## COMMISSION WILL NOT PAVE W. HUTCHINGS

Hutchings Avenue's five blocks on the western edge of the city will not be paved, it was announced Wednesday morning, following a meeting of the City Commission held Tuesday night. This was decided after the city and paving contractors had failed to receive the encouragement from the property owners on two blocks. The commission announced it would consider petitions from tax payers on 10th and 11th streets for paving, now provided 75 per cent or more of the residents signed such petitions.

All this was decided at the regular meeting of the commission, with Commissioners E. M. Eubank, W. A. Holt and Mayor S. B. Raby present. City Attorney A. K. Doss and City Secretary J. R. Lusk were also present. "The commission, however, will not consider any kind of a paving petition if there is any sign of trouble in getting the owners to sign up," Mr. Lusk said. "If the residents can not agree on the width of the street without any trouble the commission will not give the slightest consideration to any of the petitions."

Mr. Lusk said the commission would not put up with trouble on other streets as on the lower part of Broadway and that the streets would not be paved if some agreement could not be reached very easily.

The opening up of 11th railway crossing was also discussed, but the commission did not act on this matter as it has not yet received a petition asking for this work to be done, but if 11th is paved the crossing from North 11th to South 11th street will probably be opened.

The water situation was also discussed but the commission has nothing to give out as there is still much preliminary work to be done.

"The commission has definitely decided that Ballinger needs more and better water," Mr. Lusk said, "and the work will be carried forward as fast as possible."

Other matters were also discussed.

The commission went over the bills for the past month and ordered Secretary Lusk to pay them.

## 3 Death Sentences Affirmed

AUSTIN, Tex., Mar. 7.—The State's motion for a rehearing was overruled by the Court of Criminal Appeals today in the case of Hugh David Butler, of Limestone county, under a 99-year sentence in connection with the slaying of Lester Bolton. The sentence was reversed and remanded at a former hearing.

The death sentence of Lawrence Davenport, negro, who slew O. F. Foster, when the latter attempted to prevent him from attacking a girl companion after the negro had robbed Foster, was affirmed by the Criminal Appellate Court.

The court also affirmed the death sentences of Clemente Rodriguez and Esquirol, San Antonio Mexicans, for criminally assaulting Miss Frances Mohrman, a high school student.

