CHINESE SITUATION REMAINS THE SAME

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, March 28.—The pall of anxiety which has hovered over Washington since the Chinese situation became acute was lifted slightly but perceptibly today by the word that another day had passed without a serious outbreak or anti-foreign violence in that war-ridden country.

Admiral Williams, commanding the concentration of American ships and marines at Shanghai, reported to the Navy Department that he had returned to shipboard a landing force from the cruiser Pittsburgh, which was rushed ashore when it was learned that the Chinese would make a demonstration in demanding the concessions and international settlements be returned to their hands.

AMOY, March 28.—All Americans in the interior of the province of Fukien have been ordered to concentrate here as a precaution against any possible anti-foreign outbreaks.

The local situation remains calm but there is much agitation.

SHANGHAI, March 28.—Leaflets and hand-bills passed out today by agitators of Shanghai place the responsibility for the Nanking incident on the British and make no mention of the Americans.

A boycott of British goods and the calling out of all employees of Britishers are among the reprisals advocated by the agitators.

ABILENE, March 28.—A posse of more than 1,000 men abandoned the search last night for two robbers who Saturday robbed the First State Bank of Ovalo of nearly \$4,000.

Officers, however, are continuing their search in the mountainous country near here where the car in which the men escaped was found early Sunday morning. Ranger Captain Tom Hickman arrived here today to take charge of the search.

GETS TWO YEAR TERM IN SADDLE THEFT CASE

Jim Johnson, in jail here charged with horse theft, got two years in the Irion county district court before being brought here, on a charge of stealing a saddle.

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams brought Johnson here from Sherwood a short time ago after he had entered a plea of guilty in the saddle theft case. He has been unable to make bond.

SUIT AGAINST FORD CONTINUES

Sapiro's attorneys sought to eliminate 54 of the allegations. The court has taken the defense motion under advisement.

MOODY SIGNS 65 NEW BILLS

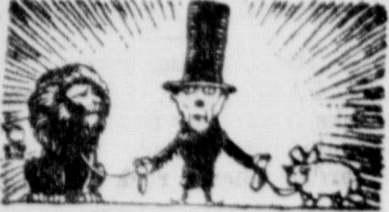

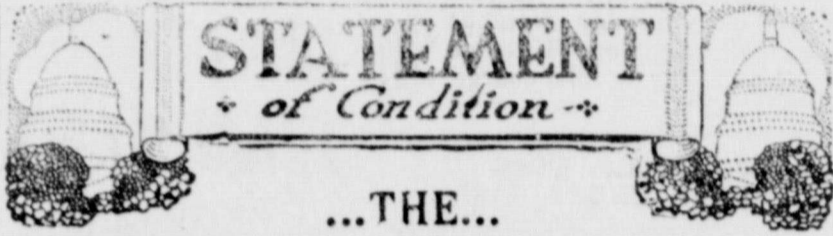
J. R. Staleup, principal of the Brownwood high school, was elected vice-president of the organization.

Alters Corn Belt Skyline



(By Associated Press) URBANA, Ill., March 28.—Scientists of the University of Illinois have grown corn so tall it has to be husked from a step-ladder, and so short the hogs can reach the ears without stretching. They have grown "fat" and "lean" corn—with a high protein content for feeding to stock, and a high percentage of oil for manufacturing use. And they have increased the number of two-eared stalks.

Thirty-one years of research have enabled the experimenters to regulate the composition of the kernel, to alter the height at which the ears are borne, and to grow more ears to a stalk.

Corn would be better food for animals, and for some human purposes, if it had lots of protein and little oil. On the other hand, manufacturers who make corn products want a kernel rich in oil and carbohydrates and with little protein.

Starting in 1896 with corn containing 10.92 per cent of protein and 4.7 per cent of oil, the experimenters have developed one strain with 18.17 per cent of protein and another with only 6.49 per cent; a strain with an oil content of 10.21 per cent, and another with only 1.43 per cent of oil; a tall stalk whose ears were 108.9 inches from the ground, and a short one with ears only 11.4 inches high.

The protein content thus has been made to vary 6.22 per cent; the oil content 8.78 per cent, and the height of the ear more than eight feet. In the last crop, 47.8 per cent of the measured stalks bore two ears.

Some of the practical reasons which prompted the experiment have disappeared with changed economic conditions, but the research has proved the ability of science to change by selective breeding the character of the corn plant and the composition of the grain.

Matchmakers of European Royalty Buzzing; Juliana of Holland Will Soon Be of Age

(By Associated Press) THE HAGUE, Mar. 28.—Royal matchmakers, attention!

Princess Juliana will be 18 years old on April 30. She will then have a castle of her own, and her income from the government will be considerably augmented.

Some day she will probably be queen of 60,000,000 people. Her fortune coming from the House of Orange-Nassau will be one of the greatest in Europe.

It would have been easy to provide a husband for Juliana if the Great War had not come about. The Minister of Foreign Affairs would have called the roll of German princes and Juliana would have selected the one most to her liking just as her mother did. But times have changed.

German principalities, duchies and kingdoms have been swept away, and monarchies which still exist do not care much for the titles of those which have been blended into the German Republic.

Juliana hardly would marry Olaf, the Crown Prince of Norway, as they are both in direct line for a throne. The same is true of Juliana and the Prince of Wales.

Juliana's husband must be a prince who is willing to move to Holland and remain here permanently in the same inconspicuous position Prince Hendrik occupies. And being a Prince Consort is not an especially desirable job.

Prince Henry and Prince

George, the younger sons of King George of England, would be eligible matches for Princess Juliana. Also Prince Charles, the second son of King Albert of Belgium. But as the Belgian house is Catholic, a marriage with the Protestant house of Orange-Nassau is regarded as unlikely.

Prince Knud, second son of King Christian of Denmark, who is now 26, is regarded as a likely suitor for Juliana's hand. The Danish house is not nearly as rich as the House of Orange-Nassau.

Prince Sigvard, second son of the Crown Prince of Sweden, who will be 20 next June, is another youngster in favor. Prince Lenart, the eighteen-year-old son of Prince Wilhelm of Sweden, second son of the King of Sweden, is another prospect.

Juliana will be a co-ed at Leyden University next autumn. The Queen has decided it is best for her daughter to have some special courses there in economics, politics and history to prepare her for the work of administering the great empire in the East Indies and Europe, which will some day come under her control.

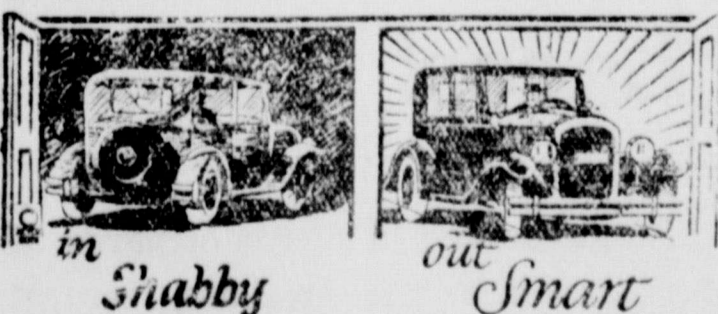
