DEFENSE RESTS IN OIL CASE

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, April 19.—The defense rested suddenly this morning without placing Harry F. Sinclair on the stand as expected in the oil magnate's trial on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government.

A 150,000 word deposition taken from Albert B. Fall, at El Paso two weeks ago, was not introduced.

The defense presented half a dozen character witnesses including Peter Finley Dunne, creator of "Mr. Dooley."

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Harry F. Sinclair, multi-millionaire oil magnate, on trial for conspiracy to defraud the government in the leasing of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve, probably will take the stand in his own defense, it was learned today.

WASHINGTON, April 19.—A sweeping investigation into the leasing of the government oil lands on the Salt Creek, Wyo., fields was proposed in the Senate this afternoon by Senator Norris of Nebraska.

The motion was offered as the climax of several weeks debate in which Senator Robinson of Indiana charged that the Wilson administration was as culpable in oil scandals as that of Warren G. Harding.

WRIGHT MONUMENT IS NOW COMPLETED

ELIZABETH CITY, N. C., Apr. 19.—A monument commemorating the first heavier than air flight of Orville and Wilbur Wright off the North Carolina coast a quarter century ago, has been completed and turned over to a group of sponsors here.

The memorial, an obelisk of grey Vermont marble, was carved by F. A. Berry, of Elizabeth City. It will be placed in the yard of the Methodist parsonage at Kitty Hawk, N. C., near the scene of the first flight. The monument plan was sponsored by Captain W. J. Tate, keeper of the government lighthouse depot at Coinjock, Currituck county.

At the top of the monument is a replica of the first glider, and underneath is the following inscription: "On this spot, September 17, 1900, Wilbur Wright brother's first experimental glider which led to man's conquest of the air. Erected by citizens of Kitty Hawk, N. C., 1926."

CREASY SENDS FILER TO INDIA

R. B. Creasy, of the Creasy Rotary Filer Co., announced Thursday morning that he had shipped a gin saw filer to a cotton ginner at Karachi, India, a distance of some 14,000 or 15,000 miles from Ballinger. Karachi is on the eastern coast of India, situated in a considerable cotton producing district.

Mr. Creasy has shipped a number of his filers out of the United States, some of them going to Turkey, Brazil, Mexico and other countries.

"Some time ago we had several orders from Russian gins," Mr. Creasy declared, "but the conditions of that country became so bad that the ginner there could secure no financial backing and so all orders were cancelled.

"I believe that in time we will work up a good business in foreign countries as many of them are beginning to raise quite a bit of cotton. In India the cotton industry is reported to be growing at a rapid pace. Our filers keep the gin saws in practically new condition and foreign ginner want some kind of a machine so they will not have to wait for parts from the States."

This is the first machine the local factory has shipped to India.

FLYERS TO HOP TO NEW YORK

DETROIT, April 19.—Preparations are being rushed at the Ford airport to fit out a tri-motored transport plane to carry replacements and fuel for the disabled Bremen at Greenly Island.

Floyd Bennett and Berndt Balchen are here from New York to day to pilot the giant plane.

QUEBEC, April 19.—Major James Fitzmaurice will depart for Greenly Island in a Canadian Transcontinental Airways plane either late today or tomorrow, he informed the International News Service over the telephone from Lake Stagnes today.

The Irish aviator declared he has no intention of going alone to New York and asserted that he and Captain Herman Koehl and Baron von Huenefeld had had no disagreement and that they were in perfect accord with his departure from Greenly Island.

Major Fitzmaurice will take back gasoline and a propeller for the Bremen, the Junkers' trans-Atlantic monoplane, and stated they expected to take off in the Bremen Monday for New York.

TRINITY COLLEGE HEAD SAYS TIME NOT READY TO FREE PHILIPPINES

(By International News Service) HARTFORD, Apr. 16.—Dr. Remson B. Ogilby, president of Trinity College, believes that if the United States granted independence to the Philippines an expeditionary force of troops would have to go out to the island in three years' time to straighten things out.

Dr. Ogilby expresses his opinion after nine years spent in the islands. He sees lack of capital the chief handicap to the island folks and he sees in talk of independence a bugaboo frightening away foreign capital. The islands are rich in natural resources, says the local college president, but its people are poor in material matters. They need capital to secure their wealth of natural sorts.

If the United States departed from the islands, says Dr. Ogilby, the next in control would be an oligarchy in the hands of the Tagalog tribe in the Manila district. Other people represented in the groups that speak eighty-seven dialects, would be swamped by the oligarchy, and in would rush the Orientals from the mainland of Asia.

**TRY THE REAL COTTON
CULPRIT**

The Senate investigation into alleged manipulations of the cotton market so far has been confined to one private firm, Anderson, Clayton & Co., of Houston.

Evidence adduced at the probe into the operations of this firm tends to show that charges lodged against Anderson, Clayton & Co. have no basis in merit but are prompted merely by business jealousies and personal prejudice on the part of a former president of the New York Cotton Exchange; and perhaps on the part of New York exchange interests for which he is a spokesman.

Appearing voluntarily before the Senate committee, W. L. Clayton has answered every allegation made against him and buttressed his answers by facts and figures not open to challenge. His chief accuser has been compelled reluctantly to admit, in one instance after another, the fallacy and error of charges made against the huge Southern cotton firm.

In view of the complete breakdown of the Arthur R. Marsh charges, in so far as they have been probed, further effort to make Anderson, Clayton & Co. the main target of the Senate cotton inquiry seems to be extremely ill advised.

Along with its probe of this merchandising firm why doesn't the Senate launch a rigorous inquiry into the real culprit of the 1927-28 cotton season, the United States Department of Agriculture?—Houston Post-Dispatch.

PITTSBURGH, April 19.—The minimum age for those seeking jobs in Pittsburgh's uniformed police service is now 23, while the maximum is 35, according to a ruling made recently. Age limits for firemen will be slightly lower

LONDON, April 19. — "The average American is an extremely fair-minded man," Sir Rennell Rodd, British delegate to the League of Nations in 1921 and 1923, declared in a recent address before the English Speaking Union here.

Sir Rennell, who also was one of the British representatives at the recent naval disarmament conference in Geneva, recently returned from a visit to America. "The American is apt to think out questions for himself," Sir Rennell continued. "His mentality is simple and direct, but he is often very ill-informed on questions which interest Great Britain profoundly."

"I have found in talking about the recent naval conference that our position and attitude were pretty generally misapprehended. Men did not seem to understand that the aims of a naval power might be quite different for a country differently conditioned geographically and economically from their own."

"But one has only to explain our position for them very readily to understand it. There is one point, however, on which we ought not to delude ourselves."

"The American people feel themselves justly entitled to arrive at their own conclusions and their own judgments, quite independently of old usages and conventions and customs to which they never pledged themselves."

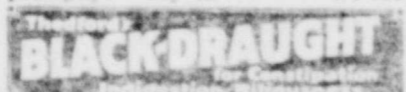
