## 30 REPORTED KILLED; 200 HURT IN LANDSLIDE

(By International News Service) RIO DE JANIRO, Mar. 10.—Thirty persons are reported killed and two hundred were injured when a landslide from Peak Monte Serrat, which demolished fifty buildings at Santos, twenty miles from Saopaulo.

## ASKS PERMIT TO EXTEND LINE

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, Mar. 10.—The Pecos and Northern Texas railroad, a subsidiary to the Southern Pacific, today asked the Interstate Commerce Commission for authority to construct sixty miles of new road between Hale Center and Parmerton.

## FOREIGN AUTHORS TO PAY 20 PER CENT TAX ON ALL ROYALTIES TO ENGLAND

LONDON, Mar. 10.—Foreign authors and playwrights whose works are produced in Britain will, in future, have to pay 20 per cent of their royalties to the British Exchequer.

This is the edict of Somerset House, headquarters of the British Taxation system, which has just sent out a letter to publishers explaining that this payment will have to be made under the finance Act of 1927.

Most British opinion is in favor of this new impost.

## RESCUE WORK IS ABANDONED

(By International News Service) PLYMOUTH, Mass., Mar. 10.—Plans to rescue 263 passengers on the stranded liner, Robert E. Lee, by transfer to the liner George Washington, was abandoned today when the choppy sea made the attempt unadvisable. The liner is in no immediate danger, and all on board are calm, a radio message said.

PLYMOUTH, Mar. 10.—Strictly observing the time honored "women and children first" rule of the sea, the hazardous task of removing 150 passengers from the Robt. E. Lee, stranded on the Maryanna rocks, moved forward with precision today.

The women and children covered with blankets from the elements are being lowered on ladders from the lee side of the boat into coast guard launches and surf boats which reached the side of the ship after a desperate struggle with breakers and rolling swell. They are then carried to the coast guard cutter Tuscarora.

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, Texas, March 10.—Quick action is imperative to reduce production to a figure to commensurate with the consumption, if the oil industry is to be safeguarded, W. Hamilton disclosed \$100,000,000.00 is required annually to carry 600,000,000 barrels of oil in storage in the United States. More than eighty representatives of oil companies with their counsel are here attending the meeting.

BERLIN, Mar. 9.—Hollow magnets develop double the energy of full ones, is the astounding discovery of the Berlin civil engineer Josef Zacher, who claims that his invention is bound to revolutionize the fundamental principles of magnetic-electrical science.  
 Zacher submitted his discovery for a test at the Reich Physical Institute and weeks of laborious research and experiments proved the truth of his claims.  
 Zacher's discovery comes as a relief for the electrical industries for it was found impossible to improve magnets by making them out of better metal.  
 Zacher's invention means a cut of some 60 per cent in the production cost of magnets.

