Pure Co. Makes New Location

The latest development in the Runnels county oil situation this week is the location made for a new well on the H. Giesecke Ranch, about eighteen miles from Ballinger. The location is northwest of the old No. 1 well of the Gulf Production Company. The surveyor's numbers for the new test have not yet been made known.

Gulf No. 1 sprayed oil over the derrick and was considered a real producer in a wildcat field over ten years ago, and other wells in this vicinity seemed to bear out the theory that oil pay is close. Thorough geological studies have been made of the area.

No announcement has been made as to when the new well will be spudded, but it is expected to be started immediately.

Hoover Leads In Campaign Expenditures

 WASHINGTON, June 6.—Herbert Hoover led the field in both parties in amount of money received and spent in the presidential campaign, the Senate presidential funds committee announced here today.

Hoover spent \$339,028.21, the investigation revealed, and Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York, was second, with expenditures of \$121,822.11.

CONSTRUCTION OF SAN ANGELO HOTEL WILL BEGIN SOON

SAN ANGELO, June 6.—Confidence that construction work will be under way on the 14-story Hilton Hotel here before July 1 has been expressed by E. M. Morgan, of the firm of Korn & Morgan, architects. Bids for the general contract for the construction of the hotel will be opened at the Hilton Hotel in Dallas on June 20, and if the contract is awarded at that time actual construction work can be started within a week from that date, Mr. Morgan has stated.

The hotel will be built for B. B. Hail, of the West Texas Lumber Company here, and has been leased to the Hilton Hotel Company. It will occupy a site at the corner of Twelfth and Oakes streets now occupied by the yards and office of the West Texas Lumber Company, which will be moved to the \$25,000 home of the company being completed on the Santa Fe tracks.

MUSSOLINI MAKES WAR ON FLY AND MOSQUITO

Republicans Contest Seat of Delegates

 KANSAS CITY, June 6.—The Republican National Committee this afternoon voted overwhelmingly to seat the Texas delegation at large, led by R. B. Creager, of Brownsville. It is believed that twenty-two Creager district delegates will be seated today.

KANSAS CITY, June 6.—The fight between Creager and anti-Creager factions of the Texas Republicans for delegations to the Kansas City convention got under way today with hearings marked by bitter exchanges on both sides.

Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach, of San Antonio, hurled a charge that Creager had accepted money from the Hoover management, as brought out by the Senate committee. Declaring that Creager had said in an interview that he would win because a majority of the members of the contest committee were Hoover men, Wurzbach said, "I can't believe that the committee is going to settle the contest on the basis of presidential candidacies."

"Goose-neck" Bill McDonald, Ft. Worth negro, followed Wurzbach with a scathing attack on the Creager forces.

Creager opened the fight by charging that his opponents made "loose" statements, and detailed the convention system of Texas.

Ex-Senator Irvine L. Lenroot, of Wisconsin, counsel for the Hoover forces, closed arguments for the Creager side.

Follow-Governor Moody's address, Mrs. Minnie Fisher Cunningham will discuss "Public Welfare in Federal Government." Frank Luther Mott, director of the University of Iowa school of journalism, will speak on "Women and Newspapers."

Tso-Lin Is Still Alive

**CONGESTING STREETS
LEADING TO FIRES**

Those dashing to the fire in automobiles in Hillcrest Monday afternoon are responsible to a great extent for the accident that might have proved fatal which occurred when the car in which Chief Louis Cohen was driving to the fire brushed down and ran over Hubert Zappe, fireman.

Despite a city ordinance to the contrary, hundreds congested the streets leading to the subdivision, hindering the passage of the fire department, and even endangering lives as well as property.

It was due to the conglomeration of automobiles near the fire that Chief Cohen's vision was obstructed. Had not so many cars been carelessly parked in that vicinity, it is most probable that the accident would not have occurred.

Effective fire-fighting requires specialized training, and the work of a volunteer fireman is a technical one. If a fire department is to be proficient, it must be accorded every cooperation on the part of the citizens.

Not only is the congestion of streets a disadvantage to the fire boys, when excited spectators break for a fire, but also the milling throng on the grounds interferes with the work of the squad.

