PEARSE SUCCUMBS TO AUTO WRECK INJURIES

Archie D. Pearse, age 26 years, died at 7:55 o'clock Sunday evening in the Halley & Love Sanitarium, from injuries received Thursday night about 9:30 o'clock on the Ballinger-San Angelo highway, when a Ford touring car in which he and Bill Mitchell were riding, collided with three other cars that had previously figured in a smash-up. Death was caused by concussion of the brain.

The car in which the two men were riding is reported to have turned over three times after it had struck the wrecked cars in the road.

Pearse never recovered consciousness after the accident. He was brought here about 11:30 o'clock Thursday night.

Pearse was born on June 29, 1900, and for a greater part of his life he has lived in Ballinger. He attended school here for some time. Later he quit school and started working for various cafes and bakeries here. He had worked here off and on for the past few years.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the home of his mother, Mrs. W. A. Pearse, 409 Sealy Avenue, with Miss Nellie Hill, pastor of the Nazarene church, officiating. Interment was made in Evergreen Cemetery.

Members of Company C, 142nd Infantry Regiment, Texas National Guard, acted as pallbearers. A United States flag draped the casket. Pearse was a corporal in Company C and had made most of the National Guard training camps held in the state.

Young Pearse is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Pearse, five brothers and two sisters.

OPINIONS DIFFER IN MURDER TRIAL

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Nov. 29.—Differences of opinion between Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall and of Special Prosecutor Alexander Simpson, over the definition of the word "casualty" continued here in the cross-examination of Mrs. Hall today.

The prosecutor held that the word meant "violent death."

The dispute arose from the testimony of Mrs. Hall, to the effect that she called police headquarters over the telephone on the morning the bodies of her husband, Rev. Edward Wheeler Hall, and Mrs. Eleanor Mills, were found, and asked if there had been any casualties reported.

TELEPHONES ON INCREASE HERE

Sixty-one new customers have been added to the list of subscribers of the West Texas Telephone Company in Ballinger, since Jan. 1, 1926. M. C. Atkins, manager of the local office, announced Monday. This now gives the company 1,148 subscribers in Ballinger.

This denotes that the city is gradually growing and that many new families are moving here each month.

There are believed to be in the city limits between 150 and 200 homes that do not have telephones, and most of these families are believed to be of five or more members.

The company estimates that there is one telephone in the city to every five persons which, when figured out, gives Ballinger a population of between 5,500 and 6,500. The city is gradually growing as the number of phone subscribers will show. A number of new homes are being erected and new telephone subscribers are coming in each month.

DEMME PERFECTS NEW COTTON-STALK CUTTER

H. F. Demmer, local blacksmith and wheelwright, has recently perfected a new cotton-stalk cutter, which for the past week has been in action on the Joe Oliver farm, four miles North of Ballinger. It will also be in action this week.

Mr. Demmer believes this invention will be of much benefit to the farmer as the machine cuts two rows of stalks at a time and also works over the ground as it cuts the stalks. It is constructed so that the man who is operating

the machine is able to ride instead of walk behind the cutter. Other cutters used in this section have had to be connected with some other piece of farm machinery before they could be used and then the work was very unsatisfactory.

This new cutter has five blades and they are only a short distance apart. The blades revolve as the implement moves and thus the stalks are pulverized.

Mr. Demmer has no patent on this machine. He buys the parts and puts them together so as to make a very successful machine. It is declared.

Some Dakota Highways Paved with Gold Ore

LEAD, S. D., Nov. 29.—Miles of highway in the Black Hills of South Dakota are literally paved with gold.

For many years gold mines up in the hills used the amalgam process of refining, by which the ore is crushed to fragments and run across metal plates through chemicals which withdraw 85 per cent of the gold content.

Mountains of crushed ore, still containing fifteen per cent of the original gold, piled up beside the shafts, and when road building began on a big scale, communities appropriated it to surface highways.
