FOUR CONVICTS TURN HIGHWAY- MEN AT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, Oct. 29.—Four convicts who escaped from the Harlem state prison farm near here Thursday, apparently turned highwaymen in the opinion of Houston police.
Under the cover of night, they robbed six persons here on the streets, obtaining about \$50 in cash and took three diamond rings, valued at \$1,000, from a woman in the residence section.

MORE LIQUOR REVEALED IN TESTIMONY

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 29.—A number of highway maintenance engineers bought automobile parts at cost from the State Highway Department and he was largely responsible for the practice, although it had the approval of Commissioners Latham, Bickett and Burkett, Ed Estes, state highway equipment engineer told the House investigating committee today.

The split was to have been between former Governor James E. Ferguson, McDonald and himself, but he declined to enter into the plan, Weldon testified.

URGES TRANSFER OF NAVAL CAMP

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 29.—Letters were sent today to United States Senators Morris Sheppard and Earle Mayfield and to Representative Harry Wurzbach, urging them to help in the fight to have the United States naval training center transferred from Pensacola, Florida to Point Isabel, Texas.

The local Junior Chamber of Commerce is working with the Corpus Christi and Brownsville chambers to bring the training camp to Texas.

RIO'S WHITE WAY TAKES AD LEAD FROM BROADWAY

(By Associated Press)
RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 29.—A miniature copy of the Great White Way has been constructed here, which imitates the spirit of Broadway in quality, if not in splendor.

The incandescent display advertises the programs of a group of new theatres, which are used exclusively for moving pictures. Electric sign advertising is limited almost exclusively to the film ads, which usually announce the names of American stars.

These theatres are housed in four adjacent sky scrapers, which form the architectural aspect of the city. The tallest is fourteen stories and was built by the leading film importer, who has acquired a fortune importing American films.

After the show Brazilians visit an American ice cream parlor, the first to specialize in light drinks. Noticing that local restaurants serve pan-cakes for dessert, an attempt has been made to cater to the custom with waffles, which are eaten at any time of the afternoon or evening, as a light refreshment.

FRENCH FEMININE LAW LEADER DEAD

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Oct. 29.—Mademoiselle Jeanne Chauvin, who forced the admission of women to the French bar and whose early struggles for the right to practice law became a real French "affaire" and divided parliament, is dead at the age of 64.

A graduate of law of the University of Paris, Mlle. Chauvin, in 1897, was refused permission by the courts to appear before them on the grounds that women were incapable of mastering the profession. Mlle. Chauvin carried her case to parliament, and young Raymond Poincare, since president of the republic and now premier, then a promising politician, the last Leon Bourgeois, Paul Deschanel and Rene Viviani took up the fight on her behalf.

The law admitting women to the bar was passed in 1900 after a bitter fight.
There are now 200 women lawyers in Paris alone.

NEAR FREEZING IN PANHANDLE

(By Associated Press)
WICHITA FALLS, Oct. 29.—A cold wave in the Panhandle caused the mercury to drop within three degrees of freezing at Texline today.

Sheriff R. E. ("Earl") McWilliams was not indicted for the killing of Pleas Hill, Concho county farmer, by the October grand jury which adjourned Thursday afternoon after four days session at the court house here. Sheriff McWilliams killed Hill while the later was trying to make his escape from the sheriff, on the Ballinger-Point Rock road. The officer was bringing Hill to Ballinger to place him in jail for Sheriff Bob Miller, of Concho county, who had earlier in the evening arrested Hill on charges of theft.

The sheriff fired after Hill had tried to take his gun away from him and after a scuffle on the ground in a pasture near the road.

The jury investigated this case very thoroughly and it was decided not to return a bill against the sheriff.

Twenty-nine indictments were returned by this grand jury, 28 being felony cases, while one was a misdemeanor, a case of aggravated assault.

The only increase of crime in this county, according to the jury was found in the violation of the laws concerning the sale and transportation of intoxicating liquors.

"Violation of the laws concerning the sale and transportation of liquor is greatly on the increase," the report said, "we find the officers are doing everything in their power to cope with this situation, but it seems that it is up to the citizenship of the county to render assistance that cannot be gotten from any other source."

Several bootlegging indictments were returned Thursday afternoon but up to noon Friday no arrests had been made in these cases, and the names of those who were indicted were not announced for publication.

