NEW OFFICIALS ARE ELECTED IN ILLINOIS

(By International News Service)
CHICAGO, April 11.—Mayor William Hale Thompson, Governor Len Small and State Attorney Robert E. Crowe concede their defeat in yesterday's record-breaking Illinois primary. Virtually complete returns show Senator Charles S. Deneen's candidates swept the state.
Small was defeated by Louis L. Emmerson, secretary of state, Colonel Frank L. Smith, running for "vindication," after being rejected a seat twice by the United States Senate on account of scandals connected with his previous victory, was defeated by Otis F. Glenn, State Attorney Crowe, of Cook county, was defeated by Judge John A. Swanson.

CHICAGO, April 11.—A grand jury investigation into the murders, sluggings, kidnappings and bombings, the holding of ballot boxes and other outrages which marked the Illinois primary election yesterday became a certainty today when Attorney General Oscar Carlstrom announced he was making special arrangements to empanel a probing body and take over functions of the defeated state's attorney, Robert E. Crowe.

BANKERS HEARD IN OIL TRIAL

WASHINGTON, April 11.—Harry M. Blackmer's name was called futilely three times today at the criminal conspiracy trial of Harry F. Sinclair.
Blackmer is one of the three missing witnesses in the Teapot Dome oil fraud case. He is in southern France, it is said, ignoring the summons.
Owen J. Roberts, special government prosecutor, then called half a dozen western bankers, who produced Albert B. Fall's account in 1922. They were called to verify the fact that Fall had Sinclair's Liberty Bonds in his possession.

PARIS, April 11.—Despite a four year vigorous search throughout Europe for James E. O'Neill, missing witness in the Teapot Dome oil investigation and criminal conspiracy trial of Harry F. Sinclair, the elusive American still was missing in his unknown hiding place, when the Sinclair trial opened Monday in Washington.

Every clue as to O'Neill's whereabouts has been exhausted. Continental Europe has been subjected to a fine tooth search, ships, railway stations and hotels have been watched. O'Neill's villa at Cannes has been under continuous surveillance.
In view of the American's ability to elude the army of professional and amateur sleuths in Europe, a belief has gained ground in some quarters that O'Neill may have returned to America in disguise, although this would be difficult owing to passport complications. However, it is pointed out that, as the search was concentrated upon Europe, O'Neill might have been able to slip away and get to the United States, where, it is understood, little effort has been made to trail him.

The beginning of the Sinclair trial marked the end of the search for O'Neill in Europe. However, the American is expected to remain in hiding until the trial is over. Some of his friends believe he may turn up in the United States or South America.

50 KILLED IN PARIS WRECK

PARIS, April 11.—Fifty persons are believed to have been killed in a collision between a special train en route to the Enghien racetrack and a Chantilly local just outside of the Gare du Nord station this morning.

MILES WELL CLOSED DOWN

Miles Oil Company No. 14-Lawson & Sons well, two miles northwest of Miles, is closed down after striking a flow of water with much gas, reports from the well indicated Wednesday. The hole is between 2,500 and 2,600 feet deep.

Ridge & McClaughan, San Angelo, have a block of acreage six miles southwest of Miles, and will spend in a new test Thursday. Joe McGinley and Bill Gruber are the drilling contractors. The contract calls for a 3,000-foot hole.
This well is located in the southeast corner of the R. Q. Holder 160 acres. The rig is up and spudding will take place Thursday.

Reports from the well on the A. P. Serratt farm, owned by Gibson & Johnson, of Abilene, said the well was on the pump but did not indicate how much it was making. A storage tank is taking care of the oil on the lease, with pipeline connections delayed due to the uncertain worth of the well.
Other wells in the county are reported to be at work with no new developments.

Horse Thieves In Kansas Use Motor Trucks

HUGTON, Kans., April 11.—Stealing horses and using motor trucks to skin them for their hides is believed by authorities here to be a new practice being extensively employed in southwestern Kansas and eastern Colorado. Hundreds of horses have been discovered out on the prairies near here, minus their hides. Stockmen believe that many of the animals show evidence of having been skinned alive.

