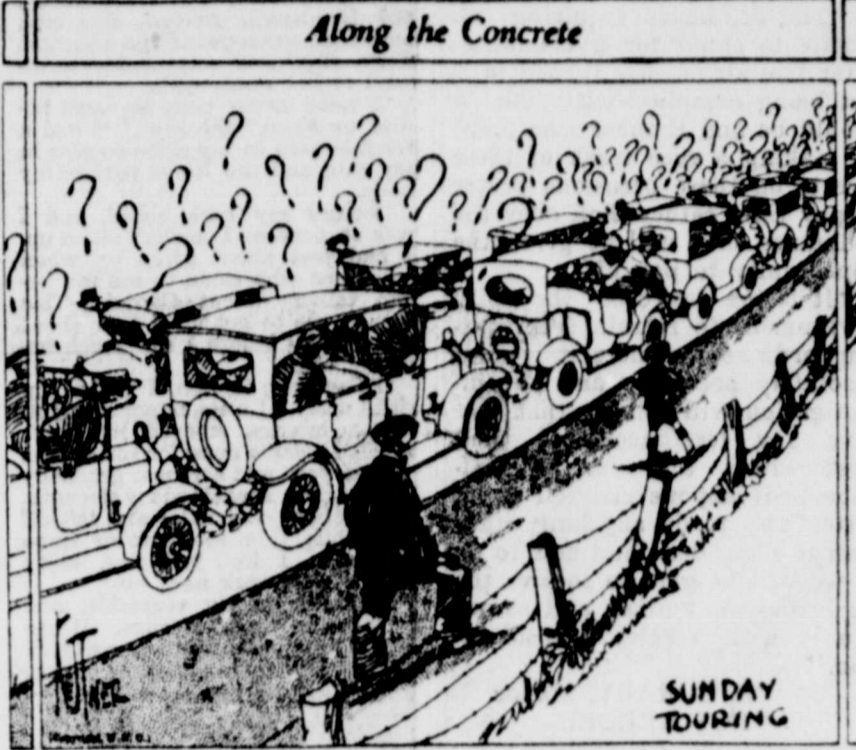

COMMISSION PASSES NEW TRAFFIC RULES

The city commission at a regular meeting held Monday night passed a new traffic ordinance that will, it is believed, assist to a great extent in relieving the streets of Ballinger from danger to both pedestrians and motorists.
This ordinance deals with right-of-way streets. Ballinger now has three right-of-way streets, namely, Hutchings Avenue, Eighth Street and Broadway. These three streets have the right-of-way over all other streets in the city and Hutchings Avenue has the right-of-way over Eighth Street and Broadway.
Stop signs will be placed at the intersections of the three streets and these signs must be obeyed, the commission advises. Cross streets leading into and through these streets are not right-of-way streets and when one goes into a right-of-way street in an automobile, the car must come to a complete stop.
Those travelling on the right-of-way streets have the right-of-way over those coming into the main thoroughfares and in case of an accident, those who come from the cross streets and are either struck by a motor car or strike another motor car, are to be held liable.
Announcement of the date of the enforcement of this new ordinance will be made within the next few days.

NO FIGHTING IN NEW YORK

WOMAN HAS RIGHT TO CHANGE HER MIND

HOTEL BUILDING BEGINS MONDAY

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Aug. 10.—"Woman's right to change her mind" is the only explanation made today of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson's failure to withdraw from the governor's race as she had said she would do.
It was learned today that Mrs. Ferguson's campaign expense account shows a contribution from a candidate for county judge.
These were the two new developments in the Ferguson-Moody controversy following a meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee yesterday, which certified both Moody's name and Ferguson's name for places on the ticket in the second primary.
The committee yesterday certified both the name of Dan Moody and Mrs. Ferguson for the runoff when it was found that Moody did not have a majority in the first race by 1,771 votes. Mrs. Ferguson filed no notice of withdrawal from the race, and James E. Ferguson, her husband, refused to say whether she would withdraw or not. With this status of affairs the committee certified both names.
The Fergusons tried to bar Moody from the runoff by petitioning the executive committee with a charge that two candidates for representative had illegally contributed to Moody's campaign expenses. The committee declined to take any action on the petition, claiming it was without legal authority.
A number of counties have already received orders to certify both candidate's names for places on the official ballots which are soon to be printed, and it will be too late for any candidate to withdraw, it was said here this afternoon.

