RAIN GREET'S SECOND DAY FAIR VISITORS

Despite the fact that a heavy rain fell in Ballinger early Wednesday morning, the attendance for the second day of the Rannels County Fair was rather large and the crowd remained in the city a greater part of the day.

The livestock parade scheduled for 1:30 o'clock Wednesday was not held, on account of the weather, but the three bands here for the celebration gave concerts on the streets until the hour for the hippodrome performance at Fair Park which commenced at 2:00 o'clock.

The crowd at the hippodrome shows for the first three performances were rather large but larger crowds are expected on Thursday and Friday. Fair officials are well pleased with the attendance thus far, despite the rain and heavy clouds which hung low in the skies over the city Wednesday.

The fair association collected insurance on the first day as a heavy shower fell during the late afternoon and registered 15-100 of an inch, while the policy called for only .10 inch of rain for paying off.

The association is insured against rain for each day, it was announced Wednesday morning by W. C. McCarver, president of the fair board.

All departments were visited by many people Tuesday and Wednesday morning and it appeared that a larger crowd would enter the park Wednesday afternoon. The Ballinger-Brownwood high school football game was scheduled for 3:30 o'clock, immediately following the hippodrome acts in front of the grandstand.

Schools of the city were recessed at noon Wednesday so that all students might attend the game in the afternoon. Coaches Crabtree and Youngblood, of the Brownwood squad, brought 23 huskies with them for the game. Quite a number of boosters are also here for the contest.

The hippodrome acts as presented in the first three performances were of an unusual value for such entertainment. There are about nine acts in this performance under the direction of Doc Holland. Tight wire walkers and performers, comedy acrobatic acts, loop walking, flying trapeze and rings acts, contortion and hand balancing; Si and Miranda, county rude acts, Jargo and the strange giraffe, dog performers, songs with the band, Charleston contest and fireworks displays are to be seen and heard every night during the fair. The first night's fireworks display was very pleasing and entertaining.

The Senior and Junior bands and the Clown Band were again seen on the streets this afternoon as was the bucking Ford of the Harwell Motor Company. This machine is operated by Bud Gray, Leonard Proctor and H. Stokes.

Si and Mirandy were on the streets looking over the crowds and having a real big time ming-

TEXAS REGENTS WIN IN COURT

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Oct. 13.—The board of regents of the University of Texas won over the men students who were seeking an injunction restraining the regents from converting Brackenridge Dormitory into a class room building, in the Third Court of Civil Appeals today.

The court dissolved the temporary injunction on the grounds that no trust or condition upon the university campus could be imposed with a legislative grant.

POSTPONE C. OF C. CONVENTION

The program and outdoor luncheon for the district convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the convention as a whole has been cancelled and will not be held Thursday of this week, as was first scheduled, it was announced Wednesday by J. D. Motley, secretary of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce.

"It was decided, following a conference with officials of the West Texas chamber, that the fair here was enough for one day and that it would be too much for local officials to arrange for the luncheon and program," Mr. Motley declared, "so the people will go to the Rannels County Fair instead of to the scheduled program of the convention."

The convention has been called off but several of the delegations that were to be here for this meeting will come to Ballinger to see the fair.

The dates for the convention will be announced later, Mr. Motley stated.

Several prominent speakers were scheduled to make addresses here Thursday before the convention but everything in connection with the convention has been cancelled.



Ledger Launches Campaign to Give \$1500 in Prizes

In order to place The Daily Ledger and The Banner-Ledger (weekly) in as many homes as possible in Rannels county, the publishers have arranged to conduct a subscription campaign through the rural schools of the county.

Prizes valued at \$1,500.00 will be awarded the schools, and a plan has been worked out which will give to every school entering the contest either a prize or a cash bonus.

Each school will be credited with so many votes for every dollar turned in on subscriptions, and the schools receiving the largest number of votes will be awarded first, second and third prizes in the order named, and all schools which do not win a prize will be given cash money at the rate of fifteen per cent for all money turned in. This guarantees all schools entering the contest against loss.

