Hundreds Visit Farm and Home Special Train Here

Several hundred persons visited the Santa Fe's farm demonstration train in Ballinger Tuesday evening. The crowd, while entirely satisfactory to those in charge of the train, would have been larger had it not been for a cold north wind which developed late in the day. The special arrived from Santa Anna about 7 o'clock and was parked near the Santa Fe station where a meeting was held, the speakers appearing on a flat car as a lecture platform. An electrically controlled loud speaker was used.

The train is being operated by the Santa Fe in co-operation with the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College as a means of boosting diversified farming throughout the state, and especially in the territory served by the Santa Fe Railway. The train was similar in many respects to the "Cow, Sow and Hen" train which was operated through Ballinger five years ago, but the exhibits prepared by the college carried better lessons, and in addition one entire car was devoted to home demonstration.

As explained by L. F. Dinan, agricultural agent, the Santa Fe is interested in the many communities it serves from the standpoint of a taxpayer, an investor, employer of labor and a public carrier. Only as these communities prosper can the railroad company prosper, he said, and pointed out that throughout Texas and other portions of the Southwest, all are largely dependent upon agriculture. Therefore, he said the Santa Fe was interested in doing everything possible to promote a better system of agriculture.

Your own Agricultural and Mechanical College has worked out a program intended to make your farming operations more profitable," said Mr. Dinan in opening the program here, "and we are running the train in order that the program may be presented to you. It is our contribution to furthering and encouraging the work of the extension service of the college which we strongly endorse. We have virtually placed the best in the extension service on wheels and brought it to you."

After explaining the purposes of the train, Mr. Dinan turned the program over to C. W. Lehmburg, county agent, who introduced the college speakers who discussed better methods of feeding and handling livestock and dairy cows, poultry raising, crops and soils, boys and girls 4-H club work and home improvement. The speaking program lasted about 45 minutes, after which the train was opened for inspection.

Leaving Ballinger about 10 o'clock, the train proceeded to Sterling City, where a meeting was held early Wednesday morning. Other towns visited that day included San Angelo, Miles, and Paint Rock. The train is covering all of the Santa Fe's

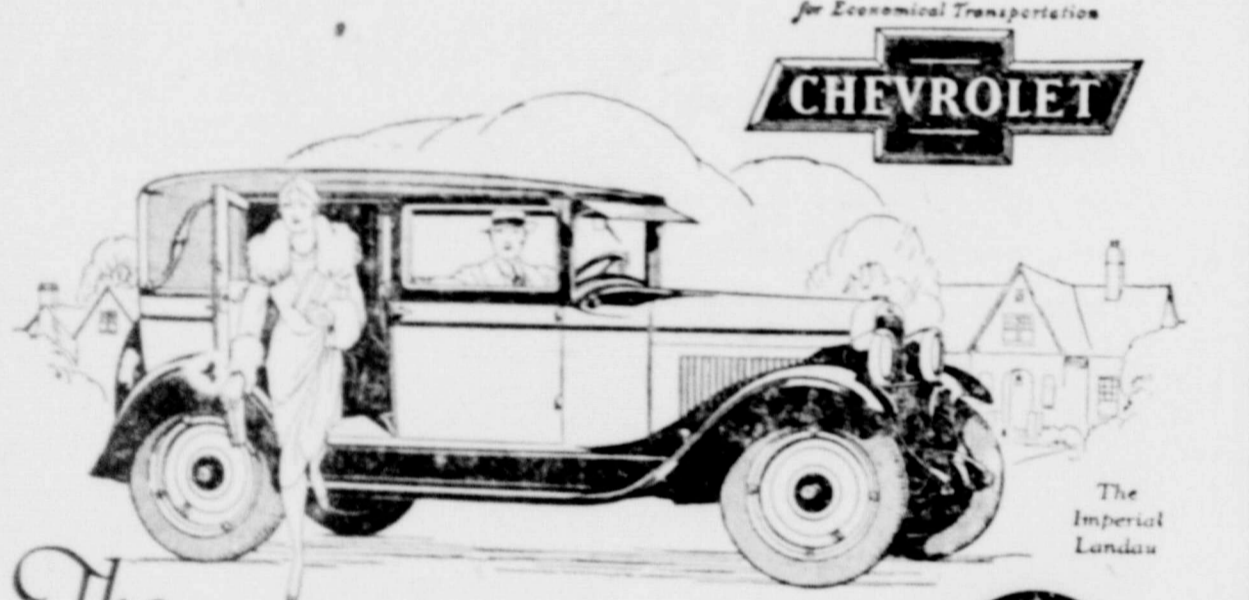

lines in Texas and will be out for a period of six weeks. Prior to reaching Ballinger the train had held 65 meetings with a total attendance of 66,254, an average of slightly more than 1,000 persons per meeting.

