## OIL RISES 150 FEET IN SERRATT WELL

Interest in oil activities in Runnels county Saturday centered on the Gibson & Johnson No. 1-A. P. Serratt, two miles north of Ballinger; Swensondale et al No. 1-E. A. Werner, near Benoit, about 8 miles northeast of Ballinger; and Pure Oil Co.'s Nos. 1 and 2 Giesecke, 18 miles east of the city.

Most of the interest probably surrounded developments at the Gibson & Johnson well, where underreaming was underway to allow the lowering of 8 1/4 inch casing to 2,325 feet, where a fine grade of oil was encountered early Friday morning. This is the nearest well to the city limits.

Much interest has been taken in this well during the past few days but the showing was unexpected and interest increased Friday when the report was broadcast that oil had been found. The liquid is reported to have risen 150 feet in the hole, with no water. The sand, which is believed to be producing the oil, was barely tapped, reports stated.

**Swensondale May Be a Well**  
Operators were also watching the Swensondale well as underreaming was also underway there with some 40 feet of open hole. Five and five-eighths inch casing was to be lowered this afternoon to below 2,500 feet, where it was reported the bit was resting on a shell, which is expected to produce an oil bearing sand.

This well has some little gas.  
**Giesecke Well May Flow**  
Pulling of 6 7/8 inch casing was to start early Saturday at the Pure Oil Company's Nos. 1 and 2 Giesecke, 18 miles east of Ballinger, a 10-year-old wildcat which in its younger days cut up quite a bit and created much oil excitement in Runnels and adjoining counties.

The well was bailed dry of all water several days ago and has been awaiting repairs on a tractor which is being used for power at the wells.

Giesecke No. 2 is making quite a bit of gas and this is being used for domestic purposes at the houses near the well.

No. 1 is expected to flow after several joints of the casing is pulled from the hole. Efforts to get a report from the well at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon failed. The casing has been in the hole for about ten years and it is probable that some little trouble will be experienced in pulling the pipe, which extends about 2,250

feet into the hole.  
Since the tubing was pulled several days ago, the gas flow has increased and some oil has been bailed from the well.

**Globe Drilling**  
Reports were rife here Saturday afternoon that the Globe Oil Co.'s No. 1-J. H. Webb, 10 miles down the Colorado River, had struck the sand encountered at about 1,800 feet in the Giesecke wells, and that gas was blowing oil and water from the hole above the derrick, however, a telephone call direct from the well, denied this report, and stated that drilling was underway at about 2,455 feet.

Operations at this well have been running very nicely since 10-inch casing was set.

**Vacuum Drilling**  
Vacuum Oil Company's Owenwood No. 1-Fowler is drilling around 550 feet after spudding on Thursday morning. Drillers at this well have made excellent progress since the hole was started.

The Vacuum put down its No. 2 McMillan in fast time and some of the crew at work on this well is working on the Fowler well.  
Drew Beams, of Okmulgee, Okla., is the contractor for the Vacuum wells.

Reports from other wells could not be obtained this afternoon.

### LASKER BEFORE OIL COMMITTEE

### NICARAGUA GETS U. S. MUNITIONS

Chief Quigg, Lieut. Tibbetts, Detectives Caudell and Nazworth are charged with first degree murder in connection with the slaying of a negro bell boy, an alleged third degree victim.

Detective Wood is charged with killing a carpenter on November 16, 1926.

The grand jury declared it had "discovered an alliance between the underworld and the police."

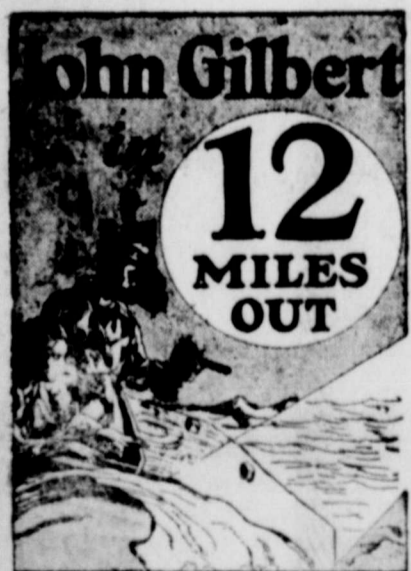

The city officials' name of San Angelo have gone on the ticket for re-election without opposition, indicating that politics in that city is not meddling with the splendid progress the Tom Green county town is making. The pay of the average public office offers little temptation to those qualified to do the work, and public service is often rendered at a sacrifice.

