FIVE CITIES ASK FOR '28 MEET OF E.T.C.C.

(By Associated Press) TYLER, April 20.—The year's co-operative effort of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce was reviewed by R. M. Keely, president of the organization in his address to the first annual convention here today.

Keely said that the record of the chamber was without parallel and attributed its phenomenal growth to the widespread and growing demand for the organization and the service it renders.

From nothing last June, the commercial body has grown to a membership of about 4,000, and has demonstrated, according to the president, that all East Texas can and will join in the great co-operative undertaking.

A hot fight for the 1928 convention was in prospect today between Greenville, Marshall, Palestine, Paris and Beaumont.

Ten special trains were due here today to bring delegates and visitors from many sections of the state. Automobile caravans are also arriving.

Sleeping accommodations for 2,500 people have been provided for in private homes in addition to the hotel accommodations for 3,500.

Among the prominent persons here who will address the convention are Governor Dan Moody, Senator Morris Shepperd and Senator Earle B. Mayfield.

FORT WORTH HERE TONIGHT

The Fort Worth boosters, some 40 of them, travelling in two big busses, are scheduled to arrive in Ballinger this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock from Abilene, on a trade trip of three days through this section of the state.

The boosters left Fort Worth early Tuesday morning and spent last night in Albany. The luncheon hour was spent in Mineral Wells Tuesday. Today they ate lunch with the Kiwanis Club in Abilene. They will spend tonight at the Central Hotel and start their return trip to Fort Worth Thursday morning early by the way of Cross Plains and Cisco.

The Ballinger Band, under the direction of H. H. Carsey will play a concert tonight at the court house lawn at 7:30 o'clock, following which Judge Alfred Cramer will deliver an address of welcome to the boosters.

Every loyal citizen of Ballinger is requested to be at the court house park tonight and give the visitors a royal welcome. The program will be short and snappy.

ONLY ONE CIVIL CASE FILED HERE RECENTLY

Only one civil case has been filed in district court here since February 21st, according to the docket in the office of Miss Georgia Singletary, district clerk. This was a suit for debt, filed on April 15th. The next court term here is in October.

CHINA REFUSES RUSS DEMANDS

(By Associated Press) PARIS, April 20.—Rejection by the Peking government of the demands of the Russian Soviet government in connection with the raid on the Soviet buildings in the embassy compound at Peking, was reported in a dispatch to the Indo Pacific Agency today.

The raid, on orders of the Northern Chinese authorities, was carried out on April 6.

NINETEEN DEAD IN TORNADO

(By Associated Press)

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 20.—The casualty list of yesterday's tornado which struck sections of five counties, today stood at 19 dead, 9 others listed as probably fatally injured, and about 100 less seriously hurt.

Property damage is estimated at \$1,000,000.

TO SPUD TEST ON SIMS TRACT SOON

C. M. Cole, San Angelo drilling contractor, will spud the test well of the Noble Oil & Gas Company and J. A. Johnson, on the Sims tract, 12 miles south of here, J. J. McHenry survey, section 12, some time this week, it was reported here Wednesday.

The contract calls for a 3,500-foot hole.

Lou Ladd-McMillan No. 1, on the Domingo Diaz survey, 10 miles north of Ballinger, resumed drilling Wednesday afternoon after several days delay. Casing was set Wednesday morning to 1,440 feet.

NEW YORK, April 20.—The North American Newspaper Alliance was informed today that Lieutenant George Wilkins, Arctic flyer, who has been missing since March 29th when he hopped off from Point Barrow, Alaska, for unexplored regions to the northeast, made a safe return to Beach Point.

150,000 Suffering from Floods; Disease Hits Many in Camps

Boys and Girls of 4-H Clubs to Have National Camp in Capital



(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, April 20.—One of the unique meetings to be held in the national capital will be the encampment here June 16-23 of the First National Farm Boys' and Girls' 4-H Club Camp.

There are now more than 40,000 local 4-H clubs in the country, with nearly 600,000 members. Their symbol is the four leaf clover, the four H's stand for "Head, Heart, Hands and Health."

The camp will be pitched on the Mall, near the Bureau of Plant Industry, and in addition to the various camp activities, arrangements have been made for many educational tours for the farm boys and girls who will be lucky enough to attend.

Two boys and two girls will be selected by each state to represent its 4-H Clubs. These will be accompanied by two state club leaders, a man and woman from each state, and all will be chosen for their exceptional work in connection with farm stock, home economics and leadership activities.

Conferences will be held for the leaders and club members in the auditorium of the National Museum and many of the old timers in the agricultural extension movement will be present for "Pioneers' Day," on June 20.

MEMPHIS, April 20.—It was estimated today that 150,000 persons are suffering from the flooding of the Mississippi Valley, and that 50,000 of these are refugees.

Calculations here placed the land covered by water at a minimum of 4,000,000 acres.

POPULATION OF FARMS DECREASE

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, April 20.—A decrease of 659,000 persons of the farm population of the United States during the last year, was the largest decrease of any year since 1920, it was announced today by the Department of Agriculture.

The department estimated that 27,892,000 persons were living on farms on January 1, 1927.
