RELIEF WORK IN WRECKED CITIES REPORT SENDS COTTON DOWN 90 POINTS

(By Associated Press)
MIAMI, Sept. 23.—Work of rehabilitating the hurricane swept sections of Florida and Alabama was greatly accelerated today as the number of relief agencies were increased, and conditions become more normal, after almost a week of distress and sorrow caused by great loss of life and property.

The American Red Cross took the lead in this humanitarian cause and let it be known that between four and five million dollars were needed for immediate use in Florida, which bore the brunt of the storm's attack.

The death list in the entire area today was still estimated at more than 400, and it will be several days before an accurate list of the dead can be compiled. Tabulating the loss in life and property is slow on account of the disrupted communication facilities. One hundred bodies have been recovered from the debris in Miami and a total of 300 other bodies are reported to have been found in other sections of the devastated region.

The total storm damage has been placed at between one hundred million and one hundred and fifty million dollars.

TAX SURPLUS RUNNING HIGH

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—Increasing tax receipts flooding the United States treasury impelled Secretary Andrew W. Mellon today to boost his original estimate to \$185,000,000 surplus for this fiscal year.

Secretary Mellon was unwilling to predict the eventual surplus, however, and maintained that it was too easy to talk reduction.

FORD ROADSTER GOES UP IN SMOKE

A Ford roadster, the property of Dr. J. W. Macune, parked on Seventh Street near the Zappe building, went up in smoke just before noon Thursday. The car was burning when discovered, and the seat, top and some of the other belongings were soon converted into smoke and ashes. It is not believed the motor was damaged.

Doctor Emphasizes Importance of Vitamins in Regular Diet

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Sept. 23.—Those who object at present day emphasis placed on vitamins in food as hokum are reminded by Dr. S. N. Blackberg, department of physiology of Texas A. & M. College, that scurvy, a plague that pestered humankind almost from the beginning of time, would have been eliminated in short order had our ancestors possessed a knowledge of this vital element.

Deficient diet and deficient vitamins are practically synonymous, Dr. Blackberg said. The ancient Greeks described scurvy, although not knowing its cause; the Crusaders believed it to be caused by something injurious in the slum fed their cross-following enemies; but it remained for Captain Cook, first around-the-world navigator to demonstrate that fresh food was an automatic cure for this disease. NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—Cotton prices struck the lowest levels in several years today when the government crop report was issued. Prices broke more than \$4 per bale following issuance of the census bureau report.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 23.—The United States government's cotton crop report today was a surprise, and the market suffered a break of from 85 to 90 points, or about \$4.50 a bale.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—Cotton of this year's growth gained prior to September 16th totalled 2,511,317 bales, the Census Bureau announced today. Of this amount Texas gained 1,139,546 bales.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—A cotton crop of 15,810,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight was indicated by the condition report based on conditions on September 16th, according to the Department of Agriculture today. The condition on that date was fixed at 59.50 per cent normal. The department places the condition of the Texas crop at 57 per cent normal, and indicated a production for Texas of 5,259,000 bales.

RAIN FALLS ON FIGHT STADIUM

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 23.—Although rain fell here this morning, it cleared up and indications this afternoon are that the Jack Dempsey-Gene Tunney fight will take place as scheduled tonight.

Tunney, the challenger, arrived in an airplane from his training camp this afternoon, and weighed in at 185 1/2 pounds. Dempsey weighed in at his training camp near Atlantic City at 190 pounds.

LEAHY SEEKING CHANGE VENUE SMALL CROWD ON TRIP TO ABILENE

(By Associated Press)
GEORGE WEST, Tex., Sept. 23.—A change of venue was asked today by the defense when the case of Harry Leahy, charged with the murder of Dr. J. A. Ramsey, physician of Mathis, Texas, was called for trial. The defense alleges that it will be impossible to get a fair trial in Live Oak county on account of the feeling against Leahy. Judge Cox recessed court until this afternoon in order to give the state time in which to file an answer to the defense motion.

Dr. Ramsey was decoyed from his home by a Mexican on the pretext of going to see a sick Mexican. He was never seen alive after he left his home with the Mexican. After more than a month's search his body was found in a shallow grave, a Mexican leading the officers to where the body was buried.

Leahy, a prominent ranchman and well known citizen of South Texas, was arrested, following a confession made by the Mexican. Leahy was held in jail at San Antonio following his arrest, and sought to prevent his removal to Live Oak county, declaring that his life would be in danger. He was returned to George West under heavy guard and has been under guard since being returned to that place for trial.

200 DEAD IN PARAGUAY GALE

LOSES SUIT TO STOP FIGHT

(By Associated Press)
PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 23.—Application for an injunction to stop the Dempsey-Tunney prize fight scheduled to take place in this city tonight, was dismissed today by the unanimous opinion of three judges in the common pleas court.

Two injunction suits were brought by B. C. Clements, Chicago fight promoter, who claims he holds a prior contract for Dempsey's services in putting on a fight. The three judges handed down the decision this morning, leaving the promoter of the fight here to go ahead with the championship match.

The fight will start at 8:30 p. m. Eastern time, in the stadium of the Sesqui-Centennial Exposition before an audience of 100,000 fight fans.

LOST BOY PROVES TO BE A RUN-AWAY

It was reported in Ballinger late Wednesday afternoon that a boy by the name of Worsham, about 13 years of age, was missing in the Dry Ridge community, four or five miles South of Ballinger. It was reported that the boy was carrying water for a bunch of cotton pickers and he failed to return when he went to the well about 1:00 o'clock to get a bucket of water. It was feared that he had fallen in the well and a runner came to Ballinger for help.

L. Cohen and Dr. S. B. Raby went out to investigate the report, picked up the boy's trail and followed it to near Rowena, where the lad was picking cotton in the field of Mr. Ernst. Mr. Ernst stated that the boy came to the field, said that he was from East Texas, and wanted a job picking cotton. He was put to work. Dr. Raby and Mr. Cohen brought the boy back to his home, and the excitement caused by a "lost boy" soon subsided.

ized reserves and make recommendations as the first committee did last winter.

Letters to the presidents of the Reserve Officers' Association of each of the five states comprising the corps area—Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona—ask that each submit the name of a reserve officer to serve on the committee. This group will consist of 10 reserve officers, representatives of each division, the artillery group, the 136 cavalry brigade and each of the five departments of the Reserve Officers' Association in the corps area.

The officers that will serve will be put on 15 days' active duty so they can report here January 17.

Each department also is asked to submit a list of subjects to be discussed. General Hinds advised that subjects considered by the first committee last winter be avoided if possible.

The first committee, among other recommendations, advocated abandonment of Defense Test Day and recommended that wives of reserve officers take flights so that they would not be averse to flying on the part of their husbands.