Respects were paid to Judge J. O. Woodward, the presiding judge, and to District Attorney Walter U. Early, County Attorney C. P. Shepherd, Sheriff R. E. McWilliams and his deputies.

The jail was inspected and found to be in an excellent condition. Inmates of the prison were also found to be treated well, and wholesome, healthful food is being served them, the report declared.

Ed Evans, negro, charged with murder in justice court here, was indicted for manslaughter by the grand jury. He is being held in jail, unable to make his bond.

Coal Costs Britishers as Much as Potatoes
(By Associated Press)

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Anthracite, owing to the coal strike which began in May, now costs London housekeepers by the pound as much as potatoes and nearly the same as cooking apples.

Even soft coal costs more than cabbage, carrots and several other winter vegetables which are in demand after the fresh garden supplies are pinched by frost.

Anthracite, by the hundredweight, at the beginning of cold weather, sold for approximately \$1.50 to \$1.75, while soft coal retailed at about \$1.00 for a 112 pound sack.

All sale of coal is regulated by the government, under emergency regulations. Private dwellings are allowed not more than one hundredweight a week, unless there are unusual circumstances which must be explained to the authorities for additional permits.

College Offers Credit for Folklore Course
(By Associated Press)

UNIVERSITY, Miss., Oct. 29.—Mississippi's folk lore will be preserved for future generations, the old-time ballads, fables, place names and traditions forming a course of study at the university this year.

Another unusual course is "Rural and Social Economics," dealing with the state's problems. Taxation, rural education and a study of the state government is included.

College credit will be allowed for both courses.

How Air Pilots Taught to "Keep Their Nerve"
(By Associated Press)

DAYTON, O., Oct. 28.—When an airplane cracks-up, the ambulances and field officials dash to the scene. If the pilot crawls out of the wreckage himself, or is helped out and able to navigate by himself, he is bundled into another plane and started up in the air again before he has time to blink.

According to the theory held by Air Corps officials at McCook Field, that is the best way to "keep your nerve," retain your morale.

It is not cruelty to him, officials say, but kindness. Most of the pilots are young fellows in the game for love of it, and it is to save this love and enthusiasm that heroic measures are adopted. It gets them away from the wreck and in a situation where they have no time to think about what has happened. All their attention is needed to pilot the new ship. Thus, it keeps their minds from morbidity, and restores shattered self-confidence, by implying their superiors' faith in them.

Officials say experience has proved that the longer a pilot stays on the ground after a crash, the less likely he is to fly again.

HOUSE MEMBERS TRY FOR SENATE

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Boots out of the House and into the Senate by the way of the ballot box are sought by six representatives in next Tuesday's elections.

Two others had hoped to travel along what the Capitol guides tell visitors is the longest corridor in any public building in the world, but their aspirations were denied by the voters of their parties in the primaries.

Congressman William S. Vare is the only Republican member of the House to obtain a Senatorial nomination, he having won out over Senator Pepper in Pennsylvania's celebrated \$3,000,000 primary. A former cabinet officer, W. B. Wilson, Democrat, is his opponent.

In Kentucky Alben W. Barkley, Democrat, seeks to unhorse Senator Ernest, Republican; Millard E. Tydings, Democrat, would occupy the seat now held by Senator Weller, Republican, of Maryland; and Harry B. Hawes would replace Senator Williams, Republican, a Senator from Missouri.

In Arizona, Representative Carl Hayden, is making the race against Senator Cameron, Republican, while Elmer Thomas, Democrat, aspires to occupy the Senate seat now held by Senator Harrell, Republican, of Oklahoma.

(By Associated Press)

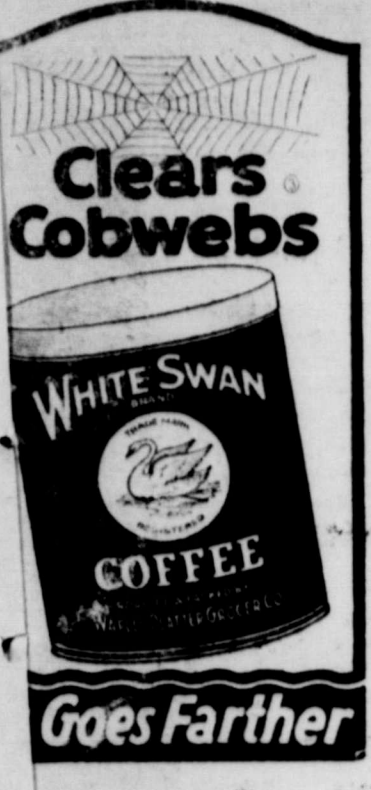

**Grandfather Clock Has
Ticked Thru 200 Years**
(By Associated Press)

PEORIA, Ill., Oct. 29.—Most everybody is familiar with Longfellow's poem about the grandfather clock that stood on the stairs "ticking the years away."

