GETS HEARING WITH COOLIDGE ON TROUBLE

(By Associated Press)
PAULS SMITH, N. Y., Aug. 31.—James Flaherty, supreme knight of the Knights of Columbus, will be received by President Coolidge tomorrow for a discussion of a resolution of the order calling for American intervention in Mexico to protect Catholic churches in their religious dispute with President Elias Plutarco Calles.

MEXICO, D. F., Aug. 31.—On the day before the convening of congress, the prospect from the Catholic viewpoint continues to be gloomy for any relief by the legislative body in the nature of a repeal of the amendment containing religious clauses in the constitution or regulations giving effect to the clauses.

As the matter now stands, congress apparently supports President Calles.

The business situation seems increasingly depressed by reason of the economic boycott.

HUNTING SEASON OPENS SEPT. 1ST

The hunting season for the North zone territory North of the I. & G. N. and T. & P. railroads running from Laredo to San Antonio, to Austin, Longview and to Texarkana, opens tomorrow, Wednesday, September 1st.

To date, W. A. Forgey, county clerk, has issued four resident hunting licenses. Youths under 17 years of age are not required to purchase a license to hunt in other counties than their own, but all over 17 years are required to purchase a license before they are allowed to hunt outside of the county in which they reside.

Dove and plover seasons open on the first (tomorrow) and continue until the last of October, two full months being allowed for the hunting of these two fowls. Mourning doves are to be killed during the months of September and October while the white-wing species are to be killed in August and September. Doves hunted in this section of the state are mourning doves. The limit of these birds is 15 per day and not more than 45 in one week.

The same is allowed on wild rail, black bellied plover, golden winged plover and yellow legs.

The duck season, including geese, brant, snipe, gallinules and mud hens, opens on October 16 and continues until January 31, 1927. The limit on ducks is 25 in one day and not more than 50 per week, while on geese and brant it is 4 in one day and not more than 12 per week.

The prairie chicken season opens on Sept. 1 but continues for only 10 days. The season closes on September 10. The limit on this fowl is not more than five in one day or ten during the season.

Open season on quail and Mexican pheasants starts on Nov. 16 and closes on January 1, 1927. The limit is 12 in one day and not more than 36 during one week.

Red fox and gray squirrels may be killed during the months of May, June, July, October, November and December. The limit is 10 in one day.

Wild turkey gobblers may be killed from November 16 to December 31 in the North zone. Not more than three gobblers may be bagged in one season.

The bear season opens November 16 and continues to December 31, the bag limit being one to the season.

The buck deer season opens at the same time as bear, and closes on the same date, but three bucks may be killed during the season, provided they each have three points or more.

The hunting season this year is expected to be one of the greatest in history for city sportsmen, and it will be a good idea to acquaint oneself with the hunting and fishing laws, both State and Federal before going in the great open spaces in search of wild game.

CONTRACTORS MAKING REPAIRS IN BUILDING

Greatest Trek of Humans Engineered in Near East

(By Associated Press)
ATHENS, Aug. 31.—The greatest trek of human souls since the exodus of the Children of Israel from Egypt is nearing completion in the Mediterranean countries.

Under the direction of the League of Nations Mixed Commission for the Exchange of Populations between Greece and Turkey, more than 2,000,000 persons have already been transferred from alien lands to their native countries.

Although little has been printed in the United States or Europe about this great human movement, it has been characterized by those who witnessed it as the greatest piece of constructive work of the League of Nations since its foundation. It required three years to complete the task, which was carried out with a surprising lack of friction at a cost of more than \$45,000,000.

Each of these 2,000,000 persons had to be transplanted bodily from a soil where he worked, ate and had his being, to an entirely unknown land, where he had neither property, nor money nor friends.

The World War and succeeding conflicts in the Near East and Asia Minor had heightened racial animosities among the Turks, Greeks, Armenians and Bulgars to such an extent that it became imperative in the interest of

peace, protection and the economic well-being of those races to remove them from countries in which they were racial minorities to the land of their nativity. There were about 1,500,000 such Greek and Armenian elements in Turkey, 450,000 Moslems in Greece and other non-Turkish territory, and about 50,000 Bulgars in scattered regions.

Throughout its work the Commission, whose chairman is Charles Howland, a well-known lawyer of New York, had the valuable assistance and advice of the officials of the American Near East Relief organization, whose superior knowledge of the refugee problem in Greece and Turkey proved of inestimable value.

The commission has built more than 733 new agricultural settlements, and 22 urban settlements. It has erected 53,000 houses and repaired 16,000 more. It has made settlements in 1,980 towns and villages. As a result of its activities the Greek population of Macedonia has increased from 513,000 to 1,341,000. The population of Athens and Piræus jumped from 453,000 to 805,000, while the inhabitants of Salonica grew from 174,000 to 460,000.

One of the most vital results of the exchange is that Macedonia, heretofore desolate and barren, has been transformed by the 500,000 newly settled Greeks into a land of real productivity.

Vasquez, Mexican consul here, who announced recently he would sponsor a back-to-Mexico colonization move, have been ordered investigated here by Judge Cunningham of the district criminal court, in a special charge to the Cameron county grand jury.

NORTON GINNER SEES SHORT CROP

DALLAS, Aug. 31.—Returns from the Texas Election Bureau at noon today from 248 counties, including 146 complete, showed the following totals for the candidates in Saturday's democratic primary election:

For governor—Ferguson, 257,040; Moody, 478,729.
For attorney general—Allred, 340,218; Pollard, 349,099.
For treasurer—Ball, 262,576; Hatcher, 394,999.