4 STATES HOLD PRIMARY TODAY

The states of Alabama, Ohio, Arkansas and Nebraska are holding primary elections today.
The chief interest in Arkansas is in the gubernatorial race.
Governor Terral is opposed for re-election by Chancellor John Martintau, of Pulaski county court, who waged a bitter campaign. The governor charged that Martintau drank excessively, while the judge accused the governor of abusing his power in issuing secret paroles to convicts.

FIVE MINERS ARE STILL ENTOMBED

(By Associated Press)
SALEM, Ky., Aug. 10.—Speculation as to whether the five miners entombed near here Tuesday night are still alive, is expected to be ended by tonight as a result of the efforts of rescue squads working day and night.
Air is being pumped into the mine, but no response is given to tapping on the air lines.

SUB MISSING SIX LIVES LOST

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Another name was added today to the list of missing in the sinking of the British submarine S-29 in Davenport Basin yesterday. The total unaccounted for now is six.
A crew working all night has not discovered any of the bodies. The cause of the accident is yet unexplained.

Commission Explains Traffic

"In view of the fact that Bal-
linger's traffic has increased to
the extent that it has become
hazardous to drive on our streets
under the present regulations,
especially in the business dis-
trict, the City Commission has
decided to place stop signals on
all streets and alleys leading into
Hutchings Avenue, Eighth Street
and Broadway.

"The Commission is aware this
will cause considerable delay to
traffic entering these streets, but
we consider one life above incon-
venience and ask the good people
of Ballinger to co-operate with us
in establishing this rule.

"Only recently a bad wreck
occurred at the intersection of
Thirteenth Street and Hutchings
Avenue, which probably would
have been avoided had the 'stop'
rule been in force at the time.
We ask the people to assist us in
control of the 'speeders.' Our
mayor dislikes to assess fines
against people who frequently
speed without thinking of the
possible danger to others. This
is noticeable with a few of our
prominent people, also delivery
cars and trucks that apparently
go as fast as they can regardless
of the consequences. We ask you
to slow down and avoid the
necessity and expense of putting
on more traffic officers to see

that the public welfare is safe-
guarded.

"The 'slow' signals near the
school buildings must be obeyed
and there is going to be no escape
from the full penalty to those
who fail to observe these regula-
tions. Public school will soon
open and fast driving within the
'slow' limits is not going to be
permitted.

"The ordinance requiring all
traffic to stand for five minutes
after fire alarms are turned in is
not being complied with like it
should be and if those who insist
on making a race track of these
streets on these occasions prefer
to pay fines rather than obey the
ordinance they will be given the
opportunity to pay off.

"It is the desire of the City
government to refrain from pass-
ing ordinances where it is not
absolutely necessary and an in-
vestigation will show that we
have far less accidents than
most towns the size of Bal-
linger. If anyone can tell us a
better way to do anything other
than is being done and how to do
it, we will be glad to receive the
suggestion in writing and assure
you it will receive considera-
tion."

Plover Eggs, English Delicacy, Off Menus (By Associated Press)

GLASGOW, Aug. 10.—Plover eggs, for centuries a delicacy of kings, have been scratched from all menus in Scotland.

Plover eggs long have been immensely popular in England, being served only at the expensive establishments, but public feeling has been aroused against robbing the nests for the market, and in twenty-eight Scottish counties the bird is now entitled to absolute protection.

For a while the law was not enforced, and plovers' eggs were served on the railway dining cars.

SAYS STRONG STIMULANT NEEDED FOR SNAKE-BITE

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, Aug. 9.—Snake-bitten, a woman living near Houston was brought to a hospital here, where 10 hours after her arrival a serum injection brought by airplane from Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, saved her life.

In the meantime home remedies were applied. Not everybody, however, knows what to do for snake-bite—aside from the time-honored remedy which the Eighteenth Amendment discouraged.

The Houston Public Library submits what is regarded as standard first aid treatment. Prefacing it with the statement that the rattlesnake, moccasin and copperhead are the only poisonous snakes commonly found in the United States, it says that snakebites have a very depressing effect on the heart and that the patient needs a stimulant, the best ordinarily obtainable be aromatic spirits of ammonia. Strong tea and coffee are also effective.

Getting at the heart of the mat-

ter, it recites that the first thing to do is to tie off the wound between the wound and the heart. "If there are no sores in your mouth, suck the wound and spit out the poison. It is harmless unless it enters the blood."

"After the wound has been sucked as clean as possible, it should be cauterized with iodine, or by a heated wire nail or blade of a knife."

"Get to a doctor as soon as possible. If this takes longer than half an hour, the string or bandage should be loosened after the first half hour for a second or two every 15 minutes, leaving it loose longer and longer each time, if no bad effects show."

