1 Dead Many Missing In Big Oil Fire

W.T.U.C BUYS 6 TEXAS PLANTS

AUSTIN, Jan. 28.—The secretary of state today approved the acquisition by the West Texas Utilities Company of Abilene, of six West Texas corporations, including the Abilene Ice Company, the San Angelo Water, Light & Power Company, the Quanah Light & Ice Company, the West Texas Ice Company of Haskell, the Cisco Ice Company and the Texas Plains Public Service Company of Abilene.
The consideration was not specified.

SAN ANTONIO MAN PURCHASES SEWERAGE PLANT

Terrell Bartlett and associates have purchased the sewer system of Ballinger from Mrs. Tom Ward and Judge Paul Trimmer, who have owned it for a number of years, at private terms.
Mr. Bartlett is one of the leading engineers of Texas. He is head of the Terrell Bartlett Engineers, Inc., of San Antonio, and widely known over the state. He has had extensive experience in planning and supervising construction and installation of municipal water and sewer systems.
A few months ago Mr. Bartlett secured an option to purchase the Ballinger sewer system and sent engineers who spent several weeks here in making a thorough examination and appraisal of the plant. He was so well pleased that he exercised his purchase option and acquired for himself and associates the entire capital stock and assets of the Sanitary Sewerage Company.
Mr. Bartlett was here Friday afternoon and stated that he had great faith in the future of Ballinger and it is believed that he will make extension of the system as required to meet growing needs of the city.
J. M. Garlington has been made local manager and past policies of former owners will be continued. Mr. Garlington has looked after collections for several years and is familiar with the system and its operation.
After closing the deal here Friday afternoon, Mr. Bartlett left for Sweetwater, where he is employed by the city on a new water project. The city of Sweetwater is reported to be without water.

TO TAKE ACTION ON WATER LATER

Nothing has yet resulted from the water meeting held Friday morning at the Chamber of Commerce offices when Brownwood and San Saba men explained the compromise between the citizens of Brownwood and the Syndicate Power Company.
These men came here asking Ballinger citizens to endorse a resolution that would settle the battle between the power company and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, if all commercial organizations in this section endorsed the proposal.
The hearty endorsement received at San Saba and Junction failed to materialize at the meeting here and it is not believed Ballinger citizens will see fit to endorse the matter. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce entered the fight at the request of Brownwood to aid all West Texas as it was expressed by several representatives present and it now appears that Brownwood with its wishes partly granted, wants the Chamber to drop the fight and leave the other West Texas cities where they were before the battle began. At least that was the opinion expressed by several local citizens. Brownwood has a permit for more water and Ballinger citizens are glad this neighboring city has the water, but Ballinger it is said will look out for itself in this matter and not do anything that will likely prevent this city from obtaining a water permit.
It is thought here that Ballinger will send a delegation to Austin in the near future to apply for more water for municipal uses as this city is steadily growing and more water will be necessary soon.

INDIAN WAR SURVIVOR GRANTED \$50 PENSION BY U. S. GOVERNMENT

(By International News Service) BLACKBURN, Eng., Jan. 27.—Jacob Haworth, one of the three known survivors of the American Redskin wars, has been granted a pension of \$50 a month from the United States government in recognition of his services in the countless American campaigns against the Indians of fifty years ago.

Haworth, who retired as a sergeant in the 11th Infantry Regiment of the U. S. Army in the days when Indian raids against the white settlements were a daily feature, fought against the Sioux Indians in Dakota, and was present when Gov. Fletcher and Bishop Whipple witnessed the signing of the treaty between the Indians and the whites.

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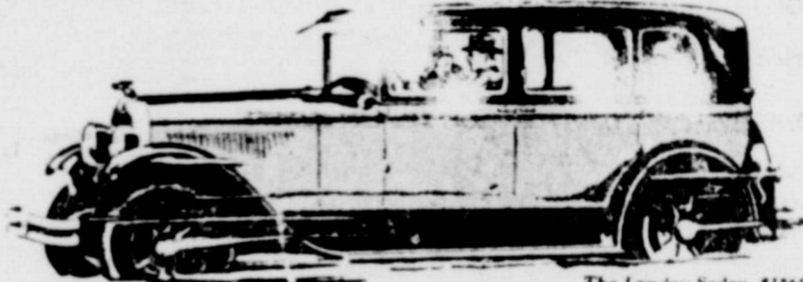

EUROPE PLANES CARRY 125,000 PEOPLE YEARLY

By J. C. Oestreicher
(International News Service Staff Correspondent)

LONDON, Jan. 28.—Out of the dreams of visionaries, surviving the onslaughts of skeptics and critics alike, the airplane emerges in Europe today as an unparalleled potential factor in long-distance transportation of passengers and merchandise.

Approximately 125,000 passengers are carried yearly on the existing airlines of this continent, and widespread development is contemplated.

