## POPE CONDEMS MEX. ATTITUDE

ROME, Nov. 20.—Pope Pius, in the Encyclical, published today, condemns the bloody tyranny suffered by the clergy and faithful in Mexico and exhorts those in other lands to continue to pray in behalf of the Mexican Catholics.  
He expresses faith in a final victory for the church.  
The pope enlarges on two themes, that of increasing violence and persecution, including attacks on young women, and the growth of the courageous though peaceful resistance.

## WAS HOME ON MURDER NIGHT

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Nov. 20.—Taking the witness stand on his birthday, Henry Stevens, charged with his sister, Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, and brother, Willie Stevens, with the murder of Mrs. Elenora Mills, on September 14, 1922, told the jury here today he was at his home at LaFollette, New Jersey, more than 50 miles away on that day and night.  
Stevens said he was thoroughly familiar with shotguns and knew something about cartridges, for all firearms, but declared that he had not owned or fired a pistol for 25 years.

## MRS. COLLIER GIVEN PARDON BY GOVERNOR

AUSTIN, Nov. 20.—A full pardon was granted Mrs. Frank Collier, of Wichita Falls, here today by Governor Ferguson. Mrs. Collier was under penitentiary sentence in connection with the slaying of her son-in-law, Elzie "Buster" Robertson.  
The governor said she had investigated the case and declared she granted the pardon because she did not think Mrs. Collier was guilty of the charge brought against her.

AUSTIN, Nov. 20.—Mrs. Hattie Robertson appeared before Governor Ferguson today and urged her not to pardon Mr. and Mrs. Frank Collier, under penitentiary sentences for the slaying of her son, Elzie, who married the daughter of the former mayor of Wichita Falls.  
It was learned, unofficially, however, that the pardons will be granted as soon as they are signed by the secretary of state.

## HUNTER KILLS BUFFLEHEAD DUCK NEAR HERE

A bufflehead, a rare variety of the duck family, was killed on the Ballinger Country Club lake near the city Wednesday afternoon by Garland Dickinson, who brought the bird among others to the city where it was embalmed.  
The bird weighed one pound eight and a half ounces. It is the first to be killed in this section this season and the species rarely is seen in Texas.  
The bird has a big round feathered head, with black back and white breast.  
C. R. Crews embalmed the bird. It is expected that the duck will be preserved indefinitely.

## Undefeated Blizzards are Whipped By Bearcats 9-0

(By Albert W. Sledge Jr.)  
Playing unbeatable football the Ballinger high school Bearcats defeated the "young college" team of the Winters high school 9 to 0 in the hottest contested game of the season for Runnels county grid fans.

Some 3,000 people saw the Bearcats, who were out to avenge the Winters city and a large number of that 3,000 were from Ballinger and there was not a faulty cheer among the entire crowd for cheers and yells were loud and many and they drowned out whatever other noise there might have been at the time.  
Ballinger schools closed up at 2:00 o'clock and at 3:30 o'clock most of Ballinger was in Winters for the game. Winters stores closed, that is a large number of them, and many went out to see the "young college" team go down before the rushing Bearcats, who were out to avenge the defeats they had suffered this year from weaker teams.

Winters' winning streak was broken and it hurt more than Ballinger football fans will ever know, the pride of the Winters players and the Winters fans, and neither will the Winters players and fans know just how much good it did the Bearcats and their boosters.  
The Bearcat fans went wild after the first three points made by J. B. Arthur, Bearcat full, when he kicked a field goal from the Blizzard 12-yard line and still wilder when Henson Alagood, Bearcat half, made his second touchdown of his football career when he intercepted a pass on his own 35-yard line and outraced the Winters eleven to his goal line, some 65 yards for a touchdown. One Winters player was almost on Alagood when he went over the line but it was not soon enough as the touchdown was made when he touched the line with the pig-skin under his wing.

That all occurred in the fourth quarter, when everything was very quiet and dull and it looked as though the game would be a scoreless tie but when the three-point lead was obtained the Bearcat fans went wild with joy and still wilder when the touchdown added six points to make a total of nine for the Bearcats and a "goose-egg" for the Blizzards.  
The Winters Band was out with the Blizzard pep squad, with the veteran Joe Ward directing; the Ballinger Band was there with the Bearcat pep squad with H. H. Carsey directing. These two organizations made entertainment for the grid fans between halves and both showed they had practiced much for the occasion. Each was equally as good as the other.  
At the start of the game Captain Tucky lost the toss, while the Blizzard captain chose to defend the South goal. Tucky chose to receive. The ball was kicked over the end zone and brought back to the Bearcat 8-yard line. There, the Bearcat line was impenetrable and instead of making 8 yards in four tries for a touchdown, the Blizzards lost 5 yards.

From that time on the game was Ballinger's.

The Bearcats played football during the remainder of the afternoon and not once was their goal-line threatened, although the Blizzards opened up a passing game in the last quarter that made for them some two or three downs but every time they were held when they endeavored to go through the Bearcat line. The passes ruined Winters' chances to win the game and once or twice Ballinger's passes threatened to ruin their own chances of winning.

McKenzie, Alagood, Parrish and Arthur were the star offensive players for the Bearcats. McKenzie made the best end runs of the game while Arthur's kicking was superior to that of the Blizzards' kicker. Parrish called signals wonderfully and never once did he falter in calling his plays. He displayed the best generalship at this game than in any other he has ever played in. Alagood was the defensive backfield star of the game and also did much in working the Bearcat interference. He was responsible for the six points after Arthur's field goal. Buck Elkins, sub back, and Pete Marecek, another sub, played a few minutes of the game and both showed they could get through the Winters line every time they were called to "tote" the pigskin.

The entire Bearcat squad worked as a machine, with Rayburn, old reliable "Speck" Rayburn, Bearcat center, and J. D. "Curly" Forman, performing wonderfully on the defense. Rayburn was partly responsible for the three points Arthur obtained in the fourth quarter. He passed the ball to Arthur before a punt and then went down to recover the fumble of the Winters safety. Rayburn went over and through the line many times to get the Blizzard runner. He was also down on the punts like a streak. "Curly" was also down on the punts and he went thru his side of the line to get the runner. He and Rayburn went down on every punt and almost every

time they would get the safety man at the same time. Forman played football all during the game. Rayburn came home with the Winters pigskin.

Smith, Middleton, Mason, Captain Tucky and Powell in the line for the Bearcats played great defensive and offensive football. They knew when and how to get the runner and how to make holes for the Bearcat backs.

The Winters team was outclassed from the first to the closing. Young, Winters captain, center, who had never been downed by an opposing center this season went down before the attack of Rayburn; Newby, the lightning streak of the Blizzard backs, never showed a thing; Robertson could not do much kicking but he tossed several passes, some of which were intercepted; Edwards was not the field general that James Parrish proved to be, he showed that when he had the ball on the Bearcats' 8-yard line in the first five minutes of the game, again when he called a Blizzard back for a field goal from the 43-yard line—he tried to make this player a Wolfe of T. C. U., who booted one against Arkansas to win a game.

Ballinger's whistling to keep up courage, certainly helped in this game. The Bearcats are going to whistle some more when they play Winters.

Ballinger tried 5 passes, three were completed, and two were incomplete, with about 5 yards being gained through the three completed passes.

Winters passed 14 times; five were completed for about 25 yards gain; two were intercepted.