"Another method of treatment consists in slashing the wound to make it bleed more freely and rubbing in crystals of permanganate of potash."

Longest One Fare Ride on Chicago Street Cars

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—The longest street car ride in the world for one fare of seven cents may be had in Chicago.

From the South city limits, with its glimpses of green farms, to the North city limits at the edge of a forest, this ride is 37.3 miles, and it takes about four hours riding. Eight transfers are necessary.

The route covers a variety of scenery. It passes Wolf Lake South of the city, runs within two blocks of White City, an amusement park, passes near the Armour Institute of Technology, within a block of the Coliseum, near the famous Hull House, passes Douglas Park, Garfield Park, Humbolt Park, and near Independence Park.

Zigzagging a bit this course passes from country scenery thru residence districts into the heart of Chicago's business and manufacturing district and out among more residences and back to the country.

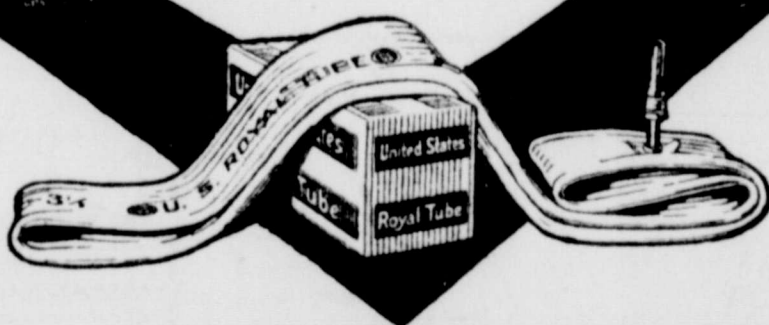

NO ICE FAMINE AT BALLINGER

A story sent out under a Cisco dateline and appearing in Tuesday's Ft. Worth Star-Telegram reported an ice famine at that place, and declared that "calls from neighboring towns for ice to relieve suffering from present heat wave had to go unanswered."

The story also said, "Baird, Ballinger, Moran and other places called for ice, but none was available."

We do not know anything about conditions at Cisco, but the correspondent who sent in the story from that place is about as far from the truth as he can get in reporting an ice famine here.

When interviewed about the ice supply here, W. G. Owsley, local manager for the West Texas Utilities Company, declared such a story was all news to him. "We are not only supplying the local wholesale and retail trade," said Mr. Owsley, "but we are shipping ice to other points where we have no plants, supplying the demand from our new plant, and have a twenty-two capacity plant in Ballinger lying idle." Two cars of ice are being shipped from Ballinger to Santa Anna every week, Mr. Owsley stated.

A short time after the Star-Telegram was circulated here Mr. Owsley received a telegram from the manager of the Abilene ice plant stating that he could supply Ballinger with 500 tons of ice from storage at that place. The same company that owns the Ballinger and Abilene plants owns the Cisco plant, and the message from Abilene goes to show that Cisco could also get ice from Abilene storage, if necessary.

The former Citizens Ice Company plant at Ballinger, which is now the property of the West Texas Utilities Company, could be put in operation in case such emergency existed. Ballinger has not been without ice since the plant was built, or since the utilities company entered the local field.

The utilities company maintains a large cold storage vault, in which is packed several hundred tons of ice ready to be shipped out to any point where an emergency might arise either through increased demand, or break downs.

Chairman Porter of the House foreign affairs committee believes that under this policy it will not be long "before a white building will be looked upon as an American building."

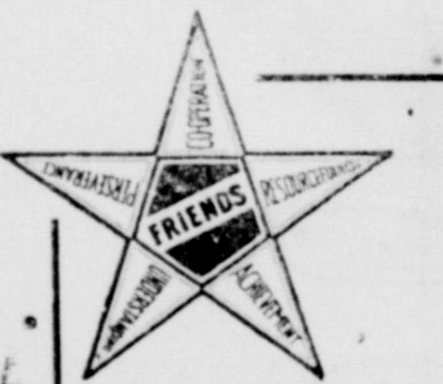
"It also will aid our tourists who, upon arriving in a strange port or foreign capital, will guess at once that the white structure is the American building," said Mr. Porter.

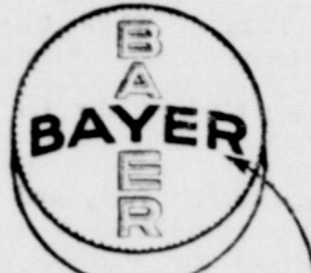