The 1928 Texas farm and home special is the third agricultural train operated in Texas in recent years by the Santa Fe and the A. & M. College of Texas co-operating. The first was in 1923 and was operated in West Texas. The last preceding special was operated in 1924 in Central and East Texas. The present special is the first with an itinerary of statewide scope.

An eight-car train, the special included three cars of exhibits feed car for the livestock, a covered flat car equipped with voice amplifiers for use of the speakers, day coach to accommodate visitors in inclement weather and two cars for occupancy of those with the train.

Specialists from the college aboard the train included: E. N. Holmgreen, poultry specialist; Miss Bess Edwards, assistant state home demonstration agent; Miss Helen Swift, district home demonstration agent; A. L. Darnell, of the dairy husbandry department; G. W. Barnes, livestock specialist; J. S. Mogford, of the agronomy department;

and R. W. Persons, district agent. The latter talked to the boys and girls and emphasized the importance of club work.

Santa Fe officials aboard included: J. F. Jarrell, manager of agricultural development, Topeka, Kans.; J. D. Tinsley, general agricultural agent, Amarillo; L. F. **Funeral for
McGregor Held
Wednesday**

Funeral services for Peter McGregor, 74 years of age, were held at the First Presbyterian Church at 4:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon with Rev. E. W. McLaurin, pastor of the church, officiating.

Interment was made in Evergreen cemetery, with Higginbotham Bros. & Co. undertakers in charge.

Following is a brief sketch of Mr. McGregor's life:

Peter McGregor was the second child of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander McGregor, born September 6, 1853, in Stratford, Ontario, Canada. The family moved to Austin, Texas in August, 1876, and later in the same year established a sheep ranch at the forks of Brady Creek, in San Saba and McCulloch counties. A year later the McGregor family moved to a place in Concho county, a few miles from Eden, and continued in the sheep business for a number of years.

In 1886, they moved to California, settling near San Bernardino. Two years later the family came to Ballinger, where they made their home.

For a short time Mr. McGregor was interested in the newspaper business here. Then he and C. R. Crews, recently deceased, entered the furniture business. He remained in this business for some ten years. In connection with his work, he became the city's first secretary at a salary of \$25 per month. Later he became associated with the Ballinger Dry Goods Company and continued with this firm until some two years ago, when the McGregor interests were bought out by H. H. Thomson. Next to his

family, Mr. McGregor was interested in his church. He united with the Knox Presbyterian Church in Stratford, Ontario, before the family came to Texas. In July, 1893, he was made a ruling elder in the First Presbyterian Church in this place, and shortly thereafter was made clerk of the session, both of which offices he filled with devotion and fidelity until his death. He had also been secretary of the Sunday school for a long number of years.

His interest in his church is illustrated by the fact that it was the only organization, with the single exception of a short connection with a fraternal order, for insurance, that he was ever associated with. His talent, his time, his money were all available always for any call that might come to him for the welfare and advancement of the church.

He was a man who, while loyal to his own denomination, was appreciative of the character and

effort of members of other denominations.

A man like Mr. McGregor, who has lived in a town forty years, does not stand in need of printed word of praise and eulogy. His life and character, his kindness of spirit and purity of thought and deed are well known to all.

The pallbearers at the funeral all of whom are officers of the church in which Mr. McGregor served for the last forty years, were as follows: A. H. VanPelt, R. G. Erwin, E. M. Lynn, H. W. Lynn, W. R. Bogle and G. M. Vaughn.

Mr. McGregor is survived by a brother, J. McGregor, of this city; and one sister, Mrs. E. C. Saunders, of Sonora; and a number of other relatives, including nieces and nephews.
