## QUAKE WIPES OUT CITY OF 100,000

### AMERICAN FLYER GOES OVER TOP OF WORLD

(By International News Service) **BURBANK, Calif., April 21.**—Confirmation of the successful trans-Pole flight of Captain Geo. H. Wilkins was received in a radiogram today from the flyer to Allan H. Lockhead, vice-president of the Lockheed Aircraft Co., builders of the Wilkins plane. The message was sent from Svalborg, Spitzbergen.

**LONDON, April 21.**—Captain George H. Wilkins, American aviator, has flown over the North Pole "across the top of the world," according to Exchange Telegraph despatches from Copenhagen this afternoon, quoting two radiograms received and published by the newspaper Politiken. Both were dated at Svalbard, Spitzbergen, and stated that Wilkins and his companions flew from Point Barrow, Alaska to Doedmansoira, an uninhabited isle where they were detained five days by bad weather after which they continued to Svalbard.

The plane and flyers were reported to be in excellent condition.

### AUTOMOBILE WASHES OFF CAUSEWAY; NONE HURT

An automobile was washed off the small causeway at Willow Creek between Miles and San Angelo last Friday night when the water of the stream rose around the car with such force that it was carried down stream. No one was injured or drowned in the accident, according to a telephone message from the San Angelo Standard Saturday.

The Standard reported that the North Concho River was on a rise and that towns northwest of San Angelo reported good rains.

### BOARD ELECTS '28 TEACHERS

Members of the school board met Friday night at the offices of the board and re-elected H. C. Lyon superintendent for two years, starting at the end of his present contract. This is the first time that a superintendent has ever been given a two-year contract here.

There were a few minor changes in the faculty of the schools, Dr. E. C. Baskin, vice-chairman of the board, who presided in the absence of C. A. Doose, chairman, stated Saturday morning.

Practically the entire old faculty was re-elected for another year, but the list of teachers will not be published until they have all accepted the places.

### WEST TEXANS PLANNING TRIP TO FT. WORTH

J. D. Motley, secretary of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce and also secretary of the Heart of Texas Secretaries, has returned from Brownwood where he attended a meeting of the secretaries, called expressly for the purpose of making preliminary plans for attending the annual West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention to be held at Fort Worth on June 18, 19 and 20.

Mr. Motley said a meeting would be held at Brownwood on May 3rd to complete the arrangements and prepare a program for the Heart of Texas towns, to be presented at the convention. It is planned that bands and delegations from Ballinger, Brady, San Angelo, San Sabu, Coleman, Menard, Mason, Junction and other points in this section concentrate at Brownwood and leave from there on a special train which is to originate at San Angelo.

Letters are being mailed out from the local office to the many secretaries in the Heart of Texas district and it is hoped that a large crowd will go to Ft. Worth for the big celebration.

### SINCLAIR ACQUITTED

(By International News Service) **WASHINGTON, April 21.**—Harry F. Sinclair today was found not guilty on charges of criminal conspiracy in connection with his leasing of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve. The jury deliberated for one hour and five minutes. This marks the government's second failure to secure convictions in the oil scandals. Albert B. Fall and Edwin L. Doherty were acquitted in 1926.

**WASHINGTON, April 21.**—The fate of Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate, charged with conspiracy to defraud the United States government in connection with the leasing of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve, was given the jury at 10:29 o'clock this morning.

A guilty verdict may bring two years imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine.

**WASHINGTON, April 21.**—Col. Robert Stewart, head of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, will stand trial for contempt of the Senate on May 21, United States District Attorney Rover announced today.

The charge grew out of investigation of the national oil scandals.

**CHICAGO, April 21.**—Colonel Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, today refused to comment on charges of Senator Nye that Stewart handled one-fourth of the profits of the mysterious Continental Trading Company's \$3,000,000 Liberty Bond slush fund.

Stewart was subpoenaed before the oil inquiry Tuesday. Stewart was involved when the deposit slip in his Chicago banking account showed he deposited interest coupons off \$750,000.

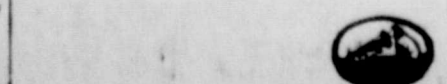

### I. C. C. AGENT OPPOSES ROAD

(By International News Service) **WASHINGTON, April 21.**—The Interstate Commerce Commission today received from its agent, M. S. James, an adverse report on the proposal of the Texas & New Mexico Railroad to build thirty-five miles of line from Monahans to the New Mexico line.