In order to equalize competition the schools have been divided into two classes. Class A schools will be those of four teachers and up, and Class B schools will be schools of three teachers or less.

Two first prizes, one for the school in Class A receiving the greatest number of votes, and one for the school in Class B receiving the greatest number of votes, will be awarded. Also a second and third prize will be awarded in each class, making in all two first prizes, two second prizes, and two third prizes to be awarded, and in addition the 15 per cent cash goes to the schools not winning a prize.

The first prize in each class is a \$450 new style Brunswick Radiola with extra loud speaker on one side and a 6-tube super-heterodyne radio on the other side. Two of these machines will be given away.

The second prizes in each class will be athletic equipment, either baseball, football, basketball or tennis equipment. The school's winning second place in each class can choose from the assortment.

The third prize in each class will be one quarter-saved oak teacher's desk and revolving arm chair to match.

The rules governing the contest are very simple, and the contest begins November 1st and closes December 15th at 4:30 o'clock p. m.

Following is the schedule of votes:

- 1 year Daily Ledger, \$4.50, 5,000
- 2 years Daily Ledger, \$9.00, 15,000

5 years Daily Ledger, \$22.50, 40,000.

County Superintendent R. E. White will appoint a committee of three to count the votes and a teacher in each school will be named as campaign manager for that school.

The Ballinger and Winters schools will not be permitted to enter the contest, but other schools entering the contest can solicit subscriptions in Ballinger or Winters, or anywhere they wish to work.

Rules governing the contest, together with a description of the prizes to be awarded, have been printed and distributed, and the contest manager in The Ledger office at Ballinger will be glad to answer questions and assist the schools in any way possible.

This campaign will enable the schools with little work to make valuable improvement in their equipment. A \$450 radiola is worth working for. It will be a big asset to any school, and the other prizes will all the schools in carrying on their work.

COTTON MEETING ON AT MEMPHIS

(By Associated Press) MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 13.—The greatest danger to the prospect of solving the cotton market depression situation is a multiplicity of plans, Governor Henry Whitefield of Mississippi declared at the opening of the Southwide cotton conference here today.

Scores of plans for relieving the emergency situation created by the cotton market depression were submitted to the committee on resolutions.

The conference, numbering perhaps 500 representatives from cotton growing states, including planters, bankers and merchants, will hear the resolutions this afternoon when they are presented by the committee.

The resolutions committee embraced three departments which are instructed to consider three phases of the problem, namely, the marketing of the present crop, orderly management of financial credits, and acreage reductions in subsequent seasons.

C. P. Mooney, editor of the Memphis Commercial Appeal, was elected permanent chairman of the conference.

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COTTON CONTROL

Representatives from the cotton states have been called to meet at Memphis, Tennessee, to work out some plan for boosting the cotton market. These representatives were appointed by the governors of the various cotton growing states.

In looking over the list of the Texas delegates we note that the delegation is composed of bankers, business men and cotton buyers, and farmers are lacking on the committee. No doubt the same is true in other states.

Is it possible that the farmers must depend on somebody else to work out their problems.

These business men from various states will meet, resolute and recommend, and no doubt offer suggestions all prompted by the best of motives, but the farmers will have to work out their own salvation.

One plan suggested is for each cotton state to pass a law levying a tax of \$25 per acre on all land over a certain amount planted in cotton. This is a far-fetched plan, is not practical and could not be enforced.

We do not need a law to prohibit us from printing more newspapers than we can sell. A baker does not need a law to keep him from baking a greater number of loaves of bread than he can sell.

Another plan suggested is the adoption of a law prohibiting a farmer from planting land in cotton two years in succession. Such a law would not stick in any man's court. If a farmer owns his land he has a right to plant anything he chooses, or at least should have that right. If he wants to sow it down in cot-

ton and sell his crop at five cents a pound, that's his business, or should be.

