VACUUM--2 MAKING 80 BBLs. HOUR

Abilene-San Antonio Rail Meeting to Be Held Wed.

Representatives from San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Abilene and other cities of the proposed route of the railroad from Abilene and Ballinger to San Antonio and Corpus Christi will be here Wednesday from 12 noon to 3 o'clock for the purpose of presenting the plans for the road to the citizens of Ballinger and Runnels county.

Porter A. Whaley, general manager of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, and other citizens of that section who are tremendously interested in this new railroad will be here for the meeting.

Mr. Whaley, in a recent letter to J. D. Motley, secretary of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, asked permission to sign the name of the local chamber to a permit which is being presented to the Rivers and Harbors Commission at Washington, D. C. This permit would grant authority to deepen the port at Corpus Christi from 25 to 30 feet which

would make Corpus Christi one of the leading ports of the United States, and as that coast city is nearest to Ballinger, Mr. Whaley says he feels that the local chamber should be willing to join other commercial bodies in this part of Texas in asking for the improvement.

"A railroad from some point in West Texas through San Antonio to Corpus Christi is assured within the next twelve months," the letter stated.

The railroad project is fostered by San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Wichita Falls, Abilene and other cities on the proposed route and

Ballinger is the key city to this proposition. At present the fight appears to be between Abilene and Ballinger against San Angelo.

San Angelo has plans on paper for a road from that city into San Antonio and to the coast, while Abilene, Ballinger and other cities have a plan for a road from this city to San Antonio which would give direct connection between Wichita Falls and other North Texas and Panhandle points and points in southern Oklahoma to San Antonio and deep water.

Brownwood and Coleman have been eliminated from the fight for the road and Ballinger is more than ever interested in the road. Citizens of this city and county are urged to gather at the mass meeting Wednesday and render all assistance possible in the matter.

From Ballinger the railroad delegation will go to Abilene for a meeting.

Maniac Beats Two Guards to Death in Jail

(By International News Service) BRIDGEWATER, Mass., Feb. 13.—Eugene Amlaw and Wilfred Gerrier, guards at the state hospital for the criminal insane here, were beaten to death by one of five maniacs who escaped from their rooms.

The prisoners were recaptured. The leader of the patients escaped through a transom over his door after smashing all furniture in the room and seizing the leg of a bed with which he clubbed Amlaw to death after which he took the guard's keys.

Then the maniac opened four other rooms and released the other patients.

All five of the crazed men jumped on Gerrier, who had rushed to Amlaw's assistance.

Sixteen night guards heard the alarm, which was sounded by another guard, and subdued and captured the quintet of slayers.

Reports in Ballinger this afternoon, unconfirmed, stated that the gauge on the Vacuum-McMillan No. 2, working at 3:30 o'clock, showed 40 barrels had come from the well within 30 minutes, which gives the well a production estimated at about 2,000 barrels daily.

This report could not be confirmed at press time but is believed to be authentic.

Vacuum-McMillan No. 2 was flowing by heads Sunday afternoon, night and Monday morning, with preparations being made Monday afternoon to swab the hole. A truck was sent to Coleman Monday morning for the tool and it was expected to arrive here Monday afternoon about 3:00 o'clock.

Operators are very optimistic over prospects for the well to be one of the best in this section with the oil coming from a fine grade of crystallized sand at a depth of 2,515 feet, the bottom of the hole.

The hole at noon Monday was reported to be standing with 2,100 feet of oil estimated at about 200 barrels and drillers believed it would blow itself in as soon as the oil was swabbed from the hole.

Ballinger experienced another record breaking crowd of visitors Sunday when the Vacuum Oil Company's second well in this county, 7 miles north of Ballinger, started flowing by heads shortly before 1 p. m. Drillers were expecting the oil and were prepared for it.

A casing crew had a few hours previous completed the setting of a 5-8-inch casing to 2,504 feet on a lime shelf, and drilling had been underway in a soft formation for a short time when a hard formation was struck. After 25 or 30 minutes of drilling a fine show-

ing of gas was encountered at 2,514 feet, ten feet below the bottom of the 6-5-8-inch casing. The bit was kept at work and went barely one foot into the sand. The bailer was lowered and two bailers of 43.9 gravity oil was brought out.

Vacuum officials who were at the well ordered suspension of drilling until they had been to Ballinger for lunch. By the time they returned hundreds of spectators were on the ground to view the bringing in of the well. A report was soon current, however, that no more work would be done until Monday.

Geo. H. Luck, of the Vacuum company, who has been in the city for several weeks looking after his corporation's interest at Vacuum-McMillan Nos. 1 and 2, stated that the well would be deepened on Monday as soon as an oil saver for the drill line arrived.

sands I have ever seen," Mr. Luek asserted. Other oil men at the well who inspected the sand were of the same opinion.

Bob Moore and Mr. Bommer of the land department of the Vacuum Oil Company, were here to look on when the well was brought in. Other operators were in the city Sunday, Sunday night and Monday.

The hole was spudded about six weeks ago by Drew Beams, drilling contractor of Okmulgee, Okla., who has one of the best strings of tools at work of any in West Texas. His crew was very dependable and little trouble was experienced in getting the hole to the required depth.

The 8 1/4-inch casing is set to 2,383 feet and completely shut off all water. The 6 5/8-inch casing is a dry string.

This well is on the Domingo Diaz survey No. 532, and is 500 feet due south of the discovery well which was brought in on August 27, 1927 by C. E. Sillis, Chas. Dutton and others.

Mr. Dutton was at the well Sunday and says it is one of the best conditioned wildcats he has ever seen. Dutton et al became interested in the Vacuum-McMillan No. 1 after the hole had been abandoned by Lou Ladd and associates of Fort Worth at about 2,500 feet, and the well was drilled only a few feet deeper to get a good gravity oil at 2,545 feet. The well has been producing from 75 to 150 barrels daily since it came in and at present is averaging 80 barrels a day.

The Humble Pipe Line Company will take the oil from the No. 2 and pipe it to Benoit, where it will be loaded on tank cars for the Humble company's refinery on the coast. Representatives of the Humble company were at the well Sunday.

R. C. Rhone, Jr., of Ft. Worth; H. L. Griswald, of San Angelo, and other oil men were at the well Sunday.

R. L. Bates, the diversification farmer from the Novice section, was in Ballinger Monday shaking hands with friends and looking after business.

Auto Kill 19 in 1 Week in Texas

The automobile led the field of indirect causes of 33 deaths from accidents in Texas the last week in January, 19 fatalities being credited the vehicle, according to the report of W. E. James, director of the Texas Council of Safety.

Since Jan. 1, 1928, 123 persons have lost their lives from accidents, while 511 have sustained injuries, the report showed.

Three persons were killed in railway train crashes and six were injured. Injuries from Jan. 24 to 31 totaled 129. Firearms wrought a toll of two lives and injured four during the week.

Other items of the report were: Interurban car, one injured, none killed; street car none injured, none killed; motor car, two injured, one killed; falls, 4 injured, 2 killed; burns, 2 injured, none killed; airplane, 2 injured, 1 killed; explosives, 2 injured, none killed; other causes, 17 injured, 5 killed. No injuries nor deaths were caused by drowning or asphyxiation during the week.—Fort Worth Star-Telegram of Sunday Feb. 12, 1928.