In many cities ordinances are

vigorously enforced, and drivers immediately pull to the curb and stop when an alarm is sounded. But it should not be necessary to enforce an ordinance of this nature; public sentiment and a sense of civic cooperation should prompt a strict observance of the content of the ordinance.

When we assist the fire department in this manner, its efficiency will be increased.

**4-H Club Members To
Visit Lee Model Farm**

On June 14th the 4H Club boys and girls and the Women's Clubs of Runnels county will make an inspection trip to the R. Q. Lee model farm at Cisco.

Mr. Lee has bought a worn-out, run-down farm about two miles out of Cisco and has changed it into a model farm for the people of Eastland county. This farm has been placed under a complete system of terraces in order to conserve moisture and build up the soil.

Mr. Lee also purchased some fine dairy cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry in order to carry out a truly diversified plan of farming. The houses, barns, equipment have all been arranged with an idea of saving labor, giving the best service and cutting down operation expenses. The sum of \$30,000 has been spent in establishing this farm and those who have seen it claim it is a fine model to adopt.

The trip will be under the supervision of C. W. Lehmburg, county agent, and Mrs. Lara Hollingsworth, home demonstration agent.

The trippers will leave Ballinger at 6 o'clock, arriving at Winters at 6:45, and will be joined there by those going from the northern part of the county. The trip is scheduled by way of Abilene. The rest of the morning will be spent inspecting the model farm.

Everybody is expected to bring lunch which will be spread in picnic style at the big dam at 12:30 o'clock.

In the afternoon the club members will judge some of the livestock on the farm and visit some

of the big poultry farms around Cisco.

This is to be an educational trip as well as an outing for the club members. However, anyone who wants to make the trip is most welcome to go, and especially the parents of the 4H Club boys and girls are urged to go, said Mr. Lehmburg. It will be an encouragement to the boys and girls and, no doubt will have an educational value for the grown-ups, he added.

A few extra cars will be available to carry the boys and girls who have no other way of going. Those who are contemplating making the trip should get in touch with Mrs. Hollingsworth and Mr. Lehmburg at once, so proper arrangements can be made for everyone, it was advised.