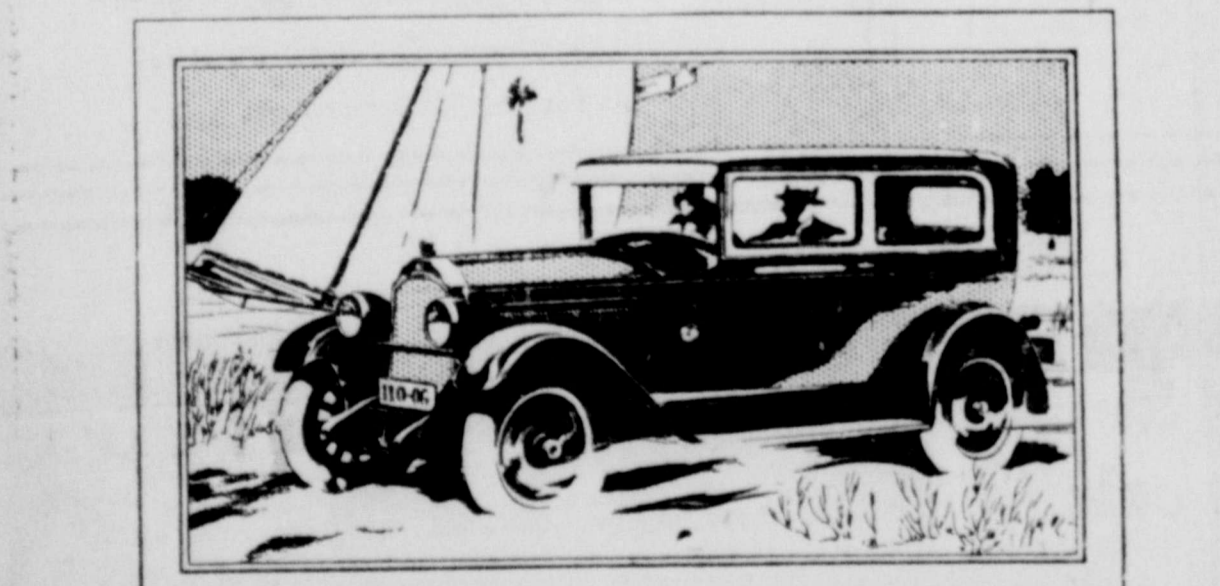

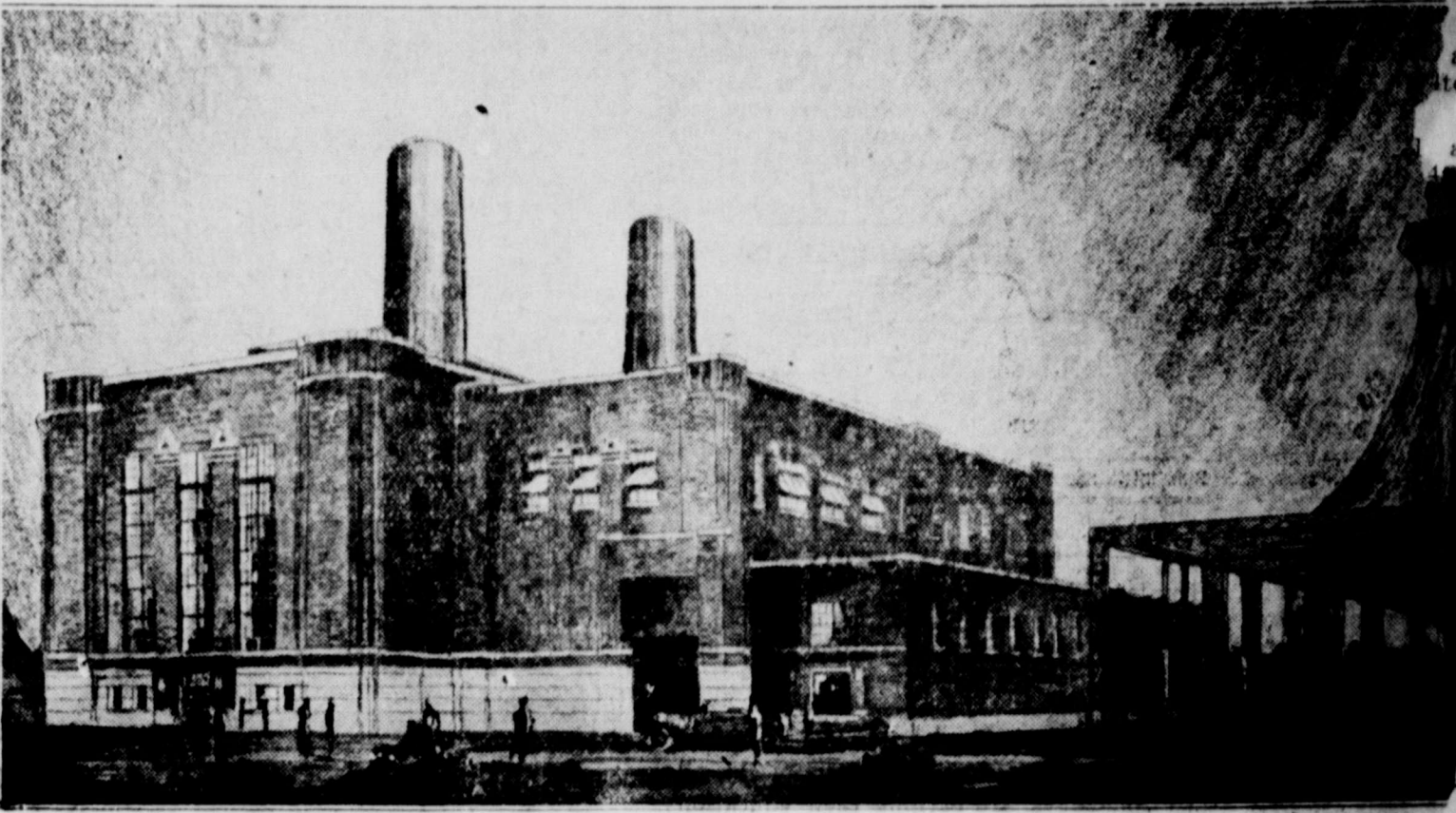

This building will house what ultimately will be the largest electric power generating plant planned so far by the West Texas Utilities Company, which now is under construction on the shore of Lake Pauline, near Quanah.