WASHINGTON, August 31.—The severest earthquake in the history of the islands, shook the Azores today, American Consul Remillard reported to the State Department from Horta.

All Americans, he said, were believed to be safe.

Houses are down, Remillard said, but it was impossible to estimate the life and property losses at the present.

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Private advices from Sorta, on the Island of Fayal, report a heavy earthquake in the Azores. First reports said that much damage had been done.

ATHENS, Aug. 31.—Greece has been shaken by a strong earthquake affecting the entire country.

No casualties had been reported this afternoon.

MEXICO, D. F., Aug. 31.—A violent earthquake has occurred on the isthmus of Tehuantepec and covering a large part of the state of Oaxaca.

No details have been received.

CREASY SHIPS MACHINE TO SOUTH AMERICA

The Creasy Rotary Filer Company are loading out one of their saw filers this week to Brazil. The machine will go to the Southern part of the South American republic where the cotton industry adds about 2,000,000 bales per year to the world's cotton supply.

This filer is going to Brazil to be installed for use in cotton gins which will handle the cotton crop now being planted. It is spring time now in that country and Brazilian cotton farmers are in the planting season.

Mr. Creasy recently shipped two of his machines to Turkey, and this is the third shipment recently to leave the factory for foreign countries.

BETTER PROSPECTS SEEN FOR OIL DEVELOPMENT

Local lease and royalty buyers are more liberal in dealing with the land owners than heretofore and some of those interested in oil development take this as an indication that the prospects for oil are better than ever before.

The two tests blocked Southeast of Ballinger were put under contract on a cash basis. The drilling companies paid cash lease for the acreage, and other cash deals are being made. Royalties are also changing hands on the cash basis. Oil men say this makes the outlook just a little more optimistic.

Notice is hereby given to all property owners and to all interested parties that at the First Called Session of the Thirty-Ninth Legislature of the State of Texas, to be convened in the City of Austin, Texas, on the 13th day of September, A. D. 1926, there will be introduced a bill in respect to Road District No. 1, of Runnels County, Texas, and the substance of such proposed law is as follows:

An act to create Road District No. 1 in Runnels County, Texas; validating and approving all orders made by the Commissioners Court of said county in respect to the organization of said district; validating the authorization, issuance, and sale of certain road bonds thereof, and providing for their payment by the annual levy, assessment and collection of general ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in said road district; approving and validating all orders of the Commissioners Court of said county in respect to said road district, bonds and taxes, or certified copies thereof, and constituting such orders legal evidence; and declaring an emergency.

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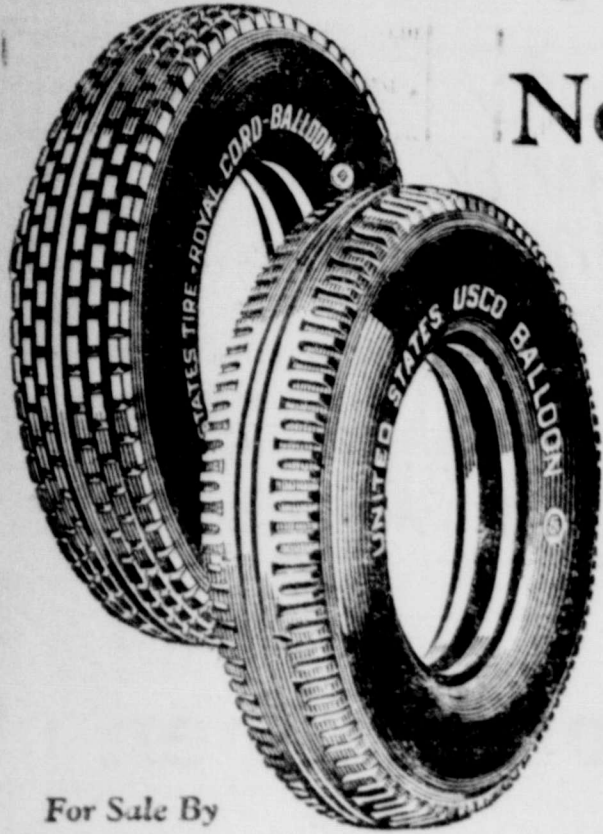

CONFEDERATE DAUGHTERS AID IN STUDY OF THE OLD SOUTH

(By Associated Press)
LYNCHBURG, Va., Aug. 31.—The United Daughters of the Confederacy have established a biennial prize of \$1,000 to encourage research in the history of the South, particularly in the Confederate period. Mrs. Arthur H. Jennings, of this city, chairman of the prize committee, said the award will be given to the Mrs. Simon Baruch University Prize.

Beginning in November the award will be made every two years, and competition will be limited to the undergraduates and graduate students of universities and standard colleges in the United States and to those who have been students in these institutions within the preceding three years. Where no essay of high merit is submitted, the prize will not be awarded for that year, Mrs. Jennings said.

Any phase of life or policy may be treated, she continued. Payment of the prize will be in two installments of \$500, the first at the time of the award and the second upon the printing of the manuscript. This will serve to promote the printing of the essay in permanent form at the author's initiative, it was said.

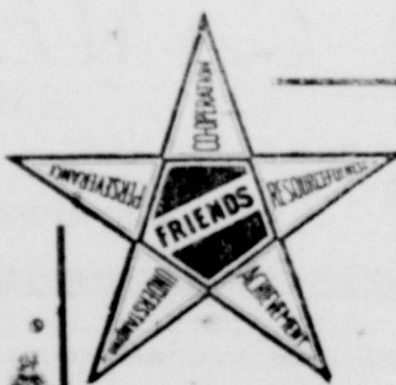