**SALUBRIOUS OUTLOOK**

Conditions of local banks as compared to a year ago prove that we are ahead of several thousand dollars in deposits and cash available. The county, generally speaking, is in sound financial condition. Farmers report planting well in progress, and the soil is thought to contain enough moisture to promote the growth of all small grains and garden stuff.—Ballinger Ledger.

There is nowhere in sight of those sentinels the topmost hills of Texas anything to be alarmed over. The promise of the present year's crops was never better at seeding time. The situation of those who have not been guilty of extravagance or speculation or bad judgment was never better than now. The promise of the future was never fairer than at this hour. Our simple crops are commanding remunerative prices. Our industries are running, if not at top speed, certainly at a moderate rate. The health of Texas is excellent, no floods have devastated, no storms laid low the homes of any considerable number of our people. There is complaint, or perhaps discomfiture, in some agricultural communities over what is called money tightness. The banks, formerly liberal in advances to those who had borrowed on prospects, have changed their policy to a great extent. More and better security is demanded for loans, and this will redound to community advantage. Weak banks are not the best banks for any town. The stronger the local bank, the stronger the local resources. There has been something of a revolution in farming as well as in banking. The era of high farm prices made paper profits easy; but actual profits in a thousand cases turned to heart-breaking losses. All reasoning men of business now know that the stimulus of war times was artificial and dangerous, indeed, fatal to many. Conditions have returned to the normal because responsible observers have seen that to struggle for the abnormal was to anticipate the impossible. We are on a higher living standard than formerly, and much of this height is represented by debt, therefore credits are less common in general. This is what compels more conservative credit methods by banks, and others.—Dallas News.

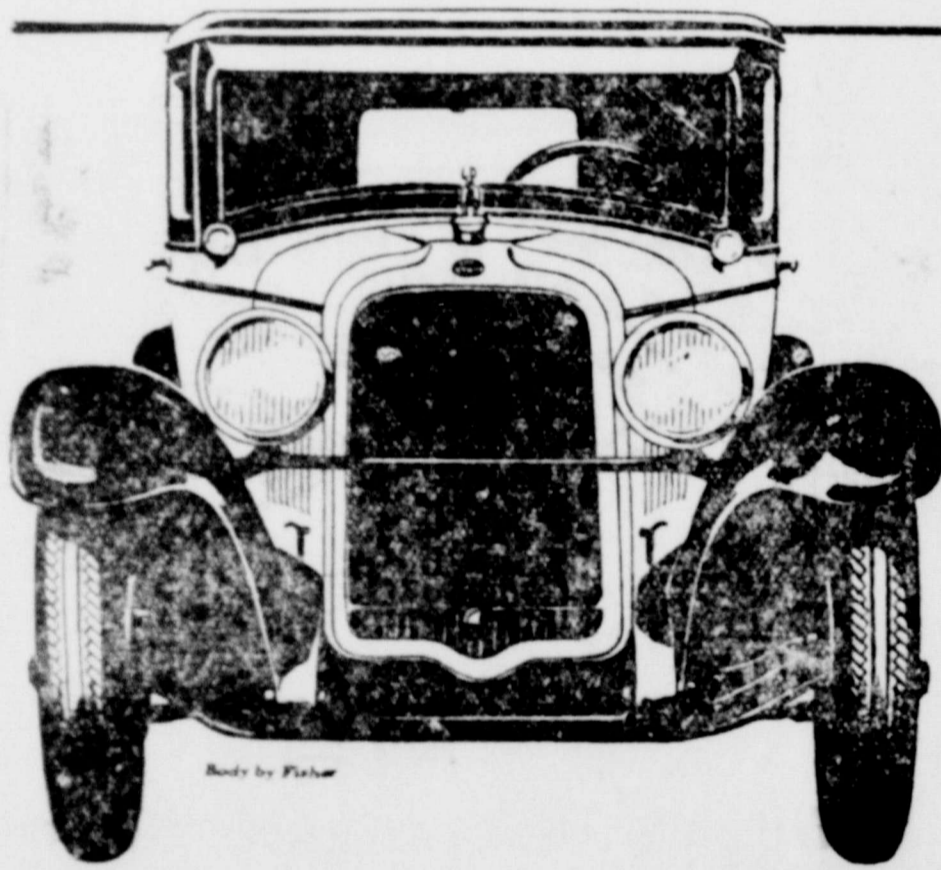