The plant, when three units are completed, will have a generating capacity of 60,000 horsepower, more than doubling the company's present available generating capacity. One unit, that under construction now, with a capacity of 20,000 horsepower, will be erected this year. Contract was awarded recently to R. E. McKee, Abilene, El Paso and Los Angeles contractor.

The building, shown in the architect's drawing, will be of concrete, brick and steel, with red-

face brick used on the exterior and white stone for trimming. It will measure 125 by 150 feet and will equal a six-story building in height.

Oil and gas will be used for fuel, all equipment having been bought with this in view. It can be converted to the use of pulverized coal should such a change become necessary.

The plant is three miles south of the main line of the Fort Worth and Denver railway. A spur track leading to the plant recently was completed by R. V. Stroup Company.

Lake Pauline impounds 1,750,000,000 gallons of water and covers 610 acres of land. Until recent years it was used for irrigation purposes but this was abandoned. By converting the

water into electric West Texas Utilities will be harnessing that otherwise would waste.

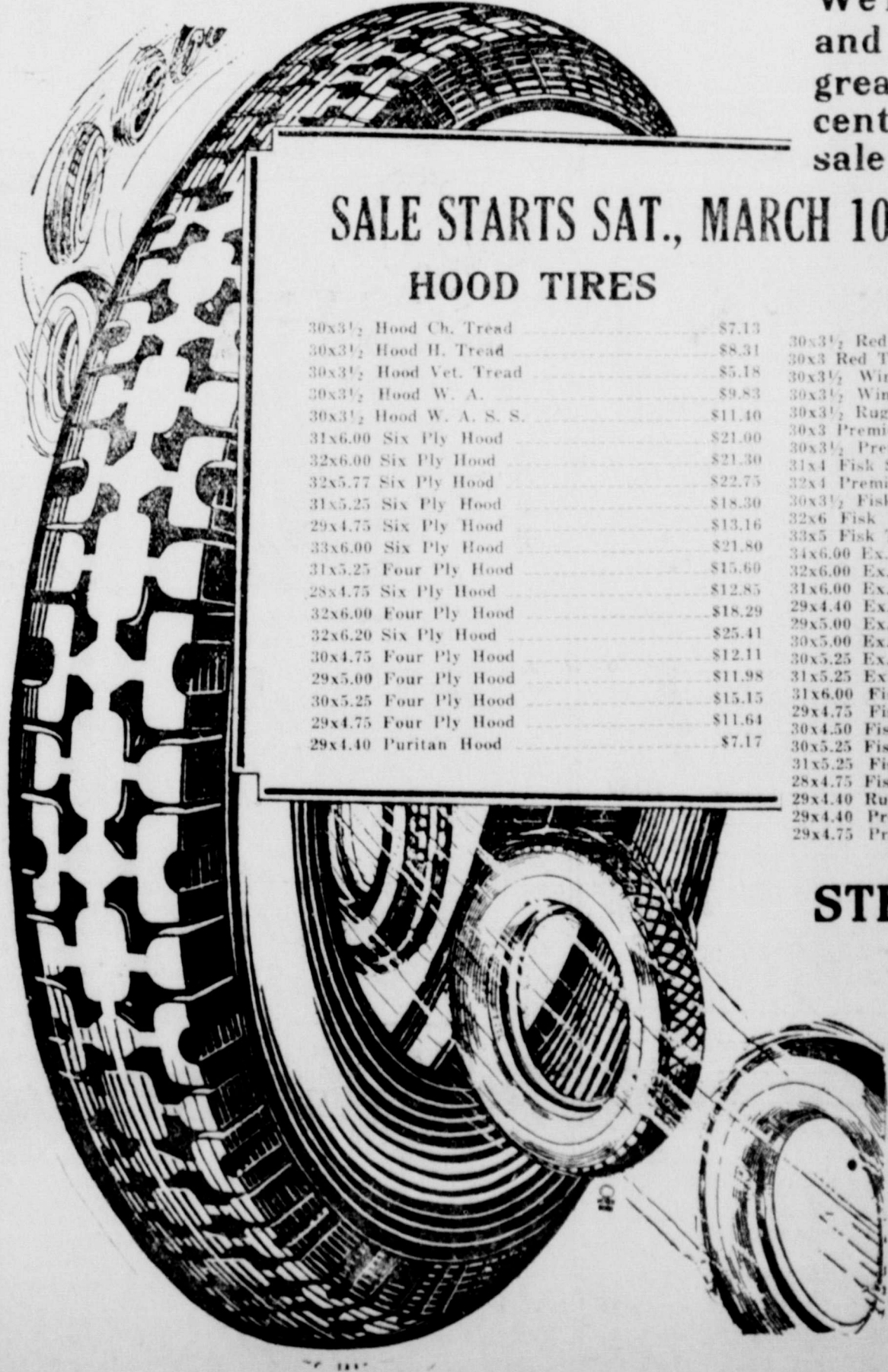

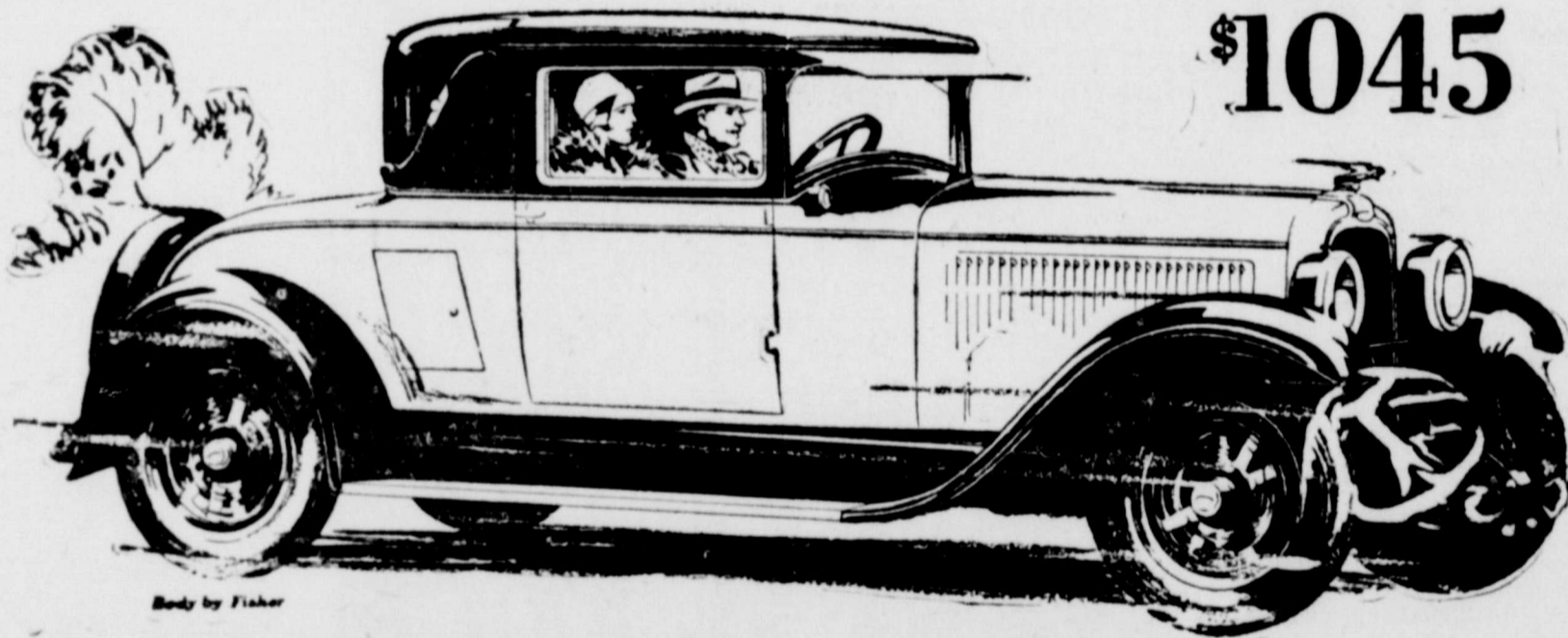

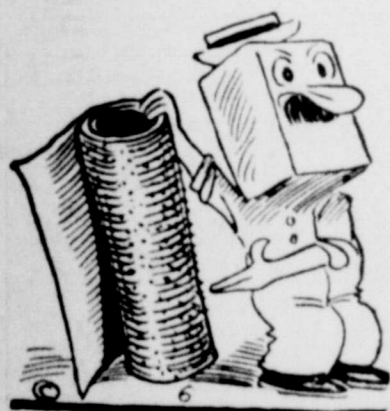

## BLAME BIRTH CONTROL FOR 750,000 FAMILIES HAVING NO CHILDREN

(By International News Service)  
 LONDON, Mar. 10—Within the past four years British births have dropped over forty thousand. At the present time, out of 1,500,000 married couples, without children in the country, 750,000 deliberately refuse to become parents.

Not only is Britain's birth-rate the lowest in Europe, but it is the lowest in that country for eighty-nine years. During 1927 there were 300,000 fewer children born than in 1920, and in every quarter

of that year the birth rate was lower than in 1926. In 2,500,000 homes there is today only one child.

Birth control, coupled with the high cost of living, is blamed for this present, supposedly dangerous state of affairs.
