## Funeral for Bennett Held In Capital

(By International News Service) NEW YORK, April 27.—The train bearing the body of Floyd Bennett left for Washington at 10:25 o'clock this morning.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 27.—The Ford plane bearing the German and Irish flyers to Floyd Bennett's funeral passed over Plattsburg at 10:30 o'clock. It was reported over Burlington, Vermont, at 11 o'clock.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The German ambassador formally requested that the United States government take no official cognizance of today's visit of the German-Irish trans-Atlantic aviators owing to the fact that they are coming solely to attend Floyd Bennett's funeral.

CURTISS FIELD, N. Y., April 27.—The German and Irish flyers landed here at 1:50 o'clock this afternoon en route to attend the obsequies for Floyd Bennett, who died after bringing them success at Greenly Island. The trans-Atlantic flyers expected to resume their flight after refueling here.

LAKE ST. AGNES, April 27.—With Bernd Balchen piloting, the Ford plane bearing Baron Gunther von Huenefeld and Captain Herman Koehl, German flyers, and Major James Fitzmaurice, Irish Free State aviator, and Miss Herta Junkers, daughter of the manufacturer and designer of the Bremen, took off for Washington

at 7:10 o'clock this morning to attend the funeral of Floyd Bennett, who died of pneumonia, contracted while taking replacement parts and fuel to the Bremen's crew at Greenly Island.

NEW YORK, April 27.—The body of Floyd Bennett, arrived here this morning and was taken on an army caisson to the 71st Regiment Armory here where for one hour his townsfolk will honor him.

Burial will be made in Arlington National Cemetery at Washington this afternoon.

## FEDERAL TROOPS KILL 19 REBELS IN BATTLE

(By International News Service) MEXICO CITY, April 27.—Nineteen Liberator rebels were killed when four hundred insurgents unsuccessfully sought to ambush a federal column near Guajalotas, in the state of Guajuato, according to dispatches to the war department.

Runnels county farmers have their planting program well under way. No complaint about the season.

The farmer who watches the produce market instead of worrying about the cotton market, is the farmer with the bank account.

The Runnels County Co-operative Creamery, located at Ballinger, is distributing \$2,500 in cash every week among a certain number of farmers. This equals to one dollar per farm, and the amount is increasing.

One automobile for every 5.13 persons in the United States was registered last year. The thirteen-hundredths of a person owns a car in Runnels county, and at the present speed the ratio will set a new mark in this county this year.

**WOLF SKULL AND RIFLE  
ADORN MONUMENT BUILT  
FOR NEW RUSSIAN HERO**

SEMIPALATINSK, Siberia, April 27.—All northern Siberia where the sun is beginning to shine three hours a day after a long dark winter, is talking about Konstantine, a peasant, who fought the season's most heroic battle with wolves and lost.

Konstantine drove into a pack of ferocious Siberian wolves on a lonely road 100 miles north of here. His horse broke loose and fled in fright dumping him on the road with his rifle. He backed up against a snowdrift and faced the beasts. He shot three in succession and the pack devoured its dead comrades before advancing on him.

Konstantine evidently kept this up eight times because a searching party which found nothing but his skeleton, rifle and bits of clothing, detected the bones of at least 24 wolves in little heaps on a trail leading to his own remains from a distance of 100 feet.

Peasants of the neighborhood will erect a monument to the hero of the North, cementing the rifle into the base of a stone slab and mounting a wolf's skull on top.

Woodward, at Coleman, who has appointed a committee to rate the winning papers from the counties in his senatorial district and declare the winners of the said district. District winners will be sent to the state department of education for rating to determine state winners. Twenty-five dollars in gold is offered by Mr. Marrs for the winning essay in each division over the entire state. Fred Kiechle, of the Farmers & Merchants State Bank, Ballinger, offered \$5 in gold to the winner in each division in Runnels county. Following is Miss Matejowsky's essay:  
"QUALITIES OF GOOD CITIZENSHIP"

The most important element of good citizenship is the spirit of public service. The conduct of a good citizen will at all times be controlled by the thought of service he can render for the public welfare rather than by thoughts for selfish advantages. Good citizenship rests on a solid foundation—the personal character of the citizen. This includes knowledge, discipline, and efficiency, besides the qualities which make up moral character. The civic self-control, for he must not only character of the citizen includes want to do right but he must have the will power to keep from doing wrong. If a citizen wants to do right, he finds that he needs ideals if conduct. He should want to do right for the sake of right. The proper solution for a good citizen would then be a strong character, good common sense, and knowledge not all found in books.

