## PARADE OPENS SIXTH ANNUAL FAIR

Ideal weather prevailed for the opening of the sixth annual Runnels County Fair, which celebration was officially opened Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock with the Boys' and Girls' clubs parade. The Ballinger Chamber of Commerce Band, under the direction of H. H. Carsey, led the procession together with fair officials and city officials.

The gates were opened at 2:30 o'clock and the fair was in progress, with prospects of breaking the first day's attendance record.

Rain began to fall about 3:15 o'clock, but it is not believed this will cut attendance appreciably.

The city police force has been increased and traffic rules are more numerous during this week. Traffic officers have been placed on several conspicuous intersections to aid the visitors in complying with the regulations and to prevent blocking of traffic.

Practically every club in Runnels county was represented in the parade today, with several delegations from adjoining county rural clubs. Practically all those in the parade have entries in the fair.

Many of the rural citizens of Runnels and other counties were here for the first day of the fair, arriving early. Streets were crowded with visitors as were the stores and Fair Park.

### UPTON COUNTY SELECTED FOR POTASH TEST

(By Associated Press) **WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.**—A tract of land in Upton county, Texas, has been selected by the United States Bureau of Mines for its underground exploration for potash.

An appropriation of \$500,000 is to be spent over a period of five years. The appropriation was made by the last session of congress for the purpose of financing the tests.

The production of potash as a valuable fertilizer and chemical is now practically a monopoly in the hands of French and German producers.

