SECRETARY HOOVER'S GAIN FAVORS DEMOCRATS

"Queen Of Diamonds" Off On Trans-Atlantic Flight

(By International News Service)
ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., June 12.—Waving a gay farewell to her mother, Miss Mabel Boll, "queen of diamonds," hopped from here at 7:19 o'clock this morning in the monoplane Columbia on the first leg of her proposed trans-Atlantic flight.

Plans of Miss Boll and her two male companions to take off have for several days been frustrated, and Charles A. Levine, sponsor of the flight, entertained doubts as to the probability of the trip being under way before the middle of the week.

The Columbia is the same plane in which Levine made a successful ocean flight.

Fifty Club Members To Visit Farm

Fifty members of the boys and girls' clubs of the county will make an inspection trip to a model farm at Cisco Thursday, according to reports from the various communities received by C. W. Lehmburg, county agent, who with Mrs. Lura Holingsworth, home demonstration agent, will supervise the trip.

The farm to be visited is known as the R. Q. Lee farm, which was formerly a worn-out, run-down place two miles from Cisco. Mr. Lee, a progressive farmer, converted the place into a model farm for the citizens of Eastland county.

Improvements on the place include a complete system of terraces, a diversified program of high types of dairy cattle, sheep, hogs, and poultry; and modern buildings and farm equipment, arranged along labor-saving plans.

Club members in this section of the county will assemble at the court house early Thursday morning, and the group will leave at 6 o'clock, arriving in Winters about 6:45 o'clock. Club members in the northern section of the county will gather in Winters, where they will join the caravan from here.

The trip is scheduled by way of Abilene. Basket lunch will be provided by the club members, and dinner will be served picnic style at 12:30 o'clock at the Cisco dam.

Mrs. Sue Jackson, 73, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. S. Kellogg, in Coleman at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, following an illness of three weeks. The body will be brought to her home this afternoon, and funeral services will be conducted at the cemetery by Rev. J. H. McClain, pastor of the Ballinger Baptist Church, at 10:30 o'clock tomorrow morning, after which burial will take place.

Surviving Mrs. Jackson are two daughters, Mrs. Kellogg of Coleman, and Mrs. Will H. Brown of Winters, and one son, W. F. Jackson of South Ballinger; and twelve grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Jackson had been a resident of Ballinger for nearly 40 years, having moved to her home a mile south of town 39 years ago, from Brenham. Her first husband, Hugh Jackson, died in 1912, and her second husband, E. D. Jackson, brother of the former, died five years later.

Italia Crew Forced To Cease Communications

Youth Held In Burglary Case Pleads Guilty

A plea of guilty of theft was made by Barley Oxford, youth of this city, to Sheriff R. E. McWilliams, when held for questioning in connection with a burglary which occurred on the Berry farm, eight miles from here on the Crews road, last Thursday.

Five or six cotton choppers, of which young Oxford was one, were at work on the Berry farm last week, and on Thursday Mr. and Mrs. Berry came to town, leaving no one in charge at the house. Upon returning, they found that a wrist watch, diamond ring, and ruby ring were missing, and their suspicions centered on the laborers. They immediately acquainted Sheriff McWilliams with the circumstances of the theft, and an investigation was promptly under way.

The sheriff interrogated the workers, and at noon Sunday obtained a confession from young Oxford, purporting that he alone was guilty. The stolen loot was recovered. Charges have not yet been filed.

ROME, June 12.—In a radio message received here, General Umberto Nobile, commander of the ill-fated polar dirigible Italia, stated that his radio storage batteries were practically exhausted, and that transmission of messages would be stopped for a few days until means of recharging the batteries had been devised.

General Nobile made an urgent appeal for supplies, including boots, rifles, ammunition, medicines, sledges, cigarettes, an oil stove, and three pneumatic boats. He stated that he had rationed supplies carried by the Italia to last fifty days, and that the party has erected a re-entined tent on an ice-floe to attract aviators dispatched in search of the stranded crew.

KANSAS CITY, June 12.—The virtual nomination of Herbert Hoover reacted in favor of the Democratic party here today. Immediately after the Pennsylvania and Massachusetts leaders threw their strength to Hoover, the Farm Bloc began preparations for a new fight in November, the backers of the farm movement promising the mid-west vote to the Democratic party if the Houston convention will adopt the principles embodied in the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill.

CONVENTION HALL, Kansas City, June 12.—A political band wagon, with Herbert Hoover sitting in the driver's seat, lumbered into Kansas City's big auditorium today for the first session of the Republican National Convention.

There was scarcely a delegate on the floor nor a party chieftain on the platform that did not concede the nomination of Hoover on the first ballot, which will probably be taken Thursday.

Caucuses of the Pennsylvania and Massachusetts delegations this morning put both definitely in the Hoover column, the former voting to support Hoover on the first ballot. These acquisitions put the pledged votes for the secretary of commerce well over the half-way mark necessary for nomination.