Two Oklahoma men have been arrested and charged with the theft and cruel slaughter of 18 head of horses.

The method, as described by authorities who witnessed such an act, was to fasten the animal's neck to a crowbar driven deep into the ground, then to draw off the skin with a line attached to a truck, leaving the carcass of the animal where the job had been completed.

The two men arrested, Homer Sweek and Virgil Jackson, were taken into custody at Woodward, Oklahoma, where it is alleged they were attempting to contract for the wholesale delivery of horses' hides to a dealer there. The pair will face trial at Springfield, Colorado, where a number of ranchers have reported the loss of their horses.

As the men were arrested by Colorado authorities, in Oklahoma, it was necessary for the officers to convince Gov. Henry Johnston that they had sufficient evidence to prove the two had carried on such a practice of slaughtering before they could remove their prisoners to Colorado.

Officers advance the theory that the prisoners are but two of a large ring operating near the border of the two states, and merchandising the hides through unscrupulous dealers. They have signified their intention of making a thorough investigation in the hope of apprehending more such violators.

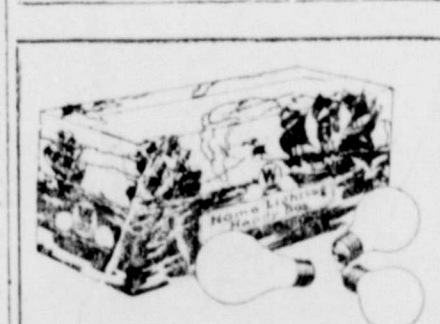
BAPTIST PASTORS TO HAVE SCHOOL

R. Q. LEE WILL SPEAK AT MILES

R. Q. Lee, of Cisco, former president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, and at present a candidate for congress from the 17th congressional district, will speak at the Miles Theatre, Miles, Saturday afternoon, to the farmers of western Runnels county and eastern Tom Green county. Mr. Lee's subject will be "Diversified Farming."
Mr. Lee is regarded as an authority on diversified farming due to the experience he has had in the work. At this time he owns one of the best farms in Texas and practices diversification. The Lee farm is located near Cisco.
It is expected that a very large crowd will attend the meeting as Miles farmers seem more interested in diversification and modern farming methods than ever.

SAN ANGELO MAN DIES OF INJURIES

Gordon ("Slats") Allen, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Allen, Sr., of San Angelo, died at 5:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon from injuries received Sunday in a collision on Chadbourne Street, east of the Murphy bridge.
Allen was rendered unconscious in the wreck and never regained his senses. He was one of the prominent younger set of San Angelo and was married only a few months ago.
The young man died while Dr. Eugene Carpenter, Dallas, brain specialist, was rushing to San Angelo by airplane to perform an operation. The surgeon arrived shortly after young Allen's death.

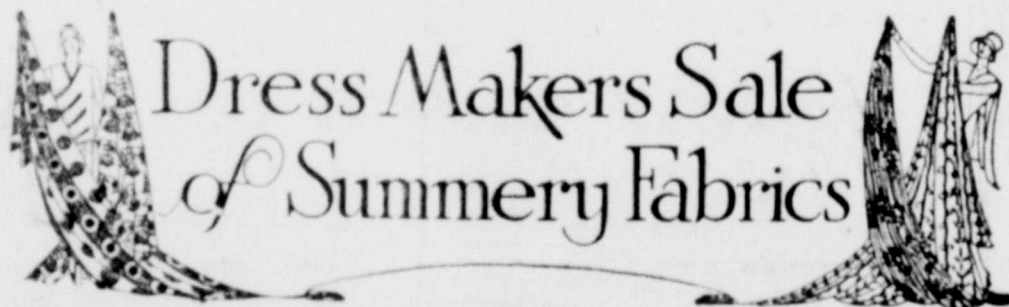