The average citizen falls down,

particularly, on his duties and obligations. He claims his rights and privileges quickly but he is not so quick to respond to his obligations. A good citizen must do all that he can if he wants his property, as well as himself, to be protected, and he should pass no criticism as to how to run the government if he takes no part in it. Voting is considered one of the highest duties of a citizen. If he is eligible to vote, he has also an obligation not simply to vote but to vote as his conscience and intelligence dictate. It is therefore, an essential to good citizenship that the person participating in the government has an education, to some extent anyway, in order that he may reason with himself and others as to what is best. He should be educated to the extent that he may vote intelligently, and be able to read and interpret the meaning of the laws of our country.

The first duty of a citizen is to know his duties and obligations, for if he is ignorant of his duty he probably will not do it. It is just as essential to good government for the private citizen to discharge the responsibilities resting upon him as it is for the official to render his services for the public good, and it is as much the duty of the citizen to enforce the law as it is of the peace officer because the peace officer needs the help of the citizen. We need more men who will work for the public good rather than those of politics who work for money alone. The best citizen is the one who does most for his community, and not the one for whom most is done.

Obedience to constituted authority is a quality of good citizenship. We must also obey the laws so we can keep from injuring others and their property. Regard for the rights of others is considered one of the primary duties of a citizen.

Patriotism is an outstanding quality of good citizenship. A person must be very unselfish if he is a true patriot. For instance, he should change his party when he sees that another is better, and he should vote for the man best fitted for a certain office rather than to let favoritism enter in. Patriotism is another name for public spirit. A true patriot will not only demand his right and privileges but he will also fulfill his duties. His patriotism will assert itself not only in time of excitement, in crisis, or in an emergency but also in every day life. He will live and work for his country as well as die for it.

A good citizen will serve on a jury when called upon. Jury service is sometimes very hard and

disagreeable work and most business men shirk from it but that is wrong. If the competent and intelligent men refuse to serve, then it falls to the incompetent and unintelligent men who become professional jurymen, and whose verdicts are unsafe and unreliable.

Honesty is an essential to good citizenship. It is a result of activity with and about the things we are to accomplish.

A good citizen will render military service when called upon. He should sacrifice himself for the good of the community, and should be ready to help the government against attacks by a foreign government, state or city.

The citizen is held responsible for the obedience of the laws of the nation, state, and cities. A good citizen will always put the interest of the public before personal interest.

In conclusion, it can be said that a good citizen is patriotic, educated to some extent obedient to the laws of the country, honest and trustworthy. It is one who will vote when eligible, serve on the jury when summoned, and render military service in time of need. A real citizen will put the interest of the whole community before personal interests and will do all he can to promote the public welfare. Public spirit helps the community to be progressive and uplifts the individual.

### OVERDOSE OF RADIUM LEADS TO NEW PLANS FOR TREATING CANCER

(By International News Service) LONDON, Apr. 27.—The curing of a cancer patient by an accidental overdose of radium, described by A. E. Hayward Pinch, director of the Radium Institute, is believed by physicians here to have opened up a new field of investigation in the campaign against the disease.

In reply to Sir Edward Gavan, who asked a question concerning the dangers incurred in using radium, Pinch told the story of a patient who was cured by an overdose.

"The patient," he said, "was ordered a 100 mg. tube of radium for 24 hours. By an error, a second 24 hours dose was given, and the growth absolutely and completely disappeared."

Such a dose, the speaker added, would not have been given deliberately.

### FIND STONE STATUE SAID TO BE OVER 500 YEARS OLD

(By International News Service) LONDON, April 27.—A stone statue of a king, believed to be more than 500 years old, and to have once stood in a niche in Westminster Cathedral, has been discovered in the back garden of a house in a London suburb.

The statue was half-buried in a heap of rubbish. It is about five feet in height, and is that of a bearded king, crowned, and

"I cannot understand how it came to be classed as rubbish," an antiquarian declared. "Indications are that the statue stood on the north porch of Westminster Hall, which was built by order of Richard II, in 1395."

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