The floor of the convention hall was packed and the galleries were jammed to suffocation when Chairman William M. Butler strode to the rostrum and banged his gavel sharply at 11 o'clock. At this time wavering delegations were caucusing on the floor and voting to support Hoover.

Idaho, which intended to give a complimentary vote to Senator Borah, and New Jersey, where Frank O. Lowden had some

strength, both announced that they would support Hoover from the start.

KANSAS CITY, June 12.—Senator Charles Curtis, Kansas' favorite son candidate, today refused to concede the nomination to Herbert Hoover, despite the action of the Pennsylvania and Massachusetts delegations this morning. Senator Curtis declared that the ballot was not yet started, and that he would fight until the nomination was definitely made.

Louis L. Emerson, head of the anti-Hoover coalition, stated, "We are still for Lowden; if we are licked, it will be while we are still fighting."

KANSAS CITY, June 12.—Chairman Wm. Butler was as solemn as a tree full of owls as he declared a quorum present at the Republican convention and asked all to rise while the Rev. S. C. Partridge, an Episcopal rector, offered the invocation.

The first outburst came when Madame Ernestine Schumann-Heink led the assembly in singing "The Star-Spangled Banner." Secretary Mellon got an ovation as he walked to his place in the Pennsylvania delegation while Butler was reading the temporary roll of the convention.

After Secretary Roy O. West read the call of the convention, Butler described the methods of functioning of the national convention. Senator Fess, the keynote, then began his speech.

Fess was one of the original "draft-Coolidge" men, and newspaper men asked him if he intended to revise his speech, in view of the overwhelming swing

Man Wanted In Abilene Is Captured

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams of this county, Sheriff H. T. O'Bar of Taylor county, and Sheriff Willie Warren of Concho county, captured a man named Hamilton, wanted in Abilene, at his hiding place on the Concho River, at a point about twenty-five miles southwest of here, at 6 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Hamilton sawed his way to liberty from the Abilene jail three weeks ago, after languishing in a cell since his arrest two months ago on a charge of counterfeiting. Complete equipment for the illicit manufacture of paper and silver money was recovered at the time of his arrest.

Working on a clue that the fugitive was secluding himself in a vacant house on the Concho River, Sheriff McWilliams conducted investigations, and summoned Sheriffs O'Bar and Warren, and the man-hunt was planned.

Arriving at a point near the location of the shack in which the convict was said to be in hiding, the trio deserted their car and crept stealthily upon the place. A cautious search showed that Hamilton was not in the house, but proof that he was using it for sleeping quarters was in evidence. Sheriff O'Bar maintained guard over the shack, while Sheriffs McWilliams and Warren separated in quest of the man.

Stealing to a point on the bank of the river nearest the deserted house, the two discovered Hamilton in the act of preparing his evening meal. He was commanded to surrender, and was immediately in the hands of the officers.

Hamilton was supplied with complete cooking equipment, and had fresh provisions on hand, which indicated that he was being assisted in evading apprehension, Sheriff McWilliams asserted. He was removed to Abilene where he will be imprisoned under guard, pending trial on a charge of counterfeiting.

Make Plans For Financing Trip To Short Course

A series of carnivals, entertainments, and box suppers will be held in the various communities supporting clubs within the next three weeks as a means of raising funds for the purpose of financing the trip of the county delegation to the A. & M. Mr. Lehmburg and Mrs. Lura Hollingsworth, home demonstration agent, are endeavoring to have an attendance of nearly 150 members this year.

The proceeds derived from each community will be subscribed to

a general fund, which will go to the expenses of the entire membership, Mr. Lehmburg said. Plans for the trip have not yet been worked out, he added, there having been no decision as to whether the club members will go by rail or automobile.

Four boy-teams are being trained by Mr. Lehmburg for competition in as many contests of the short course. These teams will enter contests in livestock, grain, and poultry judging, and terracing. The livestock judging team will consist of three boys and one alternate, and each of the other teams will be made up of two members and one substitute.

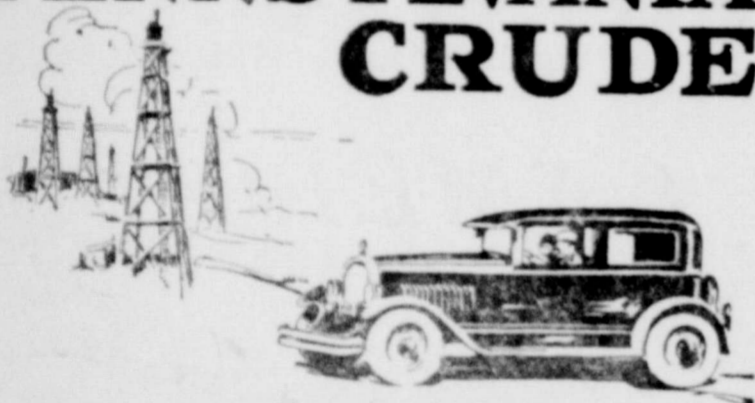
