IS COUNTRY'S YOUNGEST LAWYER, JUDGE, AT 21

WILMINGTON, N. C., Feb. 20.—Twenty-one years old and a licensed attorney and judge. Such is the unique record of Judge A. M. Rice, recently appointed recorder of Brunswick county, North Carolina. It is believed that Judge Rice is the youngest occupant of the bench in the country.

REED IN TEXAS FOR CAMPAIGN

Senator Reed addressed the Bar Association luncheon at noon and will make his principal address tonight at the city hall auditorium.

COMMISSION OPENS BIDS

AUSTIN, Feb. 20.—The Texas Highway Commission today opened bids on construction projects to cost \$460,000. The awards will be announced late this afternoon. The commission refused the plea of a group of South Texas counties for federal designation on the new Victoria-Robstown highway. San Patricio county was permitted to proceed with preliminary work on this highway, using its own funds. The county will receive credit on future work.

FORDS ARE SUED FOR \$6,000,000

PONTIAC, Mich., Feb. 20.—Charges that Henry and Edsel Ford are resorting to technicalities and "perpetrating fraud" against 2,000 former stockholders of the old Lincoln Motor Company, and seeking a prompt trial to exculpate themselves of all wrongs alleged against them was made today in a brief filed by the counsel for Henry and Wilfred Leland, who are suing the Fords for \$6,000,000.

RETAIL COST OF FOOD DECREASES

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The retail cost of food decreased approximately half of one per cent during January. This was an increase of 58 per cent over January of 1923, the Department of Labor announced today. Dallas showed a decrease of one per cent, or twice as much as the average for the whole nation.

VACUUM NO. 2 WILL BE PLACED ON PUMP

Vacuum-McMillan No. 2 will be put on the pump, P. W. Brower, general superintendent of the Vacuum Oil Company, said here Monday morning. Workmen were busy Monday preparing to set the tubing and pumping will be underway sometime this week.

The well, it is believed will make between 150 and 200 barrels daily under the pump as the swabbing test showed to be 151 barrels of oil for the 24-hour period ending Sunday morning at 7 o'clock. It is thought, Mr. Brower said, that the well will make more oil with a pump than with a swab.

Vacuum-Fowler No. 1, a few hundred yards west of the discovery well will be the next hole to be started by the Vacuum Co., but the location for this well has not been made. It will probably be spudded some two weeks after the location is decided.

Empire Cleaning Out
Empire-Collins-Gray No. 1 is cleaning out the hole at 2,540 feet after underreaming and setting casing to that depth. This well, according to reports current in the city Monday afternoon, had a quantity of fresh oil in the hole and was making considerable gas.

13 ON TRIAL IN FLOGGING CASES IN RALEIGH, N.C.

RALEIGH, N. C., Feb. 20.—Thirteen men are scheduled to face trial in Wake Superior Court here the week of February 20, charged with the sensational flogging in December, 1926, of Dolly Jones, country storekeeper, and Sam Green, his negro helper. According to Solicitor Leon S. Brassfield, who will head the prosecution, it is very likely that due to the brevity of the special term of court, the thirteen defendants will be tried all at once, instead of singly.

Such a procedure was to have been followed here recently when 16 men were to have faced trial on flogging charges, but gained acquittal when the grand jury refused to indict them a second time after a flaw was detected at the last minute in the first indictments against them.

The special term of court was called by Gov. McLean mainly for the trial of the flogging cases, and it was expected that they will take precedence over everything else on the court docket.

Two defendants in the Jones-Green flogging case have been tried separately, and both gained speedy acquittals after the juries trying them had listened for the better part of a week to voluminous testimony and lengthy summations. Those acquitted were Leland Rogers and G. A. Belshe, county camp supervisor.

The men scheduled to go on trial this month are: Dr. J. R. Hester, prominent Knightdale physician; Clyde Weathers, a deputy sheriff; Lotharo Stell, Ed Robertson, Wiley O'Neil, Jr., John Hammerick, Bennie Weathers, Paul Hester, Paul Robertson, J. T. Ramsey, Leroy Hester, John Hester and Charlie Hester, Jr.

32 Flogging Cases
With the disposal of these cases the Wake county court docket

will be virtually cleared of flogging cases, which at the beginning of the year totalled 32. Three men also stand indicted for the flogging of a farmer who was cleared of an immorality charge in court.

The wholesale indictments for floggings that had occurred in Wake county over a period of four years virtually under the shadow of the North Carolina state capitol, resulted from a long investigation by the grand jury.

Thus far, however, a conviction has never been obtained.