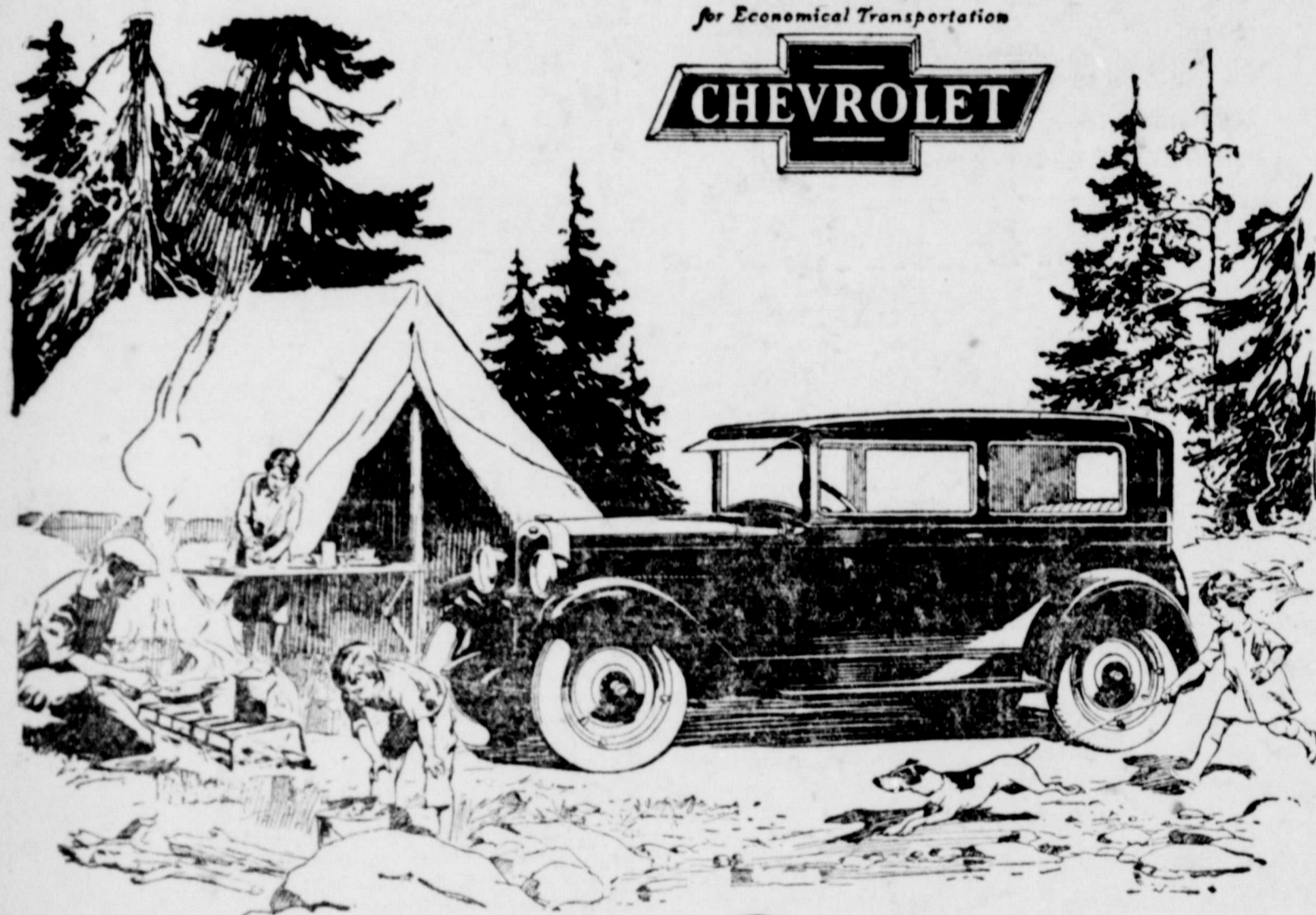

Lynn Bills San Angelo "Bon Voyage"

Speaking as a representative of Ballinger, Estes M. Lynn, prominent real estate and loan agent here, bade "a good voyage to the trusty ship San Angelo on her embarkation on the sea of industrialism" at the first annual manufacturers' banquet on the roof garden of the St. Angelus Hotel there Tuesday night.

Ballinger, as well as other neighboring cities, are looking to San Angelo for a rapid but substantial development industrially, Mr. Lynn said, and the attitude of the various towns is most friendly toward San Angelo. The interests of one city in this section are the interests of all, he pointed out.

A representative of The Ledger accompanied Mr. Lynn on the trip. More than 150 attended the banquet. The program was broadcast over KGFL. The menu of the banquet was composed of San Angelo products.

The principal address of the evening was made by Chas. R. Tips, of the Three Rivers Glass Company, outlining the progress of the infant industry that grew to amazing proportions within a short time.

"Raw products are essentially an important consideration," said Mr. Tips. "Markets and labor supply are also important. Any industry in its infancy must be operated by men who have the utmost faith in its possibilities."

Touching on the success of the plant in which he is interested, the speaker showed that it promised to be "a monument to the stupidity of its founders" in the early stages of its operations. "A promoter attempted to put over the proposition for us, but proved a failure," he said in part.

"However, he paved the way, and showed us that we had the material and the desirable situation for the manufacture of a high grade of glass. Not until we had secured sufficient local support did our plant pass through the experimental stage and become a dependable, profitable enterprise."

"Develop your infant indus-

tries." Tips admonished the manufacturers. "Plan to develop your enterprises with local aid, and keep confidence in your fellow citizen. Little foreign capital can be brought into an unproven field. You must pave the way for industrial development, by establishing proof that plants are profitable in this section."

Houston Harte, toastmaster at the banquet, declared that San Angelo was well situated in the midst of good communities, and that it was the friendly feeling of these various towns that has made for the progress of San Angelo. "San Angelo's hopes for industrial development are not based on a desire to be one great city," he said, "but to be one of many prosperous, thriving cities."

A petition asking that a permanent building be erected at the All-West Texas Exposition grounds by the association for the purpose of providing a place for industrial exhibits was signed by practically every manufacturer at the meeting.