After all is said and done the proposition is one the farmer must solve for himself. If he prefers to produce cheap cotton in preference to a plentiful supply of food for his own table and a surplus for the tin can and paper bag customer living in town, that's his business.

We would not place a straw in the way of any sane and sensible plan for controlling the South's greatest resource, but as long as the farmer expects someone else to hand him a profit-making cotton market, when he enters a competition with his neighbor to see who can produce the most cotton on the greatest number of acres, he will have another guess coming.

There is only one solution to the cotton problem and that is to raise less, more food for your own table, and then if the other fellow wants to go broke raising cotton at bankrupt prices, let him go.

ADVERTISING PEDDLERS

Too often the merchant who is the first to kick about the itinerant peddler who drops in and works the town with some line of goods which could be purchased from the local merchant, is the merchant who is the first to bite at some advertising graft promoted by an itinerant advertising peddler.

The Ledger has always stood for home trade and tried to show the good lady of the house where a dollar spent with a peddler is gone never to return, and that the home merchant who sells the same article, or one superior, at the same money, or for less, who lives here, pays taxes to help keep up the schools, city government, etc., and who employs home people to work in his store, is entitled to her patronage.

There are some merchants who refuse to practice what we preach. They patronize the out-of-town peddling printer, and buy advertising space in every grafting scheme submitted to them by the advertising peddler. These buyers of worthless advertising space seldom buy advertising space in the local newspaper, and as a rule tell you they don't believe in advertising.

If it is good business judgment to buy advertising and job printing from itinerant advertising peddlers, it is also good business judgment to buy laces, silk stockings, soaps, groceries, toilet articles, etc., from the itinerant who travels from house to house.

We contend that it is a bad policy and poor business judgment to do either, and after a little reflection the citizen and business man who has the best interest of his home town at heart will not practice it.

SEES ENGLAND PASSING AS GREAT WORLD POWER

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Oct. 8.—Dean Inge is fairly gloomy in his survey of present-day England which Ernest Benn, Limited, has just published. But the Dean of St. Paul's thinks England will survive, in spite of the disorganization of its industrial system.

While he is slow to hazard prophecies, as he says prophets have been very pessimistic about England's future after all of its recent wars, Dean Inge is of the opinion that the future will lie with large countries. The Americas and Eastern Europe still have room for large populations, and the dean believes it is unlikely England can continue as a great world power.

"The greater security of America will alone be enough to give her a decisive advantage in our competition with her," he says. "The prospect is unwelcome to a patriot. Much will depend on the friendliness of the United States, on which we certainly cannot count, but of which we need not despair."

DAYTON, O., Oct. 8.—One of the busiest and most important departments of the Army Air Service at McCook Field here is the salvage department.

When an airplane becomes unsafe for flying or is damaged in an accident to an extent that makes it unsafe, it goes to the salvage department. Every part, every piece of material that holds the slightest promise of future service is taken from the ship, inspected and either used again or sold. The discarded ship is stripped of every thing that is valuable and only a junk remains.

Those mechanical and other parts that are believed to be of further service undergo the same inspection as new parts and if they pass are put back in stock. The miscellaneous metal scraps are sold as junk.

OVERLAND OWNERS COM-PETE IN NOVEL FUEL TEST

With ten drivers trying their hands at squeezing the last foot out of a gallon of gasoline in the novel "drive yourself" fuel economy test conducted by the Sykes-Overland Company, local dealers in Overland and Willys-Knight cars this week, an average of 39.2 miles to the gallon of fuel was obtained.

A \$25 prize was offered for the driver making the best record each day, and winners for the week Monday were: W. O. Sides, 33.7 miles; Tuesday, F. O. Harms, 40.8 miles.

The average obtained by the winners was 37.75 miles. The lowest mileage was 33.6 miles, which was made the first day of the test.