The governments of Europe have awarded the operators of air lines tremendous annual subsidies, to cover material losses incurred during the early stages of development, and the rapidity with which the airplane has found popular favor as a means of transportation, seems to have justified their interest.

Nations Assist

Great Britain, France, Germany, Holland, Norway, Sweden, and Russia, in particular, have contributed heavily to the popularization of commercial air lines as important to the development of the modern nation as the establishment of railroad lines and steamship routes were a few decades ago.

It has not been a matter of a few thousand dollars, but millions. It has not been a matter of half-hearted interest, but rather co-operation to the greatest extent possible in order to bring aviation to the plane upon which it stands today.

In April, 1924, the British government brought into being the Imperial Airways, Ltd., representing a merger of the four commercial air lines which prior to that time were floundering about without the much-needed aid of governmental funds.

The Imperial Airways, Ltd., was awarded a subsidy of approximately \$685,000 a year for ten years, diminishing gradually until it became \$160,000 at the end of a decade.

Whether the project justified the government's trust may be shown in the following figures. During 1919 British airplanes carried fifty-two passengers across the English Channel, its main route, now the main route of Imperial Airways.

This number increased during the ensuing years, until in 1925, 10,602 persons chose to fly instead of making the trip by steamer. Since January 1, 1925, until January 1, 1928, the Imperial Airways has carried 52,000 passengers across the Channel, without a single injury to their passengers.

Allowing for this state subsidy, the company's net profit for the year amounted to nearly \$90,000, compared with a net loss of \$100,000 for the previous year.

Across the Channel

Daily trips are made across the Channel. There are first and second class planes, the latter being the same type machine, just as well equipped, but leaving at a less convenient hour in the morning and carrying heavy baggage as well as passengers.

The routes of the Imperial Air-

ways in Europe are as follows:
London to Paris, May to September, twice daily—October to April, daily.

London-Paris-Basle-Zurich—May to September, daily.

London-Ostend-Amsterdam—May to September, twice daily.

London-Cologne—May to September, daily. October to April, daily.

Southampton-Channell Islands—May to September, weekly. October to April, weekly.

Connections are made from Amsterdam and Cologne to Hamburg, Copenhagen, Malmo, Hanover and Berlin.

DRIED HEART OF FROG IS MADE TO BEAT BY RUSSIAN PROFESSOR

(By International News Service)
BERLIN, Jan. 28.—Bringing a so-called "dead" heart to life has become a comparatively frequent achievement of modern surgeons, but it remained for a Russian scientist, Professor Morosow, to bring to life a heart taken from the body and dried.
Professor Morosow, of the Institute of Experimental Biology in Moscow, reports his experiments in the German "Clinical Weekly."

He relates how he removed a frog's heart, dried it down to 60 per cent of its normal weight, then treated it with salt solution, and thereafter watched it pulsate regularly 13 1/2 hours. The salt solution used was Ringer's solution. When he used the "hormone of heart movement" discovered by the German professor, Haberlandt, he was able to accelerate the pulsations of the isolated heart to double the ordinary speed.

Scientists here deduce from the Morosow experiments that the heart of all animals works more independently of the body than had previously been supposed. No immediate therapeutic results have been reached, but it is hoped that sooner or later a perfected "hormone of heart movement" will be found which will be useful in reviving persons who would otherwise succumb to heart attacks.

ANOTHER U S ARTIST RECOGNIZED IN FRANCE

(By International News Service)
PARIS, Jan. 28.—Another American artist has been recognized by the French government. It has recently purchased a water, "The Placide Tertre," by Nelson McCleary, a native of Missouri, the pupil of E. A. Huppert and G. Van Millet.

Mr. McCleary has been working in Paris for some time in the studios of Pierre Vigne and Henri Marquet and his water-colors have been accepted at the Salon National des Beaux Arts, the Salon des Artistes Francais and the Salon des Humpristes.

SEE NEW HOPE IN FIGHT ON CANCER

(By International News Service)
LONDON, Jan. 27.—Great interest has been aroused in London medical circles by news of a fresh treatment for cancer which has been applied, it is stated, with great success, in Madeira recently.

The news is communicated by Dr. Michael Graham, a very distinguished Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians, London, who for many years has been associated with cancer research. He states that Dr. Fortunato Pitta, of Funchal, found accidentally that a few drops of matryer discharge of "trachoma" (inflammation of the eyelids) injected into a growing cancer, caused immediate arrest in vitality of the growth followed by disintegration of the malignant mass, with disappearance also of the secondary gland enlargements.

It also appears that the virus or agency which affects the disintegration of the growth is selective in action, leaving healthy tissue, and tumors other than malignant, untouched. The dissolved malignant growth is discharged through a subsequent small incision.

Until Dr. Pitta's virus has been received in this country, and subjected to thorough tests, medical opinion is reserved. It is hoped that the Ross Institute of Tropical Diseases will make investigation on the spot. Up to now, it has not even been discovered whether the attacking organism is of a bacteriological or chemical nature.