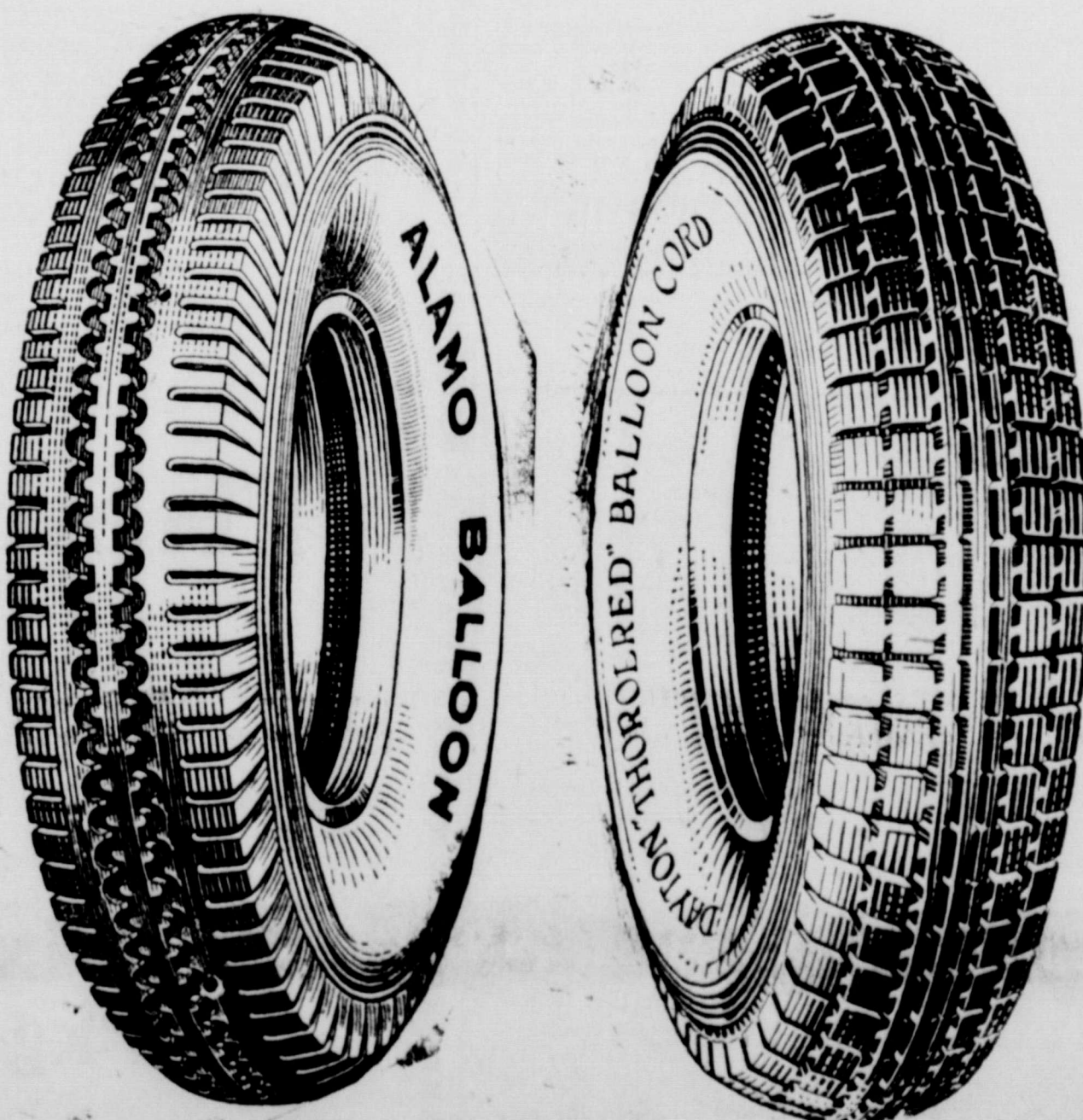

UTRECHT, Holland, Oct. 11.—Miss Rita Spanjaard knows more about cheese than any other woman in Holland. She is director of a cheese control station and the first woman cheeseologist in the world.

No cheese in the Utrecht region, no matter how strong minded, can slip past Miss Spanjaard and across the sea, unless she gives it a passport. It has to be a genuine farm cheese with a Dutch accent, just red enough, just large enough, just rich enough to get a clearance.

During a year's time Miss Spanjaard pronounces life and death sentences upon millions of cheeses. And so carefully does she finger-print the cheeses, as it were, that she could recognize any cheese from her home town, even on Broadway. By deciphering an easy code stamped into its rind, she can tell exactly from what Utrecht farm it came, the date it left home, the cow it came from, the herd to which the cow belonged and its rating.

When Miss Spanjaard took control ten years ago, only 250 farmers were subject to inspection. Now 2,500 in the Utrecht district alone avail themselves of the inspection.

This feminine dictator is a graduate of the University of Utrecht with a degree in science and, if she is somewhat formidable to a cheese, she is extremely attractive to behold—young, pretty and dressed in the Parisian manner.

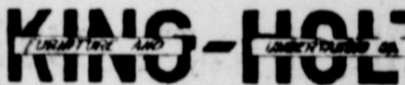

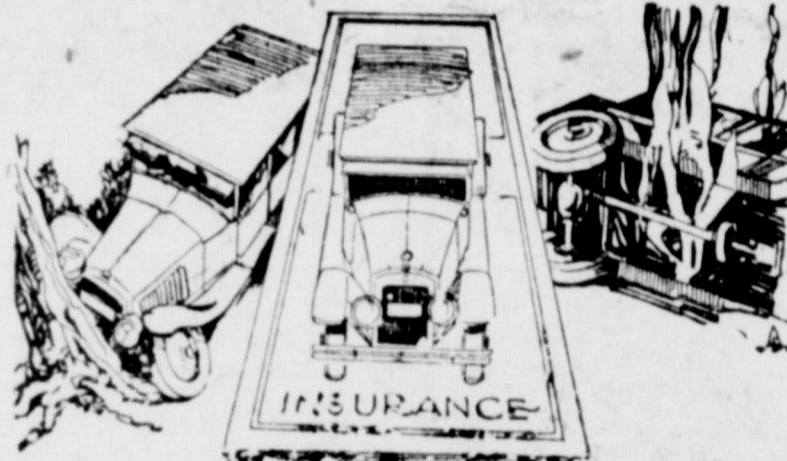