The car was standard in every detail, with the exception of the gasoline feed, which was from a glass jar fastened to the front body post and connected directly to the carburetor. The jar was filled with a measured quart of fuel at the start of each test, and the car was driven until it stopped from lack of fuel. The driver was permitted to use any driving strategy which might occur to him, but each test was made over the prescribed route, from the salesroom to Benoit, giving a wide range of hills, traffic, clear streets, turns and

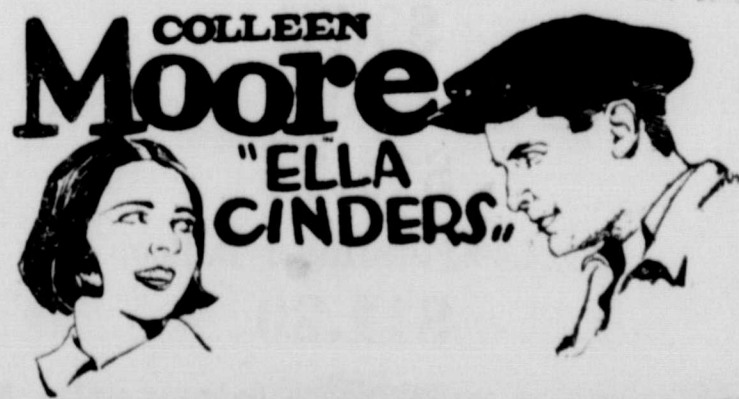

Probably the most interesting exhibits in this building are those of the West Texas Utilities Co., the First National Bank, and McCarver & Lynn.

The utilities company utilizes two booths, one on each side of the building at the East end of the hall. One is equipped with electrical fixtures and electrical wedding gifts. This booth is probably the most expensive at the fair, and more time was probably required to prepare it. The other booth is the "Kitchen of Her Dreams." This is an electrically equipped kitchen and is beautifully and economically arranged. To cap these two exhibits, the company has arranged a large map of the counties in this section of the country which are served by the company. The map has every station located that is supplied with either water, electric power, electric rail service, gas, or ice. A small wire connects the stations and each town is designated by a colored globe. Abilene, where the general offices of the company are located, is in the center of the map with a bright blue bulb. This map is seen just above the door of the East entrance.

The First National Bank's display is a scene artfully arranged showing Ballinger in 1889, the year when the bank was organized. This scene was taken from pictures made of Ballinger during the early days. It is a very attractive display.

The McCarver & Lynn insurance and real estate display is that of the Hilsdale Farms, South of Ballinger on the Paint Rock road. The scene is well laid out with the farms and roads depicted just about as they really are and with the derricks of the Red Bank-Fowler No. 1 and the

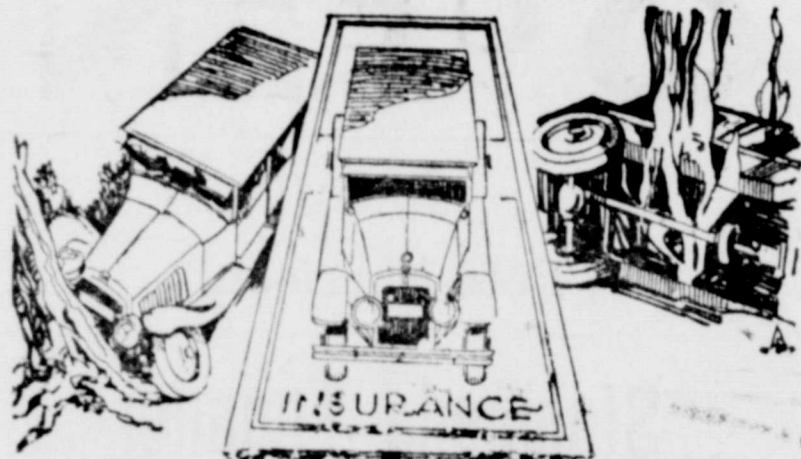
Dr. W. J. Tittenham, of Brownwood, was elected president; and Dr. J. G. Douglass, of Ballinger, was elected secretary.