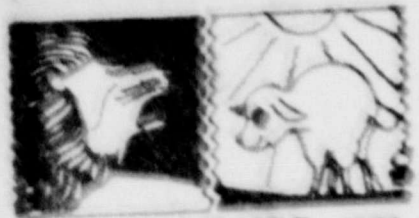

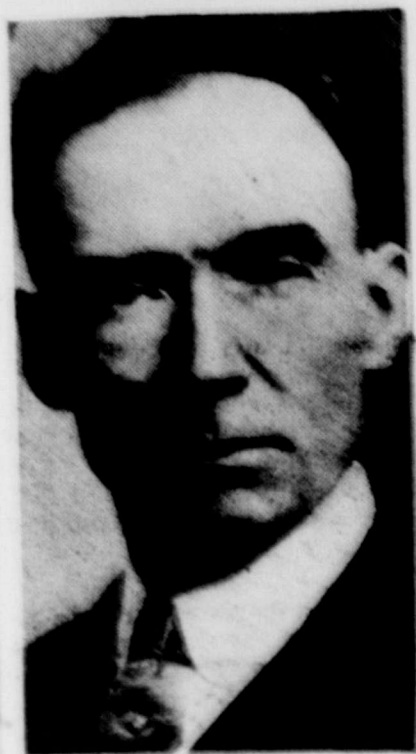

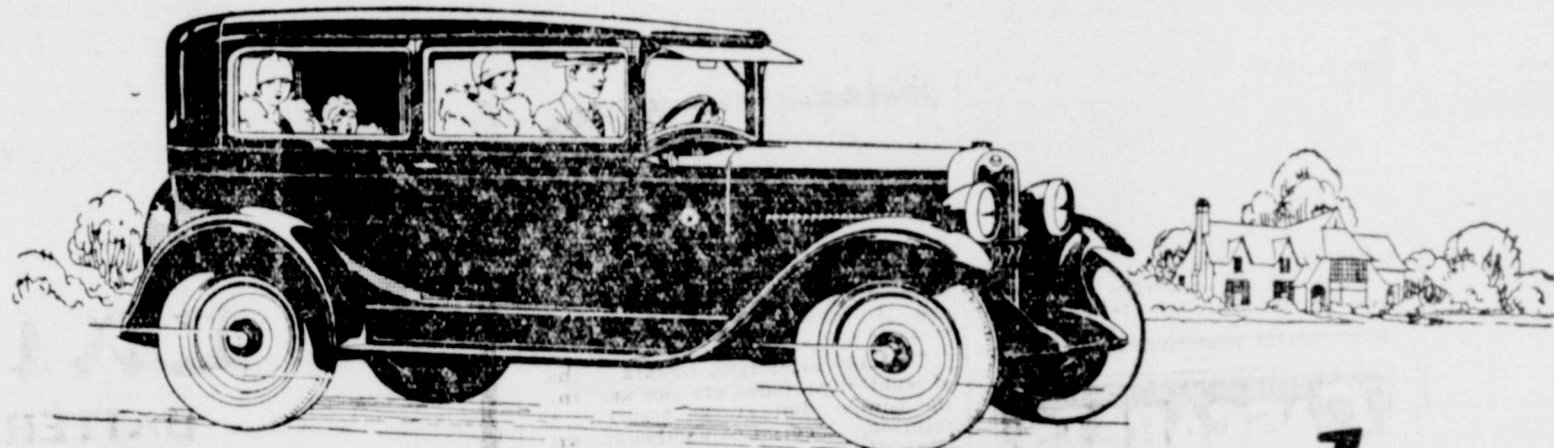

**BLACK SEA QUAKES DRIVING MANY FISH TO COMMIT SUICIDE**

(By International News Service) **BALAKLAVA, Crimea, Mar. 7.**—Continued earthquakes on the bottom of the Black Sea are driving millions of fish into committing suicide by enmeshing themselves in fishermen's nets, and biting on unbaited hooks.

The winter catch is reported to be a record for 25 years if not for all time. Canning factories along the coast are working 24 hours a day without making use of the entire supply of fish. The market price of salmon, sea bass and other salt water fish is almost nothing due to the oversupply.

Scientists definitely attribute the enormous fish catch to quakes and eruptions on the sea bottom. The fish, they say, are mad with fright and ready to jump at anything that might remove them from the watery hell. Whole schools have been seen leaping out of the water at the same time. One fisherman reported that three fish jumped into his row-boat within 15 minutes.

**GERMAN HYDROPLANES ARE SUPPLIED WITH NEW MYSTERY 'LIFTING POWDER'**

(By International News Service) BERLIN, Mar. 7.—A mystery powder which makes ships and hydroplanes unsinkable, lifts sunken submarines and other vessels in a short time and enables individual persons to carry their life preserver in their coat pocket has been invented by Rudolf Mareks, former government commissioner and now head of the firm Mareks & Co., of Berlin.

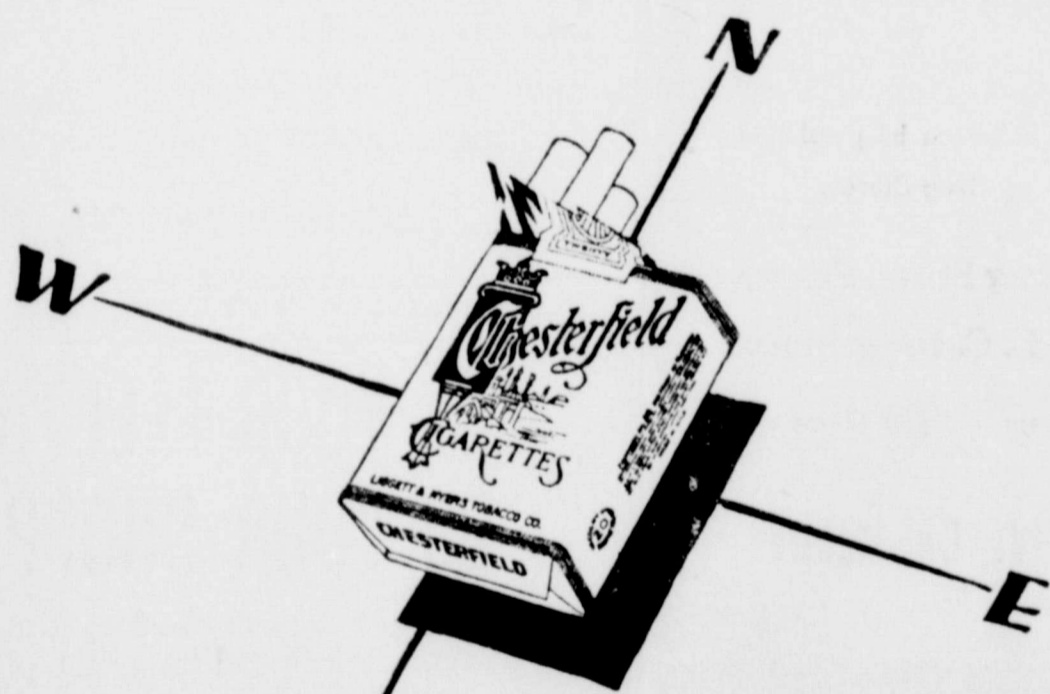

# BROWNWOOD MAN TO OPEN LUMBER YARD
