## 500 EXPECTED HERE SATURDAY FOR RALLY

Between 400 and 500 boys and girls, members of the Runnels county rural clubs, and their parents, are expected to be in Ballinger Saturday, May 14th, for the joint rally of the boys' and girls' clubs here, C. W. Lehmborg, county agricultural agent, said Wednesday morning.

"A fine program has been prepared," Mr. Lehmborg said, "and all the club members seem very anxious to attend the rally, therefore almost every member is expected to attend."

In the boys' clubs there are around 275 members and all are expected to be in the city for the big gathering. Mrs. Lura Hollingsworth, county home agent, who is in charge of the girls' clubs with a membership of about 125, expects a majority of the girls to be present also.

The opening exercises will be conducted at the court house at 9:00 o'clock, by Rev. J. H. McClain, pastor of the local Baptist church. At 9:15 a pep meeting will be held in the court house auditorium and following that a parade will be held and the club members will be treated to a special matinee performance at a local picture show.

The picture show is the compliments of W. D. Seales, manager of the Palace Theatre, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce. Educational reels will be shown at the Palace Theatre starting at 10:45 o'clock. Two reels on dairying will be projected, one on the hog industry, and one on poultrying. A two reel comedy will complete the picture program.

Talks by prominent citizens and club workers will be made during the afternoon, including one by Mrs. Dora Barnes, clothing specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

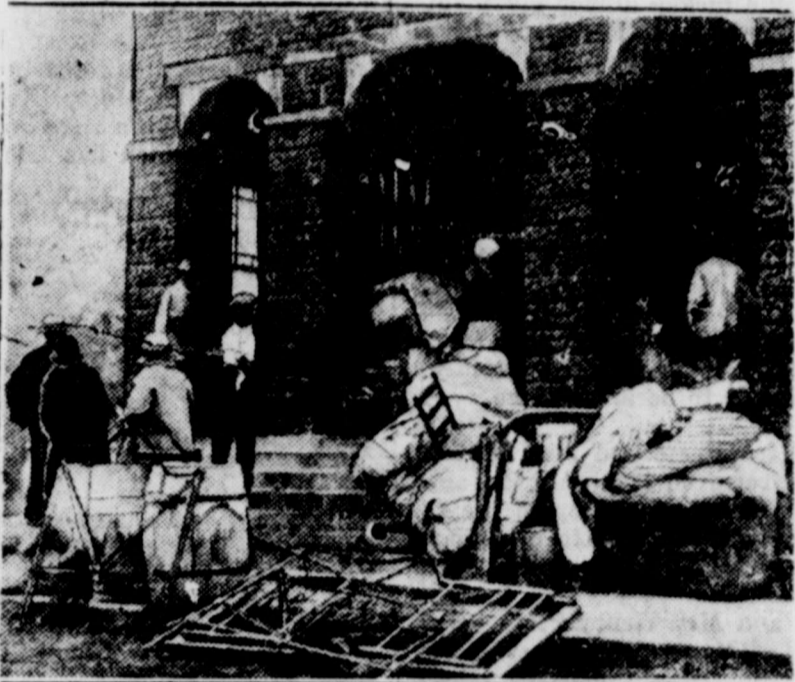

## HOUSE REVOLT IS PROBABLE

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, May 11.—Rumblings of a revolt continued in the House today, as the "conservative bloc," formed at a near-indignation meeting last night, marshalled its forces behind an economy program in the appropriations and circulated a petition seeking to repeal the judges' salary raise law passed at the regular session of the legislature.

The petition was signed by thirty-five representatives and addressed to Governor Moody seeking to have him submit to the special session the question of repealing the law. It had not been presented today.

Two civil service reform bills and the one introduced on Monday were referred to committees.

The bill to create a new state board of education, and one correcting the new law eliminating manslaughter as a recognized offense, were introduced.

The monthly report of Mrs. Jennie Kirk, county treasurer, was approved, and all bills presented were gone over and approved.

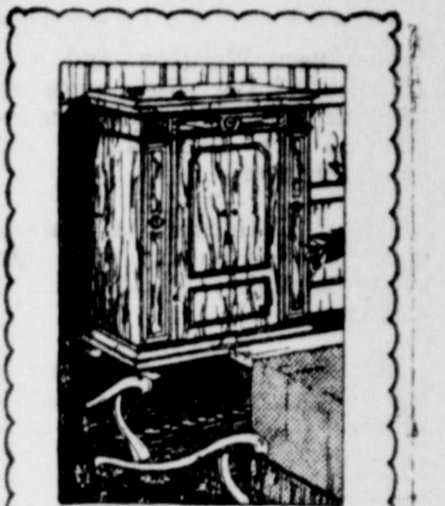

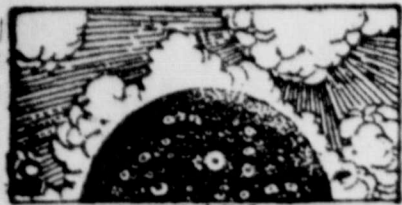

(By Associated Press) ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 7.—A chuckle for his achievements is a Ritchie characteristic, and observers of "Bert's" career in Maryland wag their heads and chuckle also.