Many persons possess grandfather clocks, but few are as old as the one in the home of James Robert Harrison, 72, inventor and manufacturer, which has been ticking steadily through nearly 200 years for six generations of the Harrison family. It keeps perfect time and the works which are of brass show no mark of the hand of Time.

The ancient timepiece was brought to America from England about 1800 by Robert Harrison, grandfather of the present owner. It was willed to Robert by his father, who probably was the first owner, so that its history dates well back in the 1700's. And it has been willed through each generation since.

Curiously, the works bear the date A. D. 1619, but this apparently is too early for the type of clock. It runs ten days for each winding.

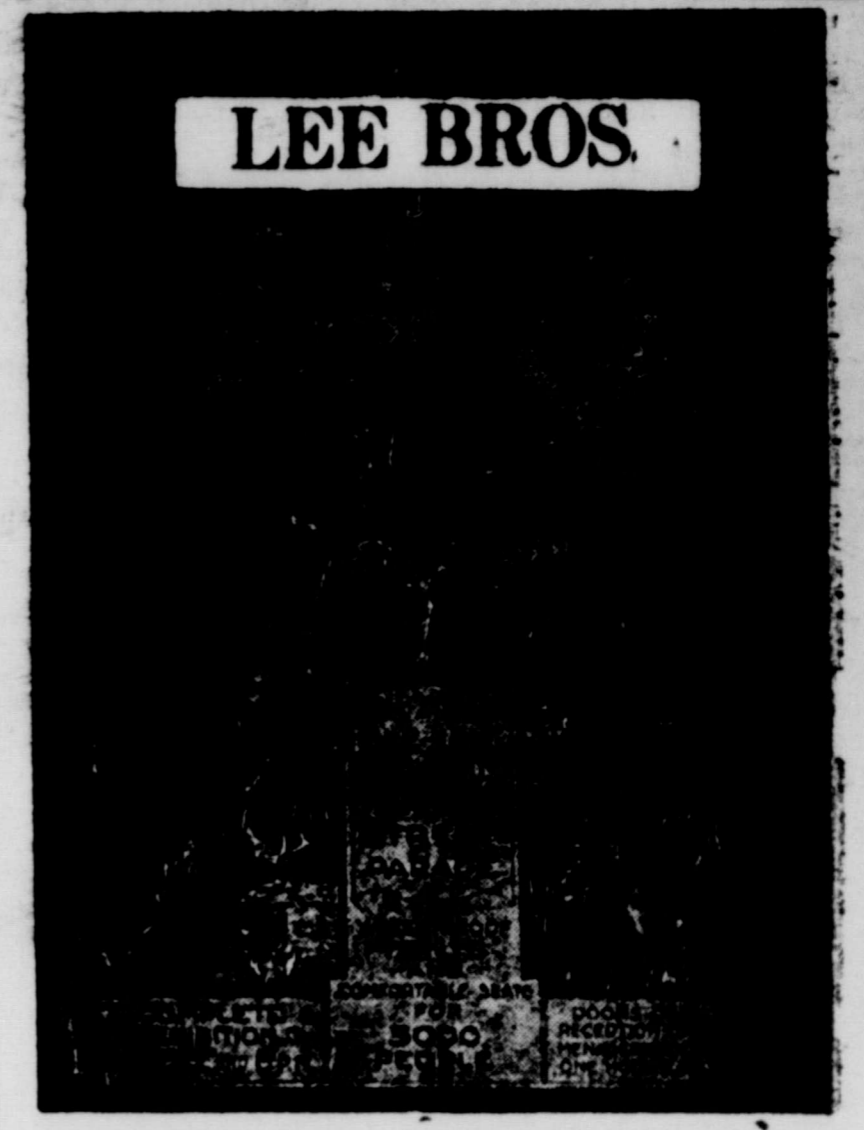
