WESTBURY, N. Y., Sept. 21 .- Two men lost their lives today when the trans-Atlantic flight airplane, the 8-35, under the command of Captain Rene Fonck, French ace, crashed in flames in an attempt to take off on the 3600-mile non-stop journey to Paris.

Charles Clavier, French radio operator, and Jacob Islamofi, Russian mechanic, were instantly killed. They were trapped in the closed cabin of the three-motored machine.

Captain Ponck, French air commander, and Lieutenant Law rence Curtin, of the United States navy, and American alternate pilot, leaped to safety before the plane burst into flames.

The crash was caused by the buckling of a wheel on the extra landing gear that was to have been dropped into the ocean as soon as the plane got under way.