For Albert Cabell Ritchie, Virginian by birth, Marylander by tradition and his state's handsomest man by popular acclaim, has three times trod the path to the State House in inaugural procession. Never since 1634 has Maryland allowed any man to do that more than once.

The governor's friends think he would like to be President of the United States, though the governor rarely speaks of it, even with his intimates.

In the 1920 convention he attracted attention by framing a plank branding the Volstead Act as "draconic and unreasonable." The governor is still opposed to the Volstead Act as a state enforcement measure, though he has signed a number of local prohibition measures.

PIONEER CITIZEN BURIED IN OLD RUNNELS CEMETERY

John R. Stubblefield, 84 years of age, was buried in the Old Runnels cemetery last Friday afternoon, following his death at his home on Valley Creek, ten miles northwest of Ballinger. Mr. Stubblefield had been a resident of Runnels county since 1901.

Mr. Stubblefield was born at Elm Store, Ark., on February 27, 1843. He served four years in the Civil War and in 1865 married Miss Jane Robinson, in Perry county, Ark., to which union was born three children. Two have died. W. P. Stubblefield, who was here for the funeral, was the third. The first wife died in 1869.

Later he married Miss Melissa McCullough at Elm Store, Ark., in 1871. Four children were born to them, one of which has since

died. The others are Mrs. D. E. Campbell and J. H. Stubblefield, of Ballinger; and Mrs. M. E. Parsons, of Denton. They were all here for the funeral. Mr. Stubblefield's second wife died in 1880.

On July 13, 1884, he married Miss Rebecca Wilkerson, at Myrtle, Mo. Four children were born to them. Two of them died, the other two were here for the funeral. They were Mrs. W. O. Lawdmy, of San Angelo; and Miss Ora Stubblefield, of Ballinger. A number of grandchildren and great grandchildren were here for the funeral.

In 1889, Mr. Stubblefield came to Texas and settled near Plano, Collin county. From there he moved to near Caddo Mills, Hunt county, in 1893, where he resided until 1901, when he moved to Runnels county.

Mr. Stubblefield was buried by the side of his third wife, who

died here four years ago. Rev. J. H. McClain, pastor of the Ballinger Baptist Church, was in charge of the funeral services.

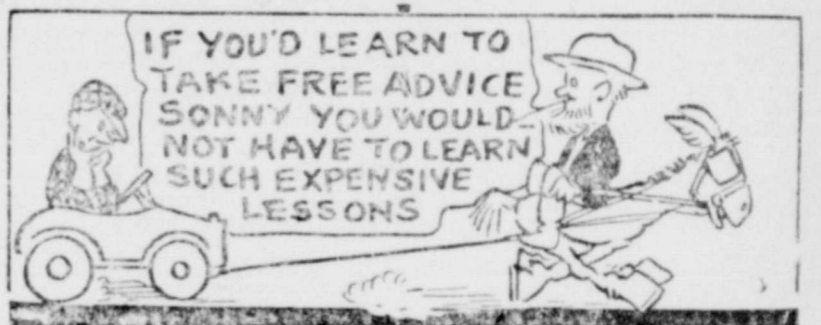

**Movies Test Chemicals, Too; Even Epsom Salts Have Role**



(By Associated Press)  
**HOLLYWOOD, Calif., May 11.** Motion pictures, having put the human race through a sieve in the search for "types" and striking screen personalities, are doing the same thing with chemicals.

Practically every organic and inorganic compound is given a "screen test" in the research laboratories where chemists are seeking new color formulae, new tones and photographic values.

The list of elements, compounds and combinations already in the chemical cast of the movies ranges alphabetically from aluminum to zirconium.

The chemicals are tested by such men as John Nickolaus, head of a studio laboratory, who developed several new color effects for "Ben Hur" with processes involving the electrolytic precipitation of metallic elements on the film.

Of the compounds regularly employed in making pictures, hyposulphite of soda is so abundantly used that it might be called the "mob" chemical. It is ordered in carload lots, and in solution is piped about the laboratory, like water. All films go through "hypo" baths.

More aristocratic is a patented compound used in removing celluloid from the film. It is as costly in its way as a ranking star.

Silver nitrate could qualify as the villain of the chemical cast of characters. It is poisonous, but one can't make a picture without it. Playing a sort of parson's role is acetone, a celluloid solvent used in splicing films.

Iodine, the familiar household remedy for cuts and bruises, plays a romantic role. It helps make blue moonlight scenes so appropriate for love-making. And
