CAN'T FIND FLOGGED FAMILY

MARSHALL, Tex., June 14.—A search for W. A. Straps and family, who disappeared from home Sunday held the attention of the authorities here today in the flogging case which resulted in state rangers being sent here and the promise of federal investigation with a possible peonage angle.
Straps and his wife were two of four victims of a masked band which last Wednesday visited two homes in the Western part of Harrison county.

LEVINE-PUPPE NOW AGREE

(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, June 14.—A conference today between legal representatives of Charles Levine and Dr. Puppe, a German financial promoter, brought a satisfactory provisional compromise definitely removing the possibility of an attachment against the trans-Atlantic monoplane Columbia.
The German had threatened attachment if a sum was not paid him for work which he claims to have done in promoting negotiations for a loan on behalf of Levine with various steel mills of Germany two years ago.
Under the terms suggested by the lawyers, both parties will make apologies and Levine will pay a sum of money to Puppe.

MORE COTTON USED IN MAY

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Cotton consumed during May totaled 633,024 bales of lint and 72,766 bales of linters, compared with 516,376 bales of lint and 65,199 bales of linters in May of last year, the Census Bureau announced today.

LINDY GOES TO GET HIS PLANE

NEW YORK, June 14.—The Evening World says that it learned from Harry Bruno that Col. Charles A. Lindbergh had slipped away from the city today on his way to Washington.
Bruno, who is associated with Richard Blythe, Lindbergh's representative, was quoted as saying that Lindbergh intended to fly his trans-Atlantic plane back to New York this afternoon.

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., June 14.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh made an unexpected visit to Mitchell Field on Long Island today apparently with the intention of flying to Washington to get his trans-Atlantic plane "The Spirit of St. Louis." He left the field, however, when a study of the weather map convinced him that flying conditions were unfavorable.

14 CONVICTS MAKE ESCAPE

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, June 14.—An extensive search is being made around the territory about Houston for 21 Mexican convicts who escaped from the Blue Ridge state prison farm Monday night.
The break was made while 64 convicts were eating supper. Two dozen men dropped one at a time through a hole in the floor under a table. The guards were standing nearby.

POLICE ARREST 150 STRIKERS

Long lines of strikers paraded today despite the rain. Some of the marchers wore steel helmets, which they said were for protection from police clubs.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—The Stars and Stripes, that stirring emblem symbolizing all of the ideals which have fostered the United States and made it great as a nation, is 150 years old today.

The rough journal of the Second Continental Congress discloses this entry among a series of marine committee resolutions adopted June 14, 1777:

"Resolved, That the flag of the United States be 13 stripes alternate red and white, that the Union be 13 stars white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

Today, throughout the nation, wherever the flag is revered, the sesquicentennial of that act is being celebrated by officials, patriotic societies and individuals, under the guidance of the United States Flag Association, of which Col. James A. Moss, retired, is founder and director general.

The flag to which homage is being paid today, with its 48 stars and 13 stripes, not only represents the ideals on which the nation is based but pictures its growth in 150 years from a group of 13 British colonies fighting for independence to a world power comprising 48 closely knit states.

Who designed and made the first United States flag under the resolution of the Continental Congress, and what became of it, remains a disputed question among historians. It seems to be established, however, that it was created to meet the need of the struggling republic's revolutionary navy, and that John Paul

Jones, who was given command of the Ranger in the same series of resolutions which included the first flag act, was the first to raise it aloft with his own hands on his new ship.

Eighteen years passed after adoption of the first flag resolution before congress moved to make the act more specific and to allow for representation in the flag's design of new states, declaring that after May 1, 1795, the emblem should have 15 stars and 15 stripes. Such a flag, flying from the ramparts of Fort Mifflin during the British attack on Baltimore, inspired Frances Scott Key to write "The Star Spangled Banner." Not until 1818 was the act passed restoring the original number of stripes, determining that they should be horizontal, and making provision for the addition of a star in the blue canton to represent each state as it was admitted to the union.

COUNTY GETS HALF INCH RAIN

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, June 14.—Rainfall estimated at a million dollars value overspread the cotton belt Monday night and today brings reports of great benefits to agriculture from numerous points in Texas.
Precipitation at Waco assumed proportions of a cloudburst, washing out crops and flooding some of the city streets.
A general drop of temperature averaging thirty degrees accompanied the rain.

No points in Runnels county reported much over half an inch rain for Monday. The precipitation east of Ballinger seemed to be a little heavier with Talpa reporting one inch, Crews .75 and Brownwood a good rain. The rain was general, however, and no place in Runnels failed to get some moisture and most all communities reported about the same that fell in Ballinger or more.

The showers and change of temperature will do a great deal of good to growing crops, although more rain will be needed to put enough moisture in the ground to withstand the hot days which will follow.
Abilene, Brownwood, Brady, San Angelo, Stacy and Fort Chadbourne report good rains.

Spectacular War Background in "The Great Deception"

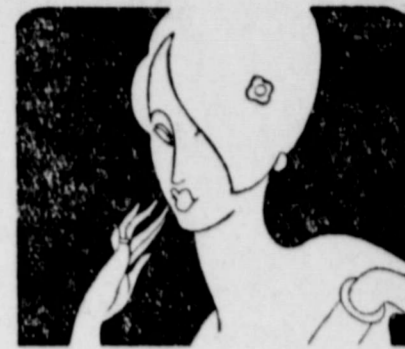

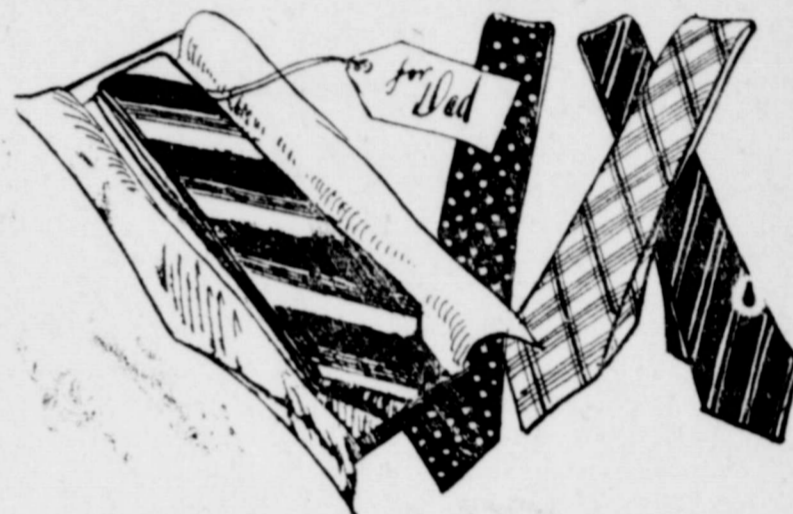
