 Replying to Mrs. Wilson, the governor stated: "If I could leave behind me an approach to the noble record of service made by Woodrow Wilson, your husband, then my efforts shall not have been useless."

LONDON, June 30.—The search for Captain Roald Amundsen, noted Arctic explorer, who has been missing almost two weeks since he went via airplane seeking the stranded Nobile expedition, today shifted to the region between Bear Island and Spitzbergen.

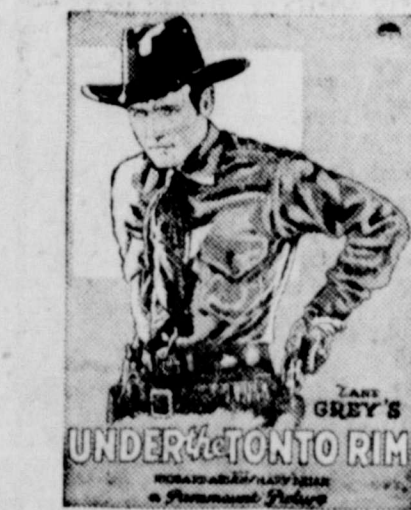

### AUTO WRECK DAMAGE MAY BE DEDUCTED IN PAYING INCOME TAX

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, July 2.

A second victory has been scored by the tax-paying motorist in the recent decision of the Circuit Court of Appeals which has ruled that a motorist may deduct from his income the damages sustained when his automobile participates in a collision.

The appellate tribunal's ruling holds that the deduction may be made irrespective of whether the vehicle was being operated by the owner or an agent, at the time of the collision, and may be taken although such damage resulted from "faulty driving. In the event of a willful act or negligence is the cause of the accident, the deduction is not allowable.

The court's decision was rendered in a case where an automobile was damaged while in unauthorized possession of the taxpayer's chauffeur who had taken the car out for his own use and not to the owner's knowledge and against his orders.

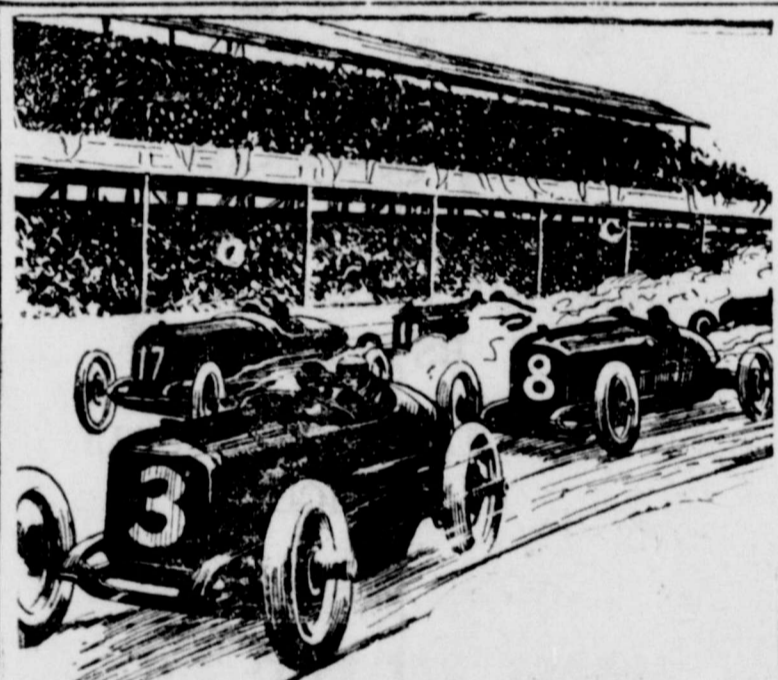