**LONDON, April 21.**—Thousands are believed to be dead and 500,000 are homeless, with Bulgaria facing a nation-wide famine today following the news of a series of earthquakes, according to Vienna despatches to the London Daily Express.

Phillipopolis is completely devastated and five other villages have been wiped out.

Phillipopolis is a city of 100,000 population. Every building is in ruins and 125 bodies have been recovered, the despatches said.

Communications throughout Bulgaria are completely disrupted, making it impossible to establish the number of victims.

The villages of Manoliv, Katunica, Karafilovo, Slatovo and Scoveleva were also wiped out.

The quake is called the most terrible in European history and Bulgaria is panic stricken.

Thousands of crazed and starving persons are wandering about, shrieking that the end of the world has arrived.

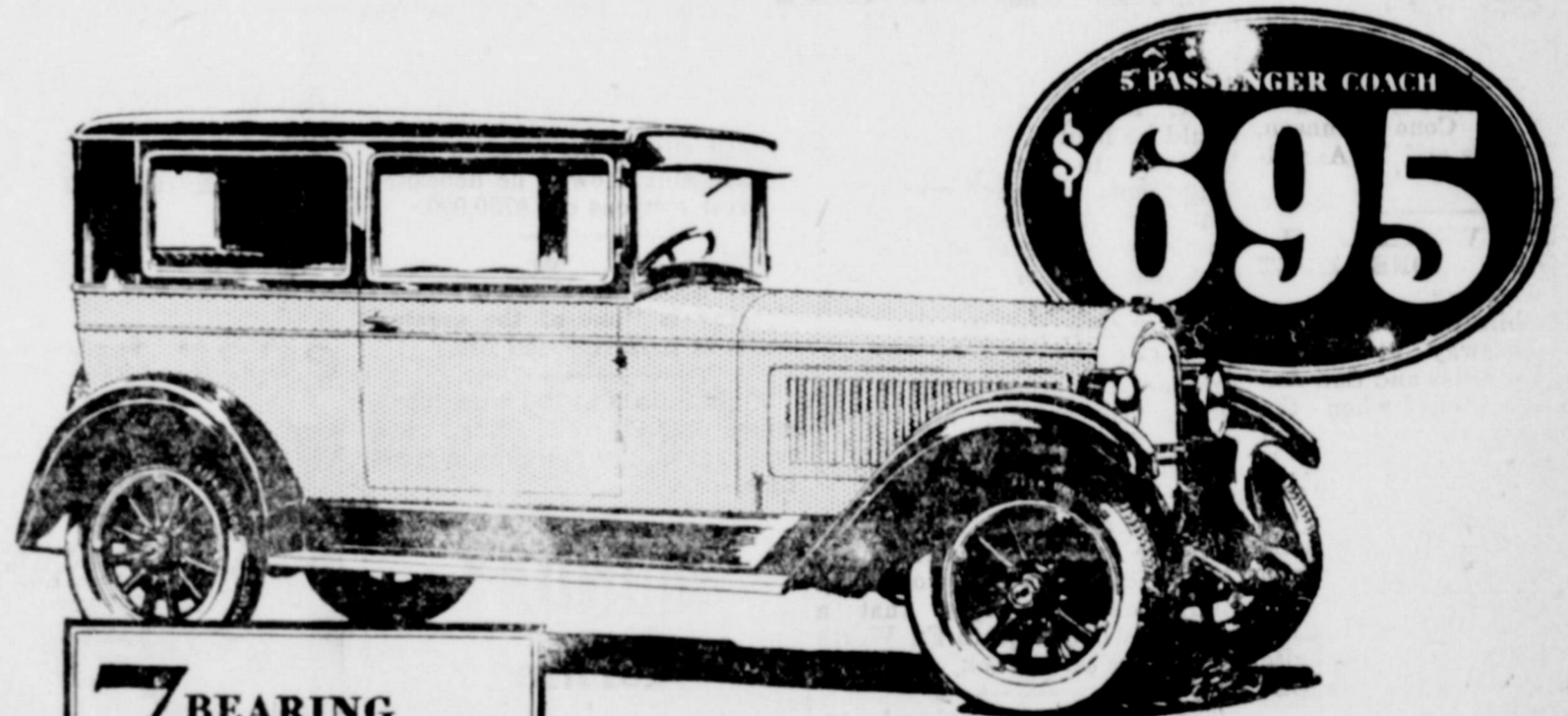
